RULES OF ORDER.

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from

the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:

(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present, the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and, if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS.

CAMBRIDGE DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:

With profound gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His providence and due appreciation to the pastors and people for their cordial hospitality and charty co-operation, I present this my third annual report of the Cambridge District.

Several of our charges have been revisited by the epidemic of Influenza. The churches were closed for four and five weeks. Added to this has been the excitement of a threatening epidemic of smallpox covering all our work located in Sussex County, Delaware. Indeed the Indian River section including the Trinity Charge, was under strict quarantine from October until January. Our pastor and his people suffered severely. Several succumbed to the dreaded disease.

Revs. W. J. Helm, C. W. Downes and Mrs. Jose Angulo each have lost their mother. Rev. L. E. Toulson and Mrs. J. R. Holland each their brother. Mrs. J. C. Bantom and Mrs. D. H. Hargis each lost their father. Several of the pastors and their families have been slightly indisposed but none has been seriously ill besides Rev. and Mrs. S. J. Hooper and Mrs. J. C. Bantom and Mrs. J. H. Harmon. This with the bad weather rendering the public roads in the rural charges almost and at some points impassable during all of February and a goodly part of March has made this a year of strenuous effort fraught with varied difficulties. But by His grace our immediate ranks are unbroken.

We have achieved some good results. The pastors' reports will show that we have surpassed all previous records.

Survey of Charges.

AIREY is the largest and most prosperous circuit on the district. Having no indebtedness it should have raised its benevolences in full. The pastor, Louis T. Robbins, has strenuously striven but these people have yet to learn to do big things for the Kingdom. Raised for apportioned benevolences, \$132; other collections advanced. Conversions, 4; accessions, 4.

BECKWITH, with W. T. Purnell, pastor, has enlarged her vision and increased her zeal to work for God's Kingdom. Pastoral support increased \$228. \$170 paid for parsonage improvements; raised for apportioned benevolences, \$50; other collections advanced. Conversions, 5; accessions, 18.

BOX IRON. This is a circuit of two churches. Girdletree has centered the greater part of her activity in home interest, liquidating the indebtedness on their church. Deeply engrossed also in securing funds to erect a new Public School building, the pastor, J. L. Nichols, has had to put forth no small effort to interest them in the benevolent causes. Rais-

ed for apportioned benevolences, \$122; other collections taken. Conversions, 11; accessions, 11.

BRIDGEVILLE. The District Retreat had a very wholesome effect on this Charge. It has surpassed all previous records financially. Apportioned benevolences, \$456 in full, other collections in full. Conversions, 38; accessions, 33. D. W. Henry, pastor.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT, under the pastorate of R. W. Thomas, has grown nightly in her power to accomplish. Pastoral support advanced \$200. Apportioned benevolences \$301 nearly raised in full; other collections increased. Conversions, 30; accessions, 30.

CAMBRIDGE—ST. LUKES. This is a Mission charge making its third report to the Annual Conference. \$35 for apportioned benevolences; other collections taken; paid on old indebtedness, \$137. Conversions, 18. D. R. Shockley, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE—WAUGH. These people taking the advantage of the prosperous times and following the leadership of their intrepid pastor, M. A. Thompson, has liquidated all indebtedness against the charge, \$1,554. Apportioned benevolences, \$344; pastoral support increased \$100. Conversions, 21; accessions, 21. Other collections taken in full.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT has paid \$362 on old indebtedness and \$68 on their apportioned benevolences. Conversions, 2; accessions, 2. The pastor, W. G. Matthews, has earnestly labored for a soul-stirring revival which is sorely needed to revitalize her interest in the fundamentals of God's Kingdom.

CHURCH CREEK, with E. F. Showell, pastor, has had a prosperous year. \$360 paid on old indebtedness; \$157 on apportioned benevolences. Conversions, 16; accessions, 22.

CRAPO, located in the tide-water section of the district, has been greatly handicapped by the hard Winter and the migration of the people. Led by their daring pastor, J. H. Dredden, they have wrought nobly. Apportioned benevolences, \$135. Conversions, 4; accessions, 4.

EAST NEW MARKET is noted for her leadership in doing things. Leading last year in conversions and also in Morgan College Half Century Campaign, this year was first over the top in the Centenary Financial Drive with Bridgeville clinging to her heels. Yet she is not weary nor faint, renewing her strength like the eagle, she still mounts upward. Conversions, 78; accessions, 78. Apportioned benevolences, \$345, nearly full; other collections advanced. D. S. Quillen, pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET CIRCUIT lacking in Spiritual vision, weak in righteous purpose is sorely in need of a gracious revival. A few of the people have conscientiously labored. Raised for all conference causes, \$89. Conversions, 3; accessions, 3. S. S. Lankford, pastor.

FEDERALSBURG after ten years has returned from her Babylonian Capitivity. She is again annexed to the Cambridge District. We welcome her return from exile. A very successful year has greeted her financially. Apportioned benevolences, \$218; other collections increased; \$318 raised

for old indebtedness. Conversions, 6. Accessions, 8. T. F. Johnson, pastor.

GOLDEN HILL. S. J. Hooper, pastor, having been seriously ill for ten weeks, is concluding his seventh year prosperously. He is a prophet with honor serving among his own people. \$122 apportioned benevolences; other collections advanced. Conversions, 12; accessions, 12.

HARRINGTON, having quickened her pace last year has grown somewhat weary. However, under the persistent leadership of her pastor, R. H. Coleman, some good results have been accomplished. \$340 raised toward remodeling the Church; \$81 raised for benevolences. Conversions, 5; accessions, 2.

HURLOCK, with L. E. Toulson, pastor, has had another successful year. Conversions, 27; accessions, 25. Washington Church renovated and paid for; \$250 paid on Union Grove Church; \$300 raised for a new Church at Petersburg. Apportioned benevolences \$336; and other collections advanced.

LAUREL, with C. W. Downes, pastor, taking opportunity by the forelock, worked unceasingly the year round except the twenty-one days they were quarrantined with the flu, scarlet fever and smallpox. Thus they logically report another successful year. \$207 for apportioned benevolences; other collections advanced; \$325 raised on a new Church. Conversions, 11; accessions, 25.

LEWES Spartan-like in her endeavor has wrought nobly against great odds. Paid on parsonage improvements, \$282; \$62 apportioned benevolences; other collections advanced; conversions 12; accessions 12. T. A. Johnson, pastor.

LINCOLN usually stands in first class. This year it has been handicapped thru the failure of her canning industry. Nevertheless, M. W. Clark pastor, has succeeded in rallying the forces. A modern heating plant has been installed at a cost of \$375. \$124 apportioned benevolences; other collections nearly in full; accessions 3.

LINKWOOD has been greatly weakened by the migration of her people. The remnant has been hindered from achieving success thru their intestinal division. \$74 raised for all Conference collections; conversions 20; accessions 20. E. H. Nichols, pastor.

MADISON'S progress has been retarded by the rebuilding of her public roads which impeded traffic. Nevertheless they report a fairly successful year. Pastoral support advanced \$100; apportioned benevolences \$104; other collections advanced; conversions 16; accessions 16. Jose Angulo, pastor.

MILFORD. W. E. Hilton, pastor, is ending his seventh year. He has strenuously labored in the midst of difficulties, snatching victory from the jaws of defeat. Seizing the opportunity proffered thru the death of the mortgage, the long standing indebtedness of \$1260 has been cancelled. \$245 apportioned benevolences; other collections advanced; conversions 3; accessions 4.

NASSAU, recovering from her grevious affliction of last year, has un-

der the pastorate of Alexander Reid excelled herself. \$238 apportioned benevolences; other collections advanced; the young people are receiving special pastoral oversight; conversions 17; accessions 17.

NEWARK, has surpassed her previous good record. Pastoral support increased \$100. Mortgage of \$200 on the parsonage has been cancelled; St. Peter's Church at Queponco remodeled and paid for; conversions 10; accessions 10; apportioned benevolences \$117; other collections taken. H. J. Stewart, pastor.

NORTH BELIN, well organized by T. H. Woodley, has, under the pastorate of J. R. Holland, become the leading appointment on the district. \$422 apportioned benevolences; other collections in full; \$2,552 paid on old indebtedness; conversions \$7; accessions 93; Pastoral support increased \$100. The flu revisited and closed this Church. Raised for all purposes \$4500.

PRESTON. We also welcome this charge's return to the district. The harmonious workings of her splendid organizations has enabled her to report unparalleled success financially. \$337 apportioned benevolences; other collections in full; \$749 paid on old indebtedness; \$307 raised on a new Church; conversions 7; accessions 7. The remarkable good thing about this charge is, nearly all the young people are Christian. D. G. Waters, pastor.

SEAFORD. This charge has witnessed a gracious revival. Conversions 58; accessions 58; pastoral support increased \$100; \$141 raised on apportioned benevolences; other collections nearly full; old indebtedness reduced. J. C. Bantom, pastor.

SINEPUXENT, with J. H. Harmon, pastor, has enjoyed another prosperous year. \$200 raised on old indebtedness and improvements. Apportioned benevolences and Conference collections advanced; conversions 8; accessions 5.

SNOW HILL, greatly stirred by the District Retreat, has experienced a great spiritual awakening. Conversions 96; accessions 88; \$334 apportioned benevolences; other collections in full; old indebtedness reduced; pastoral support increased \$200. Immediately after the revival the flu revisited this community, closing the Church for three weeks. W. J. Helm, pastor.

SNOW HILL CIRCUIT under the pastorate of W. E. Davis, has quickened her pace and increased her loyalty. Apportioned benevolences and other collections \$108, far in advance of previous years. Conversions 6; accessions 4.

SOUTH BERLIN has been greatly weakened by the migration of her people. The parsonage has been renovated; apportioned benevolences \$66 and other collections advanced. Conversions 7; accessions 8. R. R. Robinson, pastor.

STOCKTON, like Girdletree, has also been interested in collecting funds to erect a new Public School building. This with four weeks revisit of the flu has deterred the pastor, L. H. Martin, in obtaining his goal for benevolent causes. However, some praiseworthy results have been ob-



tained. \$215 paid on old indebtedness; \$146 apportioned benevolences; other collections taken; conversions 21; accessions 21.

STOCKTON CIRCUIT still maintains her record under the pastorate of B. B. Carson. Apportioned benevolences advanced; the other collections taken; \$210 paid on old indebtedness and improvements; conversions 16; accessions 8.

TRINITY has been grievously afflicted for four months with small-pox. Nevertheless, all things considered, the pastor, W. H. Saunders, brings a fair report. Apportioned benevolences \$63 advanced; the other collections taken; \$200 paid on parsonage improvements; pastoral support increased \$100. Conversions 8; accessions 8.

VIENNA has enjoyed another prosperous year. \$350 paid on Church improvements and \$350 raised to obtain a counter gift of \$500 to erect a new Public School building. Apportioned benevolences \$89; other collections in full; conversions 21; accessions 17. J. W. Parker, pastor.

WHALEYVILLE with E. H. Jolley pastor, has done well. \$200 paid on old indebtedness; apportioned benevolences \$85 and other collections advanced; conversions 22; accessions 22.

FRANKFORD, Solomon Hammond, pastor, has labored in the midst of varied obstacles and difficulties. \$170 paid on old indebtedness; disciplinary and other collections taken. The pastor, a veteran of the Civil War, requests the Conference to retire him so he can better attend to his sick wife.

District Activities.

Our lay members always look forward with happy anticipation to the District Conference and District Sunday School and Epworth League Convention. Both the Conference and Convention were highly instructive and inspirational. This year we endeavored to conduct them largely as Seminars of Methods covering the various phases of the Centenary activities, as well as Academic Education. Among the able educators and Christian statesmen who greatly stirred and felicitated us, were Pres. W. C. Jason, of Delaware State College for Colored Youth; Vice Pres. Wm. Pickens of Morgan College; Prin. T. H. Kiah of Princess Anne Academy; Dr. F. H. Butler, Secretary of Christian Stewardship and our own District Superintendents. The impressions were far-reaching. Many of our Sunday Schools raised their Missionary Apportionment in full. Several of our youths beholding the intellectual and spiritual water boiling up and gushing forth from these giant geysers, have made their way to Princess Anne Academy, Morgan College, Delaware State College for Colored Youth and other Schools to prepare themselves for Life Service. The District Conference is tending toward the momentum and dignity of our Annual Conference.

Our Monthly Preachers' Meeting, rotating from charge to charge by special invitation, has been a tower of strength in generating and maintaining the spiritual solidarity of the district.

Five of our pastors attended the Summer School for Rural Pastors at Drew Theological Seminary and Dickinson College. The improved efficiency of their ministry more than justifies the establishment of the Department of Rural Work in the Board of Home Missions and Church Ex-

tension, to extend this benefaction more largely thruout the Rural Section of our Methodism.

Nearly all our pastors observed Good Literature Day. Resulting in the importation of much wholesome information. The Church literature is being more largely purchased and more widely read.

Temperance.

Notwithstanding the vehement wail of the modern propagandists and the loud braggadocios of the corrupt politicians that the intemperance forces have just begun to fight—the death knell of John Barleycorn has been sounded. He has been buried more than four days by the overwhelming ratification of the 18th Amendment to the Constitution of the United States. Let us hope never to be resurrected. Joyous—glorious have been the benefits resulting from his burial. Crime has decreased 50%. The onerous duties of the police have been reduced to the minimum. Penal institutions once crowded are now practically empty.

Nevertheless, "Let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall." Eternal vigilance is the costly price of a continuous victory over the intemperance forces.

The late Colonel Theodore Roosevelt said—"Any work done by any man must have its influence, not upon the life of that man, but upon the lives of those coming after him. And just as this is true of the men of Lincoln's generation, so it will be true of those that follow us." We must incessantly and persistently indoctrinate the youth against intemperance. We must insist that the glorious benefits of the 18th Amendment shall accrue to the posterity of the whole world.

Public Education.

The social conscience of both the States of Delaware and Maryland is very greatly agitated concerning the status of the public schools. Maryland is endeavoring to secure legislative enactment to give an adequate salary to her teachers. We regret she is so grossly unfair in discriminating against her Negro teachers—recommending for them only \$550 minimum salary per year while the White teachers receive \$950.

The Delaware legislature recently passed an enactment giving them one of the best modern school systems in the United States. This code has been supplemented by a \$2,500,000 gift by Mr. P. S. Dupont. An equitable portion of which, \$900,000, is to be applied to the erection and equipment of modern school buildings for the negro youth. Her difficult task is to elect a legislature next Fall that will not repeal her splendid School Code.

Le us sincerely pray that Maryland will witness Peter's house-top vision with emphasis and that Delaware will be pre-eminently successful in obtaining a legislature profoundly in sympathy with the highest development of her youth.

Centenary Exhibit and Evangelism.

Visiting the Exhibit of the Centenary of Christian Missions last June and July, beholding that uniquely great panorama—"The ends of the

world brought to Columbus," one would have been callous to all religious sentiments had he not received this three-fold impression: 1st, The terribly sinful condition of the world, especially the Pagan, 2nd, The great financial and spiritual needs of the Kingdom; and, 3rd, Our individual responsibility to help to supply those needs. Therefore we have most heartily approved of the great Evangelistic Campaign launched by the Cleveland Conference of Bishops, District Superintendents and Pastors whose slogan is the conversion of one million of precious souls by June 1st, 1920.

We have most strenuously striven to cooperate with the Department

of Evangelism to secure our full quota.

The district has been completely organized according to the Centenary Calender of Evangelism. The nine group chairmen attended the Area Retreat held at Spring Garden St. Methodist Episcopal Church, Philadelphia, Pa. last October 20th, 21st. They returned from the sacred mount with their faces illumined with the divine presence in their hearts.

Earnestly endeavoring to disseminate this spiritual contagion to the last unsaved soul, three District Retreats were held at strategic points: Bridgeville, Del., November 12th; Cambridge and Snow Hill, Md., November 19th and 20th, respectively. Drs. J. W. Wagner, of Newton Centre, Mass., Leonard C. Murdock, Executive Secretary of the Area, and J. W. Jackson brought us inspiring messages. The pastors and people heard them gladly.

Besides a special Evangelistic meeting was held in each sub-district

group. And each church has endeavored to hold a revival.

The reaction from the war spirit left the people restless and in many cases unreceptive to the Evangelistic appeal. But it affords me great joy to state that the pastors have unsparingly and unselfishly labored to have all the unsaved in their charges to become acquainted with God, personally, experiencing "The great peace."

The Centenary Financial Campaign.

Enthusiastically launching the Financial Campaign from May 18th to May 25th the full quota of the district was subscribed over the top with a goodly margin. But the actualizing of subscription into real cash money was another proposition.

Those pastors who have succeeded in getting their people to work consistently the plan have done well.

The Centenary of Christian Missions is a stupendously large undertaking. We have been training in methods. We have been learning the preliminaries. Both pastors and people will do better this ensuing year.

Summary.

Zealously laboring to advance the various causes of the Church and the Kingdom, 31 pastors out of 37 have had their salaries increased. Indications are that the laity will be still more appreciative of their sterling worth this ensuing year. Our earnest endeavor will be to make the minimum estimate \$800 for each married pastor.

In the Quarterly Conferences we have continuously stressed the raising in full the amounts apportioned for Episcopal Fund and Conference Claimants and the Centenary requirements. There has been a graitfying

advance. Converts 738, which is 58% of our quota. Tithers 365; Life Service, 51; \$6,065 have been raised for apportioned benevolences; for improvements and old indebtedness, \$13,269.

The signs of the times are very propitious. The Kingdom is coming in its noonday splendor. The spirit of the Christ is molding the sentiments of the age. A mighty philanthropic and missionary influence is seizing the rich. Thousands of young men and women are forming the vanguard of God's great army. Strenuously endeavoring to take the world for Christ.

All forces seem to concur in this glorious work. The almost daily readjustments of science and invention. The wars of contending nations, the efforts of the Geo-physical societies, the immense commercial intercourse, the co-operation of governments as well as the work of the various missionary societies all conspire to extend His Kingdom to the uttermost part of the earth. God is fulfilling His royal promise—"Ask of me, and I will give thee the nations for thine inheritance, and the utmost parts of the earth for thy possession."

One loves to dream of and labor for the time when the science and the human government shall be perfected by the Christian religion. When God's will shall be perfectly done thruout the whole earth. Then the contentions of nations with nations will cease. Man will no longer wrong his fellow-man. All strife between capital and labor will be amicably adjusted. The caste will be abolished. All denominational differences will be disregarded. One vast and eternal federation will exist. There shall neither be Caucasian, Negro, Indian, Brown or Yellow Race, but all shall be one in Christ. And He shall be all and in all.

The difficult task of the grand old Methodist Episcopal Church will be fullly accomplished—

America and the world will be redeemed for the Christ.

With sincere gratitude to the pastors and the people for their hearty co-operation, I submit this, my third annual report.

Bishop and Brethren:-

In presenting this my second annual report, I realize that time is very precious. It is needed for consideration of important matters which are to come before this Conference. I shall help to save time by asking a privilege—I am sure you will grant—of making a brief report.

We rejoice that in the multitude of labors we have kept in good health. We appreciate greatly the cooperation of the pastors and churches on the district. Nearly all of the quarterly conferences I have held in person and have kept in close touch with the progress of the work.

The unusually long and severe winter, and almost impassable roads greatly hindered the spiritual and financial success of churches in the rural parts of the district. Many of them have been practically closed all

of the winter. Yet, the pastors have labored as best they could to make the best possible report for Centenary collections, and a number of souls, as a Centenary contribution to the Kingdom of Christ.

Charges.

BARCLAY has had fair success. The pastor labored and hoped for greater success, but the people were not of the same mind. Conversions—; accessions——; paid on improvements \$25; paid on church debt——; Centenary collection \$82; raised for all purposes \$178. Nicholas Brown, pastor.

CARMICHAEL under the leadership of its new pastor has had success. Conversions 11; accessions ——; paid for improvements \$52; paid for debts \$——; Centenary collection \$219; raised for all purposes \$517. I. D. Paine, pastor.

CATLIN is satisfied to retain its record of eleven years ago. It seems determined not to advance in any way. The pastor has been in serving. Conversions 8; accessions 6; paid on debts \$——; Centenary collection \$100; raised for all purposes \$201. K. S. Stewart, pastor.

CENTREVILLE has advanced along all lines. Every interest of the Church has been faithfully looked after. This charge is embarrassed because many of its good people have moved away in search of work and better wages. Yet, under the skilful leadership of the pastor a good year's work has been accomplished. This is the only church on the district to graduate a class from the Junior League course of study. Conversions 34; accessions 30; paid on improvements \$56; paid on debt \$735; Centenary collection \$249; raised for all purposes \$1,541. S. J. Horsey, pastor.

CENTREVILLE CT. reports a good year's work notwithstanding one of the churches failed to do its part of the work. Conversions 13; accessions —; paid for improvements \$90; paid on debt \$100; Centenary collection \$81; raised for all purposes \$517. G. W. Downs, pastor.

CHESTERTOWN under the leadership of its pastor is doing real constructive work. Debts are being paid, confidence of creditors restored, moral tone of the Charges advanced, spiritual life of the church quickened. The third quarterly conference invited the pastor to serve them for the fifth year. Conversions 27; accessions 20; paid for improvements \$98; paid on debts \$1,456; Centenary collection \$454; raised for all purposes \$3,036. W. H. Johns, pastor.

OHURCH HILL has advanced under the leadership of its pastor, who has been energetic in pushing the claims of the Church, and training the people for a deeper work of grace. GREENSBORO maintains its record. Revival spirit has prevailed throughout the year. Harmony prevails. The pastor has been faithful in his service and sends following report: Conversions 57; accessions 57; raised for improvements \$——; raised for debt \$270; Centenary collection \$269; raised for all purposes \$1,216. J. H. Blake, pastor.

Conversions 2; accessions 2; raised for improvements \$19; paid on debts \$226; Centenary collection \$139; raised for all purposes \$519. T. B. H. Coleman, pastor.

District Activities.

Our District Conference was held in Asbury M. E. Church, Easton, T. H. Woodley, pastor. This conference was an inspiration to both ministers and laymen. Reported attendance was over 300 persons. The reason for the large attendance is apparent. Every interest of the Church was looked after, and reports of pastors and laymen were-encouraging.

The educational interest was presented by Prof. T. H. Kiah, Princess Anne Academy; Prof. L. M. McCoy represented Morgan College; Dr. W. C. Jason, Delaware State College. W. H. Johns looked after the interest of the Southwestern Christian Advocate.

Centenary Program.

This program at first staggered our pastors. Many of them felt they were facing the impossible. But being inspired by the wave of enthusiasm which swept through the Church, and by the faith of our fathers, who dared to face dungeon, fire and sword for the sake of the Kingdom of Christ; these ministers of the most fligh God seemed to have accepted the task as a challenge from Heaven, and with a few exceptions put their quota over the top.

Increased Salaries.

The parsonage feels the high cost of living keenly. Inadequate support is an embarrassment to preachers and make impossible the largest efficiency on their part, for no man can be at his best when he is worry-

ing over making both ends meet. Too many officials are satisfied to see their pastors receive less compensation than the ordinary laborer.

An adequate ministerial supply will never be obtained until an adequate ssupport is secured the ministry. The recommendation of the Commission on Finance that \$1,300 should be the minimum cash salary for a preacher who gives his entire time to the work is none too high in these days of high prices and cheap dollars.

We are gratified with the deserved advances made in salaries of pastors. In nearly every case where the leader is a faithful preacher of the WORD and a true shepperd of the flock, the work of the Kingdom of God prospers. Because of faithful service of many of the pastors, we have been able in two years to increase the salary to the amount of \$3,956.

Evangelism.

The revival fire has burned on the district. Our preachers hail all methods which bring men to Christ. We are convinced that pastoral evangelism, and the "win one" method on the part of all the people is more resultful these days than the spasdomic efforts practised by our churches in former years. Now, each pastor is—or should be—his own evangelist for 365 days; with an intense yearning for souls, teaching the children the yoke of discipleship and personally leading men to Christ.

The primary effort of our Monthly Preacher's Meeting, wherever it may be held, is to win some one to Christ.

Temperance.

Sobriety and liberty have become enthroned. The thought and wish of the people have become the thought and wish of God. With glad amazement we hail the overthrow of humanity's unspeakable scourge, rum. We pray that it may never more become a traffic in this fair land of ours.

Sunday School and Epworth League.

These organizations as a rule, answer their purposes far better in the large towns and cities than they do in the country. Scarcely one-third of the children living in the rural part of our District attend Sunday School regularly during the year. Immediately following Children's Day, many Sunday Schools take a vacation which generally lasts until the first of October. The attendance is fair during October and November, but small during the winter. The great need for successful Sunday School work on the district is, consecrated and competent teachers and efficient superintendents, with cooperation of parents. Our Epworth League and Sunday School Convention was held in Denton last June, and was considered a success. The attendance was large, the songs were inspiring, the papers and discussions were interesting. Address delivered by Dr. D. H. Hargis, Superintendent of the Cambridge District, was a remarkable production and occasioned great enthusiasm. We were greatly helped.

Sickness and Bereavement.

During the year the following have been on the sick list—J. H. Blake, M. V. Waters, L. D. Beecham, W. E. Stanley, T. B. H. Coleman, C. W.

Moore, Mrs. J. O. Stanley, W. E. Stanley, and a child of C. W. H. Briddell. L. D. Beecham was bereaved of a brother last February who lived in New York City. I wish to report that S. A. Earle who is supplying Easton Ct.. was taken quite ill list Friday night and is not able to attend the Conference.

Summary.

Total conversions 497; accessions 416. Total raised for improvements \$3,466; paid on debts \$5,050. Total raised for Centenary \$5,420.

Brethren, while we are thankful for what has been accomplished, we cannot, we must not, we dare not be satisfied, when the call of the world's need is so loud, and the challenge of Christ to His Church is so great.

With grateful appreciation of the loving fellowship of my brothers in the pastorate, the kindness of the laity, and the undeserved favor of the Father of us all, this report is presented.

PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:

Strenuous indeed has been the work of the Philadelphia District this year. But by the help of God and the co-operation of the Pastors something has been accomplished for which we give thanks to Him, who has called us into fellowship with Himself.

Dr. J. H. Scott, my predecessor, deserves great credit for the splendid manner in which he organized and manned the District. I desire to express my appreciation to him, and to all others who in any way helped to make possible whatever of success we have had.

Now, as the spirit of gratefulness comes upon me, I see many whom I should thank individually; but I am reminded, that the time at my disposal and space in our journal will not permit. I shall therefore recount only in a brief way, some of the things, which the Pastors and Churches have striven to accomplish for Christ and His cause.

Sickness and Death.

No minister on the District has died, and nearly all of them have kept in good health. Rev. E. E. Parker is at this time sick in the Jewish Hospital of Philadelphia, but is improving. Rev. P. M. Shelton finds his sight, which has not been good for 3 years, gradually failing. He has been advised by his physician to stop. He will ask this Conference to retire him. I commend Bro. Shelton to the favorable consideration of our Conference Stewards.

The life of Mrs. P. M. Shelton was despaired of for several weeks during the past summer, but God was gracious and she is spared to her husband, and little children.

Mrs. J. H. Pearce was sick for a few weeks but has recovered. M. E. Waters, widow of the late Rev. George Waters, died in full triumphant faith July 31, 1919. She was a faithful member of Zoar Church from which she was burled.

Last Thursday evening, March 18, Rev. and Mrs. J. R. Brown were

saddened by the home going of Mildred, their 14 year old daughter.

Charges.

In attempting a summary of the work and achievements of the District I do so conscious of our failures; but glad that we have been given a chance to try.

ATLANTIC CITY reports the best year in her history. Paid on debt \$6,000; building and improvement \$1,000; Centenary subscription \$1,600, paid \$800; Benevolence in full. Raised for all purposes \$12,000. Tithers 108, Conversions 34, Accessions 47. A. L. Martin is held in high esteem by all the people, and has been asked to return for the 11th year.

BRIDGETON still holds her place on the Honor Roll, having raised all of the benevolence in full. Paid on building and improvement \$270, Centenary \$110; Conversions 30. Accessions 43. F. O. T. Laws is the esteemed pastor.

BRIDGETON CIRCUIT has had a good year. The Church at Fordsville has been thoroughly renovated and beautified at a cost of \$200, and paid for. The Springtown Church has had a gracious revival. Centenary \$40, benevolence advanced, Conversions 25, Accessions 17. F. G. Campbell, pastor.

BROOKLYN, EBENEZER .- A. F. Anthony was sent to this charge from the last Conference, but on June 27, Bishop Berry released him to go as a Missionary to Africa, since the charge has been supplied by W. H. Smithwick. The congregation has been moved from Hudson Avenue to a more convenient place on Atlantic Ave. The Church is growing and asked for W. H. Smithwick's return. Benevolence advanced, Accessions 10.

BROOKLYN, JOHN WESLEY is still growing in numbers, in Methodist spirit and practice. The Church program is used to the letter. Raised for improvements \$60, for building fund \$500. The Pastors salary has been doubled. We need a Church for these 250 Methodists. Centenary \$150, Benevolence full, Tithers 36, Conversions 41, Accessions 47. J. R. H. Matthews is the evangelistic Pastor.

BROOKLYN-NEWMAN. This charge is somewhat removed from the colored section, but is making progress. The old Church was sold and a comfortable parsonage was bought for \$4200, paid \$900 on the same. J. R. Waters has been faithful and reports for building and improvements \$650, Church debt \$500, for Centenary \$75. Benevolence in full. Conversions 9, Accessions 9. A unanimous request for the pastors return was made.

BURLINGTON-Part of this Church was burned about 1 year ago, but the work of repairing and enlarging is nearly completed. J. H. Blackiston expects to have a reopening in April. The congregation is small but faithful. This has been their best year. The deed for the Church has been transferred from the White Trustees to our own and is recorded. Building and improvements \$1395, Centenary \$110, Benevolence advanced, Conversions 5, Accessions 5, Tithers 1.

CAMDEN has enriched her services by installing a much needed Pipe Organ, and has paid \$800 on the same. Centenary subscription \$528, paid \$100; Benevolence advanced; Tithers 5; Conversions 3; Accessions 5. J. A. T. Foust, Pastor.

CAMDEN MISSION, in the home of B. W. Berry, has decreased in membership, but has increased the benevolences. Her future is uncertain. The community is well Churched.

DELAIR—W. C. Shockley has worked hard but some of his people have not. Building and improvements \$30; Benevolence taken; Tithers 16; Conversions 18; Accessions 4.

ENGLEWOOD, with F. D. McQueen, Pastor, has done well under the circumstances. Building and improvements \$36, Centenary \$14, Benevolence taken; Conversions 3, Accessions 3.

GRENLOCH & RHODES have had a good year. J. I. Peaco has taught his people to sacrifice for others. The Charge is in the Star Class. Benevolenec in full, Centenary subscription \$300, paid \$200; Conversions 9, Accessions 10.

HUDSON claims that this was her best year financially. The Ladies Aid Society raised \$600. Building and improvement \$50; Centenary \$10; Benevolence taken. J. N. Bridgman has the confidence of the people and has been asked to return.

MAGNOLIA—This is a strong Charge with great possibilities. Their entertainment of our Sunday School and Epworth League Convention last July deserves our praise. Building and improvements \$775, Centenary \$100, Benevolence in full, Tithers 3, Conversions 35, Accessions 35. J. T. Wallace, Pastor.

MERCHANTVILLE—This charge has stood loyally by the Pastor in his affliction and supported the Church. Reports show \$275 paid on indebtedness, \$289 for Centenary, and \$107 for Benevolences, Conversions 4, Accessions 10. They gave P. M. Shelton, the Pastor, a \$200 donation.

MOUNT HOLLY has joined the ranks of great Churches. They were among the first to subscribe and pay the first year Centenary quota \$365, Benevolence \$144 in full, Building and improvements \$161; Tithers 25, Conversions 18, Accessions 18. W. B. Perry is the most popular minister in town. Both white and colored say he must return to Mount Holly.

MONTCLAIR has paid off the mortgage debt of \$1350, raised for building and improvement \$600, and has rightfully increased the Pastors salary twice during the year, now paying \$2000. Benevolence slightly increased, Centenary subscription \$1100, paid \$200; Benevolence \$188; Tithers 10; Accessions 9. F. J. Handy, Pastor.

NEWARK—The peace of this charge was disturbed, when J. E. A. Johns, who had been returned was ordered by the Bishop to change Stations, but the people soon found that a master of the situation was at hand

and settled down to hard work, which resulted in what is perhaps, the best report in the history of the Charge. The parsonage has been beautified. A new heating plant installed, raised for improvements \$125, on old debts \$1200, on Centenary \$600, Benevolence \$306 in full, Tithers 15, Conversions 25, Accessions 63. The folks say W. A. Hubbard is a fit, and must return to Newark.

ORANGE reports a good year. Paid on old debts \$200, improvements \$400, Centenary \$400, Benevolence taken, Tithers 10, Conversions 45, Accessions 65. The Pastor has worked hard and is asked to return for the 6th year. R. G. Waters, Pastor.

OSSINING—J. N. C. Davis has done his best. The congregation is small but willing. Raised for Centenary \$5, Benevolence taken, Tithers 1, Accessions 5.

FRANKFORD—The faithful few, under the good leadership of L. H. McArthur, have advanced and report as follows: Paid on Church indebtedness \$250, Centenary \$170, Benevolence taken, Tithers 1, Conversions 3, Accessions 2.

GERMANTOWN is in her glory. They say, "A greater than John is here." The year has been a series of successful events. The first rally was a record breaker, \$3,050 was raised. The mortgage on the site for the new Church was paid off, raised for building and improvement \$350. Centenary subscription was \$1371, paid \$1,422. Benevolence raised in full and \$143 was given in special gifts, for scholarships and missions in Africa. Raised for all purposes \$9,000, Tithers 151, Conversions 33, Accessions 37. All clamor for the return of J. E. A. Johns.

HAVEN is still on the Honor Roll, and leads the District in the number of conversions. A heavy debt does not put out the fire on this altar. It is continuous and the membership grows steadily. The future is bright for great development and progress. Paid on indebtedness \$100, improvements \$475, Centenary \$1000, Benevolence in full, Tithers are 48, Conversions 143, Accessions 141. The Pastor, J. R. Brown, grows in favor with the people and has been asked to return for the eighth year.

JOHN WESLEY—The Trustees are still looking for a larger place to accommodate the crowds that come to hear J. W. Jefferson preach. Paid on debts \$90, improvements \$190, Centenary \$562 in full for the first year, Benevolence in full, Tithers 30, Conversions 31, Accessions 40.

SOMERVILLE have gone "Over the top" in everything. The Pastor uses the latest Church methods and succeeds. Raised on debt \$100, Centenary \$237 in full for the first year, Benevolence \$103 in full. This is about \$6 per member. Tithers 15, Conversions 10, Accessions 8. Good for the young man, E. E. Parker, Pastor.

ZOAR is the mother Church, but she is as young as any and is growing with the years. Last year she had 130 Accessions, this year 153 and 132 Conversions. The Trustees have bought four properties in the rear of the Church to be converted into a Parish house, costing \$8500, \$4000 in hand to pay on the same, raised for the Building Fund \$2200, improvements \$318, Centenary \$2300, Benevolence in full, Tithers 250.

The Pastor has been loaned to the Centenary part of the year, but as is seen the work has not suffered. F. H. Butler is held in high esteem by all denominations. The Church asks for his return, and invites the Conference to hold its next session there.

ZOAR MISSION has had a good year. A Church is needed for these eighty-five members. They are not in the Centenary and no provision is made for them, but they have collected \$650 and have taken title to the building in which they worship. This congregation and others make plain that we need a City Missionary Society in our Conference. Raised for Centenary \$86 in full, Benevolence in full, Conversions 40, Accessions 41. William Goldsborough, Pastor.

PLEASANTVILLE has had a fair year. The people are able but more co-operation is needed. E. F. Morris is Evengelistic and has had 15 Converisons, 10 Accessions, raised on debt \$100, improvements \$200, Centenary \$125, and the Benevolence increased.

SALEM between the 1st and 2nd Quarterly Conferences tore down the old Church and began to construct a new one, but for lack of funds and sufficient workmen, winter caught them, and the work was stopped. The people for the most part have kept faith and are hopeful. By united effort and careful management the situation can be overcome. Raised for building and improvement \$1533, Centenary \$108, Benevolence taken, Conversions 15. Accessions 15. W. A. T. Miles, Pastor.

SALEM CIRCUIT reports success. Paid on building and improvement \$62, Centenary \$19, Benevolence taken, Conversions 10, Tithers 10, Accessions 7, R. A. F. Graham, Pastor.

SPRING LAKE is a summer appointment. Supplied by J. P. Blades, who reports raised for improvements \$27, for debt \$134, Centenary \$4, Ministerial support advanced.

WHITE PLAINS, with 50 members, has had phenomenal success. Raised in Trustees rally \$2,600, cancelled the mortgage of \$2046, and has money in the bank towards a parsonage. Centenary \$56, Benevolence \$107 in full, improvements \$139, Conversions 12, accessions 12. W. B. Nelson has put this charge on the Honor Roll and himself in the class of men who do big things. Surely they have asked for his return.

YONKERS and JERSEY CITY form a Circuit. A. G. Henry, the patient, serves this charge. These are missions, and big rents for halls make make a comfortable support for the Pastor almost impossible. Progress has been made. Centenary \$33, Benevolence advanced, Conversions 19, accessions 11.

There are on this District seven Missions, without Church buildings, and only 3 of them are in the Centenary. There are great opportunities for the expansion of our work in these great Northern Cities, and rural Districts, but if it is to be done, more money must be gathered from somewhere. It is hard to gather, train and develop our Methodist people in Mission houses when there are beautiful Churches just around the corner.

District Meetings.

Our Epworth League and S. S. Convention was held in Magnolia, N. J. July 2nd and 3rd. The attendance was large, and the interest intense;

but it is sad to say that often the enthusiasm of these meetings dies with the close of the Convention, and does not reach our Leagues and Schools.

There are on the district 26 junior and 27 Epworth League Chapters. Eight of the Junior Leagues are pusuing the regular course of study. There are 31 Sunday Schools and they are in fair condition, but the membership is altogether too small. If it is true that only 15% of the S. S. scholars join the Church, and 85% are lost to Christianity, it is evident that there is great need for trained and consecrated League and Sunday School workers. To these matters we have constantly called attention and urged that Teachers Training Classes be formed, and regular courses pursued.

Preachers Meeting.

Our Annual Preachers' Institute met in Atlantic City, N. J. September 23-24-25. Eight subjects touching our rural and city work were well and profitably discussed by men of the district, visiting Dist. Supt. and Pastors. The session closed with Evangelism uppermost in our thought. After an inspiring sermon by Dr. C. A. Tindley, and one convert, we returned to our Charges resolved by God's help to win our quota of the million souls.

Centenary.

Perhaps the word most often on our lips this year has been "Centenary." We believe that the movement came from above, and that God approved it and breathed His spirit in it. Therefore it has become an inspiring word, giving us a vision of sacrifice and service, such as we have not had before.

During the months of May and June, under the leadership of Mr. Cecil Brooks and Mr. W. F. Simmons, 6 Sub. District Group Meetings were held in the following places: Philadelphia, Camden, Merchantville, Salem, Orange and Atlantic City. As a result of these meetings and the inspiration they gave when the drive was put on we went over the top with subscriptions amounting to \$19,070 and the work of collecting began.

The Fellowship of Intercession was preached, emphasizing the power of united prayer. The Christian Stewardship Campaign gave to the district 736 Tithers.

The good effect of the Centenary is everywhere manifest.

1st-It has increased our giving to all of the benevolences.

2nd-It has systematized our method of Church finance.

3rd—It has increased our knowledge of individual responsibility, and has brought us face to face with our obligation to the whole world.

Our one regret is that more of our young people did not give themselves for Lifes' Service to Him, who gave Himself for us.

Ministerial Support.

In these days of high cost of living and inadequate ministerial support, thousands of Pastors are demonstrating that there is surely a "Call to the Ministry"—but for this call, many would leave the Word and serve tables. How some of our men are getting on with so small an income

can only be understood in the light of God's power to multiply loaves and fishes, and to increase the meal and the oil in the homes of those who have left all to follow Him.

In my first round of the Conference I discovered the condition, was moved with compassion, and urged the matter of increased salary for all the brethren. It is gratifying to report that while all did not advance, 22 of the 32 charges increased the Pastors support as follows:

Atlantic City, \$300.00. Bridgeton, \$75.00. Bridgeton Circuit, \$50.00. Burlington, \$50.00. Newman, \$50.00. Grenlock & Rhodes, \$50.00. Zoar. \$100.00. Mount Holly, \$150.00. Delair. \$100.00. Zoar Mission, \$200.00. Pleasantville, \$164.00. Englewood, \$300.00. White Plains, \$200.00. Yonkers & Jersey City, \$125.00. Hudson, \$50.00. Ossinning, \$100.00. Haven, \$100.00. Salem, \$50.00. Salem Circuit, \$164.00. Germantown, \$100.00. John Wesley Bk., \$600.00. Montclair, \$440.00.

Total increase, \$4,038.00.

This was commendable indeed, but it does not keep pace with the increased cost of living or with the increased income of the people. In this day of material prosperity, God's Ministers should receive a comfortable support and not be among the people with fear.

The cause of our Retired brethren has not been forgotten. We have kept it constantly before the Conferences and have gotten some results. We are happy to report that 20 of the charges have raised their apportionment for Conference Claimants in full. An increase of \$386.00. This heartens, but does not satisfy us, for we shall never be contented until these men, who have made possible our success, receive 100 cents to the dollar, which is their just and deserved claim.

Evangelism.

. To me this seems to be the main question. All we have done through Centenary and Church is meant to focus here. To raise millions and to fail to lift souls is failure indeed, and gives cause for serious reflection.

To be an Evangelist is the commission of every Pastor, and there is no one who can take his place. His ability to organize and lead the forces of God to conquest over sin is a proof of his call.

I am glad to announce that the preachers of this district have adopted and put into practice the Centenary Conservation Program, and whatever

other methods they deem helpful in bringing men to righteousness and to God, but they have not depended solely upon these. They have sought help from Him, "who giveth to all men liberally and upbraideth not."

My exhortation has been that we should have a Revival not only for 2 weeks in the year but for 52 weeks. We cannot speak as enthusiastically of our success as we had hoped to have done; but we are glad to report that in each charge an effort was put forth to have a revival and win souls. In preparation for this, District and Sub-District retreats were held. Cottage Prayer Meetings were conducted, and Win One Legions were formed. As a result 27 Charges report a total of 923 Conversions, and 878 added to the church. This is not our full quota of the million souls but it is such a representation as figures can give of the vision, faith, and service of 32 men, who have seen the Lord high and lifted up, and his train and glory filling the temple and hearing Him say, "Whom shall I send and, who will go for us?" have answered, "here as I send me," and with firetouched lips have preached the gospel of repentence and salvation by faith.

Part of our Evangelistic program should be the conservation of these new converts. They must be kept and trained for Christian service. To this we commit ourselves for the sake of Him, who called and sent us.

Temperance and Thanksgiving.

The forces of righteousness have had cause for thanksgiving during the year. An institution like that of slavery has been destroyed. But now the fight for law enforcement is on. We must give hearty support to those charged with this responsibility and keep forevery dead this enemy of man.

I call attention to another evil which threatens the welfare of our Church and nation, "Sabbath Desecration." In some of our large cities the trend is toward an open Sabbath, permitting games and entertainments of various kinds. It is reported that our Church attendance is affected by these things. To fight this evil God and the church calls us, with it there must be no compromise.

We will join hands with our board of Temperance, Prohibition, and Public Morals and shall have victory in this, as we did over the legalized rum traffic.

Mr. Chairman—For our failures we are sorry, for our victories we give praise unto the King eternal, Immortal, Invisible, the only wise God to whom be honor and glory forever and ever.

SOUTH PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:

This district has been the scene of strenuous activity and some marked achievements.

We are thankful to our Heavenly Father that death has not broken our ranks. However, we have not escaped sorrow. On the evening of June 30th, 1919, W. J. L. Hughes, pastor of St. Daniel's Church, Chester, Pa., was struck by an engine at a railroad crossing in that city, and seriously injured. But God graciously spared his life and recovered him, I trust, for years of usefulness.

Willie, a'ged 19 years, the son of W. C. Bowland, pastor of Coleman, Md., was drowned July 29th at Bowles Wharf where he had been working. Nothing but the comfort and consolation of a firm faith in Him who said, "I am the resurrection and the life," sustained Brother Bowland and his companion in such a sad experience.

L. Y. Cox, a retired veteran, has been quite sick, though feeble is still full of hope and good cheer.

Several pastors and member of their families have suffered illness.

While it is not possible to record all the things that have been achieved in the several charges, I take pleasure in giving glimpses of some of the salient features.

BUTTONWOOD, with Lewis Hodges, pastor, has enlarged the Church building and paid \$670 on account of the same.

CAPE MAY has spent \$305 on improvements of church property and paid \$200 on old debt. 6 conversions and 5 accessions. \$200 has been raised on Centenary quota and all other collections in full. H. T. Johnson, pastor.

CHESTER: ST. DANIELS, notwithstanding the pastor, W. J. L. Hughes, was incapacitated for service for more than two months because of an accident, reports the Centenary quota, \$1457, and all other Benevolent collections raised in full. \$100 advance in the pastor's salary; 90 converisons and 90 accessions. Raised for all purposes \$10,074. In bank \$3600 toward contemplated remodeling of church edifice.

CHESTER: SILOAM has spent \$768 on improving church and parsonage, raised in full its quota of Centenary collection, \$508, and every other apportionment. 23 conversions and 25 accessions. Sydney Emptage, pastor.

CHESWOLD with J. L. Taylor, pastor, reports 10 conversions, \$200 paid on improvements and the Benevolent collections greatly increased. Centenary \$176.

COKESBURY under the inspiration of the Centenary movement has increased its giving. R. B. Thompson, pastor.

COLEMAN with W. C. Bowland, pastor, has spent \$397 on improving church property, and made a great advance in the Benevolent collection. Centenar x\$180.

DELAWARE CITY reports \$120 paid on improvements and the Benevolent collections advanced. L. C. Buchanan, pastor.

DOVER with L. S. Moore, pastor, has had 32 conversions and 30 accessions, has paid \$350 for improvements, increased the pastor's salary by \$200, and raised \$330, a large portion of Centenary quota. This is a well organized and systematically arranged church.

DOVER CIRCUIT makes a fair report, advancing the Centenary and other Benevolent collections. I. J. Brittingham, pastor.

GALENA with T. E. Randall pastor reports \$850 spent on improvements. The church at Davis Hill has been renovated and beautified. The pastor's salary has been advanced \$100 and the Centenary quota and other Benevolent collections looked after. Centenary \$276. Conversions 3; accessions 5.

MIDDLETOWN reports \$331 paid on improvements and the pastor's salary and the Benevolent collections advanced. 14 conversions. J. L. Parker, pastor.

NEW CASTLE with R. S. Johns, pastor, has had 3 conversions, 6 accessions and has increased all ministerial support and Benevolent collections. Centenary \$114.

NEWPORT has built a new church which was so much and so long needed. It is up to date in its equipment with electric lights and pipeless heater, its neat auditorium and its rooms for social gatherings. \$3000 has been raised and paid by this congregation and the Centenary donation of \$2000 which has been granted by the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, puts this church out of debt. They have nearly raised their first year quota for the Centenary and all the other Benevolent collections in full. The people brought the tithes to the storehouse, and the Lord pourned out blessings upon them. Conversions 30. J. H. Stevenson, pastor.

OCEAN CITY supplied by D. L. Ridout, is a summer appointment and reports the mortgage on the Church canceled and \$160 paid on improvements and the Benevolent collections greatly increased.

ODESSA with W. B. Whittington, pastor, has raised \$380 on improvements, increased the pastor's salary \$157 and raised \$200 Centenary money, besides all the other collections in full. Accessions 5.

PHILADELPHIA: EAST CALVARY CHURCH has had another record breaking year. 310 conversions and 385 accessions; \$1150 paid on improvements and \$4000 on old indebtedness; \$7576 for the Centenary. For all Benevolent and Conference collections this church sends up in cash and vouchers \$8800. Everything is not only full, but running over. Raised for all purposes, \$24,523. The pastor's salary has been advanced \$500, making it \$2500. Although the same brother has served this charge as minister for eighteen years, standing room even is at a premium at every Sunday service. We need and need now greater East Calvary which is planned in the Centenary program. C. A. Tindley, pastor.

EAST CALVARY MISSION, which is hereafter to be known as Macedonia M. E. Church, has had a hard struggle but reports 38 conversions and a total membership of 156, the Centenary quota and other Benevolent Collections raised in full. It is needed in this crowded section and I think it ought to continue. It will remove to a large building, 1024 Lombard St. J. L. Davis, pastor.

ST. PAUL CHURCH, supplied by J. E. Dennis, has wrought well and reports 6 conversions and their full quota of \$130 for Centenary raised. They maintain their place in the Honor class.

PORT DEPOSIT has advanced the Benevolent collection and the pastor's support and made a net gain in membership. A. A. McDowell, pastor.

PORT PENN CIRCUIT with L. T. Robbins, pastor, reports \$420 paid on improvements, \$465 on old indebtedness and the Centenary and other collections advanced: 40 conversions and 35 accessions.

SASSAFRAS CIRCUIT has paid \$268 for improvement on property and \$270, nearly 60 per cent., of the Centenary quota, and all the other collections in full. 8 conversions. W. C. West, pastor.

SMYRNA CHARGE has purchased the church building formerly used by the Roman Catholics. It gives them a better site and a larger and finer edifice. They have raised \$1034 for building and improvements, advanced the pastor's support \$100, and paid \$165, a large portion of their Centenary quota. M. H. Murphy, pastor.

STILL POND CIRCUIT with P. W. Price, pastor, has had 28 conversions and the same number of accessions; paid for improvements \$825, advanced the pastor's salary and raised \$465, more than 90 per cent. of their first year's Centenary quota and other apportionments in full.

SWAINTON reports \$205 paid on improvements, \$129 on old indebtedness an dthe Benevolent collections advanced. J. O. Griffin, pastor.

TOWNSEND CIRCUIT with L. W. Deakins, pastor, has had 30 conversions, 26 accessions and has advanced the pastor's salary and paid \$175 on the Centenary and other Benevolent collections in full.

WILMINGTON: EZION reports 102 conversions, 81 accessions, \$1000 paid on improvements, \$3000 raised and in bank toward installing a new pipe organ; the quota for the Centenary by monthly installments paid in full \$1815, and all other apportionments met. Raised for all purposes, \$10,200. J. U. King, pastor.

HAVEN, with G. T. Fields, pastor, has the shout of victory. \$1500 raised and paid on old indebtedness cancells the mortgage on the church. The first year's quota for the Centenary, \$529, raised in full with every other apportionment treated likewise. The pastor's salary has been advanced \$100. The congregation has grown and the membership has increased.

MT. JOY rejoices in 19 conversions and in being the first charge on the district to raise and pay in full its first year quota for the Centenary, \$691. All other Benevolent and Conference collections have been raised in full. \$1500 has been collected and put in bank toward a greater church plant with up to date equipment. Raised for all purposes, \$5000. J. W. Bond, pastor.

WOODBURY CIRCUIT, supplied by J. E. Green, has remodeled and enlarged the church in the town and paid \$435 on the same. The pastor's salary has been increased \$100. Raised \$75 for Centenary and the other collections in full. 31 conversions, 29 accessions.

New Work.

Brother G. T. Fields under my direction organized a Church and Sunday School in East Wilmington with 16 members and 15 Sunday School

scholars. A hall is being used for holding service. We hope soon to purchase a site for a church. There is a large opportunity here. Many of our people are moving to this section from the country. They desire us to furnish them a church home. The demand for laborers and the promise of increased wages cause a constant influx of these people. This project is in the district Centenary program.

Evangelism.

An intensive Evangelistic campaign has been on. District and subdistrict group meetings of pastors and laymen have been held. Personal work through the unit system and protracted meetings have both been used. The long severe winter has been somewhat a handicap in the rural charges for winter there is the most favorable season for revival work. We have had 800 conversions and 1000 accessions.

Benevolent Collections.

The Centenary financial campaign had the right of way the first two months of the Conference year. More than the quota for the district was subscribed. I have tried to have the subscription paid in monthly installments, but did not wholly succeed. All the brethren have not sufficiently grown in grace and knowledge to work according to a system. Those who took time by the forelock have reached the goal. No movement of the church in our day has stimulated such giving as the eCntenary has. This district has paid in more than 85 per cent. of the year's quota in less than ten months. Last year this whole Conference raised for all the Disciplinary Benevolent Collections, including what was raised by the Women's Societies, \$15,138, which was an increase of \$3773 over the previous year. This year this district raised for the Centenary (the two Mission Boards) alone over \$16,000. Beside the apportionments for the other six Disciplinary Collections have been raised in full.

Ministerial Support.

There has been on an average more than ten per cent. advance in pastor's salary, but this is inadequate. The cost of living continues to soar. The laymen's wages have been increased since 1916 100 per cent. and more. The pastor's not more than 20 per cent. on an average. The crises is on. The pastors must have better support if they are to render efficient service. Our Quarterly Conferences must not balk at making adequate apportionment for the minister's support. The people will not fail to pay for efficient service when it is made plain to them what they are asked to the pastor per day for his support.

The Bishops' and District Superintendent's support is looked after with commendable zeal and promptness.

Some pastors and people are slow to understand that the claim of the retired ministers, widows and orphans is equally important and imperative. I count it an unfavorable reflection on the apstor and people when a charge reports all other ministerial support raised in full, but a deficiency for the support of Conference Claimants.

This district has advanced this cause. An increasing number of charges is in the honor class.

Sunday Schools.

We have on this district 46 Sunday Schools and 8034 scholars of all grades. Some of these schools are advancing; others almost standing still and others have ceased to move.

The crying need is for better trained, consecrated teachers who count it love's labor to train immortal lives and feel obligated to do it faithfully.

Teacher training classes are maintained in a few charges. These are in the cities and larger towns and are far too few there. A campaign to generate enthusiasm and stimulate a greater interest in the Sunday School is urgently needed. I am convinced that to have a better class of officers, teachers and members who will work and sacrifice for the kingdom of our Lord, we must train for it. The Sunday School modernly equipped is our training camp.

The time has come for this Conference to request the Board of Sunday Schools to give us a Sunday School missionary—a specialist for our territory. We need such an assistant and need him greatly.

Education.

The state of Delaware has a new school law. It gives equal educational advantages to the children of its citizens regardless of race or color. The term for the school year has been increased to ten months and the salaries for teachers advanced.

One of her citizens, Mr. Pierre S. Dupont, has given the state \$2,000,000 to help build adequate school houses. \$400,000 of this amount to be used for school and grounds for colored people and in addition, \$500,000 so that adequate ground and up to date school buildings may be furnished our people and serve as community centers. A new day had dawned for the Negro in Delaware. God bless Mr. Dupont.

W. C. Jason, the President of the State College for Colored Students, with his faculty is making that institution a blessing to the race. The outlook is bright and greater facilities will be furnished this school. Dr. Jason is also President of Delaware Negro Civic League. Under this association the colored citizens of Delaware are being organized to co-operate and take advantages of their new opportunity.

Conclusion.

Much has been attempted. Pastor and people have burned with zeal. I rejoice that so much has been accomplished. I regret that more has not been done, but am thankful there remains an earnest desire to advance the Master's cause.

I appreciate and acknowledge the good work of my immediate predecessor, W. A. Hubbard, and all who have led the district before me. They have made it possible for the work to advance.

With thanks to our Heavenly Father for health, guidance and support—yea for innumerable blessings, and to pastors and people for kindness, patience and co-operation, I respectfully submit this my first annual report.

SALISBURY DISTRICT.

Bishop Hughes and Brothren:

By the grace and guidance of God, I have been permitted to serve the Church as Superintendent of the Salisbury District through another year. This has been a year of earnest toil, amid unusual difficulties, on the Salisbury District, but the hearty response to the call of duty on the part of the pastors, and the co-operation of a loyal people, enable me to present to this session of the Conference what is in some particulars the best report which it has been my privilege to render.

Translations.

Daniel Archie Ridout, for thirty-seven years a member of this Conference, went to his coronation last July. I have supplied the pulpit of Marion Station, where he was serving at the time of his death, with several pastors of the district and the local preachers of the charge, including D. L. Ridout, the son of the deceased, who, together with the widow has rendered invaluable service. The officials have very graciously paid the salary to Mrs. Ridout and allowed her the use of the parsonage.

J. W. Waters, a man of solid piety, faithful in the service of his Lord, a supply pastor in this Conference for twenty-two years, went suddenly to his reward Sunday morning, March 14th, 1920.

Brother Jas. A. Kiah was bereft of a sweet little daughter, nearly three years of age.

During the year the following persons have been on the sick list: Brothers J. S. Coulbourne, H. C. Snead, G. S. Jacobs, C. T. Covington, G. W. Joynes, Mrs. G. S. Jacobs, Mrs. R. N. Davis, Mrs. I. D Pitts and Mrs. W. T. Spellman.

Charges.

Most of the charges have made an unusual record during the year. I shall refer briefly to a few of the more important achievements:

COTTAGE GROVE. This charge has been strengthened by the addition of one of the churches of the old Westover Circuit; it has had a year of success under the pastorate of M. P. Sterling. One church has been beautifully renovated, the Centenary and other benevolences looked after. Total \$225.

CRISFIELD, with C. S. Sprigg, pastor, continues to march forward. The industrial conditions of the town have been better this year than for many years; the pastor and his people observing this situation, made well of their opportunity and so successfully planned their work and worked their plan as to be able to send to the Conference the best financial report in the history of the Charge. Ministerial support paid in full and \$750 raised for Centenary and other benevolences. Raised for all purposes \$3529. Conversions 7, accessions 6.

DAMES QUARTER has had a good year and reports 52 conversions,

48 accessions, and quite an increase in benevolences and pastor's salary. \$225 raised for improvements; \$348 on old debts. C. A. Norwood, pastor.

DEALS ISLAND, O. H. Spence, pastor, has done well under circumstances not conductive to success. Conversions 11, accessions 13 and conference collections taken.

DELMAR. This charge was made a station at the last session of the Conference and its success this year fully justifies the change. A new parsonage has been built and nearly \$500 paid on the same; \$155 paid on old debts, benevolent collections advanced and pastor's salary almost doubled. C. T. Covington, pastor.

FAIRMOUNT: CENTENNIAL has been supplied this year by George H. Bivins, and sends to the Conference the best report in years. Raised for Centenary and other benevolences \$240.

FAIRMOUNT: ST. ANDREWS, with S. T. Parker, pastor, reports well. This is a well organized church and can be depended on to do its work. The Ladies' Aid Society reports \$419. Raised for Centenary \$443. Total benevolences \$500. Ministerial support paid in full. The mortgage has been lifted, \$722 having been paid on same. Conversions 32, accessions 33.

FRUITLAND has the material on the ground for a new church which is very much needed. Advanced the pastor's salary \$150. Centenary \$150, other benevolence increased. Conversions 14, accessions 18.

GREENWOOD has begun the building of a cement block church, but not much has been done on the building because of unfavorable weather. We hope to see it completed soon. H. R. Purnell, pastor.

HEBRON, with G. W. Joynes, pastor, has had some success. Conversions 10; accessions 8. Centenary \$100, other benevolence \$60.

HOPEWELL has advanced the benevolences nearly fifty per cent. beyond last year, advanced the pastor's salary \$100, and paid \$100 on old debts. Conversions 10, accessions 10. W. T. Spellman, pastor.

HORNTOWN, with C. W. Johnson, pastor, has done far better this year than last. A great revival added 56 souls to the church. Paid \$276 on old debts. Ministerial support and benevolent collections greatly advanced.

JAMESTOWN. The addition of Revels Neck church to this charge has greatly encouraged the people and increased the strength of the charge. The salary has been advanced and benevolent collections increased. Conversions 16. Accessions 5. O. P. Dickerson, pastor.

KELLER. The condition of the old church building was such that it had to be torn down early last fall. Since that time the congregation has worshipped in a hall which is far too small to accommodate the people. They are building a splendid church, but weather conditions and the illness of the pastor and his family have militated against the success of the work. The charge was blessed with a glorious revival, 81 persons professing conversion. Paid on the new church \$1367, on old debts \$200. H. C. Snead, pastor.

KINGSTON, I. H. Bivins, pastor, continues to advance. This charge has two fine churches entirely free of debt, largely due to the efforts of the Ladies' Aid Society. That organization raised \$977. This was done not at the expense of other causes, however, for the benevolences advanced 33 per cent. and the pastor's salary was increased \$50. Conversions 25, accessions 21.

LAWSONIA led the district last year in per capita contribution to the benevolences. Its report this year seems to show that it has maintained its standard. This church added \$100 fo the salary, bringing it up to \$1000, which was paid by the first of February. The benevolences were advanced nearly seventy per cent., a total of \$450 having been raised for the same. \$513 paid on old debts and \$600 in bank toward the building of a new church. A good revival resulted in 31 conversions and 29 accessions. T. W. Cooper, pastor.

LEEMONT. For seven years E. E. Rogers has labored in this field. He brings to the conference this year his best report. 68 accessions, benevolences nearly doubled, pastor's salary advanced \$100, and \$1062 paid on old debts. Total Centenary and other benevolence \$450.

LIBERIA has been led on to success by G. S. Jacobs as pastor. Although the pastor was in the hospital for several weeks, the charge makes a better report than last year. Accessions 13. Raised \$160 for benevolence and \$328 on old debts.

MARDELA SPRINGS. This charge has made quite an advance over last year. Benevolences increased fifty per cent. Conversions 8, accessions 7. I. D. Pitts, pastor.

MARION STATION, although bereft of its pastor last July, makes a splendid showing. The people have been loyal and sacrificing and Mrs. Ridous deserves great credit for her faithful toil and devotion to the work of this charge. The report shows \$450 paid on old debts, ministerial support paid in full, \$470 raised for the Centenary.

MT. VERNON, under the leadership of R. C. Hughes as pastor, has made progress. The benevolences have been advanced and \$700 paid on mortgage indebtedness. Accessions 8.

NANTICOKE, with J. H. dEwards, pastor, has done well, having advanced the benevolences beyond last year and raised \$1500 on a new church which will be built in the near future. Raised for Centenary and other benevolences \$300.

ORIOLE. This charge was sorely afflicted by the death of the Rev. J. W. Waters, the pastor, early Sunday morning, March 14th. He had wrought well as a moral and spiritual force in that community and many will rise up to call him blesed. The report shows 10 conversions, 10 accessions, \$195 raised for benevolences, and ministerial support raised in full.

PARSONBURG was made a station last year and R. N. Davis was appointed pastor. A splendid years work has been done. The charge,

though small, has been thoroughly organized and the various auxiliaries seem to vie with one another in working for the interests of the Kingdom. Harmony reigns and the outlook for a good station is bright. Conversions 16, accessions 7. Raised \$207 for benevolences, \$75 for improvements and for old debts \$310. The Ladies Aid Society reports \$361.

POCOMOKE CITY keeps up its record of the past two years. This strong charge is led on by W. R. A. Palmer. This wide-awake and efficient pastor is ably supported by loyal and intelligent officials. The result is success. A gracious revival brought 43 souls into the church and the sipritual life of the charge is greatly quickened. The pastor's salary was advanced \$140, the benevolent collections amount to \$485. A new lot has been purchased, the St. Marys church removed and repaired, and \$150 raised for this purpose, \$450 paid on old debts.

PRINCESS ANNE, with E. O. Parker, pastor, has had another year of success. The Centenary was not very enthusiastically received by this church but there are quite a number of tithers and this has greatly added to the financial strength of the work. This charge is very much in need of a suitable parsonage and would very likely build if they could receive some aid from the Centenary.

PRINCESS ANNE CIRCUIT has increased the benevolences and ministerial support. \$171 has been raised on old debts. Conversions 8, accessions 8. \$195 raised on old debts. T. L. McDonald, pastor.

QUANTICO has been very successfully pastored by J. A. Kiah. Under his administration the charge has taken on new life. It is well organized and the work systematically prosecuted. A great revival wave swept over the charge and 55 persons professed saving faith in Christ. The mortgage, of several years standing, has been cancelled and the church is now free of debt. \$100 added to the pastor's salary with a \$200 additional increase for ensuing year. Raised for benevolence \$337, and for old debts \$440.

SALISBURY, JOHN WESLEY, with J. M. Dickerson as pastor, has succeeded in paying off the long standing bonded debt, increased the benevolences and raised ministerial support in full. The pastor has anxiously worked for a revival under discouraging circumstances.

SALISBURY, WHITES CHAPEL, under the pastorate of C. W. Pullett, has succeeded grandly, having had 8 accessions, increased the benevolences one hundred per cent., advanced the pastor's salary \$100, raised ministerial support in full and \$104 on old debts.

SHARPTOWN started off by advancing pastor's salary two hundred and fifty dollars. The charge has been organized and good year's work accomplished. A great revival resulted in 68 conversions and 66 accessions. Both churches have been renovated and \$970 paid on same. Paid on old debts \$75. Malachi Rasin, pastor.

UNIONVILLE, G. T. Townsend, pastor, surpasses its good record of last year. It has raised her \$300 for Centenary and other benevolences, advanced pastor's salary \$50, and raised the full apportionment of ministerial support. Conversion 9, accessions 12.

WACHAPREAGUE. Revival fires burned in this charge, also, and resulted in 64 conversions. The charge is spiritually alive. Salary and benevolence in advance of last year. J. R. Purnell, pastor.

WATTSVILLE, with J. S. Coulbourn, pastor, advanced the pastor's salary \$100, completed the new church at Atlantic and paid \$641 on the same, \$610 on old debts, parsonage extensively improved. Total conference collections \$500. Conversions 57, accessions 44.

WETIPQUIN, W. H. Turner, pastor, reports 46 conversions and 46 accessions, benevolences advanced 25 per cent. beyond last year, also quite an advance in ministerial support. Raised on improvements \$262 and paid \$98 on old debts.

WHITE HAVEN. This charge has had another successful year under the leadership of Roswell Water's as pastor. Conversions 10. Accessions 10. Raised for Centenary and other benevolences \$205. Paid on old debts \$275, improvements \$110. The pastor's salary was advanced \$100.

WITHAMS. A new church is in course of erection on this charge. A revival brought into the Kingdom 38 converts. Accessions 29. Salary advanced \$50. Raised for Benevolence \$230.

Mission Points.

LEATHERBURY CHAPEL, supplied by L. W. Pinkett, has done well. The building has been renovated at a cost of \$216, and same paid for. Benevolence increased.

PORTSVILLE, supplied by J. J. Mitchell, has improved its church building at a cost of \$500, and paid for same. Having accomplished this, it is not to be expected that much else could be done.

EXMORE, VA., supplied by J. J. Whittington, put in electric lights and made other needed improvements. Paid pastor \$400; total raised \$516.

Evangelism.

We are fully convinced that the pastor is his own best evangelist. Wherever pastoral evangelism has been wisely and faithfully tried good results have followed. Some pastors have taught the children in the Sunday Schools to give their young hearts to God, personally led the young people of the Epworth League to their Savior, and won to the royal service of King Immanuel men and women grown old in the employ of the enemy of their souls. Thus all classes are turning to Jesus their Savior through the consecrated efforts of these men who have a passion for souls. Total conversions 809. Total accessions 624. Total tithers 206.

Young People's Societies.

The District makes a net gain in its enrollment of Sunday School membership of nearly three hundred, yet its membership is less than the church membership by more than eleven hundred. This must not be, for the Sunday School is the main source through which the Church perpetu-

ates itself. Therefore, I have incessantly urged the importance of training the children and young people that they may be thoroughly indoctrinated in the word of God.

The Epworth League, like the Sunday School, offers to our young people the very best opportunity for soul culture and spiritual development. Every church should have a real live young people's society with a program adequate for the social, intellectual and spiritual needs of the people to whom it should minister. Every Sunday School should have a teacher training class, and every League should pursue a regular course of study under efficient leadership.

The Sunday School and Epworth League Convention was held at Leemont, Va., and was largely attended. The papers, discussions and addresses were educational and inspiring.

Princess Anne Academy.

Notwithstanding the handicaps as the result of the fire on April 18, 1919, which totally destroyed the dining room, kitchen, laundry, class rooms, including chemical laboratory, and the Principal's residence, this has been the most successful year in the school's history. Records show that more than 400 students applied for entrance last fall. Of this number they could receive about 200, and were forced because of lack for dormitory space to turn away more than 200 anxioùs students, who should betrained for the future leadership of the race.

The school is characteristic this year of its usual religious fervor. The week of prayer was observed at the beginning of the calendar year, resulting in 8 conversions, making the student body almost 100 per cent. Christian.

Never in the history of the school was it graded better and more appropriately. Those applying are of the high school age and those finishing are not as mature as adults as many of the previous years have been. This condition furnishes a better basis upon which to do real high school work. The work of the school has so commended itself to the Maryland State Board of Education that the State certificate is granted to the graduates of the Academy without examination.

The dining room, laundry and kitchen, which were destroyed by fire last April, have been replaced by a brick structure 40x80 feet. This building is modern in structure and up-to-date in its equipment. It has been said by men of wide experience in school work that this is one of the best buildings in this section of the country of its kind. In addition to the dining room, laundry and kitchen, there are storage rooms, refrigerating department, coal bin of about a car load capacity, garbage under shelter, and lavatory.

Electricity has been installed on the grounds of the Academy, in the dormitories and all of the buildings. Mr. E. C. Cannon, of Princess Anne, is the contractor. Mr. Cannon has also agreed to put two or three lights leading from the town to the Academy as his contribution to the school's canvass for funds. This will give them light from the town to the school on the public highway.

The Olney Mansion, which has always been the Principal's residence, has also been remodeled. A very pleasant and successful campaign was

directed among the Virginia appointments last September. The tour was made by automobile. Those accompanying the District Superintendent on the trips were Drs. W. R. A. Palmer, William Pickens, and Principal T. H. Kiah. The people of these appointments (Horntown, Wattsville, Washapreague, Keller and Withams) demonstrated very great interest in the work of the Academy and subscribed quite liberally in the purchasing of bricks for the new building. Had opportunity permitted us to visit other appointments we feel sure that they would have shown equally as great interest.

The great need of the school is a dormitory for boys. As a result of the war we must turn out leaders in larger numbers and at a greater rate of speed from the schools. The dormitory now used for boys, being more than 30 years old, has far outlived its period of usefulness. As the homes from which the students come are constantly improving in domestic equipment and modern conveniences, so much our schools improve in dormitory equipment and comforts if they are to retain the membership of those coming from the best homes. I make an urgent plea to the members of the Delaware Conference, both ministers and laymen, to rally to this most imperative need of our institution that has for more than 30 years stood as the intellectual beacon for the youth of our Conference, directing them and guiding them in the right channels to havens hitherto sought by others who failed to reach them, because of lack of the proper and most necessary preparation for life service.

District Conferences.

John Wesley Church, Salisbury, Md., was the seat of the District Conference the first week of last October. The attending throngs taxed the capacity of the church at every service. The spiritual tide ran high. The opening sermon was delivered by the Rev. M. P. Sterling. This was followed by the Holy Communion, which was received by the scores of ministers and laymen who were present. Among those delivering helpful addresses were, Drs. Jason, of the Delaware State College, Kiah, of Princess Anne Academy, Pickens and Spencer, of Morgan College, and Murdock, Centenary Secretary for the Philadelphia Area.

The Centenary Movement was given a large place in the plan and program and the effect has been seen in all phases of our work. The people everywhere seem to be getting the vision of the need of both the home and the foreign field. They are calling for strong preachers, able leaders, spiritually and intellectually prepared to train their young people and to shape their lives to fit into the great program of the Twentieth Century Church.

Ministerial Support.

In order to procure men of this calibre, the laymen seem to be aroused to the importance of granting to the pastors a more liberal support. The financial support of our pastors has always been inadequate to their needs, but in these days of unprecedented high cost of living, it is marvelous how our preachers exist on the stipend which they receive in the name of salary. I have incessantly urged the Quarterly Conferences to increase their salaries to meet the present conditions of living. It is

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gratifying to report the marked advance which amounts to \$3,350. Surely this points the way to a better prepared ministry.

Conclusion.

The thirty-nine pastors of the District, together with their wives and people, have toiled and sacrificed, without complaint, to make this report possible. I have simply stood on the firing line as a fellow soldier of my loyal and faithful comrades. I know something of their experiences, their successes and their failures, their joys and their sorrows. Many of them have confided in me; all of them have trusted me. But I do not know all. No man does. We will have to wait until the final day when the Books of the recording angel are open to be fully apprised of the heroic deeds and sacrifices of these heralds of the Cross.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO VISIT PRINCESS ANNE ACADEMY.

The Committee to visit Princess Anne Academy, made its visit Feb. 25th, 1920. The Academy has passed through some trying experiences since our last report. On the night of April 18th, last, the Principals' residence, laundry, kitchen, dining hall and all the recitation rooms were swept by fire. It seemed providential that the girls' dormitory was saved. Often what seems to be disaster proves to be a blessing in disguise. The same seems to be true in this case. It gave opportunity for larger and better things.

Improvements.

To replace the old building (destroyed) the board constructed a magnificent brick building, including kitchen, dining room spacious enough to accommodate 250 students, storage rooms and laundry. Out of the remaining walls of the destroyed building, is being constructed a commodious home for the Principal. This in every way is a home with modern conveniences. It is equipped with electric lights as well as modern heating apparatus. Furthermore the whole campus has been equipped with electric lights. But still the needs are many. The work has been handicapped because of insufficient room for recitation. To meet this need. they have to use the Chapel, often two classes at a time being assembled. The blacksmith shop is also being used a recitation room. There is much need of an administration building. This building, the committee was informed, will be erected this year. A new dormitory for the boys is a pressing need. In the first place it is too small. The present structure is inadequate in almost every way. 'In the second place, the rooms are not heated. Coal stover are placed in the hall and the boys are compelled to resort to these stoves to get warm. The committee would ask the Conference to consider this need. From this school come many to the membership of the Delaware Conference. Others are looking this way. They will be among the leadership of the Conference. Therefore, we recommend that the Delaware Conference consider it its duty to proffer the means for the erection of a dormitory for the boys. We found approximately 200 students in attendance. But a sad feature confronts the school which should be of interest to the Delaware Conference. More than 200 applications could not be accepted because of a lack of accommodations in the Dormitory. Considering the few handicaps, the work of the school is go-

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ing forward splendidly. The principal, Rev. T. H. Kiah, and his loyal corps of teachers are doing much for the boys and girls of this school, intellectually, industrially and spiritually. We are informed that of the great student body only three remain unconverted; and these three are in the balance. This is commendable for the school.

With all the emphasis at our command, we say a dormitory for boys oungt to be built at Princess Anne Academy. It ought to be done, it can be done and if the Delaware Conference says so, by the help of God, it will be done.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Of the outstanding lessons of the world-war none is more impelling than the value of training in both the development of the resources of the individual and in the marshalling of these resources for definite achievements.

The times demand increased interest in education. The pace is rapid. In every position in life in which one chances to find himself, he is immediately confronted by an almost cruel impatience, demanding that we be equal to life's exigencies.

Another result of the world-war is the new standard of citizenship. Twenty-one years of life will not be sufficient to give one the stamp of citizenship hereafter. The new standard of citizenship makes him a citizen who is able to interpret the ideals of his nation, imbibe the spirit of his age and give expression thereto in a pronounced willingness to shoulder the responsibilities which such citizenship entails.

The chief agency by which the coming generation will be enabled to maintain a footing when America becomes the cultural mistress of the world, and measures up to the new standard of citizenship is Christian Education, that does not make the individual incidental to the curriculum but has as its goal and end the development of the individual to the full dignity of regenerate manhood and womanhood.

The Conference Board of Education therefore recommends a larger interest in education and a larger spirit of liberality both in thought and in funds toward our educational institutions, paramount among which is our own Morgan College and its branches for more than a half century standing, to minister to the ever-expanding needs of its constituency—to make good our promise to P. A. \$30,000 of which remains as our unpaid obligation.

We also highly endorse the educational program of the State of Delaware evident in the "New Code" which provides for the untrameled opportunity for the youth of Delaware without regard to racial identity to the best in education.

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- 1. By providing adequate school-buildings and equipment.
- 2. By securing efficient teachers.
- 3. By making the school term sufficiently long to do lasting work, a fund for which having been created by the magnanimous gift of Mr. P. S. DuPont, \$900,000 of which the Negro youth of Delaware are to be the chief beneficiaries.

We urge that the brethren cooperate fully with the educational agencies that are at work in the States, represented by the Delaware Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GENERAL CONFERENCE MEMORIALS.

We, your special committee on Memorials to the General Conference, met and organized by electing J. H. Nutter, President, and J. U. King, Secretary.

After careful consideration of all the Memorials which properly came before us, which were seven in number, we make the following recommendations:

No. 1.—Memorial on the Courses of Study, coming from and adopted by the New Jersey Conference.—In view of the fact our Bishops are at this time already overworked, besides two of our Bishops are members of the present commission on the Conference Course of Study, we recommend that this Conference take no action upon said Memorial.

No. 2.—Memorial Relative to the Co-ordination of Home Missionary Agencies and a Unification of Administration for the same, from the Newark Conference.—In this case, we recommend no action by this Conference.

No. 3.—Memorial on Consolidation of Benevolent Board, from Illinois Annual Conference.—In view of the multiplicity of administration machinery and the overlapping of the same, which we believe would result in

unnecessary waste of time, energy and money, we recommend that this Conference approve this Memorial.

No. 4.—Memorial on Foreign Language Conferences of the Church, from New York East Conference.—Because of what we believe will be a conflict of sentiment, we recommend that this Conference take no action in this case.

No. 5.—Resolution on Race Relations, from the Salisbury District of the Delaware Conference.—This resolution we approve but recommend that the endorsement shall be by a committee representing the Conference at large.

No. 6.—Memorial on Making Appointments, from Newark Conference.

—In view of the fact that the adoption of this Memorial by the General Conference carries with it a certainty of the modification of the method of making appointments, we recommend that this Conference should not approve the same.

No. 7.—Memorial Concerning the Amalgamation of the Foreign Speaking Groups, from the Eastern Swedish Conference.—Because this Memorial asks only what we believe to be reasonable and just, namely, that there should not be a dissolution of any Conference or any drastic measures taken in the case of any constituency without that constituency having an opportunity to present its side of the case, we recommend that this Conference endorse the same.

MEMOIRS

DANIEL ARCHIE RIDOUT.

The Rev. Daniel Archie Ridout, son of Rev. Daniel Archie Ridout, of the Baltimore Conference of the A. M. E. Church, and Caroline M. Ridout, was born at Mt. Winans, Baltimore County, Maryland, December 25, 1857. He was converted near Easton, Maryland, in a woods early one morning at the age of twelve. He was educated in the Public Schools of Maryland and the Baltimore City High School. He taught school in Baltimore County before entering the Ministry. He joined the Delaware Conference in 1882 at at Centreville, Md., where he later pastored three years. He married Miss Mary Frances Jones of Baltimore, Md., at Govanstowa, Md., Nov. 9, 1882. Ten children resulted from this union, three of whom 'John Calvin, Viola May and Daniel Lyman) still survive. His first wife died at Nanticoke, Md., August 2, 1902, and was bured at Govans, Md.

On April 27, 1904, he married in Baltimore, Md., Miss Mary J. Slater of Cambridge, Md. He was the author of "Life of the Rev. Daniel Archie

Ridout" (his father).

He served the following charges: Bridgeton, N. J., 1 yr.; Smyrna, Del., 2 yrs.; Haven, Wilmington, Del., 3 yrs.; Princess Anne, Md., 2 yrs.; Cambridge, Md., 3 yrs.; Middletown, Del., 1 yr.; Orange, N. J., 2 yrs.; Merchantville, N. J., 1 yr.; Chestertown, Md., 3 yrs.; Snow Hill, Md., 2 yrs.; Nanticoke, Md., 2 yrs.; Laurel, Del., 4 yrs.; Fruitland, Md., 2 yrs.; Milford, Del., 1 yr.; Oxford, Md., 3 yrs.; St. Michaels, Md., 1 yr.; Centreville, Md., 3 yrs.; Marion Station, Md., 1 yr. and 3 months.

He was an outstanding man in the Conference. He was a Chester-field in manners. A great musician. How many of us can recall that masterpiece of his, "Hymns, and How We Sing Them." He trained his children in the art of music until the name Ridout among us suggests music. He was a great essay writer. His writings were clear and convining, showing thought and research.

As a Preacher he was at his height. Energetic, concise, forceful,

spiritual. You saw, you were convinced, you went away to do.

His illness lasted over two months. In all of that time he kept the same quiet spirit he had in health. The writer being near him visited him often. Always cheerful, inquiring about the work and the brethren. The brothers of the Conference same, sang, prayed and rejoiced with him. By his wife stood his wife. This elect lady left no call unanswered day or night. She was spending and being spent for him. The last Sunday morning he lived he sang (at home in his bed with his congregation at one of his churches next the parsonage), "My faith looks up to Thee," while his wife held him on her arm. He said to her that is a beautiful hymn. On July 2, 1919 at Marion Station, Md., his soul took its flight to the God who gave it. He met the Savior of whom he had preached these

years and received the well done. He was peculiarly devoted to his children. He was one with them in devotion, recreation and life. He lived for them and today they bless his memory.

The funeral services were held at Handy M. E. Church, Marion Station, Md., conducted by Rev. C. W. Pullett; addresses were made by Revs. T. W. Cooper, I. D. Pitts, W. T. Spellman and G. W. Bivens; others assisting, Revs. O. H. Spence, T. L. McDonald, J. M. Dickerson, R. H. Coleman, and F. T. Johnson. Interment at Mt. Calvary M. E. Cemetery, Fruitland, Mr.

A RESOLUTION ON PLAN OF UNIFICATION.

Whereas, The Unification plan of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as submitted by the committee on Unification at Louisville, Kentucky, is in many respects unfair and discriminatory to the colored membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church; and

Whereas, The Methodist Episcopal Church has always been fair and impartial ni its legislation to the extent of granting its colored membership equality of both rights and privileges in its representation, its legislation body, and participation in its administration; and

Whereas, If any discrimination has been shown it was not by legislative enactment; and discrimination while oppressive is more tolerant in administration than legislation; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we the members of the Dealaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, condemn and deplore the proposed plan of Unification as submitted by the joint committee on Unification, in that it proposes legislation inimical, unjust and discriminatory to the colored membership; and be it further

ASIN CONTROLL CONTROL

Resolved, That the delegates to the General Conference from the Delaware Conference be instructed by the Conference to refrain from supporting any legislation that in any way discriminates against the colored membership either as to representation or administration. Be it further

Resolved, That inasmuch as there is no expression from the delegates previous to their election and their views are unknown to the electorate prior to the election, that they deem themselves in honor bound to carry out the provisions of this Resolution, or tender their resignations as delegates during the session of the Conference.

RESOLUTION ON INCREASE OF PREACHER'S SALARIES.

Whereas, The cost of living has greatly advanced within the last four years while there has been very little advance and in many cases none whatever in the salaries paid our ministers and

Whereas, The ability of our people to pay has been very largely advanced through increased wages to laborers and the increased prices of all farm products which increase in the needs of a family and in the ability of our people to pay ought to result in a corresponding increase in the salaries of our preachers; therefore.

Resolved, First, that we recommend such an increase in the salaries of all ministers as shall correspond to the increase in the cost of living and in the income of the masses of our people.

Resolved, Second, that (as laymen of the Church upon whom the responsibility for the maintenance of an efficient ministry largely depends) we recommend that the cash salary paid any preacher, who is in effective relation and gives all his time to ministerial work, shall be not less than \$1000, and we pledge ourselves to use our utmost endeavor to bring every pastoral charge up to this minimum.

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
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
