

WHEREAS the members of Central Methodist Church, formerly on the Kenton Charge, have requested that said Central Methodist Church be closed, and

WHEREAS, all requirements for the abandonment of church property as set forth in the Discipline of the Methodist Church, 1952 edition, have been met.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference in regular session at Grace Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware, on the 12th Day of May, 1955, hereby declares said Central Methodist Church abandoned.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Trustees of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church be, and are hereby, empowered, authorized and directed to dispose of said Central Church property, and the officers, President and Secretary of said Conference Board of Trustees are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute a deed conveying said Central Church property to GREENWOOD CONSERVATION MENNONITE CHURCH and the proceeds, after all costs are paid be transferred to the Cheswold Methodist Church, Cheswold, Delaware to be used by said Cheswold Methodist Church for plant expansion purposes only.

WHEREAS Union Methodist Church now on the Ellendale Charge, because of insufficient membership, is no longer able to support the ministry of the Church, and

WHEREAS the Dover Board of Church Location and Building having adopted a motion for abandonment, and whereas the consent of the Bishop and the District Superintendents having been given (Discipline, 1952, paragraph 188)

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference in regular session at Grace Methodist Church, on the 12th day of May, 1955, hereby declares said Union Church ABANDONED.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Conference Board of Trustees be, and is hereby, requested to take over the care and supervision of said Union Church until such time as the Peninsula Annual Conference shall further instruct said Board in the disposition of the property.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORT: At the request of O. A. Bartley, permission was given to print the following reports in the Journal:

Report of a Special Committee appointed by the District Superintendent to deal with claims of Millwood Methodist Church and Houston Methodist Church relating to Parsonage.

It is the obligation of every Methodist Church being served by a minister to provide an adequate parsonage in a good state of repair for said minister.

We read in the quarterly Conference minutes, dated August 8, 1899 and November 4, 1899, that Millwood Church invested the total sum of \$184.00 in a new parsonage at Houston, Delaware to be returned if there should ever be any separation of the two churches.

The records show that the only expenses for repairs over the 53 year period assumed by Millwood Church was ¼ of the cost of installing a bathroom in the parsonage. All other repairs were paid for by the Houston Church.

Due to the fact that these two churches have separated, we, the committee of three appointed by the District Superintendent, according to Chapter 4, Section 8, article 190 of the 1952 edition of the Methodist Discipline, agree that, in view of the facts presented, Millwood's equity in the Houston Parsonage has decreased in value because they have not assumed their share of the upkeep of the Houston Parsonage. We believe, therefore, that \$75.00 would be a fair and just return to be paid by Houston Church to Millwood Church.

We trust that all parties concerned will accept the decision of this Committee. Signed—Fulton J. Downing, W. W. Mack, Paul M. Powell.

# WESLEY JUNIOR COLLEGE CORPORATE SESSION

The annual corporate session of Wesley Junior College was held at Grace Church, Wilmington, Delaware on May 12, 1955 at 1:30 p.m. Hon. W. Fell Davis, president of the Board of Trustees presided.

The minutes of the previous Corporate Session were approved as read. Dr. J. Paul Slaybaugh, president of the College reported that the increase in number of students had made it necessary to secure more dormitory space for girls and that the Richardson Home had been purchased for use as a dormitory for girls and a dining hall for the entire student body making the previous dining hall available for a library.

President Davis expressed his appreciation for the work of Dr. Slay-baugh and suggested that a lack of room will probably result in some students being turned away next fall.

Rev. Ralph C. Jones, chairman of the nominating committee presented the list of nominations for trustees. The session accepted the list as presented with the secretary casting the ballot. The following were elected:

Be It Resolved: that a Commission be appointed to make a comprehensive study of Wesley Junior College upon which the Conference may make decision relative to future policy of the Conference in relation to the College. The Commission to be constituted as follows:

- (1) Eight trustees to be appointed by the president of the Board of Trustees.
- (2) Eight members to be appointed by the Bishop.
- (3) The Bishop to serve as chairman with the district superintendents and president of the College serving as exofficio members.

Be It Further Resolved: that this Commission present its report at a called session of the Conference prior to March 1, 1956.

There being no further business the Corporate Session was adjourned.

GENERAL CONFERENCE DELEGATION: Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam announced the Conference was entitled to three Ministerial Delegates and three Lay Delegates to the General Conference.

RULES COMMITTEE: F. A. Baker made the following report for the Rules Committee, which was accepted by the Conference: The Committee on Rules moves that the Conference rules of order found on page 625 in the Official Journal of 1954 be the rules of order for the conference session of 1955. The committee on rules also recommends that the following rules govern the elections of ministerial and lay delegates to the general and jurisdictional conferences.

MAY

In accordance with Paragraphs 22-25, 501-2, 522-3-4, Discipline of 1952 the Peninsula Conference may elect three Ministerial and three Lay Delegates to the General Conference and four additional Ministerial and four additional Lay Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

The additional delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference are the Reserve Delegates to the General Conference in order of their election.

In connection with these elections I now move the following procedure and rules:

- 1. That after all the delegates to the General Conference have first been elected on a separate ballot, the Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference as reserves to the General Conference be elected by balloting.
- 2. That there shall also be elected three Ministerial Reserve and three Lay Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.
- 3. That every member entitled to vote shall be ordered within the Bar of the Conference and those not within the Bar of the Conference shall not be entitled to vote except the treasurer, the statistician and their assistants, whose ballots shall be received by the tellers.
- 4. That any ballot containing fewer or more than the number of names to be voted for shall be rejected.
- 5. That where there are two or more members of the same name, only such ballots as containing the Christian name or initials of the person for whom the ballot is cast shall be counted, but such omission of the Christian name or initial shall not affect the other names on the ballot.
- 6. That a majority of the legal ballots cast shall be required. A majority of the legal votes cast on any ballot shall elect except when a larger number of members receive such a majority than are to be elected; in which case the person or persons receiving the highest vote shall be elected to the total number of places to be filled. A tie vote between two persons when but one place remains to be filled shall be disregarded and another vote shall be taken.

WHEREAS, Twelve hundred men each year during 1952-53 and 1953-54 were separated from active membership in the Annual Conferences through death, retirement, withdrawal, location, etc., and,

WHEREAS, Eight hundred sixty-four Methodist men were graduated from the accredited seminaries of the United States (679 from Methodist Schools; 185 from non-Methodist schools) in 1953-54, and

WHEREAS, an increase in theological schools enrollment of 50% is necessary if The Methodist Church is to meet the minimum number of ministerial replacements needed with trained ministers, and

WHEREAS, the ten existing Methodist theological schools are at near capacity with 2967 students and cannot accommodate the 4450 men (50%) increase needed in seminary training annually;

THEREFORE, We respectfully memorialize the General Conference of The Methodist Church, now in session, to take immediate steps to make provision for an expanded program of theological education. The committee so recommended and it was adopted by the Conference.

# (a) District Superintendents

O. A. BARTLEY, Superintendent

Bishop Oxnam and Members of the Conference:

Once again I offer an accounting of our stewardship of the Dover District for the year which has just closed.

"AND DEPARTING LEAVE BEHIND US . . . "

The Annual Conference was scarcely over when the first break in our ranks occurred. On May 28, 1954, David T. Campbell died suddenly in the Blades Parsonage. On June 25, J. P. Outten, who retired in 1933, left those ranks to join that of the "Saints redeemed". After a long illness, Mrs. Howard Davis, wife of our retired brother, The Rev. Howard Davis, gave up the uneven struggle with disease on September 30, and on March 15, 1955, the angel visited Asa E. Knicely and gave release to his spirit.

Appropriate memoirs have been prepared for each of these departed friends, but for those who cared "there is left a majestic memory". To all the friends and relatives we call to mind these words: "Blessed are they that mourn, for they shall be comforted".

#### Pastoral Relations

The Rev. F. Charles Louhoff will seek at this Conference the Retired Relation. With his retirement he brings to a close perhaps the finest pastorate in his entire career at Houston, Delaware. He worked hard; brought forth much fruit, and possesses the love of his people. We wish for him and Mrs. Louhoff every possible happiness in this new relationship.

#### **Pastoral Changes**

Upon the death of the Rev. David T. Campbell, we asked the Rev. Jacob C. Hanby to assume the responsibility of the work at Blades. This he has done with outstanding success; namely, 28 new members, a new W. S. C. S. Society, all financial obligations paid in full, and a new M. Y. F. formed. He will ask for the Active Relation at this Conference.

On January 31, 1955, the Rev. Donald E. Devey was relieved of his pastorate at Kenton, Delaware, and Mr. Frank Lucia who has decided to give his life to the ministry was asked to take over. This young man and his wife, who is the daughter of the Rev. Milton Milliner, have brought new life and hope to this charge. To both of these brethren I extend my heartiest commendation for a job well done.

#### Education

The work entrusted to the Conference Board of Education, and its Executive Secretary, The Rev. Douglas Milbury, has been prosecuted with strength and with many victories. 307 attended Christian Workers Schools, 138 receiving credit cards.

The Youth Work has expanded in a very gratifying way, notably the Youth Visitation Program in which 47 charges participated. 725 youth and their leaders attended the closing rally in Avenue Church, Milford.

The sub-District rallies have been helpful and in the main very well attended.

The Youth Fund amounts to \$914.

#### **Buildings and Improvements**

A number of building programs are now underway, or being contemplated for the near future.

Reliance Charge is adding to its educational facilities to the extent of \$20,000. Wesley Church on the Seaford Circuit is expanding its facilities at a cost of \$10,000, but the value will be nearer \$15,000 since much of the labor is being contributed by the men of the Church.

Bethel Church, Lewes has successfully completed a financial campaign in the amount of \$100,000 and is now having the architect prepare the plans for an educational addition costing \$125,000.

Wesley Church, Georgetown has voted to proceed with a campaign for building funds amounting to \$100,000. An architect has been employed and is now drawing preliminary plans.

Calvary Church—Milford is about ready to let the contract for the completion of the sanctuary, and the Church in Bridgeville will begin construction of its educational building this Spring. These additional charges have paid \$1,000 or more for the improvement of property:

Rehoboth has purchased a lot where it hopes in the near future to locate the parsonage. This is a very strategic spot for Methodism and we sincerely hope the day will come soon when this church will meet the challenge of this situation. The Conference should be prepared to help.

#### The Woman's Society of Christian Service

This year brought to a close the administration of Mrs. Earle Sylvester and her staff, and nothing I can say will add to the fine commendations which have been received by the loyal officers, and faithful members of this organization.

Mrs. Sylvester has been honored by election to the Presidency of the Conference Society and we predict she will continue to give the high caliber of leadership it has received under the direction of Mrs. Virginia Jackson, retiring President.

At the Spring Meeting of the District Society, Mrs. Granville Tyndall of Rehoboth was elected to succeed Mrs. Sylvester, and we look forward to the continued success of the organization under her leadership.

#### The Board of Lay Activities

The District Lay Leaders and the Conference Board of Lay Activities have again put on a commendable program. The annual dinner for lay leaders and ministers was attended by 185 on a very stormy night and listened to an inspiring and informative address delivered by Dr. Hurst Anderson, President of The American University.

Four communion breakfasts for men were held with a total attendance of 840, and the special cause of this Board, the support of the Board of Child Care was emphasized in most charges, the total offering amounting to nearly \$4,000. There are now 12 units of Methodist Men, and the Stewardship Program has received the fine and consecrated leadership of Paul M. Powell who has organized the program for an "on-going" emphasis, which we believe will bring forth excellent results.

#### Ministerial Support

Conley's Chapel White's Chapel Zion

#### Roxana-Sound Circuit

Hickory Hill which has been on the Dagsboro Circuit will be placed on the Roxana-Sound Circuit as an afternoon appointment. The total salary will then be \$3700.

#### Harbeson

Sand Hill, formerly on the Georgetown Circuit will be served by the Pastor of the Harbeson Charge, thus with Indian Mission, giving us a \$2700 or perhaps \$2800 appointment.

These changes will reduce travel for the ministers involved, and are in line with the recommendations of the Board of Missions Survey made last year and adopted by the Conference. Although one Church is discontinued and one transferred to the Easton District, there is a net increase in support of approximately one thousand dollars over the previous arrangement.

#### Dover Air Force Base

On September 1, 1954, Chaplain A. M. B. Shapp, a member of this Conference, began his work as pastor of St. Paul's Church, Dover and as a civilian chaplain to work among the military families which had moved into the Dover Area as a result of the expansion of the Dover Air Force Base. In the eight months following, he has made 1,787 calls to Air Force families, contacting 2,477 persons, all in the name of the Christian Church.

Many of these families are Methodist, or have preference for the Methodist Church, but many others have no denominational affiliation whatever.

Such work as this cannot be evaluated in terms of statistics alone. There are many dividends in human relations which are beyond any mere set of figures.

The local directors of this project believe we should continue this experiment, and so recommend. However, the matter of the relationship of the Church to the military is not confined to the Dover Area. From Bainbridge to Chincoteague our life feels the impact of military installations upon it. It is, therefore, gratifying to know that the Conference Board of Missions and the Conference Committee on Relationship to Chaplains have raised a special duty committee to investigate this problem during the coming Conference year with the hope that it may be able to find some definite suggestions to recommend for action by the Conference. In the meantime, the Dover project can continue to be a pilot experiment in the total study.

I close this report with several deep convictions. First, a profound respect for the loyalty of the lay people on the Dover District who love the Church and serve her with gladness. Second, each passing year brings a deepening comprehension of the fine fellowship there is in the ministry. Occasionally there is one who puts self above his Lord, but more often than not these are consecrated men who give much, much more than they receive. Finally, the assurance grows that Our Father never makes the load so heavy but that, by faith, He also gives us the strength and courage to bear it. To Him be glory forever and ever.

Bishop Oxnam, and members of the Peninsula Annual Conference, dear Brethren:

Again I have the privilege of bringing an annual report to you representing the labors of our Methodist people on the Easton District.

#### Our Parsonage Homes

The Rev. and Mrs. Roy B. Phillips of Wesley Chapel of Kent are the proud parents of a son, and to Rev. and Mrs. Reginald H. Wheatley of our Burrsville charge was born a little girl. We welcome these into our District family.

Three of the ministers during the year have suffered severe illness. Rev. Kenneth M. Dickey of Tilghman met with an accident a day or two after Conference, and was not able to take his work for several weeks. The Rev. H. V. Branford, of Kent Island, and the Rev. A. E. B. Blundon of Hillsboro-Queen Anne, both were hospitalized through the summer and were out of their work for from three to five months. All sufficiently recovered that they resumed their pulpits and are doing their work. I wish to record my appreciation to the officials and members of these three churches for the magnificent way in which they stood by their ministers during these periods.

At this session of the Annual Conference the Rev. H. V. Branford requests that he be granted the Retired relation. I have a special feeling with regard to announcing this request, for Harry Branford and I knocked at the door of the Conference together in the year 1926. We have had an interest in each other through these twenty-nine years. We who know him know that he, with his wife, have sacrificially and successfully served every interest of the Kingdom committed to them. We wish them God speed as they move into their lovely home at Rehoboth Beach, and pray that the release from responsibility will increase his physical stamina for many years to come.

#### District Activities

Since increasingly the Commission plan is finding favor with our churches, I shall seek to present this report on these lines.

Missions. I think we are working in the right direction by maintaining our Missionary Cultivation program in the month of February. Under the guidance of our District Secretary, the Rev. William Hemphill, Jr., Dr. C. Stanley Thoburn of India spoke in nine churches on the District to a total of 643 people. He also appeared in six High Schools before the entire student body. The visual aid materials have been used by a number of churches. This year, according to reports which I have received, forty-two of the fifty-four charges in the District have paid their World Service askings in full. Thirty-

six have paid every apportionment in full. The total offering on the District for the Bishop's appeal for Korea is \$2434; Advance Special for Gilchrist is \$1016, for Dennis \$253; Rally Day \$1590.00; for the Fellowship of Suffering \$1043.50; Board of Child Care \$2289; Week of Dedication \$484.

Education. Final figures are not available, but I am satisfied from the reports in the Quarterly Conferences that both Church School enrollment and average attendance will show a substantial increase. Four Leadership Training Schools were held in the early fall, at Ingleside; Denton; First Church; St. Michaels; and Cambridge, St. Paul's. I cannot report that these were significantly successful. There is a definite feeling among the ministers that our Leadership Education program needs to be completely reviewed and adjusted to more adequately meet the needs of the people. I am sure the ministers of the Easton District will be glad to cooperate in any plan which seems to remedy the present situation. After Conference it is hoped that there will be an effort made to do exactly this.

Our District M. Y. F. program under the leadership of the Rev. Dale L. Ruth, with the five County sub-District Directors, the Rev. W. H. Kohl, Rev. J. Gordon Stapleton, the Rev. Charles E. Covington, the Rev. James R. Hughes, and the Rev. Robert C. Hicks have consistently done effective work with our young people. Meetings are held each month in each County with the average attendance ranging from seventy-five to one hundred and fifty. Our young people are enthusiastic, they are being well trained, and under the leadership of these men are having opportunity for healthy growth both spiritually and socially.

Finance. Under the leadership of Mr. C. Brooks Nagel, our District Director, the Stewardship program initiated by our Board of Lay Activities is being guided in a manner that should produce results in the coming Conference year. Our Laymen are being made aware of the necessity for increased giving for their own souls sake.

Several churches this year have made extensive improvements to their buildings. Those spending \$2500 or more are as follows: Fairlee, remodeling of church sanctuary and building an addition to connect the church and church house \$7,000; St. Thomas' \$3000; Chestertown, Christ, paid on indebtedness \$4500, on improvements \$1110,—a total of \$5610. Wesley Chapel of Kent \$2600; Beckwith-Spedden \$2600; Ingleside \$4000, St. James \$2500.

Greensboro \$2500; Oxford balance on indebtedness \$5,600, installing carrillon bells \$3940; Sudlersville, erecting an educational and fellowship hall to cost approximately \$26,000, this year have raised \$10,000. Cambridge, St. Paul's, paid on old debt \$1300, on improvements \$2800, a total of \$4100. Cambridge, Grace, paid on indebtedness \$3,406, improvements \$1,317, total of \$4723. Cambridge, Zion, paid on indebtedness \$20,000, total building and improvements \$12,000. Queenstown paid on indebtedness \$3300, on improvements \$2300, totaling \$5600.

Several churches I think deserve special mention. The officials of Trappe this year, sensing a need for additional educational facilities, under the leadership of their pastor, Rev. J. C. Stapleton, have conducted their own campaign, raised \$10,000, and are in the process of erecting an educational unit. At Goldsboro the officials have about completed the entire renovation

of their parsonage including hardwood floors, complete new heating system, completely renovated bathroom, new roof, storm windows, paper and paint. The total cost of this project is \$4200 in cash, and in addition much labor has been donated by members and friends. At St. Lukes Church in St. Michaels, Rev. E. W. Cursey, pastor, where one and a half years ago there was a merger of the two churches, the former Southerland Church has been renovated into a parish house at an approximate cost of \$6000. The debt on the renovation of the parsonage reported last year at \$1500 has been paid in full, and a considerable part of the cost of the renovating is in hand.

Christ Church, Federalsburg, Rev. D. G. Higgins, Jr., pastor, continues the work of completing their addition for educational work. They are spending money as they get it. This year they have raised \$8,100 for the building, and \$1600 for improvement on church and parsonage. The people of Kennedyville, Dr. E. J. Bond, pastor, have refinished the interior and exterior of their church, installed a new heating system, at a total cost of \$2700. Hooper's Island, Rev. W. A. Turner, pastor, have improved the parsonage and so completely remodeled the Hoosier Memorial Church that it is easily one of the most attractive churches on the District, at a total cost of \$8000, with much labor contributed in addition. Plans now are to do the same at Hoopersville.

Easily the most extensive project in the District is the erection of the new church in Church Hill where the Rev. Donald O. Clendaniel is the pastor. Last year he reported the removal of one of the church buildings. Since then the congregation has been worshipping in the remaining building while their new \$60,000 unit was being erected. Plans now call for the reopening of this building on June 19. It is expected that the total indebtedness will be less than \$20,000.

In addition the total salary increase on the District for next year will be \$6670, individual churches as follows:

salute the out-going president Mrs. Baynard Harper, of Hurlock, and cordiaally thank her for the untiring leadership she has given to this organization in the last four years. We welcome into the place of leadership, as our new District president, Mrs. Walter B. Palmer of Denton. I am sure the women of the District will give every support to Mrs. Palmer, and that under her leadership this organization will continue to prosper.

The District Board of Lay Activities, under the leadership of our District Lay Leader, Mr. Horace M. Morgan, have continued to promote such activities as seem to be helpful to the men's work. Mr. Morgan has given his loyal support in every effort to work out our Stewardship program under Mr. Nagel. Our Lenten Communion Breakfasts were held this year in the five counties on the first five Sundays of Lent, with a total of 542 men in attendance. The offering, in the amount of \$309.32 has been sent to the Board of Child Care as a special contribution from the Laymen of the District. Last fall we held our first District-wide Men's Banquet in Denton. Judge J. DeWeese Carter was toastmaster. Our speaker was our own Chaplain Carpenter. So successful was that affair that immediately plans were made for a second Men's Banquet, which will be held this year in November,—the speaker to be our resident Bishop, G. Bromley Oxnam.

Again I reiterate my appreciation to the ministers and laymen of this District and to my Brethren of the Cabinet for their brotherliness to me, and for their devotion to the Kingdom of God as is reflected not only in this report, but in the many acts in which they have sought by some means to bring in the Kingdom of God.

Bishop Oxnam and Fellow Members of The Peninsula Annual Conference:

First of all, let me say that I am sincerely grateful for the privilege of bringing to you this report of some of the events and accomplishments of my brethren in the ministry and the laity of the churches on the Salisbury District during the Conference year just closed.

#### **Pastoral Adjustments**

The only pastoral adjustment on the Salisbury District during this Conference year was on the Stockton Charge. As of September 1, 1954 the Pastor, The Rev. Willard L. Stevens, was transferred to the St. Louis Conference and The Rev. G. Francis Wilson was appointed to complete the year on that Charge.

#### Concerning Our Pasonage Families

The Rev. G. A. Morris, for many years an honored minister in the Maryland Annual Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church, and a retired member of the Peninsula Annual Conference, died at his home in Salisbury on August 2, 1954. And the Rev. J. W. Smith, who served faithfully and well as a Supply Pastor in our Conference for a goodly number of years and was in the retired relationship, died at his home in Galestown, Maryland on November 21, 1954.

There have been no deaths during the year among the pastors or their families on the Salisbury District who are in the effective relation. And no pastor was sick for any extended period of time as has been true in other years.

The Rev. Robert W. Hastings was compelled by serious illness from a nervous condition to ask for the retired relation at the 1953 session of our Conference. Some years ago he was given a lot in Blades, Delaware on which after a time a small bungalow was built and rented. Fortunately, it had just gotten paid for when he was forced to retire. But in order to furnish it and get through the first year of retirement he had to place a new mortgage on it in the amount of \$2000. Through the love and sympathetic concern of fellow pastors and of the laymen in the churches of the Salisbury District this mortgage will surely be entirely liquidated in the very near future. Perhaps it should be said in this connection that it has been found most practicable for the District on which he last served to help a stricken minister to meet a special need such as this. And each of the Districts in our Conference has had its turn and opportunity in recent years to render such urgent service. By the grace of God, the help of the Conference from necessitous funds, the thoughtfulness of friends, and by the ingenuity and good planning of the Hastings family, consisting of Bob and Madelyn and their two children, Bobbie and Karen Sue, they have managed somehow to meet the elemental necessities of life. This somewhat extended statement is made here because of the general interest in and concern for their welfare on the part of members of the Conference. We shall continue to help them in every way we can and shall remember them in our prayers.

We are happy to announce that four of the parsonage homes have had the pleasure this year of welcoming new babies. The Rev. and Mrs. Edgar J. Clawson of Mt. Hermon have a son, Edgar J. Clawson, Jr. The Rev. and Mrs. R. C. Vernon of St. Martins have a daughter, Margaret Bell Vernon. The Rev. and Mrs. C. H. Squires of Ocean City have a son, James Levin Squires. And the Rev. and Mrs. Bruce R. Graham of Marion Station have a daughter, Barbara Lynn Graham. We extend our congratulations to these parsonage homes which have been blessed in this special way.

#### Christian Stewardship

The work in the Salisbury District this year began with the emphasis on Christian Stewardship. After Conference, at the first District Preacher's Meeting which was held on June 6, Clinton H. Brown, Conference Director of Stewardship, gave an inspirational message to the pastors and their wives on the Stewardship Movement. Also, he called their attention to the

stewardship materials prepared by the Board of Lay Activities of the Methodist Church. This was followed during the summer with stewardship workshops in each county for the pastors and local directors of Stewardship. In the fall the stewardship picture, "The Hidden Heart," was shown in each of the six Group Quarterly Conferences held on the District. Later, this outstanding picture was presented on most of the charges of the District. The District Director of Stewardship, Mr. Richard B. Sheridan, Jr., and the District Lay Leader, Mr. A. L. Fleming, gave generously of their time for the workshops and for other stewardship meetings in the churches.

The pastors on the Salisbury District, generally, preached on Christian Stewardship emphasizing the stewardship of time, the stewardship of talents, the stewardship of life, and the stewardship of possessions. The results are to be seen, first of all, in a deepening spiritual commitment in our churches and as a by-product of that there has been increased giving to the support of all the needy causes for which our great Church is responsible. The preaching and practice of Christian Stewardship is surely the basic solution to most of the baffling spiritual, as well as financial, problems which are faced by all of our churches—large and small.

#### Repairs, Improvements, and Payments on Indebtedness

In October the hurricane "Hazel" swept across our territory and took a heavy toll in destruction on the Salisbury District. The churches on a number of charges suffered in varying degrees but the greatest damage was done at Rumbley and at Mt. Pleasant Church, Crisfield. At Rumbley on the Fairmount Charge, the Rev. J. Melvin Kay, pastor, the building was made completely unusable. At Mt. Pleasant, Crisfield, The Rev. A. T. Mac-Farland, pastor, some \$21,000 has been expended and paid in full in restoring the church building and in renovating and beautifying the sanctuary. The church services at Rumbley are still being held in the church house but it is hoped that soon arrangements will have been completed to begin rebuilding. The restored sanctuary at Mt. Pleasant was reopened on Sunday. March 6. And with the new color scheme which brings out the beauty of the colored windows and with other improvements that were made, this is now one of the most attractive and worshipful sanctuaries in our Conference. The community of Rhodes Point on Smith Island suffered great destruction but, fortunately, there was no loss of life and the church building itself had only minor damage. The church buildings at Ewell and Tylerton suffered some damage, also, but all has been repaired and is paid for.

Repairs from this storm damage and other improvements this year have totaled \$182,892. The churches which have spent \$500 or more on this are as follows: Allen, \$3633; Berlin, \$4350; Bishopville, \$4378; Crisfield-Asbury, \$1270; Crisfield-Immanuel, \$1000; Crisfield-Mt. Pleasant, \$21,000; Crisfield-Mariners, \$6667; Deal Island, \$1549; Delmar-First, \$1311; Delmar-Mt. Olive, \$50,000; Fairmount, \$1800; Fruitland, \$4190; Galestown, \$2564; Hebron-Nelson, \$2550; Hebron-St. Pauls, \$1800; Mardela, \$1185; Mt. Hermon, \$692; Mt. Vernon, \$8497; Oriole, \$2800; Pittsville-Ayres, \$1680; Pocomoke-Bethany, \$3293; Pocomoke-Salem, \$1550; Princess Anne, \$1955; Salisbury-Asbury, \$5011; Salisbury-Bethesda, \$7521; Salisbury-St. Andrews, \$1366; Salisbury-Trinity, \$9222; Sharptown-Mt. Vernon,

\$4250; Smith Island, \$6466; St. Martins, \$3678; Stockton, \$2764; Trinity and Quindocqua, \$906; Willards and Grace, \$12,000.

This includes extensive work to provide additional church school space at Delmar-Mt. Olive, C. W. Branford, Pastor, and at Asbury Church, Mt. Vernon, G. I. Loar, Pastor; elaborate folding doors in the fellowship hall of Bethesda Church, Salisbury, J. Leas Green, Pastor, to create additional rooms; and a complete new kitchen with electric dishwasher at Trinity Church, Salisbury, Carleton M. Harris, Pastor. Willards Church, J. B. Vaughn, Pastor, added a church school annex and bought new furniture which has transformed the appearance of their sanctuary into a place of beauty which is most conducive to worship.

Thirteen churches report payments on indebtedness totaling \$21,707. They are as follows: Bishopville, \$1000; Crisfield: Immanuel, \$1650; Deal Island, \$1920; Hebron: St. Pauls, \$3400; Mardela, \$179; Mt. Hermon, \$935; Oriole, \$2000; Pocomoke-Salem, \$2100; Salisbury: Bethesda, \$500; Salisbury: St. Andrews, \$900; Smith Island, \$1305; Snow Hill: Bates, \$4650; Snow Hill: Whatcoat, \$1168.

#### Christian Education and Youth Work

The program of Christian Education on the District was greatly strengthened by the five Christian Workers' Training Schools which were held in January. Nineteen courses were offered by trained and experienced instructors with a total enrollment of approximately 500. The encouragement and help of the Rev. F. Douglas Milbury, Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, in setting up these Schools was very much appreciated.

In the fall, discussion groups for workers with youth, were held by The Rev. O. G. Brewer, Jr., District Director of Youth Work, together with the sub-district counsellors—The Revs. Clarence J. Fox, Larry S. Renner, and Elmer R. Shield. The purpose of these discussion groups was to strengthen the youth work in our churches. In the Spring, preparatory to the Methodist Youth Fellowship visitation throughout the Conference, two additional training sessions for adult workers with youth were held under the leadership of the Conference Youth Directors, The Revs. Howell Wilkins and Donzel Wildey, assisted by The Rev. Edwin Thomas.

The Methodist Youth Fellowship visitation on the week's end of March 20th was entered into wholeheartedly and was especially helpful. It resulted in better understanding of our Methodist Youth program and in inspiration and encouragement to achieve our Conference goal of winning 2000 teen-age youth by the end of the coming Conference year.

The regular District Methodist Youth Fellowship program of monthly sub-district meetings has been carried on faithfully under the leadership of the district director and the sub-district counsellors. The response of our youth and their local church counsellors has been most gratifying. Thirty-four charges on the District report evening sessions of the Methodist Youth Fellowship with a total enrollment of 919.

The response of the churches, under the leadership of their pastors, to the support of other work among our Methodist youth is reflected in the contribution of more than \$7300 to the support of Wesley Junior College

and more than \$2000 to the support of our ministry to Methodist youth through the program of the Wesley Foundation.

Thirty charges report having had Vacation Church Schools with a total enrolled in them of 2351.

Twenty-two charges report having Methodist Young Adult Fellowship groups with a total enrollment of 1082.

#### Membership and Evangelism

The total number of new members reported this year on the District is 762. Charges receiving five or more new members this year are as follows: Allen—19; Berlin—40; Bishopville—6; Crisfield: Asbury—20; Crisfield: Immanuel—18; Crisfield: Mt. Pleasant—25; Crisfield: Mariners—6; Delmar: First—11; Delmar: Mt. Olive—8; Fairmount—10; Fruitland—22; Galestown—22; Hebron: St. Pauls—7; Mardela—5; Mt. Hermon—5; Mt. Vernon—15; Nanticoke—5; Oriole—5; Parsonsburg—12; Pittsville: Ayers—12; Pocomoke: Bethany—21; Pocomoke: Salem—25; Powellville—10; Princess Anne—15; Salisbury: Asbury—67; Salisbury: Bethesda—50; Salisbury: Grace—50; Salisbury: St. Andrews—13; Salisbury: Trinity—60; Sharptown: Asbury—6; Sharptown: Mt. Vernon—8; Smith Island—60; Snow Hill: Bates—9; Snow Hill: Whatcoat—26; Somerset—6; St. Martins—13; Stockton—7; Whaleyville—9; Willards—24.

# Methodist Men and Woman's Society of Christian Service

We now have 19 chartered Methodist Men's groups which is an increase of five over last year. Charges reporting newly chartered groups are: Hebron: Nelson; Oriole; Parsonsburg; Pocomoke: Salem; Willards and Grace. We fully expect to reach our goal of 24 chartered groups by the end of this quadrennium.

The Communion breakfasts during Lent this year were very well attended with a total of 540 men present. They were occasions of strengthening faith and of deepening Christian fellowship.

Methodist Men have enthusiastically given their support to the Board of Child Care since taking it as a project for their special interest and support. The total given to the Board of Child Care this year is \$4062, an increase of \$280 over last year.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank our Conference Lay Leader, Mr. Granville Hooper, for the times he has so willingly spoken to Methodist Men's groups on the District. Professor A. L. Fleming, too, deserves special mention for his devoted service as District Lay Leader—going about speaking in our churches, being present on charter nights for Methodist Men, helping to keep the needs of the Board of Child Care before our laymen, and contributing leadership generally to the Laymen's work of our churches on the Salisbury District.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service has also had a splendid year under the faithful leadership of Mrs. Ethel Dougherty of Immanuel Church, Crisfield, as District President, and her fellow workers. The District officers report that the spirit of co-operation among the churches has been unusually fine. Every church in the District is now listed as "organized" since each one has either a fully organized society, a modified plan society,

or a District member. Every church had sent a contribution for the missionary work of the Woman's Division to the District Treasurer before the books were closed on April 20. The pledge to missions was met in full and \$10,000 was pledged for the coming year which is an increase of \$500.

#### Crusade For World Order

In early January, the District Superintendent held five Seminars around the District to discuss with the pastors the Crusade for World Order, the Church Attendance Crusade, and the Youth Emphasis. Following the plan of the general church, the month of February was devoted to presentation of the Crusade for World Order. In preparation for their sermons on this subject a number of pastors visited the United Nations and, with few exceptions, three sermons were preached on every charge on the suggested topics, namely, "The Meaning of Peace", "The United Nations", and "Disarmament". And the booklet "Plowshares and Pruning Hooks" was made available to our people in all the churches.

#### **Ministerial Support**

Looking ahead to the new year and realizing the importance of providing more adequately for the support of the pastors, 23 churches have increased their pastoral support for the coming year. They are as follows: Berlin, \$400 Expense; Crisfield: Immanuel, \$100 Expense; Crisfield: Mariners, \$200 Expense; Deal Island, \$50 Expense; Delmar: First, \$100 plus \$100 Expense; Delmar: Mt. Olive, \$300; Fruitland, \$400; Galestown, \$200 Expense; Hebron: St. Paul's, 100 plus \$300 Expense; Nanticoke and Bivalve, \$200 Expense; Ocean City, \$50 plus \$400 Expense; Parsonsburg, \$150; Pocomoke: Salem, \$250; Powellville, \$133; Princess Anne, \$250 Expense; Salisbury: Grace, \$600; Salisbury: St. Andrew's, \$50 Expense; Salisbury: Trinity, \$100 plus \$100 Expense; Sharptown: Asbury, \$300 Expense; Sharptown: Mt. Vernon, \$400 Expense; Smith Island, \$200 Expense; Snow Hill: Whatcoat, \$300 Expense; Whaleyville, \$300; making a grand total of approximately \$6000 in increased ministerial support, including salary and expense account for the coming year.

## World Service, the Advance, and Other Giving

I am happy, indeed, to be able to report that the churches of the Salisbury District have contributed this Conference year a total of \$51,329 to General and Conference Administration and General and Conference Benevolences. This is \$7,722 more than the total to the same causes last year. The amount contributed to the Continuing Advance for Christ and His Church as reported to me was \$11,891 which is \$2956 more than the total for last year. The special offering for Korea totaled \$2940. The Week of Dedication offering this year amounted to \$1430. The Methodist Youth Fund came to \$617. This makes a grand total of \$22,644 in giving for others this year in excess over last year. And at the same time the churches on the District expended \$47,657 on their own buildings and improvements over and above last year.

Much praise and appreciation go to our Conference Missionary Secretary, The Rev. W. O. Hackett, to our District Missionary Secretary, The

Rev. Rollan E. Ferry, and to our pastors and missionary minded laymen for the continuing interest and response of our churches in World Service and Advance giving. The fact that support of the work of the Gilchrists in India, certain continuing projects in Puerto Rico, and the work of Louis and Madelyn Dennis on the island of Borneo are included in the Advance Specials giving of the churches in our District constitute a most valuable personal incentive to sustained missionary interest.

#### Appreciation

Bishop Oxnam never ceases to inspire all of us to endeavor to climb toward ever higher heights of nobler and more Christlike living. To work with him in the Cabinet is to feel the power of his brilliant leadership and the ever present challenge of his personal life to be sincere and forthright and mature in one's every act and attitude. He stands out among us as student, scholar, eminent citizen, church administrator, human being, lover of good fun, master of repartee, incisive appraiser of human nature and motives, preacher extraordinary, and friend of God. We think of the young G. Bromley Oxnam going to find his first circuit appointment and now of his place of recognized and honored leadership in the World Church. And we are reminded of those lines in Henry W. Longfellow's poem—"The Ladder of St. Augustine"—in which he said:

"The heights by great men reached and kept
Were not attained by sudden flight,
But they, while their companions slept,
Were toiling upward in the night."

It is a source of continuing joy and satisfaction to have had the privilege of serving for another year with him, with my colleagues in the Cabinet, with so many of the fine laymen of our churches on the District, and with my fellow ministers in the Gospel and their families.

In conclusion, let me take this opportunity to express my personal appreciation and thanks to all those who have helped in any way, by their faithfulness and co-operation and loyalty and devotion to duty, and understanding, to make possible the achievements of the churches on the Salisbury District which I have tried to sketch on the canvas of this report. And not only to these—"But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

Some unknown saint once observed, "The death of Christ did not terminate His work but did germinate it." The Chronicles of the Christian Church across the centuries validate his observation. This germination has been apparent in the Wilmington District this Conference year.

#### Changes

"The Ambassador of The Almighty" who comes to call persons from this imperfect life to that all-perfect, glorious, celestial life beyond, did not enter any personages of the Wilmington District this year. He did come for the wife of one of our retired brothers and two widows of deceased brethren: Mrs. George A. Cooke, Mrs. Charles H. Hudson and Mrs. Lulu M. Wilson. Appropriate Memoirs have been prepared by selected members of this Annual Conference.

Two new persons entered parsonages of the District this year: Jon Lawrence Thomas Benjamin was born on August 14, 1954. Lonnie Beth Hastings was born November 4, 1954.

The Rev. Melvin E. Wheatley and Mrs. Mary Banning were united in Holy Matrimony on Thanksgiving Day, November 25, 1954.

On March 1, 1955, the Rev. Leon W. Ross was transferred from the Hockessin Charge to the Danville District of the Virginia Conference. The Rev. Ralph E. Hughes was transferred from the Warwick Charge to the Hockessin Charge. The Rev. Robert P. Whitlock was appointed to the Warwick Charge. The Rev. D'Arcy Littleton, retiring from the Veterans' Administrative Chaplaincy, was appointed assistant pastor of Cherry Hill Charge to assist the Rev. John H. Jones who had been hospitalized for a number of months.

On May 1, 1955, the Rev. Ralph H. Collis was transferred from Grace Church, Wilmington, to Asbury Church, Salisbury, to serve as Minister of Visitation and Director of Religious Education. At this Conference Session, the Rev. Herman McKay will be transferred back to his home Conference from the Troy Conference where he served with distinction as executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education. He will succeed the Rev. Ralph H. Collis as Associate Minister of Grace Church, Wilmington.

#### Conversions

Last Conference year, the total number of accessions reported was 2502, an increase of 832, or 50% over the preceding year. This year, 1274 persons were received on profession of faith, and 1230 by letters of transfer or recommendation, a total of 2504, an increase of 2. This increase is more significant than the number suggests. Last year each Charge in the District was joined with two others in a three-week, three-charge United Evangelism Campaign of preaching services and visitation evangelism. This year there was no district-wide campaign nor any organized supervision. An increase of two therefore indicates increased voluntary commitment to evangelistic effort on the part of pastors and people. It is heartening to note that again this year the number of accessions through profession of faith exceeds the number received by transfer.

#### Contributions

All but 12 Charges accepted their World Service and Benevolence askings in full. Most of the Charges have paid their acceptances in full.

All but 13 Charges have paid the Wesley Junior College askings in full. Only four Charges, three of them of Mission status, did not pay anything. Most of the others came near to reaching the amounts asked. One Charge doubled the amount asked.

All but 16 Charges have paid the Wesley Foundation askings in full. Five came near to reaching the amount asked. Eleven Charges report nothing paid.

General Advance Specials reported this Conference year indicate a total for the Gilchrist Fund, the Dennis Fund, and other Advance Specials of \$14,091—an increase of \$5,726.

The Fellowship of Suffering and Service Offerings reported this year total \$2,358, a decrease of \$407.

The Rally Day Offerings aggregated \$1,526, an increase of \$157.

The Week of Dedication Offerings totaled \$1,594, a decrease of \$131.

The Methodist Youth Fund Offerings totaled \$1,097, a decrease of \$55.

The Board of Child Care Offerings totaled \$4,044, an increase of \$1,083.

The Offering in response to the Bishops' Appeal for Korea totaled \$3,106.

A total increase of ministerial support for pastors appointed by the Bishop amounts to \$20,874. This falls into four categories:

- 1. Twenty-six Charges have increased pastors' salaries \$10,400 as follows:
- \$1500 Increase: Cherry Hill.
- \$1000 Increase: Grace Church, Wilmington; Stanton.
- \$ 700 Increase: Cecilton.
- \$ 500 Increase: Claymont, Brandywine, Trinity of Wilmington.
  - \$ 400 Increase: Chester-Bethel, Newark, Newport.
- \$ 300 Increase: Brack-Ex, Elkton, Galena, Minquadale, Harrison Street.
  - \$ 250 Increase: Union of Wilmington.
  - \$ 200 Increase: Christiana, Ebenezer, Port Deposit, Rising Sun, St. Georges, East Lake, Mt. Salem.
  - \$ 150 Increase: McCabe.
  - \$ 100 Increase: Bayview and Bethel; Red Lion.

- 2. Thirteen Charges have added expense accounts totaling \$3,740.
- 3. Ten Charges have indicated they will pay parsonage utilities amounting to \$2,734.
- 4. Two Charges-Cecil United Parish and St. Paul's, Wilmingtonwill have assistant ministers appointed by our Bishop this year for the first time with salaries totaling \$4,000.

This tremendous increase in contributions for all purposes can be traced in large degree to the Stewardship of Possessions Program emphases under the leadership of Clinton H. Brown, Conference Director of Stewardship, and of Paul J. Turek, District Director of Stewardship. This program, which is a continuing one, was handicapped this past year by the constant interruption of emergency appeals and other special emphases which seemed to be necessary. Nevertheless, in the Churches where the pastors and people have cooperated wholeheartedly, amazing results have been achieved. The Brack-Ex Church has increased its number of Tithers from 26 to 66. At the kick-off dinner for the Kingswood-of-Brookside financial campaign, six young adult couples, earning modest salaries, and most of them buying their homes through monthly payments, pledged \$11,250 on the basis of 150 monthly payments as a concrete evidence of their desire for a Church Building. This sacrificial giving was sparked by a new concept of Christian Sharing inspired by the Stewardship of Possessions Pro-

Unprecedented results have attended Fund-Raising Campaigns in the District during which the dominant theme has been Stewardship. Holly Oak Church is now in the midst of an Every-Member Canvass for an additional \$25,000 to build an educational unit. To date, \$19,222 have been pledged and the Canvass continues. Brandywine Church, after paying off its indebtedness this year and burning the mortgage, has recently completed a campaign in which pledges aggregating more than \$500 per Sunday were obtained to cover the Current Expense, Benevolence and Renovation Budgets. The Kingswood-of-Brookside congregation, numbering one hundred families, less than nine months after the first service was held in a school-house, pledged \$58,000 to be paid in 150 monthly payments towards its first building unit. The New Castle congregation pledged \$80,000 for renovation and expansion. The Wilmington Manor congregation pledged \$123,000 for the first unit on its new site. Atonement Church of Claymont not only has pledged \$50,000 per year on a recurring basis to cover its Current Expense, Benevolence, Debt Retirement and Expansion Programs. but in addition, as direct results of the Stewardship emphasis in its Fund-Raising Campaign, will receive 110 new members, and has received 500 indications of desire to serve in various capacities in the Church and its allied organizations.

#### Cultivation

The Church Schools of the District show marked increases in enrollment, attendance, teaching staffs, finances. All through the District educational facilities are becoming inadequate. Everywhere plans are being formulated for the expansion of existing educational buildings or the erection of new ones. A number of our Church Schools have had to project two Church School Sessions each Sunday in order to accommodate the increased enrollment.

Thirty-nine Charges reported an enrollment of 5,005 pupils in Daily Vacation Bible Schools last summer, an increase of 462.

Two Leadership Training Schools for Christian Workers were held. The Rev. P. O. Hill was dean of the Cecil County School which was held in Perryville, Md. The Rev. Ralph H. Collis served as dean of the New Castle County School which was held in Silverbrook Church, Wilmington. In addition, a number of teachers and officers from Churches in lower Cecil County, Maryland, and New Castle County, Delaware, attended the Leadership Training School of the Dover District which was held in Middletown.

The District Woman's Society of Christian Service has intensified its inspirational, informational and organizational cultivation as it has reached about every Church in the District. Mrs. Lucille Mangum, newly installed president, will carry on the splendid achievements of her predecessor, Mrs. Harry A. Menser.

Dr. Charles S. Clarkson, District Missionary Secretary, has ably supplemented the missionary emphases of the WSCS. Through the importation of inspiring missionary speakers, literature and audio-visual aids, the imperative challenge of Christian Missions is being answered with an increasing response as is evidenced by the marked increase in Advance Specials covering many missionaries in many lands.

This is the third year in which contributions for Advance Specials amounted to \$1,000 or more on the Cecil United Parish. This achievement is cultivated through an Annual Parish-wide Missionary Day with visiting missionaries of the Methodist Church bringing personal contacts. The October, 1954, issue of World Outlook carried the story of the work of Cecil United Parish in an article, "Building A Christian Rural Fellowship."

In addition to assuming a \$600 Advance Special for the support of the Rev. and Mrs. Everett Thompson in Japan, Hillcrest Memorial Church has asked for a family for resettlement in cooperation with the Refugee Program.

Twenty-four Methodist Men's Organizations report a total enrollment of 1100, an increase of 95. The Monthly Inspirational Breakfast the third Sunday of each month in the Hotel DuPont for Lay Leaders of the District continues. The average attendance has now reached thirty.

Twenty-four Methodist Young Adult Fellowships report a membership totaling 1,076, an increase of 199.

Forty-three Methodist Youth Fellowships report a membership totaling 1,217, an increase of 43.

A District-wide Family Life Conference, under the leadership of the Rev. and Mrs. Ralph H. Collis, was held in Grace Church, Wilmington, Sunday afternoon, February 27, 1955, with the families of pastors of the District, and the family of one layman selected for each Charge present. Rich in inspiration and fellowship, it has been reproduced with variations in a number of Local Churches, making a wholesome impact in this important phase of our task.

Day Nurseries and Kindergartens in the Holly Oak and Wilmington Manor Churches are providing additional Christian environment and guid-

ance for young children as well as a sense of security for working mothers in these communities.

"The Circuit Rider" broadcasts have continued Christian cultivation through the important medium of television from Station WDEL-TV, and through the services and support of the Reverends G. H. Pigueron, Jr., and Gerald A. Foster, Mr. Floyd Woodcock and many others.

#### Construction

Many of our loveliest Church buildings, most adequate educational units, and comfortable parsonages, would not have been made possible without the borrowing of large sums of money. The consistent promptness with which our Churches have met their obligations and have paid off their indebtedness has established for them a reputation among the banks of our District that gives them a high priority when new projects require new borrowings.

During this past year thirty-two Charges paid \$123,848 on their indebtedness, a decrease of \$28,496 from the amount paid on debt last year. Charges paying \$1,000 or more on debt during this Conference year are:

During this Conference year, construction, renovation and expansion in the form of the building and improvement of sanctuaries, educational units, parsonages, the purchase of land and buildings for expansion, installation and renovation of organs, new pews, stained glass windows, etc., in thirty-four Charges totaled \$327,351, an increase of \$114,272. Charges spending \$1,000 or more on Building and Improvement during this Conference year are:

In the report to the Annual Conference last year, 19 projects were noted as being planned for the near future. A brief report on their status is in order:

"\$155,000 for the first unit of the new Brack-Ex Church." This unit is nearing completion. The first service in it is scheduled for June 26.

"\$154,000 for the new Sanctuary at Newport." This project was completed, and was consecrated by Bishop Oxnam on Sunday, October 24, 1954.

"\$150,000 for the first unit of the new Wilmington Manor Church." This project was delayed pending the securing of a plot of 11.6 acres in a strategic location on the clover leaf at DuPont Parkway and Basin Road. After exhaustive study, bids will soon be asked for the first unit at approximately \$250,000 rather than \$150,000.

"\$75,000 for additional educational facilities, Hillcrest Church." An intermediate step has been taken. A new parsonage was purchased. The old parsonage was converted into a Church House with space allotted for Nursery, Youth and Boy Scout accommodations. Plans were adopted for a ten year expansion program. \$5,000 have been secured and set aside for the proposed educational building.

"\$75,000 for the first unit of the Kingswood-of-Brookside Church." The success of this newest Church in the District has been so great, with 250 received into the Church and 335 in the Church School during this first year, that a larger first unit will have to be erected. Within the next few weeks bids will be requested on a first unit which will cost approximately \$185,000 rather than \$75,000.

"\$65,000 for a new educational building at New Castle." A house and lot have been purchased which will provide a source of revenue and an entry to the lot previously purchased at the rear of the New Castle Church. Plans are being drawn for an educational building costing not less than \$50,000. The stucco has been removed from the walls of the present buildings, exposing the red bricks which harmonize with the colonial architecture of old New Castle.

"\$50,000 for remodeling the Sanctuary of Elkton Church." This project has been held up temporarily pending a decision whether to remodel or to build an entirely new Sauctuary.

"\$50,000 for remodeling Peninsula Church Sanctuary and Educational Building." This work is in progress. The Fellowship Hall, Lounge, Basement Class Rooms, Modern Kitchen, are completed and work is beginning on the main floor. It will cost between \$80,000 and \$100,000 before the work is completed.

"\$30,000 for Habbard Memorial Hall, Chester-Bethel Church." Pending a survey of needs in this rapidly developing suburban section, building operations have been delayed, but the Building Fund continues to grow.

"\$30,000 for the restoration of the Delaware City Sanctuary." Plans have been drawn. Bids are being sought. It is hoped that work will begin soon.

"\$14,000 for expansion at Ebenezer Church." A brick house with more than five acres of land adjoining the Church, with a market value of at least \$50,000, was purchased for \$14,000. The house has been renovated, the grounds have been cleared of accumulated brush, the barn is

being transformed into a social hall by the voluntary labor of members of the congregation. The house is being used as an auxiliary educational building. A large parking space has been surfaced.

"\$12,500 for continuing the renovation at McCabe Church." More than one-third of this continuing renovation program was accomplished this Conference year.

"\$10,000 for re-decorating Janes Church and rebuilding its organ, Rising Sun Charge. This work was completed at a cost of \$15,000, all of which has been paid.

"\$6,000 for an educational building, The Cedars." The outside walls and roof were erected by a builder. The finishing of the rooms is being done by voluntary labor of members of the congregation. To date, \$5,607 has been spent. The money was raised before the work was done.

"\$3,500 for a social hall at Kirkwood." Here also, as at The Cedars, the walls and roof were erected by a builder while voluntary labor by members of the congregation is completing the work. To date, \$3,000 have been paid on the work.

"\$3,500 for pews in Stanton's Sanctuary." They have been installed and dedicated at a cost of \$3,778.

"\$2,000 for remodeling the parsonage and recreational hall at Cecilton." The parsonage has been remodeled at a cost of \$3,028 which has been paid.

"\$2,000 for continuance of the renovation program at Silverbrook Church." Instead, improvements aggregating \$5,000 have been made.

"\$1,000 for renovation of St. George's Church." \$2,800 were spent in this work of renovation.

In addition to these projects anticipated last year, other projects have developed during this Conference year. A large parking lot with amasite base has been provided at Aldersgate Church. After long years of hoping and planning, the Christiana Charge is building a modern parsonage near the site of the old one, which has been removed. A Community Hall is being built adjacent to Union Church on the Cecil United Parish Charge. The Holly Oak Charge has had the old combined Parsonage and Church House demolished and a much needed parking lot has replaced it. Marshallton Church has secured additional land and an imperatively needed parking lot with hard surface is being constructed. Millington Church has secured the house and lot adjacent to the Church and has \$1,200 in an Educational Building Fund. Newark Church sold its old parsonage and now has a modern one with ample grounds in the Nottingham Manor development. In addition, the Newark congregation has acquired a house and lot at the rear of its property and is about to vote on the acquisition of another house and lot as a part of its expansion program. Perryville has completed the Renovation of its Parish House, which had not been renovated since its erection more than a quarter of a century ago. The work was done by volunteer labor by men of the Church. St. Paul's Church, Wilmington, is installing, a stainless steel kitchen in its basement, building a garage for its pastor, and constructing a parking lot which will accommodate about

#### Church Extension

The goal of the nearly organized District Church Extension Society, 1500 sustaining members at \$10 per membership, was not reached. With so many unexpected calls for funds and so many other program emphases, it was deemed unwise to put on an organized campaign during this Conference year. However, as the result of the distribution of a folder, "Steeples For Our State," written by Dr. W. F. Dunkle, Jr., and of an appeal to the pastors of the District to bring this important matter to the attention of their people at the time and in the manner they thought best, more than 300 of the desired 1,500 memberships have been secured. Officers have been elected. Incorporation of The Wilmington District Church Extension Society has been effected, and plans are being projected to increase the emphasis and the membership during this coming Conference year.

Your District Superintendent has been alert to the growing suburban developments in Cecil and New Castle counties. He has spent many hours traveling the roads in both of these counties watching construction, and in conversations with informed persons concerning trends. Many of the projects noted in the section of this report titled "Construction" are properly Church Extension items. Not a few of them have resulted from his suggestions.

No new congregations were started this year, other than Kingswood-of-Brookside, because in his judgment, reinforced by competent counseling. none are needed as yet. The Methodist pastors and people who preceded us, built more wisely than they or we had realized. Many of the little Churches scattered over almost every part of these two counties are suddenly finding themselves surrounded by mushrooming housing developments. While other denominations are finding it necessary to start many new congregations in these new developments, Methodism has an advantage of being on the spot in most of them with a nucleus of members and a building although, in most instances, the building is inadequate.

As your Superintendent sees it, the need of the Methodist Church in these countries of Cecil and New Castle is not for more Churches, but better Churches with expanded facilities and programs.

In late October, 1954, noting the unusual building activity in the center of Brandywine Hundred, your Superintendent called in the pastors of our seven Methodist Churches in Brandywine Hundred and asked them to help him decide whether we ought to start a new congregation in the center of an irregular ring made up of those seven Churches, or concentrate on expanding the programs of those seven Churches through the formation of a voluntary. functional United Methodist Parish of Brandywine Hundred. After discussion, they called together three representative laymen from each of the seven Churches. They met after Sunday evening services in Aldersgate Church in the early part of November. After the situation had been outlined, they voted unanimously to set up the Brandywine Hundred United Methodist Parish and expand the programs of the seven Methodist Churches ringing the area. Your Superintendent gave them a tentative agenda of activities: survey, defining boundaries of major responsibility, unified publicity, more numerous road signs, exploring the possibility of employing a Deaconness to cover the entire field for all of the seven Churches, presenting the total

Methodist Program of the total community, channeling people to the various Churches. The organization was effected with the Rev. George W. Goodley as chairman. The pastors and representative laymen have met monthly: they are considering their common problems, evaluating the strength and weakness of the programs of the various Churches, and concrete results are beginning to appear.

The groundwork for a similar functional grouping has been laid in New Castle Hundred. Next Conference year similar projects will be explored in several sections of Cecil County, and in Christiana and Pencader Hundreds of New Castle County.

A District Planning Council has been projected. The presiding officers of each district-wide organization, the secretaries of the various Conference agencies, the presidents of the District Ministerial Associations, will meet with the District Superintendent the first Monday afternoon of June to pinpoint the dates and objectives of their organizations for the next Conference year, to note the dates and objectives of any projects adopted at this session of the Annual Conference, and to prepare an Activities Calendar to guide pastors and Churches in their planning for this Conference year just ahead of us. The District Planning Council will meet Quarterly for review and revision of the District Programs.

#### Courtesies

The speeding months have multiplied the innumerable courtesies extended to the District Superintendent and his wife. They have appreciated all of them. They have endeavored to be worthy of them.

# (b) Boards, Commissions and Committees

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RELATIONSHIP TO CHAPLAINS AND MILITARY PERSONNEL

This is an age of cold war.

This is an age of cultural transition.

The strain is severe, the tension continues, the prospect hidden. It has been suggested that a field must be plowed and disced, and weeds sharply hoed under, before the field is ready to receive the seed, to nourish the plant, or to produce the harvest. In the meantime, however, rightly or wrongly, a call to military arms has been sounded. The United States of America has a standing armed force of more than two million; approximately five hundred thousand recruits are processed annually as a part of our defensive military establishment. The challenge before us is this—to take the Gospel to our military personnel, and more effectively than we have done to date.

This Committee on Relationship to Chaplains and Military Personnel is one of the newer committees, having been created by the unanimous and enthusiastic approval of the Conference, May, 1952. The emphasis of the Committee is threefold:

(1) The Church's responsibility to personnel stationed at the six military installations within the bounds of the Conference;

(2) The Church's responsibility to the many Methodist youth from the Conference area as they enter military service;

(3) The Church's responsibility to ministers of the Peninsula Conference who have volunteered for a specialized and missionary duty as chaplains with the armed forces.

Dr. Bartley has already referred to the pioneering and fruitful ministry of Brother Albert Snapp in attempting to relate the many men (and women) of the Dover Air Base to the local Methodist churches. The Committee on Chaplains is pleased to cooperate with the Board of Missions and Church Extension in studying and acting to help make this work more effective. Above all, we wish to acknowledge the original impetus and continuing assistance of Charles Irving Carpenter, Chief of Air Force Chaplains. Our hope is that we will be able to extend the likes of the ministry at Dover to include the five other military installations within the bounds of the Conference,—that our efforts will prove to be an example and inspiration to the rest of the conferences of Methodism, indeed, to the whole Christian Church.

There are three points to make concerning the Church's responsibility to the many Methodist youth from the Conference area as they enter military service:

(1) help them to face the problems of military life in distant places before they are called to the colors;

(2) help to keep open the channel of communication from the home community (and home church) while the young people are on active duty.

(3) help to meet, understand, assist and make welcome the returned veteran, with particular recognition of the distinct type of challenge, temptation, and growing-up he has had to undergo.

Finally, pray for our Chaplains. Write to them of our boys. Remember that they too serve Christ and His Church. It is only as we work together

that we can present the Gospel in all its beauty and power. Whether or not we succeed in presenting the Gospel to those who are called to serve as members of the armed forces will set the pattern for an increasingly Christian America on the one hand, or an increasingly pagan America on the other. The choice is ours.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE TO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE 1954-1955

The financial backbone of the Child Care program, serving the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences is the Christmas Offering. More than half of the money needed to guarantee the kind of service a church should give dislocated children is provided through this united effort of our Methodist ministers and members. For several years the goal of the campaign has been \$75,000. Victory has crowned our endeavors this year. Returns from the Baltimore Conference were \$70,329; from the Peninsula Conference, \$14,280; or a total of \$84,609. The Board of Child Care is deeply appreciative of the work done by the Christmas Offering Promotion Committee, Robert H. Parker, Chairman, and for the wholehearted cooperation of the ministers and laymen of all the districts in both conferences. The program is moving toward real financial stability. The support received from and through the churches is the largest factor in this achievement. The sources of income to meet our budget, considered in terms of percentage, are as follows:

- 1. Board and clothing, etc., provided by relatives or agencies, 20%.
- 2. Income from endowment, 10%.
- 3. Individual and group gifts, in addition to the Christmas Offering, 6%.
- 4. The Woman's Auxiliary, 3%.
- 5. Christmas Offering and church contributions, 61%.

In recent years the children who seek our services present more serious problems than they used to. Mere shelter, food and clothing will not meet the need. Nearly 90% of them are the product of broken homes. Their experiences have included moral and spiritual poverty. They have become unhappy, resentful, and in many cases, quite bitter. They lack training; they have had no opportunity to develop, no guidance, no inspiration, not even good examples. The many changes they have had to make have left them surrounded by an aura of confusion and insecurity. Little wonder that their lives are characterized by emotional upheaval.

Therefore, our operations have had to be geared to serve fewer children, with the emphasis upon an enriched quality of what we are trying to do for them. The assisting of any such youngster to become a stable person in his own right is more difficult and more costly than the former, more voluminous, less expensive type of care in other years, but the results have a far greater significance. Actually, we are doing more work, in terms of effort and hours, then we did twenty years ago with twice the number of children.

The case of one boy from the Peninsula Conference serves to illustrate this present day problem. He was eleven years old when admitted over two years ago. He had been deserted by his mother in infancy, and his father was a patient in a mental institution. When a baby he was given to an unrelated, lone woman; lived in this setting for five years. Then he was moved to the home of his paternal grandmother, who had little to offer him in terms of warm, loving, understanding care. She got public assistance to live on because she kept the boy. The child was actually neglected. Finally the public agency moved him to a foster boarding home, where he was accepted and properly cared for. For reasons of health, the public agency asked us to move him to the Western Shore. We received a greatly upset youngster with no ties in life, clamoring for attention as well as affection, and presenting patterns of behavior that required the best skills of all our staff, especially the most experienced housemother in our organization. No single illustration more completely points up how money has to be spent for social work, good administrative supervision, good houseparents, all kinds of medical care, physical and mental.

Were many of our children left in their native environment, they would have moved out, undoubtedly, into delinquency. Our service, therefore, is providing preventative measures within the framework of the total community approach.

Again this year nine Peninsula children (7 boys and 2 girls) received care. The value of this resource is emphasized in one special case. The mother of two boys, 10 and 12, of a family living in this Conference, had been hospitalized three times. Then the fourth time meant a prolonged stay in a sanitarium. The father needed help. His pastor came to us. A former pastor was interested, too. We studied the case and accepted these youngsters, not only giving them a good place to live while their home is kept waiting for the return of the mother, but also the kind of case work service which will help them to understand their plight, giving them the stamina to work with this life situation.

Foster home parents are not trained or qualified to handle the kind of problems these children present; therefore, the round of foster homes, where children do not adjust, before coming to us. If it were not for our homes they would have to be sent to training schools to mix in with delinquents.

The adoptive service of the Board of Child Care has the largest potential for the future well-being of unfortunate children. Since the beginning of the Conference year one staff member has given full time to this service. Mrs. L. Margaret Harris is a mature, seasoned person, who has had considerable experience in this area of work. She has accepted and worked with sixteen unmarried mothers. She has sought to help them with the basic problem underlying their social failure. The focus of the relationship is rehabilitation. This worker also studied ten different homes scatteringly located for possible places to board babies being studied for adoption. Six of the ten were accepted for use. The study of one is pending. Furthermore, she supervised thirteen different babies in study homes during the year. One of these was returned to its natural mother. All but four of the remaining number have been placed in adoptive homes. The same worker studied eleven different adoptive couples, ten of whom were accepted. She also

supervised seventeen babies whom she had placed in adoptive homes. Before the year was over the adoption of seven of these had been completed and they were no longer our responsibility. This is the very brief summary of what represents, on the part of one person, a large amount of concern, consideration, and skillful work and planning. This is all that one person can possibly do.

Two couples, active members of two Peninsula Churches, are now being processed to become adopting parents. An effort is being made to scatter this service over our entire large territory of two conferences.

The expansion of the adoptive program cannot take place until the Board has sufficient resources to add another member to the case work staff.

The Board recognizes the outstanding guidance of our Executive, Dr. F. Reid Isaac. It has been through his excellent leadership that we have been able to accomplish so much for so many needy children. We wish him God's richest blessings in the continuance of his outstanding work.

It is gratifying and inspiring to realize that as Methodist people and as a Church, reaching out to gather up in our arms these many needy children, we are not functioning solitarily in a denominational setting, but are part of a world-wide Christian movement. Wherever there are children crying out because of their hurts, there are the followers of the same Master who once embraced them and made them happy.

In ancient times a Chinese philosopher was asked the question, "What is the greatest happiness?"

He replied, "I am an old man. I have wandered far and wide. I return to my native village and you ask me, "What is the greatest happiness?" I will tell you. It is listening to the song of a little child who goes on happily down the road after having asked me the way."

Schedule No. 1 Mortgage Investments

All mortgages held by the Endowment Fund were examined by us. Exceptions noted were discussed with those in charge and necessary adjustments made to place them in order.

In our examination of securities it was noted that one certificate representing 19 shares of the common stock of United States Fidelity & Guaranty, received as a stock dividend in April of 1953, was missing. However, dividends have been received regularly on these shares. Steps should be taken to have this certificate replaced.

During 1953 the preferred stock of Southern Railway Co. was split 2 for 1 but the certificate for 7 shares held by the Board of Conference Claimants was never submitted for issuance of new shares. This should be accomplished by contacting the Transfer Agent of Southern Railway Co. Dividends paid to the date of the split have been received but subsequent dividends have apparently been withheld pending issuance of a new certificate.

All other income on securities owned has been accounted for.

A quick analysis of the foregoing report indicates that the bulk of our investments is in the small mortgage field. Folio 5, schedule No. 1 shows the amount of these mortgages to range all the way from \$15.00 to \$16,000.-00 with no more than six (6) mortgages in amounts of \$10,000.00 or above, and no less than one hundred and fifty-five (155) in amounts of \$5,000.00

In my last report to the Annual Conference I stated that it was our intention to restudy our investments and investment policies. I now wish to

report our efforts in that direction. Last October, upon the invitation of the chairman, our resident bishop and his cabinet met with the Board of Conference Claimants and its officers to discuss investments and investment policies in general. At this time it was decided that a special committee from the Board consisting of The Hon. J. DeWeese Carter, Mr. John Holt and The Rev. William H. Revelle, Jr. should make a detailed study of our investments and report its findings to the Board as soon as completed. This committee examined mortgages held by our Board, made spot checks of properties on which we held mortgages to determine values of the same, consulted real estate and investment counsellors and in January asked the Chairman of the Board to call a special session of the Board of Conference Claimants to meet with Dr. Charles L. Calkins, Executive Secretary of The Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church and Mr. John M. Tittle, who for many years has been Investment Counsellor for the Board of Pensions. The District Superintendents were invited and accepted the invitation to attend. On January 26, 1955 Mr. Tittle sent us the following letter:

"At the conclusion of a special meeting of the Board of Conference Claimants of the Peninsula Conference of The Methodist Church on January 24th in Wilmington, the Board of Directors asked me to set forth a suggested plan of procedure with respect to certain financial and investment matters.

The information I received during the discussion leads me to believe that the problem faced by your corporation falls into two parts:

- I. The purely mechanical operation of the Board of Directors in discharging their duties which will include:
  - (a An improved system of internal checks and controls that follows recognized business procedures and also conforms with Paragraph 1632-Sections 1 and 2 of the Discipline of The Methodist Church.
  - (b A definition of the powers of the Investment Committee so that it may know its responsibilities and act upon them.
  - (c Adequate quarterly reports to the Executive Committee concerning investments and other financial matters by both the Chairman of the Investment Committee and the Treasurer.
- II. The statement of an investment policy that follows recognized investment procedures and techniques, and which conforms with paragraph 1632-Section 3 of the Discipline of The Methodist Church.

With respect to the first problem I believe that:

- (1 All checks should be signed by the Treasurer and countersigned by any one of several designated members of the Board of Directors.
- (2 Only the Executive and Investment Committees should have the power to make investments; the Treasurer should consummate such investment transactions only when empowered to do so; the Investment Committee should be empowered to act between quarterly meetings of the Executive Committee and its decisions transmitted to the Treasurer for appropriate action.

- (3 A safety deposit box must be obtained and all securities deposited in it. The Treasurer accompanied by one of several designated members of the Board should have access to the box. Proper records should be kept of the deposit and withdrawal of securities. An alternative suggestion and better, although more expensive, would be to open a custodian account in the trust department of a bank. The cost should not be great for purely custodian—not investment advisory—services.
- (4 At the time that a transfer of the securities owned is made to a safety deposit box—or custodian account—an audit should be made to verify individual securities and mortgages owned. In other words, a count. With respect to the mortgages owned the audit should include a list of the individual loans and their maturity dates—plus a list of and amounts of those mortgages now in default on principal payments.
- (5 The return (yield) on the mortgages owned appears to be in excess of the return currently to be expected from a "good grade" mortgage. I suggest, for several reasons, that a spot check be made by a professional appraiser of the mortgages owned to determine whether they are sound or marginal in character.
- (6 Under no circumstance should a member of the Investment Committee, or any member or officer of the Board of Directors, benefit from financial transactions with the Board of Conference Claimants. This is specifically recognized in Paragraph 1632—Sections 1 and 2 of the Discipline.

It may well be that the above suggestions and procedures are not complete but, if followed, the Investment Committee, the Executive Committee and, finally, the Board of Directors will have a far better grasp of operations.

Consideration of point number two—investment policy—centers around the theory of diversification according to classes (types) of securities. Again, diversification of investments complies with Section 3 of Paragraph 1632 of the Discipline. Let it be here noted that proper investment procedure and the Discipline are in agreement as to method. One is not a contradiction of the other. Furthermore, under no stretch of the imagination can it be said that the investments of your corporation are diversified. The theory and reason for diversification of investments is well understood and needs little comment. It involves the use of equities or common stocks in investment portfolios such as yours.

The major case for including common stocks can be stated very simply. As far back as financial records are found, the record shows a long upward trend of the price level, sometimes temporarily interrupted, and a corresponding decrease in the purchasing power of money. We call this inflation. The mortgages owned by your corporation—almost 100% of total investments owned—cannot protect it against inflation. For most of us, the best means of protection is the ownership of common stocks. Historically, the stock market is at a high level and admittedly it would have been better for your

corporation to have diversified its investments years ago. However, further inflation seems possible if not probable. No one certainly knows the answer; so we must hedge against inflation and deflation.

Hedging against inflation and deflation appears to be accomplished best by diversification as to types of securities. A reasonable long-range program for your corporation to point toward would be:

More common stocks should be owned when the market appears low than when it appears high. The minimum and maximum ranges indicated above are subject to further discussion and change.

If your corporation decides to adopt some such program, the technique of achieving it can be discussed at a later date. At our meeting it was stated by your treasurer that the mortgages owned by the corporation matured at the rate of approximately \$5,000 monthly or \$60,000 annually. Unless the mortgages can be sold in volume, which is probably unlikely, the transition will take time. Therefore, income from securities owned will remain about the same for some time to come.

It is obvious that no more mortgages should be purchased in the foreseeable future. Short or medium term marketable U.S. Treasuries (not of the savings type variety) can be bought with idle cash until your Board of Directors formulates its plans.

The trust laws of Delaware follow the "prudent man" rule which will not interfere with the program outlined above. An interpretation of this rule by the former Secretary of State of Delaware was forwarded to me today by O. A. Bartley.

When you are ready to proceed I will be glad to suggest specific investments that would seem appropriate.

I have discussed your problem with members of my firm and we shall be happy to assist you at this time without charge for our investment advisory services. Please feel free to call upon me."

On March 9, 1955 the special committee made its report to The Board of Conference Claimants at a meeting in which the District Superintendents were again invited to be present. The following statement constitutes the report of the special committee as amended and finally adopted by the Board of Conference Claimants on March 9, 1955.

We recommend that the annuity rate shall be increased from \$44.00 to \$46.00 for the Conference year of 1955-56, and that a necessitous fund of \$5,000.00 be allowed.

Finally: I have been directed by The Board of Conference Claimants to have prepared and attached to this report for publication in the Conference Journal, a table showing the status of ministers in regard to their payments as related to the Annual Conference Assessment on minister's salaries for the purpose of increasing the Conference Claimant Endowment Fund. It will be remembered that the action of the Conference of 1945 requires that all ministerial members and supply pastors shall be assessed one-half of one percent on salaries up to \$2,000.00 and one percent on salaries of \$2,000.00 and above. The action stipulates that the policy shall be in effect for twenty years.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO STUDY INVESTMENTS

At a regular meeting of the Board of Conference Claimants, a committee was appointed to study investments and procedures of operation of this trust. The committee named, consisted of the Honorable J. DeWeese Carter, Judge; Mr. John T. Holt; and the Reverend W. H. Revelle, Jr. After consultation with Dr. Charles L. Calkins, Executive Secretary of the Illinois and Maryland Corporations of the Board of Pensions of the Methodist Church; and Mr. John M. Tittle, Investment Counselor to the above named Corporations; in accordance with advice received from them we recommend:—

- I. That the following changes in the mechanical methods of operations of the Board of Conference Claimants of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church be immediately adopted in the discharge of their duties as managers of this trust.
  - A. In strict accordance with Paragraph 1632 ("Financial Policy") of the 1952 issue of the Discipline of the Methodist Church which states: "The following rules shall apply to financial administration of Annual Conference Boards:"
    - "Persons connected in any way with the securities, real estate, or other forms of investment sold to or purchased from the Annual Conference shall be ineligible to serve on the investment committees of Annual Conference boards, societies, or institutions."
    - 2. "No officer or member of an Annual Conference Board, society, or institution shall receive a personal commission, bonus, or remuneration in connection with the purchase or sale of securities or other properties for such board, society or institution."
  - B. There shall be an investment committee from the membership of the Board of Conference Claimants with recommendatory and investigatory powers only, which shall make written monthly reports to the Board of Conference Claimants. Their reports shall include:—
    - 1. Mortgages: a physical viewing of the property, photographs, and certificate of appraisal by an outside expert appraiser or appraisers.

Stocks or bonds: balance sheets, brokers recommendations, and earning record.

The reports of this investment committee shall include but not be limited to these things.

No funds of this Trust shall hereafter be invested without the approval of this Board, duly made and passed.

The fee for certificate of appraisal shall be in accordance with the local scale for such services. The compensation paid to members of the investment committee shall include mileage and other 'out of pocket' expenses.

The Investment Committee shall be appointed annually by the President of the Board of Conference Claimants and shall consist of three (3) members. This committee shall be immediately appointed following the adoption of this report.

- C. A safe deposit box shall be immediately obtained and all securities belonging to this trust shall be promptly placed and kept therein. Said safe deposit box shall be accessible only on the joint authority of the Treasurer and Secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants. Further, a safe, large enough to hold the records and books, shall be secured and placed in the home or office of the Treasurer; and all material records of the Board of Conference Claimants shall be immediately placed and kept therein.
- O. An immediate and complete audit of all mortgages and securities now owned by this trust shall be made by an independent firm selected by the President of the Board of Conference Claimants. This audit shall include the following:—
  - Concerning mortgages:—the date made; any arrearages in interest or principal; balance due on each mortgage; the payment record; the assessed value of the property; whether the mortgage has been renegotiated; and any other detail requested by the President.
  - 2. Concerning stocks and/or bonds:—purchase price, if any; present market value; and earning record.
  - 3. And shall further show that all securities listed in its report are deposited in the safe deposit box of this Board. During the course of this audit, the auditors shall have spot checks of existing mortgages made by professional appraisers.
- E. All checks and other disbursements from this trust shall be accompanied by appropriate itemized vouchers, and shall be signed by the President and countersigned by the Treasurer of the Board of Conference Claimants.

- F. The Board of Conference Claimants shall meet regularly on the fourth Thursday of each month at the Y. M. C. A. in Wilmington, Delaware.
- II. That the following investment policy be immediately adopted by the Board of Conference Claimants of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church in the discharge of their duties as managers of this trust and in conformity with the laws and 1952 Discipline of the Methodist Church, which states, Paragraph 1632, "The following rules shall apply to financial administration of Annual Conference Boards."
  - "3. The principle of diversification of investments shall be observed, in order to obtain proper geographical and class distribution of investment commitments."
  - A. No more than sixty percent of the funds of this trust shall be invested in mortgages at any time. All mortgages shall be of substantial and bankable character. All existing mortgages shall be liquidated according to present rates and schedules and shall not be renegotiated.
  - B. No more than forty percent of the funds of this trust shall be invested in bonds, guaranteed as to principal and interest by the United States Government, state government, or some political subdivision thereof; or first mortgage bonds, common or preferred stocks issued by substantial and well-recognized corporations, in such proportions as the Board of Conference Claimants may, from time to time, determine to be advisable and in accordance with sound business practices.
  - C. The payment of principal indebtedness due on existing mortgages, which is maturing and being paid at the approximate rate of \$5000.00 per month, shall be invested in accordance with the above outlined new policy of investment for funds of this trust.

These recommendations in respect to investment policy are deemed necessary in order to comply with the mandatory provisions of the Discipline of the Methodist Church which require diversification of investment of all funds held by the Church, and follow substantially the recommendations of Mr. John M. Tittle, Investment Counselor, who acts in that capacity for the Board of Pensions of the Methodist Church.

Such policy is also believed advisable to comply with the legal requirements of a trustee under the laws of the State of Delaware which require a trustee, in the discharge of his duties respecting investments, to act as a "Prudent Man" would act in such matters; inasmuch as the principle of diversification is uniformly adopted by all large insurance companies, banks, and other investment institutions.

The foregoing report as adopted by The Board of Conference Claimants on March 9, 1955 is an expression of our best judgment in these matters and is intended to indicate the investment policy to be followed with refer-

ence to future investments. The Chairman and The Board wish to express their deep appreciation to all who have assisted in the study and planning of this policy, and to ask the cooperation of the conference in making it effective.

#### CONFERENCE DEACONESS BOARD

The Deaconesses in Peninsula Conference have had a very full and busy year. Miss J. Louise Whitsitt working at Scott and Wilmington Manor Churches has carried a tremendous schedule. She works in the Sunday School and Womans Society of Christian Service at both churches, calls and has charge of the Thursday Evening Religious Education Program for the children of the choirs at Wilmington Manor. On Sunday afternoons she teaches the youth and adult class at Wesley Chapel. In the summer the Daily Vacation Church School at Wilmington Manor and Wesley Chapel takes her time. She gives unstintingly of herself in these services.

Deaconesses Genevieve C. Poppe, Mae I. Greer and Jennie Propert work in our Womans Society of Christian Service Conference Projects, the Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home and the Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House. This year the Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home has had a very successful teen-age program. The Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood has offered a new service through a supervised Study Hall for the boys and girls in the Community. A summer program including Daily Vacation Church School, Nursery and playgroups helps to give the younger children a safe and happy vacation time.

Through Nursery School, Primary Clubs, Sewing and Cooking Classes, Brownies, Girl Scouts and Teen-agers, they serve some 400 different boys and girls each week with an average monthly attendance of 1500.

# THE BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT TO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE—1954-1955

The activities of the Board of Education are so extensive the work must be carried on by various committees and departments. For this reason, the Board of Education's report is a composite report made up of the reports of the functioning groups whose work is important enough to merit a hearing. These groups are: the Executive Secretary and his staff departmental directors; the Finance Committee; the Camp Committee; the Committee on Religious Education Directors in the local Church; The Committee on Wesley Foundation and other student groups; and the Committee on the Board of Education Parsonage and office.

All of these groups have given valuable service to the Conference. Special attention is called to the program for University and College students recommended for the Peninsula Annual Conference. This is the result of a survey of the University and College Communities within the area covered by our Conference by an expert in Wesley Foundation and student work. It is important for each Church to pay the quota of fifteen cents per member if this work is to be accomplished.

The Camp Committee report also deserves special consideration. The payment of \$6500.00 on the Camp Mortgage makes the Board of Education debt free. The construction of a new combination education-recreation-worship building is in process. Other significant achievements are mentioned in the report.

The local churches are urged to give greater financial support to the Board of Education work through increased Rally Day giving. We appreciate what most churches are doing; however, we must call attention to the fact that some churches send in no Rally Day offering at all. Increased giving will enable the Board of Education to increase the services in all departments. It will also enable us to provide better facilities and a better program at Camp Pe-Co-Meth.

#### CAMP COMMITTEE REPORT

The year 1954-1955 has been a good year for Camp Pecometh. Much effort and money has been spent in order to make our camp outstanding in terms of property and facilities.

The two primary tasks accomplished this year have been the liquidation of the mortgage on the camp property and the construction of a combined recreation hall and indoor chapel. Said construction is now under way and will be completed by the opening of the 1955 camping season. At the end of the 1954 camping season the camp treasurer, Mr. Thomas Roe, reported a balance of \$7,984.89. After final expenses, the balance at the first of the year was approximately \$7,200.00. The mortgage of \$3,500.00 was liquidated, leaving a \$3,700.00 balance in the treasury. \$3,000.00 of this will be used for the new building, and a mortgage not exceeding \$11,000.00 will

be taken on the camp property. By the end of the first year the committee expects to pay at least \$5,000.00 on the mortgage leaving a total debt of \$6,000.00 by January of 1956. Plans have been made to stimulate interest in Rally Day. All surplus funds will then be used to pay off the mortgage.

Other accomplishments during the year are as follows: the slight damage done by hurricane Hazel has been repaired, the sewage system has been improved, new signs have been erected at the various entrances to the camp and several buildings have been moved to more practical locations on the camp site.

The committee appreciates the cooperation of all the members of Conference in helping to make Camp Pecometh outstanding among all camps. Much credit for the success of this year is due to Rev. Douglas Milbury, who, by careful planning and budgeting, has presented a well rounded program at a minimum expense.

# REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION COMMITTEE TO THE SPRING MEETING OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION, April 1, 1955

This year, as authorized by the Annual Conference, a Wesley Foundation survey was conducted by the Board. The resource person was The Reverend Douglas Cook of the Wesley Foundation at Yale. From his visit

to our conference and his contacts with each of the higher institutions of learning within our conference, he submits the report that you have received today. There are many helpful suggestions and we trust they will be guides for the present and future work in this field.

From this report the committee comes with the following suggestions:

- 1. The name of the committee by "College and University Religious Life Committee."
- 2. The formation of an Inter-Conference Commission in this work. It would be set up by the Boards of Education of the Peninsula, Delaware, Baltimore and Washington Conferences. The members of this board from our conference would be The Executive Secretary of Christian Education, President of the Conference Board of Education, Chairman of the College and University Religious Life Committee, the Student Worker and a student from one of the functioning units; the latter two to be selected by the Conference Board of Education.
- 3. The College and University Religious Life Committee in our local conference would consist of the conference W. S. C. S. secretary of Student Work, one layman from each school (Salisbury State Teachers, Washington College, Wesley Junior College, University of Delaware), a clergy from the Conference Board of Education. The ex-officio members would be the Executive Secretary of Christian Education, President of the Conference Board of Education, the Cabinet of the Peninsula Conference, the Student Worker and a student from each of the institutions mentioned above.

# 4. UNIVERSITY OF DELAWARE:

We suggest that item 1 and its subheadings be given careful consideration as found on page 3 of the report.

The Committee commends the Wesley Foundation Unit at the University for the functioning of the organization as related in items 2, 3, 4 on page 3 and item 1 on page 4.

The Committee suggests that a more careful consideration be given to suggestions given in the report under the heading "FACILITIES" as found on page 4.

The Committee recommends that the Board of Education allot the total of \$5,000.00 for the work in year 1955-56.

Some kind of student religious center is needed at the University in the near future. While the Methodist Church is not far from the Campus, it is not on the "beaten track" for the students and neither is it within the psychological campus community. A study of this whole question needs to be undertaken considering these possibilities:

- a. A house as nearly as possible on the campus to serve as a center for the Wesley Foundation.
- b. A student religious center be established in cooperation with other religious groups.
  - c. Other ways, such as that in operation at the University of Maryland.

#### 5. WASHINGTON COLLEGE:

The proposed recommendations are presented with no thought of taking from the work that is being done by the two Methodist Churches in Chestertown and which of necessity must be continued. We suggest that the two congregations cooperate with the appointed Student Worker.

- a. The name be called "Wesley Fellowship."
- b. Serious consideration on the part of the cabinet for the appointment of a young man, with interest and aptitude for college work, to an appointment near the college with the assurance that the Board of Education would use the Wesley Foundation Funds to supplement the salary.
- c. The Board would use the funds of The Wesley Foundation to care for secretarial expense and the carrying out of the program.
- d. We suggest that careful consideration be given to the purchase of a home near the campus or a room in the college building for the carrying on of the religious work with the students.

#### 6. SALISBURY STATE TEACHERS:

Realizing the interest on the part of the students and the activities on the part of other churches in this field we seriously recommend that Methodism do something immediately among the students at this institution.

a. Our recommendations concerning this school are the same as those found under Washington College, (a, b, c, d.)

The purpose of the above suggestions in regards to both Washington College and Salisbury State Teachers is to lay the foundation for the future when a professional worker is secured for the College and University Religious Life program, with the possibility of the same person working in our Summer Camping program.

#### 7. WESLEY JUNIOR COLLEGE:

This is our one and only Methodist Institution in our conference. We need a closer relationship and a working fellowship between the church and the college, the college and the church.

- a. We seriously recommend the establishing of a Campus-Church Relation Committee with representatives of the local church; the school; the students, the faculty; and the Conference Board of Education.
- b. We suggest that the local church give careful consideration through the W. S. C. S. Youth Organization, and other organizations, in finding ways in which they can more adequately serve a larger number of the students' needs and interests, Sunday services and special days being considered.
- c. We urgently request that a working relationship between the Director of Religious life of the College and the members of the local

church staff be created. (We feel that the above will create a more friendly relationship as well as create a deeper loyalty on the part of the students toward the church and the church toward the students.)

d. We recommend that the Board use some of the Conference Wesley Foundation Funds for the students of Wesley to attend the conferences concerning the religious life of the college and youth.

# THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF DELAWARE, 1954-1955

The Wesley Foundation meets its four-fold emphasis of worship, service, education, and social activities through three regular weekly meetings; the church school class, the Sunday supper group and the Tuesday evening sessions, with additional occasional meetings. Among the interesting series of programs on Tuesdays have been the following: "The Christian on Campus," "Beliefs of a Methodist," "The Christian and Social Issues," and "The Devotional Life of a Student." The Church School Class under the able direction of Dr. John Harvey has concentrated on the theme "Christian Principles in Practice." The Lenten Study Group selected the study guide "The Unfolding Drama of the Bible."

Several new features of the Foundation's program deserve attention. A special consideration to the place of freshmen in the life of the group resulted in a freshman introductory supper, the traditional Freshman party and a hot dog roast. After several evenings devoted to Freshman Orientation, six freshman officers were elected to work with the upperclass officers. The Foundation also cooperated more fully with the wider program of the local church through the joint sponsorship of the film John Wesley and of the Family Life Seminar. The Church School Class adopted the new procedure of rotating student teachers which has met with enthusiasm from the members. The Sunday Supper meetings being a new addition to the program, hold much promise for informal group work. A new aspect of the program has been that of exchange meetings with other religious groups; Hillel Foundation of the University of Delaware and the Wesley Foundation of the University of Pennsylvania have cooperated in this. All member groups of the University Religious Council were the guests of the Wesley Foundation for its social drama entitled "John Doe." Projects undertaken for the Methodist Student Fellowship Fund this year include an informal dance and a sandwich sale in the dormitories.

The Wesley Foundation has participated beyond the local denominational group even more widely than in previous years. Ten students attended the first Fall Workshop to be held by the Chesapeake Area MSM. A similar

group will attend the Spring Conference of that body. Three students and the Co-Director attended the Regional Leadership Conference last summer. Wesley has been active in the work and promotion of the University Religious Council, the Protestant Committee of that Council and the Student Christian movement of the Middle Atlantic Area. It acted as host for the Protestant Vesper of Religious Emphasis Week and for the World Christian Student Day of Prayer Service. Members attended and participated in the leadership of the first SCM Conference to be held in Delaware. In cooperation with the University Religious Council, The Foundation supported the University Religious Emphasis Week, the URC Forum on Marriage, and the URC Concert of Sacred Music.

By means of the \$5,000 allocated by the Board of Education, for which we are deeply grateful, the Foundation was enabled to employ a full time worker thereby making possible the expansion in programming. We urge that the Conference shall continue sufficient assistance to operate a full program.

#### Program

They have substituted at the console of the organ, have played for county wide Men's Communion-breakfast services, and been generally active in the affairs of the Churches. In cooperation with other religious organizations on the campus, they have instituted the practice of saying grace before meals served in the dining hall.

It is planned to send a delegation to the annual Chesapeake Region's spring retreat, which will be held this year from April 29th - May 1st. If possible, the Club would like to send representatives to the leadership conference at Camp Casowasco, New York.

The Wesley Club would like to express its sincere appreciation to the Christ and First Methodist Churches of Chestertown, the local W. S. C. S. groups, to the Peninsula Annual Conference, and any other persons or groups who have contributed to it. We have struggled, but our struggle is resulting in growth. We hope that growth may grow 'from more to more'.

# REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION APRIL 1, 1955

It takes time and experience to learn the work of this office of Executive Secretary of the Board of Education. There are many details that must be cared for along with certain seasonal projects that present themselves. Such a task as this is too great for one person to do. What accomplishments have been made during this Conference year have been made so by the able assistance of Mrs. Milbury who is such a capable part-time Secretary, and a capable staff of volunteer workers. Certainly no other Executive Secretary has a finer group to work with than I have. The work recently carried on by the Youth leaders and Youth was a thrilling experience. We have one of the finest Boards of Education found anywhere. The good cooperation of the Cabinet makes the work go much better.

# SOME ACCOMPLISHMENTS THIS YEAR—

The number of local Church Schools who use the facilities of our office is increasing all the time. Contacts with Church Schools, Commissions of Education, Teachers Groups, and planning meetings have given the Executive Secretary forty-nine opportunities for serving. He has had the privilege of sharing in forty-one worship services in as many different churches. Various Youth groups have asked him to assist them on fifteen different occasions; one of these was to direct a week-end Christian Witness Mission in a local

Church. He has answered in addition, eighteen speaking engagements. Seven calls have been answered to participate in groups beyond the area of our Conference. In order to see the task more completely, he has attended three training Conferences. He has given guidance to 16 set-up meetings for leadership education Schools. Because of the need for teachers, he has taught in eight different Schools. In the administering of such a task, much travel is involved. Traveling the distance of 38,000 miles, he has gone into about every territory of our Conference. Many, many letters must be written and sent out to carry on this work. These literally go into the hundreds. We send out seven issues of the Newsbulletin which are made possible because Mrs. Milbury is the alert and busy editor. Every week, from two to six strip films and slides go out from the office to local Churches to aid them in their work in various departments.

# Camp Pe-Co-Meth

This has been the finest summer experience that we have had since we were appointed to this work. The ease with which the work has gone on has been most gratifying. All who come are glad we have such a fine place for our youth and adults.

At the very outset we want to say a word of deepest appreciation for the fine Staff which worked together as a team. Few of us realize how much work is done by Mrs. Milbury as registrar and dining room hostess for the camp.

Our activities started with our Older Youth Weekend and Work Camp. Rev. O. G. Brewer, Jr. was the leader of this and he did an admirable job. Thirty-four of our youth were there.

Following this we held a Family Life Seminar for ministers. We had twenty-two ministers who attended this for at least part of the time. We had two top men in this field; Dr. Edward Jackson and Dr. John Green of Boston.

We held our spring training Conference for Children's Workers and Adult's workers on June 11th. and 12th. Twenty-four of our workers attended this Conference.

Our Senior Week with Rev. James R. Hughes as Dean was a very unusual experience. We shall never forget that Galilean service. Thirty out of the forty-three came down to light their candles when the call for full time Christian service was given.

Our three Intermediate weeks were ably led by Rev. H. C. Jeffers, Perry O. Hill, and D. O. Clendaniel. There were 93, 132 and 106 present. Each week was rich in fellowship and spiritual uplift for all.

Our four Junior weeks had as Deans Mr. David Kidder, Rev. H. T. Caldwell, Mrs. G. I. Loar and Rev. Roy Vernon. The attendance for these weeks was 125, 136, 121, and 94. We felt that each Junior was helped by the experience of living together with the good Christian counselors. All of the deans were good leaders.

MAY

The W. S. C. S. school of Mission for girls was guided most effectively by Mrs. Ralph Lloyd. After filling the Camp with 119 they still turned away 92 who wanted to come to the Camp.

The U. C. Y. M. Training Conference members were enthusiastic concerning our Camp.

The Church School Superintendents was the largest for several years. 44 of the leaders were present. They had the fullest program ever. Every one was enthusiastic about some of the new things we tried.

There were 40 present at the Laymen's Retreat. The time was changed for 1955 with the hope of having more attend.

The Adult Retreat was a new type of combining Family week and a spiritual seeking. Dr. Clifford Richmond gave us all something to think about and use in our personal living.

How can you measure what transpires in a Summer program like ours at Camp PeCoMeth? Here are some of the results which we could record: There were thirty who committed themselves to full time Christian Service. There were also 73 who gave themselves to Christ to follow his way as nearly as they could. Who of us can venture to guess what goes through a young person's mind as his candle beats back the darkness of the night with its eager light! God moves close to the thoughts of youth in such times.

### Looking Ahead

After last summer's experience of our ministers at the Camp, some have asked if we could have some such a meeting again. We consider ourselves very fortunate in being able to obtain Dr. Glen Clark of Wisconsin for two days to lead us in a Prayer Retreat on June 1 and 2nd. Dr. Clark is one of our country's finest leaders in this very vital field. Every minister who attends will have something of a new eagerness in his messages. I hope that many of us plan to be present for these two days.

Our Young Adult Weekend will be held June 17-18-19. A committee of Young Adults and the Conference Adult Director met here in Dover to plan this event. Much interest was shown. The Adult Staff are committed to promote this as one of our projects for this year.

The Church School superintendents Conference will be held July 16-17. We hope to have some leader from Nashville, Tennessee to lead us in our work together.

We are planning a Family Life week at Camp during August 21 to 26. We have secured Rev. and Mrs. Paul Bohi from the Baltimore Conference to lead us. Rev. Bohi is the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education. Since our facilities for families are limited, we will be able to take a small number.

The U. C. Y. M. of the Chesapeake Area are meeting again with us August 27 to September 3rd.

There is a Spiritual Life Retreat being planned for the Labor Day week-end.

The Layman's Weekend Retreat will be held this year on September 10, 11. It was their opinion that they could get a much larger group on this date so we are working with them to try to get the largest possible attendance out at this Retreat.

The Chesapeake Area Methodist Student Movement are asking that we reserve for them the dates of October 7, 8, and 9 for their proposed Workshop again this year.

We are planning to hold Bible Conferences for two weeks in September for our Conference. While at Buck Hill Falls our Adult Directors decided to try these on their districts this Fall.

The Conference of Christian Education of our Church will be held at Cincinnati, Ohio this fall on November 8th. to 13th. To this meeting Presidents of Boards of Education Conference Children, Youth, and Adult Directors, a Cabinet member and the Executive Secretary go for inspiration and study in order to do a better task. This exchange of plans and ideas helps us to make our work better.

There will be a long awaited Conference on Youth Summer Agencies at New York City January 3-6 which will give a great deal of direction and guidance to our type of Camping experience. This has been needed for a long time.

Both Mrs. Milbury and I want to say a real "thank you" to the Board for its graciousness and consideration for us in this work. They have made the task a great deal more enjoyable than it would have been without their fine spirit. I think that the Conference will be very proud of the report which the Board will bring to it at its annual session. To all we say "thank you."

### Adult Work

Each one received a handbook of materials to give guidance in the work. We planned to send as many as would go up to the Special Adult Workers' Seminar at Buck Hill Falls, March 8, 9, and 10th. of this year. Seven of us were stirred by the possibilities of Adult Work. We plan to give attention to Young Adult Work and Bible Conferences in the Fall. Already, interest has been shown for this work. We believe real work can be done for our Peninsula Conference. All of the Directors are committed to aid in the Young Adult Retreat planned for this year.

### Youth Work

Of course, the most important phase of youth work has been the launching of the Youth Emphasis. However, we must not overlook the regular year after year program of rallies, camp, conferences (Hurricane Hazel made this last one in Salisbury the "Candle light Conference") staff and youth training, etc.

After a series of planning meetings the Emphasis was outlined in the Calendar distributed to every church. Sessions were arranged to assist ministers in their concern for youth. The district staffs were encouraged to set up training meetings for adult workers. The visitation took a great deal of time preparation. It could not have been done without the tireless work of Donzel Wildey and the youth staff. 163 charges were visited with contacts made with over 3,000 youth and adults. The district rallies saw over 1,800 in attendance. Perhaps even more lasting will be the impression made upon those young people who did the visiting. At any rate, a serious effort is being made to do a better job of reaching young people for Christ.

With the obvious need for a better youth program, it is still difficult to understand how some can continue to ignore the assistance offered. Also let no one be deluded into thinking that anything as intensive as our present effort can be a regular part of our program as long as we must depend upon volunteer staff. Future plans point to the officers training at Pe-Co-Meth May 28-29, the Convocation in August and the Christian Witness Missions throughout the Conference in the fall.

I must regard the time and interest of the last five years placed in this program as one of the outstanding enjoyments of my ministry. It has led to service in wider fields of the Maryland-Delaware Council of Churches, the Virginia Council of Churches and elsewhere.

I wish Doug Milbury and his staff increased success in the field of Christian Education.

# Report of Conference Children's Director

As we take a backward glance over the past twelve months there are some things that we would like to report in the field of Children's Work.

- 1- Four weeks of Junior Camp during July and August with a splendid staff of volunteer workers. The 463 Juniors enjoyed the opportunity of living happily together for the weeks.
- 2- September 11 and 12, 1954 our Conference and District Directors and several selected leaders of children from each District met in Dover for an Observation School. Mrs. Ada Smith of Baltimore taught the juniors and met with the Junior workers. Miss Margie McCarty came from Nashville to teach the Primary children and their leaders; and Mrs. Harry Bethards of Grace Church, Wilmington, Del., taught the Kindergarten group and their teachers. In spite of rain and wind the attendance was very good and much benefit realized.

- 3- As a result of the Observation School in Dover, the same type of School was held on a similar basis in Sharptown, Rising Sun, Ingleside, and Cambridge, with those who attended the Dover School serving as teachers.
- 4- So far as we can learn, a course for leaders of Children was offered in each of the leadership Schools held this year; most of them were taught by our own Conference teachers. We are happy to report that Mrs. G. I. Loar and Mrs. F. D. Milbury were both accredited and taught this year.
- 5- On the Salisbury District, Mrs. G. I. Loar, the District Director, conducted a pre-Easter Workshop for workers with Children during March at Upper Fairmount, Princess Anne, Hebron, and at Friendship Church on the St. Martin's charge.
- 6- Several Council meetings have been held in the Salisbury, Easton, and Wilmington Districts this year.
- 7- The Conference Council met in the home of the Executive Secretary on January 15, 1955 to report on work accomplished and plan for the coming year.
- 8- A District Loan Library has been suggested and has already been started in some of the districts, this to include the manuals and other books needed by workers in local churches.

### A Forward Look

- 1- A Children's Worker Bulletin published in April by Conference Director.
- 2- Conference Council meeting at Camp PeCoMeth June 10-11, 1955 to plan next years program, with an inspirational speaker on Friday evening.
- 3- Four weeks of Junior Camp in July and August.
- 4- Stressing of proper program of Evangelism with children.
- 5- Urging of recognition of Family weeks, May 1 to 8th, 1955.
- 6- Promoting in various ways the use of Methodist Literature in Church Schools.
- 7- Urging of Additional Session and Missionary Education especially for Juniors.

God has blessed our efforts and we are grateful for the many things accomplished in the Districts. We hereby express our heartfelt thanks to the Executive Secretary and his helpful wife and to the District and subdistrict Directors who have given of their time so willingly that it has been a real privilege to work together with them in promoting the work with Children in our Conference.

# REPORT OF THE FAMILY LIFE COMMISSION

On Friday, October 22, 1954, the Peninsula Conference delegates to the National Conference on Family Life (held in Cleveland, Oct. 8-10) met in Dover, Delaware to consider and act upon proposals for carrying the spirit and message of the National Conference to every District and local Church.

MAY

Under direction of the Executive Secretary, this group organized a Temporary Committee on Christian Family Life to serve until the Annual Conference meets in May 1955, at which time a permanent organization will be proposed.

Under the leaders, there have been two District Family Life Conferences held; one on the Dover District was held with some of the attending ministers remarking of the value that they had received both through the group discussions and the large list of materials presented. The largest one was held on the Wilmington District at which about 200 persons were present. This proved a real help and inspiration to those present.

The following resolution to be made to the Peninsula Conference meeting in May, 1955, was adopted.

### Resolution

- 1. A Committee on Christian Family Life be organized in the Peninsula Conference.
- 2. The Committee be composed of one District Superintendent appointed by the Cabinet; two representatives from each major Board of the Conference selected by the Board; two representatives appointed by the W. S. C. S.; two representatives appointed by the MYF; the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education; and two representatives of each District appointed by the District Superintendents after consultation with the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education.
- 3. All Boards and Agencies of the Conference be committed to cooperate with the program worked out by this Committee.
- 4. The Board of Education be charged with the responsibility to promote this work in the Conference.

# Responsibilities of the Committee

- 1. To arrange for Christian Family Life Conferences on Annual Conference and District levels as needed.
  - 2. To assist Local Churches arrange Family Life Conferences.
- 3. To promote interest in the Christian Family Life Movement among the clergy, the laymen, the laywomen, all agencies of the Church dealing with the family, etc.
- 4. To develop resource persons in all phases of the "Church and Family Life Movement."
- 5. To work with the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education in making available resource materials.
- 6. To make a study of the "The Christian Family"—"Its Practice and Needs" within the area of our own Annual Conference.
- 7. To assist in developing family Camping programs on District and Local Church levels.

# REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The Peninsula Conference Board of Evangelism believes that the acceptance of Christ as Lord and Savior and joining the church is not the end of the evangelizing process. The church must continue to work with God in the development of Christian character to the end that each individual may grow in Christlikeness. This is our objective. We can think of nothing higher. We dare not consider any lesser goal.

Evangelism is more than an isolated or sporadic activity which can be relegated to certain favorable seasons of the year. It is a continuing process, which should receive emphasis in the church program throughout the entire year. Evangelism must be carried on throughout life—from childhood, through youth, and on during the adult years.

To promote the emphasis of evangelism as a continuing process, the Board of Evangelism wishes to cooperate with any and all boards, committees, and groups of the Peninsula Conference and makes the following recommendations:

- 1. That there be a Spiritual Life Mission in each local church, to activate and deepen the spiritual life of all members.
- 2. That each local church cultivate at least one prayer movement of some kind or another, such as prayer meeting, prayer cells, or morning prayer groups.
- That each local church encourage family worship in every home, including grace at meals.
- 4. That each local church Commission on Membership and Evangelism set some realistic goal of net gain in membership.

- 1. PRAYER RETREAT at Camp Pe-Co-Meth June 1-2 with Dr. Glenn Clark as resource person. It will begin Wednesday, June 1, at 10:00 A. M., ending June 2, at 2:00 P. M. The cost will be \$4.75 for the entire time or \$1.00 registration per day and 75c for meals. All ministers and their wives as well as laymen are urged to attend.
- 2. The Northeastern Jurisdiction Conference on Evangelism will be held at Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa., July 10-17.
- 3. A MINISTERIAL RETREAT for all ministers of the Peninsula Conference will be held at Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania, January 23, 1956.

# GOODWILL INDUSTRIES OF WILMINGTON REPORT TO PENINSULA CONFERENCE, MAY 12, 1955

Friends of Goodwill Industries often express their interest in the agency's progress with the casual question—"How's Business?". In regular commercial industry, answering such a question adequately, would be a fairly simple matter—business is either good, or, it's bad, depending on the results achieved through the operation of certain well established economic principles. These principles are in operation at Goodwill Industries too but they serve only as supporting factors in maintaining the agency's work. The real "business" of Goodwill is service to people—handicapped people.

If our services prove to be an effective means of helping to solve the problems and filling the needs peculiar to handicapped people, then "business" is good. If we fall short of the mark as indicated by our primary purpose, then "business" is bad regardless of our experience in material and financial operations.

It is believed that we can report "business" was good during the past year despite the fact that financial resources were somewhat under the levels of 1953, the agency's peak year. Total income for the twelve month period amounted to \$72,332.56 a six percent decrease, but, opportunity wages, that is, wages paid to handicapped workers amounted to \$46,127.14 an increase of nearly five percent. It is significant that this five percent increase was paid to a total of 59 persons, four less than the number (63) served during the previous year. The average hourly rate paid in opportunity wages for 1954 was 76 cents as compared with an average of 70 cents for 1953.

Goodwill Industries was 86% self-supporting during the year being reported. This means that 86% of the agency's total income was derived from industrial earnings. 13% of total income was received through the United Community Fund of Northern Delaware and the remaining one percent was received from various other sources.

Among a number of advances made during the year in the direction of acquiring improved and additional facilities and equipment, two outstanding examples were, (1) the installation of a new hydraulic type freight elevator at a cost of nearly \$10,000 and (2) the installation of complete paint spray equipment, including an up-to-date booth and all accessories. Better than half the cost of the elevator has already been raised through designated contributions and the paint spray equipment was given to Goodwill Industries free of cost by a local business firm.

Statistics concerning operations and finances are useful in measuring some of the agency's operations and activities; they reflect, in a degree something of the scope of the program in operation. Actually, they tell very little, however, with regard to the real "business" of Goodwill. The needs and problems of handicapped people, encountered during a given period of time, are so varied, both in kind and degree, that it is very difficult, if not impossible, to classify them even into general groupings. Each individual situation is different; each case presents its own particular problem. The agency's services too, although basically maintained on a program of employment, reaches much further into the lives of the individual workers than just the first step of providing a job. The benefits, if any are achieved, de-

pend entirely on the cooperative action of both client-worker and the agency. There are no statistics, either in words or figures, which can describe these benefits for reporting purposes.

Perhaps the brief stories of two of Goodwill's workers may serve to illustrate something of the agency's function in the community as well as its services to the handicapped during the past year.

Joseph is feeble-minded. Both his mental and physical disabilities are the result of cerebral palsy. One hand and arm is severely crippled and one leg is also defective. He can neither read nor write; and, at the age of 31, he still can't tell time. Joseph was practically discarded by commercial industry as unemployable. Before coming to Goodwill several years ago, he faced a future of complete dependence on his relatives or else public relief for at least a partial filling of his daily needs. This is not a success story; Joseph's future is still uncertain. This much, however, has been gained—on the very day that this report was written, Joseph informed the writer in his hesitating manner of speech, that he had just given his mother over \$1100 which he had saved from his earnings at Goodwill Industries, as part of the purchase price for a new home. Rather than being a burden on the community, Joseph can be considered, despite his severe handicaps, a productive and useful citizen in his community.

Phillips was a sailor in the merchant marine for a number of years. One day he decided to change his occupation. He found a job in a leather tanning establishment in Philadelphia. In using the machinery related to his new work, an accident occurred crushing both his hands. Doctors were able to save one badly mutilated hand but the other had to be amputated along with part of his arm. In his thirties, with a wife to support and with an abundance of energy and ambition, Phillips was determined to overcome the handicap created by the unfortunate accident. His determination, however, proved to be no match for the determination of prospective employers to send him on his way, once they caught a glimpse of the artificial hook he wore and the other mutilated hand. After many fruitless attempts to find a job, Phillips arrived at Goodwill Industries early in 1954. Once he had become oriented to his new surroundings and the tension of bitterness and disappointment had been relieved, Phillips became an excellent worker; superior in many respects, to others having much more in the way of physical equipment. Here too, is another productive and useful citizen added to the community; he could have, very easily, become another public charge.

These are only two of the 59 cases served during the year. The others, many of whom, were as seriously handicapped, also applied their energies and remaining capacities in trying to help themselves become useful, contributing members of society. They worked hard, and they took their earnings along with a good measure of self-respect back to their communities where they bought and paid for, their own food, clothing and shelter, and in some instances, supported families as well. Rather than being an expense to the public as so-called "charity" cases, Goodwill workers were taxpayers themselves. They paid, during 1954, more than \$3700 in withholding taxes to the federal government.

In a feature story about Goodwill Industries which appeared in a local newspaper recently, the reporter commented on the general air of happiness

and contentment which she had observed among the workers during her visit. We like to think that what she saw and found so commendable, was the reflection of something good and wholesome—something which had been initiated and was being sustained, through the medium of useful productive work, by the cooperative efforts of determined, courageous handicapped workers and the "business" of Goodwill Industries. When our friends ask—"how's business?", we think we can answer that "business" was good during the past year—and, we are thankful.

Plans and procedures were projected looking toward the reaching of the desired goal, an adequate building located on a good site wherein sheltered care for the aged of the Peninsula Conference could be given. Those who have been charged with this responsibility have been at work and have surveyed and considered a number of possible buildings and sites.

The search will be continued with care and caution until there is found an adequate building on a good site.

Your board again recommends the voluntary support of the homes and hospitals within adjacent conferences that have in the past and do now minister to the constituency of this conference. We call your attention to the fine ministry of The Strawbridge Home for Boys at Sykesville, Maryland: the Kelso Home for Girls at Towson, Maryland; the Board of Child Care of the Baltimore Conference; and the Methodist Hospital in Philadelphia, Pa.

We urge the continued gerenous support of the Christmas offering for the Board of Child Care. We wish to record our gratitude to the Board of Lay Activities of our conference for their able and effective promotion of the Christmas offering.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES OF PENINSULA CONFERENCE

As the program of Lay Activities in Peninsula Conference continues to grow in interest and enthusiasm, it is an ever challenging task for laymen and ministers to work together for Christ and His Church. Ten new Methodist Men's Groups have been chartered this year, bringing the total number to 60 chartered groups in Peninsula Conference. Wilmington District leads with 23 units, four of which are new this year; Salisbury District is next with 19 units and 3 new groups this year. Dover District now has 12 groups and two of these are new ones, while Easton District has 6 groups and has not added any new ones this year.

One of the outstanding activities in each district has been the Laymen's Communion Breakfasts which have been well-attended and proved to be times of rich spiritual experiences. Offerings received at these services have been given to the Board of Child Care. Another activity which all four districts have participated in with enthusiasm and splendid attendance have been the Charge Lay Leader and Pastors meetings, and these have been very helpful in promoting the work of "Methodist Men."

The Sixth Annual Laymen's Week-End Retreat was held at Camp Pe-Co-Meth on Aug. 21-22, 1954 with W. Carl Walton, of West Orange, N. J. as the guest speaker. Clinton H. Brown, the Wilmington District Lay Leader, was the speaker at the Sunday morning session. Both messages were outstanding and the Retreat was a time of deep spiritual inspiration. This year the Seventh Annual Retreat will be held at Camp Pe-Co-Meth on the week-end of Sept. 10-11, 1955.

In the observance of Laymen's Day, Oct. 17th, 1954, the emphasis was "A Time For Decision" and there was much encouragement this year in the increased interest and participation by the laymen-speakers filling the pulpits throughout the conference.

Clinton H. Brown, the Wilmington District Lay Leader has done a very outstanding work as a district lay leader and he is also the Conference Director of Stewardship. He has this program fully organized and is ready to assist any local church in the "Stewardship of Possessions" program. It is very important for every church to have a layman named to be the director of stewardship. "The Stewardship of Possessions" program is a continuing program of the Methodist Church.

Among the important meetings which our Peninsula Conference Laymen attended this year were: The First National Conference of Methodist Men at Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana, on July 9-11; the Laymen's Reception for Bishop Oxnam, at Baltimore, Md. on Sept. 27th; the Jurisdiction Laymen's Meeting, at Buck Hill Falls, on Nov. 13-14; and a Meeting in interest of our Washington Area Educational Institutions at York, Pa., on Mar. 11th. The attendance at all of these meetings was exceptionally good and the laymen were inspired by the importance of the laity.

In the Wilmington District the unique monthly Sunday Morning Breakfast Meetings continue to grow in interest and the outstanding speakers throughout the year are a real inspiration to the laymen who attend. On Conference Sunday morning, May 15th, Bishop Oxnam will be the speaker at this Sunday Morning Breakfast meeting.

The Annual Laymen's Meeting during the Conference session will be held in Grace Church, Wilmington, Del., on Friday evening, May 13th, at 7:30 o'clock. The program for this meeting has been planned by Clinton H. Brown, the Wilmington District Lay Leader. The guest speaker will be Senator John J. Williams, of Delaware.

As Conference Lay Leader, it has been a real privilege to work with the entire Board of Lay Activities of the Conference and I would like to express my sincere appreciation to each of them for their splendid cooperation this year. To each one I am indeed grateful for the wonderful response which has made the year's work a success.

# REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS

This year has found your Board of Missions busy about many things. In addition to those activities which have always been a part of its work there have been several new projects developed during the year that have

grown, directly or indirectly, out of the thorough study and survey made of the Conference last year. We believe that this survey will continue to be a wholesome and guiding influence upon the work of Missions and Church Extension for years to come, especially as we keep alive to the trends and changes as they occur in the several areas of our conference. We sincerely appreciate the thoughtful manner in which the members of the Conference authorized such a study and the unanimity with which they adopted its recommendations.

# Missionary Cultivation

The program of Missionary Cultivation has been ably directed by our Conference Missionary Secretary, the Reverend William O. Hackett and his aides, the four District Missionary Secretaries. Wide use has been made of our growing film library. More of our Churches are establishing local Commissions on Missions and through them creating greater interest in the work of our denomination in its far flung Missionary enterprise. Once again February was designated Missions Month in the Conference. The Rev. Dr. Stanley Thoburn, of Leonard Theological School, India, visited each of our four Districts for a week of intensive cultivation. He addressed not only Church groups, but School and Civic groups as well. His messages were well received and did much to accent our appreciation for the educational and evangelistic work of the Church in that field. Many churches that were not on his itinerary made use of the visual aids, or enjoyed programs provided by our District Secretaries.

The year round program of cultivation carried on by the Woman's Society of Christian Service is of great benefit to our complete understanding and appreciation of the Missionary work. We commend them for their fine programs, excellent study books and the circulation of the magazine "World Outlook."

### Missionary Aid

Within each District there are certain churches that have been clearly in need of supplemental assistance. In those cases which seemed to represent a Missionary responsibility or a Church extension opportunity, we have, on the recommendation of the District Superintendents, granted limited aid. We are very pleased that in the majority of cases the local situation has been greatly strengthened, thereby justifying the faith which was placed in them.

# The Advance

Many of our Churches have responded to the appeal for Advance giving. This is second mile giving to enable existing programs in World and National Missions to continue, and where possible for us to increase our labors and open new fields for Christ. We are especially concerned that our Churches underwrite the support of the Robert Gilchrists who represent our Conference in India. Louis and Madeline Dennis, in Borneo, look to the people of this area for part of their support and we are always glad to hear of their successes. We also urge those Churches that now support work in Puerto Rico to continue with their projects. It has been found that where

a church can be personally related to the work of certain Missionaries or a particular field that Church will be greatly benefited and will sense an increasing partnership in the work of the kingdom.

## The Migrant Ministry

For thirty-five years there has been an organized Ministry to the agricultural Migrants who come each year to work in the crops and canning houses of our two states. This program is conducted under the auspices of the Maryland-Delaware Council of Churches. Our Conference allocated \$1,000.00 through this Board to the support of this Ministry during the past year. We urge the continuation of such support for this worthy program.

# Church Extension

This Board has continued its interest in and support of all those Church Extension Projects to which it has made long range committments. We are pleased to see the progress being made in these Churches and the splendid response of the local congregations in shouldering their responsibilities. The Budget of the Board which will be printed in the Conference Journal will indicate the extent of our support to these Churches.

As a result of the action of the Conference last year in adopting the Survey Report certain responsibilities were created for this Board. First, we were directed to cancel the indebtedness of the Church in Wilmington Manor and provide a new lot on which they might relocate. We have received the complete cooperation of The Division of National Missions in Philadelphia in regards the settlement of this indebtedness. One payment has been made this year and we plan to complete payments of this obligation in two additional years. We can also report that a new lot has been secured for this Church and one which we believe is adequate for all present needs and any anticipated future development.

Second, we were urged to establish a parish in Brookside, a development near Newark, Delaware. With the complete cooperation of the Cabinet, The Wilmington District Church Extension Society and this Board, this has been done. This Board, with funds made available for this type Church extension development, has underwritten the support of a pastor for this parish for the year; has assisted in the securing of parsonage and furnishings and has done all in its power to encourage the members of this new Church in their life as a congregation. We have met with the pastor and officials of the Church on several occasions and have carefully studied their needs. This new parish has received a major part of our attention during this year and we are thrilled with the results that these people have achieved in the name of God. We will continue to support this work and will be investing in the new building that will house their activities in the coming months.

# Ministry to Military Personnel

Your Board has considered the needs of the families of the men stationed in the several Military establishments located in our Conference.

We believe that we have a Missionary responsibility to minister to these people. Thus far we have established work in only one area. We have assumed partial support for the work of a Minister in Dover who has concentrated his efforts upon the families of men attached to the Dover Air Force Base. Gratifying results have been seen here. During the coming year, we will be cooperating with the Committee on Chaplains and the Cabinet in a study of the needs throughout our Conference with the idea that a broader program may be launched to relate such families to local Churches and an active Christian life. We appreciate the aid that the General Commission on Chaplains and the General Committee on Camp Activities have given us in this past year.

### A Continuing Concern

We would remind the Conference that by its action last year in adopting the Survey report it has stated that "When analysis indicates that two or more Churches in the same neighborhood are in too close proximity, have too small a membership for an effective program, and must be placed on a circuit to secure pastoral leadership, then it is suggested that the Conference declare its policy to be the uniting of such Churches." In order that this objective be achieved an eight point program was adopted which placed certain responsibilities upon this Board and other agencies of the Church. These may be found listed on page 539 of the 1954 Journal.

Another continuing concern relates again to the survey report as recorded on page 540 of the 1954 Journal in which it states "There should be a constant study of circuit lines, seeking that realignment which will make possible the most efficient ministry to our churches. Moreover, the uniting of two Churches, one church becoming a station, etc., will throw the whole alignment of churches out of any given plan. A constant study is therefore urgently suggested." We would commend the Cabinet for their efforts to provide a more efficient ministry for all our churches in accord with the policies declared above and urge our people in every Church to support this phase of our Conference program.

### Recommendations

The Conference Board of Missions recommends:

- 1.—That the month of February 1956 be designated as Missionary Cultivation Month, and that suitable programs be planned by the Conference Missionary Secretary in cooperation with his aides and the Superintendent of each District.
- 2.—That each local church organize a Commission on Missions, and plan to use the splendid Missionary materials produced by our Church, as well as the visual aid resources available to them.
- 3.—That William O. Hackett be appointed Conference Missionary Secretary for the coming year.

# RADIO, TELEVISION AND FILM COMMISSION

The Commission is now ready to serve the various Boards and Commissions of this Conference in the promotion of their special programs.

We respectfully request the Conference to designate this Commission as the Radio—TV—and Film Commission in conformity with the designation used by the Commission of the General Church.

# ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT OF BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

Through the conference year the Board of Social and Economic Relations has held several meetings to study the social issues of our area and has conducted a special activity relating to the program of our church. We present the results of our work in the following statement of beliefs and report.

### Race Relations—

No less a person than Arnold Roynbee has declared that one of the two chief problems before the whole human race, historically speaking, is the problem of race relations. We believe that the ideal Christian Church is one in which no racial discrimination is practiced. We recognize, however, that individuals and organizations learn the truth of the ideal and make progress toward it at different rates. But we must keep the ideal clearly visible before all.

"The historic decision of the Supreme Court abolishing segregation in the public school system is in keeping with the attitude of The Methodist Church." We applaud President Eisenhower and other government officials for the long list of federal moves quietly eliminating racial discrimination and segregation. Their approach in setting an example in deeds can be followed with great advantage by all.

Likewise, we applaud the action of our own Council of Bishops when, in November 1954, they declared, "One of the foundation stones of our faith is the belief that all men are brothers, equal in the sight of God. In that faith, we declare our support of the ruling of the Supreme Court."

Nor would we overlook the ministers and laymen of our own Conference who have been in the front lines in dealing with the problem. By their faithfulness and courageous action in the face of great difficulties they have upheld the Christian goal and the way of love as exemplified by Jesus Christ.

We would point out to all persons in authority that it now seems conclusive that harsh controversy and violence occur when ambiguous policies are declared or inconsistent practices are apparent. The same disastrous results occur from a second cause, when conflict develops between the authorities concerned. Our obligation as a church is to "re-examine continually our Christian responsibility in race relations and interpret its meaning."

Recognizing that attitudes do not change experiences so much as experiences change attitudes, we therefore:

- 1. Urge our ministers to work for the removal of any racial barriers that may exist within the charters of their local ministerial associations;
- 2. Urge our churches to seek out and employ all opportunities to bring races together in the fields of their common concerns:
- 3. Request that the leaders of the several activities in which our Conference is engaged seek to have joint promotional meetings for the overall church program when the needs of the churches concerned are not so broad as to make this impractical.

### Civil Liberties—

"The Christian should be interested in civil liberties because of his religion. For him the will of God should be supreme; allegiance to our Heavenly Father is both primary and basic. Belief in the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of all men implies that God is interested in all, irrespective of race, nationality, sex or creed. Human personality is sacred. Since this is true, then all men should have equal rights. There should be no "second-class" citizens." Therefore:

- 1. We believe it to be the duty of the church to assert the eternal principles upon which this freedom and equality is based and to call attention to any current abuses of that freedom and equality.
- 2. We believe that true democracy must be preserved in our nation. Our primary source of strength is the responsible democratic action of its people. Thus, our people must be informed, and one function of

the church relating to social issues is to develop an enlightened electorate.

- 3. We believe that communism must be resisted. We reaffirm the statement of the General Conference of 1952, "Its atheistic totalitarianism and its tendency to infiltration, clever deception, and ruthless violence make it the major foe both of Christianity and of freedom in the world today. Recognition of these facts is essential to Christian democracy."
- 4. However, we believe that communism must not be resisted by its own methods. The stigmatizing of courageous and loyal citizens, irresponsible accusation, assertions of guilt by association, or any spreading of the charges of disloyalty on the basis of mere suspicion are contrary to our way of government and our faith. To violate civil liberties in order to combat communism is to use an evil means to try to bring about a good end, but means and ends are inevitably interrelated.

### Religious Liberties—

1955

Man, as a child of God and yet a being in time and social relationships, stands in constant need of the guidance of God. We rejoice in the apparent movement of the people of our land to a larger participation in the practice of worship, both corporate and private. We believe that the concerns and convictions resulting from worship can best be worked out in our society when good men band together in some Christian Fellowship. Thus we recognize the duty and the right of each person to unite with the denomination of his own choice.

We view with alarm, however, the attempts to place any one denomination in a position of special prestige or governmental favor. This constant attempt takes many forms, depending upon the political and social conditions of the moment. It seems the battle for religious freedom is never fully or finally won. Therefore:

- 1. We reaffirm our belief in the principle of separation of church and state. We must be on constant guard against encroachment upon this principle and do pledge to it our continued support.
  - 2. We recognize and hold sacred for all Christian Fellowships the same rights, privileges and responsibilities that we claim for ourselves, affirming in the spirit and words of John Wesley, "If thy heart be as my heart, give me thy hand."

# Universal Military Training—

Once again Universal Military Training has come up for consideration in the form of bill H.R. #2967. To be sure it is described as a "modified" version in that it requires only six months of regular training plus nine and one-half years spent in the reserves wherein the youth would be required to give 48 "assemblies" and 17 days in a summer camp each year. From a military point of view we are not competent to judge its effectiveness, though

there seems to be some serious doubts in the minds of others well versed in this field.

However, we do oppose the establishment of any standing universal military training program. By it youth are subject to indoctrination with the idea that armed forces holds the answer to the issues of today's world. On this ground alone, if for no other, we must register our protest to the plan. It has been asserted by others that "militarism as a way of life is a foe of democracy." As a church we would declare that mediation, conducted in an atmosphere of Christian life, is the proper method for the working out of our differences.

# Social Evils- to another base of guilt by association, or mether base aldienoge

Two outstanding evils in our society are intemperance and gambling. It has been attempted to disguise the true nature of these evils by giving to the one a false respectability and to the other a benevolent purpose, but they still remain the "bad wolf in grandmother's shawl who would devour" us. We commend the effective work of our related boards in their efforts to expose these evil practices.

# United Nations Trip- away about to something add to head theismon of shiness

Our group project this year was a directed tour of the United Nations and a discussion of its program and purposes. We are happy to report that the seminar was well supported by the conference.

Assisted by Dr. Charles F. Boss, Jr., of the Board of World Peace, a one-day trip was arranged for Friday, January 21st. We visited the several buildings of the United Nations and a meeting of the sub-committee on Religious Liberty. We were also privileged to have addresses by members of the regular working staff. These, with the question periods that followed, greatly enlarged our information and appreciation of the work of this important organization. Our final meeting, a summary session, was held in the Methodist Building that evening.

Unfortunately, it was necessary to restrict our registration to fifty persons. The purpose of this seminar was to give information and an experience that would be background material for the presentation of the Crusade for World Order in the local churches. Thus the program was centered upon the ministerial level. We feel, however, that it would be helpful if our churches would encourage organized lay visits. Some churches already have made such a visit; others we know are planning them. To this end, your Board offers you any assistance it can give in helping you with transportation or speaker arrangements.

### Program for 1955-56—

For the coming year we are planning, in cooperation with the Board of Temperance and the Legislative Committees, to have a seminar in each district on the three problems of race relations, gambling, and alcohol. It is our hope that every church will have three laymen attending these late afternoon and evening sessions; laymen whose purpose in coming would

be to become local leaders in these fields of social concern. A fourth seminar on the subject, the pulpit and controversial issues, would be held at the same time for ministers. We shall secure as resource persons and leaders for these sessions the very best that we can afford.

In addition it is planned that the Board will sponsor one Washington and three United Nations Seminars. These would be spaced through the winter months and would be open to all persons of our Conference.

# REPORT OF CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF STEWARDSHIP OF POSSESSIONS

At the 1954 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference, a resolution approving the Stewardship of Possessions Program was adopted unanimously and a Conference Director was elected.

Since then, under the direction of Dr. John N. Link, the Area Director, and with the complete cooperation of the District Superintendents, meetings at Conference and District levels have been held and four District Directors appointed. They are Paul Turek, Wilmington District, Paul Powell, Dover District, C. Brooks Nagel, Easton District and Richard B. Sheridan, Salisbury District.

As the result of the meetings and the efforts of these directors and the District Superintendents, every minister and many laymen have learned about the Stewardship of Possessions Program.

Little effort has been made to determine results in terms of statistics, for it is our opinion that we are not as much interested in numbers as in increased giving resulting from tithing which will become apparent if the Stewardship of Possessions Program is adopted by a church.

We must admit, except in a few isolated instances, results have been meager.

At a regional refresher training meeting, at which your Conference Director was in attendance, the same main obstacle was considered as we discussed at our own staff meeting of District Directors and District Superintendents held in Smyrna recently. This obstacle may be explained as follows:

When the Stewardship of Possessions Program was first mentioned, it was called a Laymen's Program and many ministers have been content to let it be just that. However, every one knows that if the minister in the local church is not back of a program it will almost surely fail.

Our appeal, therefore, is to you fine ministers; first, to become tithers if you do not already tithe. Accept the blessings God so generously bestows on those who are generous with Him. Then take another look at this Stewardship Program and you will see how its tremendous appeal will win others to the blessings of tithing.

Pardon some personal words that some of you may have heard me say before.

I have always been a tither. In no other way can we account for God giving us the money to visit so many places of Methodist interest, the most recent being our visit on the Christian Advocate Tour to the Hawaiian Islands. From these trips we have tried to bring back pictures and stories which many of you have said helped just a little.

I am only a salesman with a rather small salary. There is no other way we can account for God's generosity to us than because we have tried to be generous with Him. I commend this course to you.

One evening I was sitting in the lobby of the hotel in Hilo on the big Island of Hawaii. Through the door and coconut trees I could see the sullen red glow of the erupting volcano. We flew around that volcano later that night and there I saw God still creating the earth, for it was in just such fashion over billions of years these volcanic islands were created.

One of our party, a District Superintendent, one of that much maligned group, came over to where I was sitting and introduced me to the man with him, a Mr. Kong, a stocky, round-faced, smiling Hawaiian gentleman. The District Superintendent told me this man had been very good to him when he was serving a church a few years ago. Mr. Kong had sent him several hundred orchids so that his church could have an orchid Sunday when every one coming to church would receive an orchid.

The next morning Mr. Kong was in the lobby of the hotel handing out orchids to all the members of our party, both men and women. They were in little glass vials with pins. Mr. Kong was very gracious and smiling.

Later in the day at the Airport was Mr. Kong again with Mrs. Kong and their little daughter, all with boxes of orchids from which we helped ourselves

At length I drew him aside and asked why he was doing this. He told me that several years ago he and his wife had become Christians and dedicated their lives and business to Christ and his Church. He said they liked to be with Christian people and were taking this means of showing their appreciation for our coming. I then asked him about the orchids he had sent to the District Superintendent. He said he did that often and when I asked him the cost he said, "O I give them. There is no charge". I said, "Then Mr. Kong, you are a tither". He replied with a smile, "Yes and much more". My next question was "How is your business?" He said "It is wonderful". He then handed me his card which read "E. L. Kong, Grower of Orchids, The largest in Hawaii".

I whispered to myself, "How generous is God to those who are generous with Him".

We are not discouraged because of meager results. This program is just beginning and with the help of you ministers working with your laymen and women, it is bound to succeed.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

The problem of the drinking driver on the crowded highways of America has been one of the major head-line snatchers of the past year. Every day we can read in our papers of the exploits and accidents in which drinking on the part of one or more of the drivers is a contributing factor. In other areas of life there is also ample evidence as to the contribution beverage alcohol makes to the moral breakdown in the lives of people and society. Radio and television have made it so "every day" and so socially acceptable to use alcoholic beverages, that it has often dulled the keen edge of conscience of even sincere church people.

The simple fact remains that we must, by every means at our disposal, do all we can to control and eliminate the use of alcohol as a beverage. The people of our churches must constantly be made aware of the facts in regard to its use. Particularly must they become informed as to the moral and psychological effects upon individual personality and on society in general.

The answer is not simple; the problem itself is tremendous. Those who dare to lead will not be acclaimed for their popularity in espousing a popular cause. But the church must continually and persistently work to remove this insidious evil from our midst.

The action of the General Conference has also placed in the hands of your Board of Temperance the responsibility for awareness and action in regard to legalized gambling. The Legislature of the State of Delaware has before it a number of bills to extend legalized gambling in the state. Bills for Bingo, with and without controls, have been introduced, a bill to legalize a dog race-track with pari-mutual betting, has passed one house of the Legislature.

Your Board, in cooperation with the Delaware Legislature Committee of our Conference and leaders of other denominations in the state, has done all it knows to help defeat this legislation. It is fully believed by this Board that if the Methodist people of Delaware would firmly stand upon their Christian convictions in this matter and individually inform the members of the Legislature from their home districts of their opposition to these gambling bills before the Legislature, that not only would the threat of increased legalized gambling be erased, but there would be hope of eliminating parimutual betting on the horse races.

Your Board conducted four District Seminars during the month of January, with varying success. We feel that those who showed interest enough in attending received information which would be helpful with the temperance program in the local church.

Your Board has secured for use in the churches of our Conference for the next year, the temperance film, "The Power of Decision." Three more roadsigns for temperance have been erected and two more will be, as soon as suitable sites can be found. Your Board sent a youth delegate to the National Methodist Youth School of Alcohol Studies at Ohio Wesleyan University, Delaware, Ohio last summer. The District Secretaries of Temperance have been helpful in establishing a program for temperance in their respective Districts.

We continue to cooperate with Dr. Frederick O. Smith of the Maryland-Delaware Temperance League.

We propose for the coming year:

- 1. To continue cooperation with other temperance agencies.
- 2. To cooperate with the General Board in promoting Commitment Day, on the first Sunday of December.
- 3. To urge District Committees on Leadership Education to include a Temperance Course in their Leadership Training Schools.
- 4. To send a delegate to the Methodist School of Alcohol Studies and two delegates to the Pennsylvania School of Alcohol Studies.
- 5. To make available to the churches the temperance film, "Power of Decision."
- 6. To erect more roadside signboards for temperance in cooperation with local churches.
- 7. To help our youth know they need not drink to belong to the group and to be happy.
  - 8. To help establish a temperance committee in every local church.
- 9. To recommend support by Annual Conference action of the proposal that the Board of Temperance, Board of Social and Economic Relations, and the Legislative Committee of Maryland and Delaware plan together for one-day seminars in each of the districts on alcohol, gambling, racial integration.
- 10. To continue to do everything we can, by education and legislation, to limit and eradicate legalized gambling from our area.
- 11. To urge our ministers to take positive and constructive action in regard to alcoholic beverages and gambling in the local parish.

Representatives of other Boards are being named. Definite plans for projecting the Conference upon our own area are in the process of formulation.

In spite of the fact that America is on the move "Millions now living will never" be urbanized. The rural church must dig in and prepare to minister more adequately to those in its area.

# REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

The three main emphases of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, namely, 1) The Development of the Spiritual Life of the members, 2) Christian Social Relations and Local Church Activities, and 3) Missionary Education and Service, have been the center of attention this year, as always. In addition to the annual observance of the Week of Prayer and Self Denial in the fall, a Retreat was held at Camp Pecometh in September and a Day-Apart, with Mrs. Louise Eggleston as the leader, was held in February. As a result of these efforts a number of new prayer groups have been formed in local churches. Service activities in local communities and churches have been numerous and financial assistance with local needs has been large. The Conference missionary plegde of \$45,000 to the Woman's Division of Christian Service has been met in full and on the basis of pledges received from local churches for the coming year an increase of \$1500 has been set as the goal for 1955-56.

The calendar of activities this year has included the Fourth Quadrennial Assembly of the Woman's Society of Christian Service held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, May 25-28, 1954 which was attended by three conference officers, the four district presidents and a youth delegate. Each district had an Officer's Training Day for local officers in June. And each district held a Seminar in September where the study and program materials for the year were presented and explained to the local officers. Mrs. John Pearson of The Woman's Division spoke in each district in November. And Mrs. Wallace N. Streeter, President of Northeastern Jurisdiction Woman's Society of Christian Service, addressed the Annual Meeting in each district in March.

The Girl's School of Missions and Christian Service was held at Camp Pecometh June 28 to July 3 and was attended by 118 girls. Ninety-six girls were turned away because of lack of room. Nineteen girls received recognition for having attended the School for three years.

The Summer School of Missions and Christian Service held at Wesley Junior College, July 12 to 16, was attended by 97 full-time and 127 part-time students making a total of 224 women. The influence of this School is seen throughout the conference in a better understanding of the work of the society and in a larger use of the study materials which are provided. This year an unusually large number of study classes have been held using the spiritual life, Christian social relations, and mission study books. Approximately 100 of these classes met the high requirements necessary to receive Special Jurisdiction Recognition. This is an increase over last year of approximately 40 such Special Recognition classes.

MAY

In the Department of Christian Social Relations and Local Church Activities services too numerous to mention have been rendered in local churches. They include such things as visiting the sick and the newcomers, providing fellowship occasions of many types, supporting the young people, the choirs, the church school, etc., in various ways, and assisting with every phase of the program of the general church. Among other Christian Social Relations activities reported are such things as: sponsoring the UNICEF Hallowe'en observance to help the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund; participating in the Temperance Seminars; sponsoring "Over 65" clubs and parties for the elderly people in the community; taking teas and parties to patients in mental institutions; providing flowers and cookies for the Veteran's Hospital; promoting understanding of the Bryson bill which would prohibit interstate liquor advertising; giving information about legislation on Universal Military Training; urging registration and voting and giving demonstrations on how to use voting machines; informing local societies of the racial policy of the Woman's Division of Christian Service; and organizing trips to the United Nations.

The program at the Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home and the Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House which are supported by the women of Peninsula Conference has had the largest attendance in the history of the institutions and seems to be meeting a real need. The staff includes the Deaconess-Director, Miss Genevieve Poppe; two other Deaconesses, Miss Jennie Propert and Miss Mae Greer; a US-2, Miss Betty Lou Brown; and the hostess, Mrs. Flora Cooke. Many enjoyed the Open House at the Deaconess Home on October 20.

In line with the emphasis on co-operation with the total program of the church, the Conference Secretary of Student Work attended, last fall in Buffalo, New York, a meeting of all Student Secretaries in Northeastern Jurisdiction which was called by Dr. Stanley Martin of the Board of Education in Nashville. The purpose of this was to inform these secretaries of the needs of the Methodist Student Loan and Scholarship Fund and the importance of Student Day on the second Sunday in June. As a result of this meeting the purpose and significance of Student Day have been presented in both the fall and the spring district meetings in order that the women, as individual members of the church, may lend every possible support to this important Methodist cause. To be of help in recruiting the ministers, missionaries, and deaconesses which are so greatly needed to carry on the work of the church at home and abroad, the Secretary of Missionary Personnel has distributed among the churches 370 copies of the booklet "Service Projects for 1954." This tells in a very specific way of the needs and the qualifications required. And an attempt has been made to place these booklets in the hands of strategic persons in the churches who are in positions of leadership with young people in order that the challenge of service in the church vocations may be brought before youth groups in the church school and the Methodist Youth Fellowship. Two girls preparing for fulltime Christian service have received help from the Bettie S. Brittingham Memorial Scholarship Fund this year. The Conference Woman's Society cooperated with the Board of Education by paying the expenses of a representative of the MYF to the United Nations-Washington Seminar in February. And the Conference Secretary of Youth Work assisted in the Methodist Youth Fellowship visitation program this spring.

The Conference Secretary of Promotion reports 369 societies in Peninsula Conference with 23,690 members. Eighteen churches are recorded as unorganized. In the last four years there has been an increase of over 70 societies. And the number of unorganized churches has been reduced from 115 to 18. In other words, now all but 18 of the churches in the Conference have either a fully organized society, a modified plan society, or a District member.

This increase in societies, the increase in study courses, in service activities, and in the general understanding of the program of the Woman's Society of Christian Service has been due to many factors. The tireless devotion of the women in the local churches has been demonstrated again and again. The consecration and teamwork of the conference and district officers have played a large part. The co-operation of the District Superintendents and the Pastors has helped greatly and is much appreciated. And as this four year period now comes to a close and a new president begins her work on June first, there is every assurance that the women of the conference will continue to advance and to render ever-increasing services to their local churches, to the communities in which they live, and to the larger community of the world.

Since the pre-conference printing of this report, the Annual Meeting of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service has been held in Salisbury on May 5th. At that time reports were made by Secretaries of all departments. Two outstanding speakers addressed the group—Miss Katherine Eye, missionary to the Belgian Congo, and Miss Ivy Chou who will soon go out to Borneo as a missionary under the Woman's Division of Christian Service to work with Madeline and Louis Dennis. The biennial election of officers was held.

Mrs. Earl Sylvester of Harrington, Delaware was elected to serve as President. Mrs. Sylvester has been District Secretary of Promotion and just now is completing four outstanding years as President of the Dover District Woman's Society of Christian Service. Our best wishes go with Mrs. Sylvester as she enters upon her new duties and I am sure that she will receive the same co-operation and loyal support which have characterized the last four years during which I have served.

- 1. The Radio and Film Commission of the Peninsula Conference receive \$350.00 for the advancement of their program for the year 1955-56.
  - 2. The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, \$100.00
- 3. The Town and Country Commission receive \$400.00 to send delegates to the National Rural Conference.
- 4. Honorarium of \$350.00 for the Secretary; \$200.00 for the Statistician.
- 5. That we underwrite the expense of the initial survey which this Annual Conference authorized for Wesley Junior College and other Conference expenses not provided for in the budget be paid from the Contingent Fund.

If some emergency arises, or any item has been over-looked, the District Superintendents and the Commission on World Service and Finance, acting jointly, may, by a two-thirds vote, draw upon the Contingent Fund to meet

We will start preparing a new budget early in September of this year. We therefore must request all Boards and Commissions requiring appropriations to meet and anticipate and prepare their budgets for the next four years. This should be submitted to the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance not later than September 15th.

## DAVID THOMAS CAMPBELL

David Thomas Campbell, son of Charles H. and Sarah C. Campbell, was born August 17, 1883 near Georgetown, Delaware.

Following his father's occupation he became a farmer. He married Sophronia B. White. They had two sons, both of whom reside in Maryland, Oliver G. Campbell of Melsons and William O. Campbell of Parsonsburg.

Throughout his early life he took an active part in the affairs of Melsons Church and for a period of years served as Superintendent of the Sunday School.

Approaching middle life he came under the conviction that God was calling him into the Christian ministry. Trusting that God was leading, he disposed of his two farms giving them to his two sons and proceeded to the work to which he had been called.

While Dr. Leonard White was Superintendent he was appointed to St. Luke's and Stengle Churches in the Salisbury District. Then to White Haven. From here he was assigned to Powellville which he served for ten years. Following this was a brief ministry in Ellendale for two years.

His first wife having passed on, he married Mrs. Bettie H. Gray of Willards, Maryland on June 27, 1942.

In 1944 he was appointed to Blades where he served with honor and great usefulness. He was beginning his eleventh year when he was called from us on May 28, 1954.

Funeral services were conducted in The Blades Church by the Superintendent, Dr. O. A. Bartley, who was assisted by the Reverend R. Jervis Cooke and the Reverend Walter H. Stone. Interment was at Melsons Cemetery.

Having served with David through the entire period of his final appointment, it is with appreciation that these lines are written. We remember his clean outward appearance so indicative of his inner spirit, his modest manner and refinement. Though generally of a serious mind, he enjoyed fun and could create laughter. Sincerity was the deep impression he made on those who came under the influence of his ministry. Being a soul of integrity, men trusted his word with absolute confidence. In his work as a minister he knew how to communicate the spirit of worship which made his helpful messages even more effective. Without reserve he gave himself to his Lord and to his people in sacrificial faithfulness. He has left an example of what it means to be "a good minister of Jesus Christ."

## ASA EVERETTE KNICELEY

Asa Everette Kniceley was born June 9, 1891 in Braxton County, West Virginia, the son of Daniel and Margaret Knicely. Before entering upon his studies for the ministry, he served in the United States Army during World War I, 1917-1918. Forced to leave the Army by broken health, he spent some months in hospitals before resuming his normal civilian pursuits. He re-

ceived his education at West Virginia University and then completed the Conference Course of Study through correspondence work with Emory University, Georgia. He married Janet Seay of Petersburg, Virginia. Of this union five children survive: Mrs. Edward Hudson, Seaford, Del.; John E. of Milford, Del.; Mrs. Robert Kern, of Salisbury, Md.; William Asa, Salisbury; and Donald E., now residing in New York.

As a Knicely entered the ministry as a supply pastor in 1926 in the West Virginia Conference. He was received into the membership of that Conference in 1929, was ordained Deacon in 1931 and Elder in 1933. In the year 1936 he transferred to the Virginia Conference serving within its bounds for three years and until Methodist Union made him a part of the new Peninsula Conference. In this Conference he served the following charges: Beckwith and Spedden, Greenwood, Parsonsburg and Concord-Grove.

Never robust in health since his Army days, he sought the retired relation in 1952 upon the advice of his physician. His first year of retirement was spent in Salisbury where he was associated with Trinity Church as a Minister of Visitation. Then in 1953 the Kniceleys moved to Seaford, Delaware. Here they found a place of fellowship and service in many of the organized activities of the community. At the time of his death, Brother Knicely was Secretary of the Blades Lions Club and Chaplain of Post No. 6, The American Legion of Seaford. A few months before his death he had been appointed a Police Magistrate by the Governor of Delaware with an office in Seaford. In this position he applied the understanding of a Christian heart and used the experiences of years in the ministry to bring real help to people in trouble. Help that went farther than mere judicial decisions, help that reached in many cases into the heart of the problem and sought to show a better way of life to the men and women who were brought before him.

Upon moving to Seaford, Brother Kniceley placed his quarterly Conference membership in St. John's Church, and became a regular participant in the activities of the Church, ever willing to teach a class, assist in a service, or speak a good word for his Church. Many of the ministers of the Conference called upon him to fill their pulpits, and he was never happier than when he had such an opportunity to serve his Lord. During these months Asa Kniceley was my next door neighbor, brother Minister and very real friend. The people of St. John's Church join with those of the parishes he served in his active days in mourning his death.

On March 14, 1955, Brother Kniceley underwent major surgery at Peninsula General Hospital, Salisbury. Complications following the operation made multiple transfusions necessary. In spite of more than twenty-five pints of a rare type blood, and a magnificent demonstration of concern on the part of Doctors, Nurses, Hospital staff, as well as of friends all over the Delmarva Peninsula who sought blood and offered aid, he expired on the morning of the 15th, answering the call of God to come home.

Funeral services were conducted at St. Johnstown Church, Greenwood, on March 18, 1955 by his pastor, The Reverend R. Jervis Cooke, and the Greenwood minister, The Reverend Harry H. Connor. His body was laid to rest in the St. Johnstown cemetery.

#### GEORGE ALBERT MORRIS

Brother Morris married Miss Sadie Merrill of Wilmington, Delaware, November 1895. She departed this life in March. 1918.

On April 25, 1921 Rev. Morris married Miss Minnie Adkins of Salisbury, Maryland.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Minnie Morris, a son, Albert K. Morris and three grandchildren, George Albert Morris II; Miss Dorothy Ellen and Miss Linda Lee Morris.

On June 30, 1954 he met with an accident which later caused his death on August 2, 1954. Services were conducted at the Hill and Johnson Funeral Parlors, Salisbury, Maryland on August 5, 1954 by Rev. A. J. Jackson, D.D., Rev. H. Norman Nicklas and the writer. Interment was at Pittsville, Maryland.

#### JOHN PERRY OUTTEN

Although he confided this to no one, the Church soon realized his usefulness, and gave him license to exhort, and soon after, license to preach. His Pastor strongly urged him to begin preparation for the Ministry at once. The boy Preacher was appointed teacher of the First Bible Class of men, and

given about all the Church work he could do. It was his desire to go away to school at once, but his father and mother were old and afflicted, his brothers and sisters were all grown and gone from home, and he felt it to be his duty to stay on the farm and care for the Old Folks until an unmarried older brother could come and relieve him. He then attended the Conference Academy, taking the four year course in three years, graduating from the Conference course of Study in 1898 and from the University of Chicago in 1899. His interest in his studies, however, did not obscure his judgment in more vital things and he succeeded in persuading Miss Lida R. Wiley of Seaford, Delaware to become his companion for life, the sharer of its joys and sorrows. They were married April 15, 1891. Of that happy union were born four children; Lawrence Randolph, Maynard Carlisle, Granville Wiley and Mary Marguerite, now Mrs. Edward H. Burke. Throughout the vicissitudes and changes, the sorrows and bereavements, the joys and blessings and victories of an itinerant's life, they have faithfully kept their vows, and travelled the long journey hand in hand together. On April 15, 1941, they celebrated their Golden Wedding, with their family and friends; and

others, to help them celebrate the sixtieth anniversary of their marriage.

Brother Outten was evangelistic in spirit. He wrote his sermons in full, then left them at home and usually preached without notes. He held revivals on all the charges which he served, and in this way, built up the church membership. He built and completed four churches and a parsonage, solemnized hundreds of marriages and baptized hundreds of children, preached more than 5000 sermons, made more than ten thousand pastoral visits, and attended Annual Conference for more than fifty consecutive years.

#### BERTHA CASE COOKE

Bertha Case Cooke, daughter of Herman and Louisa Coffin Case, was born in Chatfield, Minnesota on July 5, 1867. After graduating from the high school there, she began teaching at the age of sixteen. Not being able to enter college, she determined to get an education through reading. She took the four years' course in Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Work, after which she received her diploma in 1890. Then she did several years of post-graduate work. In her "Memories" written for her children, she writes,—"This gave me the equivalent of a college education but without the associates and friends one gets in actual college attendance. Without

knowing it at the time, I can see how it helped to fit me for the place I was later to fill in a parsonage."

She was married on November 15, 1892, in Austin, Minnesota, to the Reverend George A. Cooke, who was pastor of the Methodist Church in Dodge Center, Minnesota. She was always a loyal companion and took an active part in the churches served by her husband. She loved her Saviour and she loved people and took great joy in showing that love through service. The one submitting this memoir once had the blessed privilege of living in her home for a while, at which time she proved to be a real friend and mother to him. Probably the influence of this genuinely Christian home had much to do with his answering the call to the ministry.

Mrs. Cooke is survived by two sons and two daughters, nine grand-children, and seven great-grandchildren. Her sons are, Raymond Ward Cooke, a minister in the Baltimore Conference, and Don Alvin Cooke, a minister in the Florida Conference, and at present District Superintendent of the Jacksonville District. Her daughters are Evelyn Reynolds, wife of Paul Reynolds, pastor of New Castle Methodist Church, and Lucile Ogden. also of New Castle. R. Jervis Cooke, pastor of St. John's Church, Seaford. Following the death of her husband in 1936, Mrs. Cooke spent most of her time with her children. For seventeen years she had been spending a part of each summer at Brandywine Summit Camp and was very much interested in all of the activities there. The Willard Union, of which she was a member, had the white ribbon service at her funeral.

A young man was sent to the Berryville charge to be their minister, and on June 5, 1888, Lula Boxwell became the bride of the Rev. J. Harry Wilson. They reared four children, three of whom survive: Charles Frederick, Harry Clark, and J. Seward.

The Wilsons gave freely of their services in a number of other charges, including Parksley, Virginia; Houston, Delaware; Preston, Maryland; Hoopers Island; Georgetown Circuit; Beckwith, Maryland; Sharptown, Maryland; Mt. # REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

For Receiving Local Preacher's License, Annual Conference Membership and Ministerial Orders in The Peninsula Conference.

- 1. It is the policy of The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications to follow the disciplinary requirements. Therefore this Board:
  - a. Requires that all necessary documents be presented to the Board before it officially will interview applicants for recommendation for Admission on Trial. However, the Board will always be available for guidance.
- b. Refuses to recommend any candidate who has not fulfilled all disciplinary requirements according to the rules of the Board.
  - c. Will oppose the election of such candidates in the Executive Session.
- 2. Summarized Procedures required by The Methodist Discipline, 1952; and The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications of The Peninsula Conference.
  - a. Procedures For Obtaining A Local Preacher's License:
    - 1) Remember Paragraph 302, The Methodist Discipline: "No member of the Church shall be at liberty to preach without a license."
    - 2) Since The Peninsula Annual Conference holds District Conferences, a person desiring a Local Preacher's License must take the following steps: (Paragraph 303, 1, The Methodist Discipline, 1952)
      - a) Secure the recommendation of the Quarterly Conference of the Church of which he is a member.
      - Appear before, and secure the written approval of, The District Committee On Ministerial Qualifications (Paragraph 672, The Methodist Discipline 1952)
      - c) Pass satisfactory written examinations in the studies prescribed for candidates for License to Preach.
      - d) Be examined on the subjects of Doctrine and Discipline.
      - e) Agree to abstain from the use of tobacco and other indulgences which may injure his influence.
- b. Procedures For Retaining A Local Preacher's License:
  - 1) Make a report by October 1 to the District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications concerning activities during the past year and desire for renewal of Local Preacher's License.
  - 2) A minimum of four books should be read each year by Local Preachers who are not taking The Conference Course of Study: two in the field of doctrine, two in the field of preaching. The Report to The District Board of Ministerial Qualifications should contain a list of the books read in these fields during the year.

- c. Procedures For Receiving Annual Conference Membership:
- 1) On Trial: AMARIAN TO GRADE THE TO SECTION TO
  - a) Present a recommendation duly signed by-
    - (1) The president and secretary of The District Conference.
    - (2) Or by the chairman and secretary of The District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications.
  - Pass a written examination in Studies Prescribed For Candidates For Admission On Trial.
- (1) Graduates of Accredited Colleges who are also graduates of Accredited Schools of Theology shall be exempt from examination in The Conference Course Of Study (Paragraph 325)
- (2) Including examinations in Methodist History, Polity and Doctrine if they can furnish credentials in the same Text, or its equivalent, from their Seminary. (Paragraph 325)
  - c) Deposit with the registrar of The Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications:
    - (1) Approved Permanent Record forms containing satisfactory written answers to questions as to age, religious and Church experience, Call to the Ministry, educational record, educational plans, etc.
    - (2) Approved Physical Examination form. This physical examination must be taken in the Clinic of The Memorial Hospital, Wilmington, Delaware, or with Dr. David Gilmore, Salisbury. Md.
  - d) Must be a graduate of an approved Liberal Arts College. Under extraordinary circumstances, The Annual Conference, by a three-fourths vote, may admit a candidate in accordance with the provisions of The Discipline.
  - e) Must have had one full year's work in a Theological Seminary accredited by the University Senate.
  - 2) Full Membership:
    - a) Must be a graduate of a Theological Seminary accredited by the University Senate. At least one year of Seminary work should be done in a Methodist Seminary. Where it has not been, then special work shall be required to secure adequate instruction in Methodist History, Doctrine and Policy.
    - b) Must have had two years' successive appointment-
      - In Itinerant Work on Circuits or in Stations after being received on Trial.
      - (2) Or Instructor in one of our Institutions of Learning after having been received on Trial.

- c) Must have been elected to Deacon's Orders
- d) Must answer in open Conference the 19 Disciplinary Questions.
- e) Must present a recently issued Certificate of good physical health. (See 1C) 2) above)
- d. Procedures For Receiving Ministerial Orders:
  - 1) Deacons:

- a) Have authority to:
  - (1) Preach
  - (2) Conduct Divine Worship
  - (3) Perform the Marriage Ceremony
  - (4) Administer Baptism
  - (5) Assist an Elder in Administering The Lord's Supper.
- b) Eligibility:
  - (1) Local Preachers:
    - (a) Must have been Local Preachers for four consecutive years.
    - (b) Must present to the Annual Conference a recommendation for Deacon's Orders from The District Conference.
- (c) Must have completed satisfactorily the Studies prescribed for Local Preachers who are candidate for Deacon's Orders.
  - (2) Approved Supply Pastors:
    - (a) Must have been approved supply pastors in regular service for two full years.
- (b) Must have completed—
  - The first two years of The Conference Course of Study.
  - 2. The Studies indicated for Reception on Trial.
  - (3) Members on Trial in The Course of Study:
    - (a) Must have been on Trial in The Annual Conference two years.
      - (b) Must have completed satisfactorily the first two years of the Conference Course.
  - (4) Seminary Students:
    - (a) Must have been Local Preachers two full years.
    - (b) Must have completed one-third of Degree Course in Approved Seminary.
    - (c) Must have been Received on Trial
  - 2) Elders:
    - a) Have Authority to:

- (1) Preach
- (2) Conduct Divine Worship
- (3) Administer the Sacraments of Baptism and The Lord's Supper.
- (4) Perform the Marriage Ceremony.

#### b) Eligibility:

- (1) Local Preachers:
  - (a) Must have been Local Deacons for two consecutive years.
  - (b) Or have served as regularly appointed pastors for two full years after having been ordained deacons.
  - (c) Must present recommendation for Elder's Orders from District Conference.
  - (d) Must have completed satisfactorily the studies prescribed for Local Deacons who are candidates for Elder's Orders.

## (2) Approved Supply Pastors:

- (a) Must have been ordained Deacons.
- (b) Must have been serving as regular approved supply pastors for one full year since their ordination.
- (c) Must have satisfactorily completed the third year of the Conference Course.
- (d) The fourth year in the Conference Course must be completed within two years if the candidate is to be continued as an approved supply pastor.
- (3) Local Deacons: (Who have been Received on Trial)
  - (a) Must be in Full Connection in The Annual Conference.
  - (b) Must have been Local Deacons one year immediately preceding such election.
  - (c) Must have completed satisfactorily the studies prescribed for Local Elder's Orders.
- (4) Conference Members in The Conference Course:
  - (a) Must have been in Full Connection in The Annual Conference for one year.
  - (b) Must also have been Deacons for the same time.
  - (c) Must also have completed satisfactorily The Conference Course.

#### (5) Seminary Students:

- (a) Must have been received on Trial.
- (b) Must have been elected to the office of Deacon.
- (c) Must have been Deacons at least one year.
- (d) Must have been admitted into Full Connection.

- e. Procedures For Ministers Coming From Other Churches:
  - 1) Pre-requisites:

1955

- a) Must have come from other Evangelical Churches.
- b) Must present suitable testimonials of good standing.
- Must give assurances of their Faith, Christian experience, other qualifications.
- d) Must give evidence of their agreement with us in Doctrine and Discipline.
- e) Must present a certificate of good health.
- 2) Possible Ways of Being Received:
  - a) Quarterly Conference may receive them as Local Preachers:
    - Pending recognition of their Orders by Annual Conference, they are not entitled to administer the Sacraments.
    - (2) The Annual Conference may recognize their Orders as Local Deacons or Local Elders provided they pass satisfactorily the Studies for Local Preachers.
  - b) District Conference may recommend them:
    - (1) Annual Conference may then-
      - (a) Recognize their Orders.
      - (b) Receive them into Conference Membership.
    - (2) At its discretion may require them to take a part or all of the Conference Course of Study.
  - c) Annual Conference may receive their application directly:
    - If they can meet the educational standards required of Methodist Ministers.
    - (2) If their credentials are recognized, they may be received into Membership on Trial, or in Full.
    - (3) Must answer satisfactorily the Disciplinary Questions of Par. 321, 343.
    - (4) Those from other than Methodist Churches must take upon themselves our Ordination Vows without the reimposition of hands.
  - d) Annual Conference:
    - (1) May receive on equal standing preachers who are on Trial in the ministry of another Methodist Church.
    - (2) Before admitting them to full membership, special care must be used to see that their examinations are satisfactory.
- 3. Other Specific Regulations:
- a. Examinations:
- 1) At the meeting of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications on March 16, 1953, it was voted that—

- a) All candidates for Local Preacher's License shall be required to send the written work required in the 1952 Students' Handbook to the indicated members of The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, and to take the examinations from those same Board Members at the indicated time.
- b) All studies in The Conference Course beyond the Local Preacher's License Course, covering Admission on Trial, and the studies outlined for the four year course, or their equivalents, shall be taken—
  - (1) In an accredited Theological Seminary if at all possible.
  - (2) In Summer Schools of accredited Theological Seminaries.
  - (3) Or by correspondence through the Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Georgia.
- 2) Books and Examiners for License to Preach:

The Bible: The Books of Matthew, Mark, Luke, John—P. E. Reynolds, 523 Delaware Ave., New Castle, Delaware.

Cherry: The Beliefs Of A Methodist Christian—W. H. Revelle, Jr., Chestertown, Md.

Martin: To Fulfill This Ministry—J. B. Vaughn, Pittsville, Md. Church: Knight Of The Burning Heart—H. O. Wilkins, Middletown, Delaware.

- 3) Place: Wesley Junior College, Dover, Delaware.
- 4) Time:
  - a) Monday, October 17, 1955, 10:00 A. M.
  - b) Monday, March 12, 1956, 10:00 A. M.
- 5) Procedures:
  - a) Written work for each Book, as required by the 1952 Discipline and outlined in the 1952 Student's Handbook—
    - 1) Shall be sent to the Examiner
      - a) Before October 1 if October examinations are desired.
      - b) Before March 1 if March examinations are desired.
    - 2) Failure to meet this schedule forfeits the right to take the examination until the next scheduled date.
  - b) Examinations shall be in writing, both questions and answers.
  - c) The grade of 70 is required for passing. All papers submitted will be examined with reference to the use of English. Grammatical construction as well as the subject matter shall be taken into account in determining the grade in each subject.
- b) Personal Interviews:
  - 1) Each candidate for Admission on Trial, and for Admission into Full Membership, must appear before the Executive Committee of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications at Wesley Junior

College, Dover, Delaware, Monday, March 12, 1956 for personal interviews concerning his qualifications and fitness for the Christian Ministry. Each candidate will be contacted concerning the hour of his interview.

- Notification of intention to appear before the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications shall be sent to the Registrar at least ten days before this meeting.
- c) A recently issued certificate of good health shall be required of each candidate for admission on Trial, and another when he applies for Admission into Full Membership.
  - This certification shall be on the comprehensive Form provided by The Commission on Ministerial Training, and may be secured from the Registrar.
  - 2) The examination must be taken through the Clinic of The Memorial Hospital, Wilmington, Delaware or with Dr. David Gilmore, Salisbury, Md. Arrangements for examinations should be made at least three weeks before the March Meeting of The Board.
- d) By action of the 1955 Session of the Conference, during the Conference year 1955-56 candidates for Full Membership and Reception on Trial will be given psychological tests.
  - 1) The date for these tests is being set for Monday, February 6, 1956, and will be administered at Newark, Delaware. Each candidate will be contacted concerning the hour of his tests for February 6 or, if necessary, on another date.
  - 2) Interviews concerning the tests are being set for Monday, February 27, 1956, and will be arranged by appointment with each candidate for February 27, or if necessary, on another date.
  - The purpose of the psychological testing is to provide counsel and guidance for the candidates.
- e) The Methodist Schools of Theology, at the direction of The Commission on Ministerial Training, are establishing Summer Schools for Approved Supply Pastors in the Course of Study. We recommend these Schools. Free Scholarships are available for Approved Supply Pastors who are graduates of High Schools. The one in The Westminister Theological Seminary will be held from June 13 to July 1, 1955.
- f) Probationers in the Conference are reminded that The Discipline allows two years only On Trial for the purpose of annuity upon retirement. Par. 321, 331. Members in full connection should read Par. 345-347. Approved Supply Pastors should read Par. 315-320.
- g) Books for the Conference Course of Study may be purchased at The Methodist Publishing House, 516 North Charles Street, Baltimore 3, Maryland.

# MISCELLANEOUS

## (a) CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

- Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 9.00 A. M., and adjourn at 12.30 P.
   M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3. All resolutions and motions shall be in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.
- Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5. The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
  - (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
    - (2) To Adjourn.
  - (3) To take a recess.
- (4) To lay on the table.
  - (5) For the previous question.
  - (6) To postpone to a given time.
  - (7) To refer.
  - (8) To substitute.
  - (9) Amendment.
  - (10) To postpone indefinitely.
  - A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.
- Rule 7. When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

- Rule 9. When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conterence; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration: but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15. It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17. All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.
- Rule 18. No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19. These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
