Recommendations were read and adopted on motion of H. A. Bailey that they be subject to the perusal of the Board of Education. (See VI. B-7.) Recommendations, from Study of Local Church Programs to Serve Families.

The new conference director of youth work, Edwin L. Ellis, was presented. He announced the program of summer activities that have been planned for youth.

Report of Committee on Christian Vocations was read by Miss Florence Wilson. Recommendation 6 was referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance. Other recommendations were adopted. (See VI. B-14.)

Credentials accrediting Trevor C. Jones as minister of Christian education were presented by Bishop Love.

Board of Hospitals and Homes report was submitted by C. B. Miles, E. A. Hughes and J. C. Hardcastle. Recommendations 1, 2, 3, and 6 were adopted. Directors, as nominated, were elected. Recommendation 5 was referred to Commission on World Service and Finance. (See VI. B-11.) The Reverend George H. Purgen, Peninsula Conference, was guest speaker.

Golden Cross Enrollment was conducted by Mrs. L. Beatrice Dorsey, director of the Society.

After announcements, Benediction was pronounced by C. B. Miles, and the afternoon session was adjourned.

EVENING SESSION-7:30 P. M.

Devotions were led by Amos P. Jenkins.

Films of former sessions of the Delaware Conference were shown by Mr. Charles Long of Tindley Temple with narration by David W. Briddell.

Sermon was delivered by Claude A. Edmonds. Subject, "Hearing God Speak"; text, 1 Samuel 3:10. Ushers of John Wesley Methodist Church, Philadelphia served and the choir rendered music for the evening. Benediction was pronounced by C. A. Edmonds.

THURSDAY, MAY 24, 1962-MORNING SESSION

Lay Delegates' Meeting at First Colored Wesley Methodist Church was called to order and devotions were led by Miss Florence Wilson. Hally P. Johns, lay leader, presided over the business session. Information was presented on the Study Conference held in Cincinnati, Ohio, March 26-28, 1962.

Executive Session: Devotions were led by C. W. D. Browne. Psalms 19 was read and the hymns, "Jesus, the Very Thought of Thee" and "O Master, Let me Walk With Thee," were sung.

Report of Board of Ministerial Training was presented by D. R. Fletcher, registrar, and adopted. (See IV. The Disciplinary Questions, Part II, 21-33.)

The Registrar urged the district Boards of Ministerial Training to deal honestly with problems of qualifications before candidates are referred to the Conference Board. An approved supply pastor must be a high school graduate and under 35 years old when placed on the list. An approved supply pastor must have six years of consecutive service before being admitted on trial into the Conference.

D. R. Fletcher, on behalf of the Board of Ministerial Training offered the following recommendation: We recommend that all ministerial candidates receiving aid from the Inter-board Scholarship Committee be required to give three years of ministerial service to the Delaware Conference. If the recipient desires not to enter the Delaware Conference or fails to give three full years of service thereto, the grant becomes a loan, and is to be repaid. Recommendation was defeated by vote of 40 aye; 41 no.

Report of Committee on Conference Relations, presented by C. E. Kiah, was adopted. (See IV. The Disciplinary Questions, II. 34-43 and VI. B-1.)

Conference Session: Devotions, led by W. R. Mayberry, chairman of the Board of Evangelism, marked the beginning of the presentation of the Board of Evangelism. Dr. Harry Denman, general secretary of the Board of Evangelism, was presented by C. W. Derrickson, conference secretary of evangelism. The subject of Dr. Denman's sermon was, "I Am the Bread of Life"; text, John 6:34-39.

Dr. Denman was requested to convey congratulations from the Delaware Conference to Bishop and Mrs. Charles F. Golden on the occasion of their twenty-fifth wedding anniversary celebration in Nashville, Tennessee.

Resolution requesting the Conference to affirm its adherence to the statement of principles and adopt the recommendations of the Cincinnati Study Conference was read by E. H. Crampton on behalf of the Board of Christian

Social Concerns. Resolution was discussed and would be presented for action on Friday morning, May 25. (See Resolution 4.)

Visitors Presented: Thomas H. Burress, executive secretary, and Mrs. Regina B. Hewlett, general membership chairman, of the Philadelphia Branch of the NAACP were introduced by H. H. Nichols. Both spoke regarding the work of the NAACP in Philadelphia in seeking to solve problems facing the Negro.

Committee on Courtesy presented the following visitors: From the Washington Conference—J. B. A. Dyson, F. L. Williams, F. D. Foy, E. P. Clark, K. L. Jackson, R. C. Williams, C. E. Briggs, C. E. Queen, W. E. Bishop, T. H. Brooks, R. E. White, E. G. Carroll, W. E. Williams, and H. E. Dixon. Others presented were: G. E. Davis, R. Collier, G. Davis, G. E. Lipson, J. H. Larkins, and J. H. Powell.

Noon Message was delivered by J. B. A. Dyson, district superintendent of the North Baltimore District, Washington Conference.

AFTERNOON SESSION-2:30 P.M.

Missionary Service: H. D. Davis presided, assisted by Mrs. Clarissa D. Walker, O. H. Spence, W. R. Mayberry, and R. L. Cordery. The Missionary Sermon was delivered by Edward H. Holmes; subject, "The Mission of the Church in an Age of Crisis." Music was rendered by the Ministers' Wives.

Board of Evangelism: C. W. Derrickson was re-elected secretary of evangelism. Recommendations, read by W. R. Mayberry, were adopted. (See Report VI. B-8.)

Proposed Conference Rules XXXV and XXXVI were read by W. C. Strother, in accordance with rule XIX. Copies were distributed to members for study before voting on Friday.

Report of Golden Cross Society, read by Mrs. L. Beatrice Dorsey, director, was adopted. (See Report VI. B-12.) She reported \$166 collected on the previous day for Golden Cross enrollments.

Report of Commission on World Service and Finance was read by F. D. Jones. Motion by D. R. Fletcher to adopt the report section by section was approved.

On motion of D. R. Fletcher, the chaiman of the Commission on World Service is to interview each treasurer of the various boards and agencies receiving funds from the conference treasurer to see if they are properly bonded and report to the Commission.

On request of H. D. Davis, Board of Missions was removed from section III and placed under section I.

On request of C. L. Carrington, action on item 10, section I, was suspended until the report of Board of Christian Social Concerns has been heard.

Section I was adopted with exception of item 10.

Bishop Love stated that a directive was passed in 1949, recorded in Journal of that year, for the use of the conference treasurer in disbursement of receipts.

On motion of A. Chancy, action on item 22, section III was deferred until the report of Town and Country Commission has been presented. On request of Bishop Love, action on item 27, section III was deferred until Committee on Emancipation Proclamation Celebration reports.

On motion of H. H. Nichols, action on item 29, section III, was deferred until report of Board of Pensions has been heard.

W. C. Jason moved that \$200 be appropriated for the Historical Society. Request of H. D. Davis that \$500 be appropriated for study team of the Conference Board of Missions was referred to Commission on World Service and Finance.

Corrections: Section I, item 8, M instead of E; Section III, item 30, requested budget for 1962-63, \$425 instead of \$300; Section IV, item 7, 5% of pastor's cash salary.

Added Items: Section III, item 37, Methodist Center Project, \$15,000 over two years period; item 38, Matching Fund Drive, \$30,000; item 39, Historical Society, \$200. (See VI. B-2.)

On motion of D. R. Fletcher, the order of the day for Saturday, 10:30 A.M. will be reception of ministerial members on trial and into full connection.

Benediction was pronounced by F. D. Jones and afternoon session was adjourned.

EVENING SESSION-7:15 P.M.

Anniversary of the Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. Carrie W. Henry, presided. Mrs. Beatrice Conway presented Miss Theressa Hoover, associate secretary of the Department of Christian Social Relations, Woman's Division of Christian Service. The subject of Miss Hoover's address was, "Our Mission Today." Music was rendered by the Wesleyan Service Guild Chorus of Tindley Temple.

Anniversary of the Board of Missions: Brief reports, including showing of slides, were presented by H. H. Nichols and C. L. Carrington who had participated in the Visitation-Evangelism Mission to Alaska in February. This Mission was sponsored by the Division of National Missions and General Board of Evangelism.

Mortgage Burning Ceremony was conducted by Bishop Love for churches having burned mortgages during the past year.

The ushers of Emmanuel Methodist Church served and the choir rendered music for the evening.

Benediction was pronounced by C. L. Carrington.

FRIDAY, MAY 25, 1962-MORNING SESSION-9:00 A.M.

Devotions were led by L. H. Purnell.

Conference Session was called to order by the Bishop.

Committee on Journal report, made by F. D. Arnold, that minutes for Wednesday and Thursday were perused and necessary corrections made, was accepted.

Report of the Committee to Study Minimum Salary was read by D. W.

Briddell. After discussion, report was adopted on motion of D. R. Fletcher with the following additions and deletions to recommendations: delete from #4, "in an instance wherein the spouse is gainfully employed or"; add #11. That a local church shall be reapportioned the next conference year any unpaid amount for minimum salary within a conference year. We further recommend that the provisions of paragraph 823, Methodist Discipline, regarding minimum salary as an essential part of the proportional payment of ministerial support, be practiced by all pastoral charges. Add a third possible solution: #2 being, speed our efforts wherever possible and feasible, to effect mergers and consolidation of churches that are unable to give adequate support to a minister. Change amount for pension purposes from \$3,101 to \$3,398. Under recommendations 1 and 2, add "a minimum" before per annum. (See VI. B-19.)

Report of the Minimum Salary Fund, read by Miss F. G. Wilson, was adopted. (See VI. B-18.)

Board of Missions report read by R. L. Cordery and H. D. Davis. Error under Loans and Donations noted by G. O. Commodore. Correction—change amount of loan from \$12,000 to \$15,000 and amount of donation from \$7,500 to \$4,500 for Mt. Zion Church, Pocomoke City. On motion of H. H. Nichols, the Conference-wide Week of Missions was set for October 8-12, 1962. On motion of H. H. Nichols, the request from the Board of Missions for \$500 for Conference Study Team was referred to Commission on World Service and Finance with instructions to approve. Report and recommendations were adopted. (See VI. B-5.) H. D. Davis was nominated and re-elected conference missionary secretary.

Visitors were introducted by Bishop Love. Dr. Charles B. Copher, professor at Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Ga., and Dr. William H. Smith, vice-president of Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D.C., spoke in the interest of their respective seminaries after being presented, Rev. George M. Curry, representing The Methodist Publishing House, urged increased use of the facilities provided for meeting the needs of Methodists.

Telegram, received from John W. Handy, Jr. stating his inability to attend Conference due to duties as chaplain, was read.

On motion of D. R. Fletcher, the afternoon session would begin at 2 o'clock today as requested by the Bishop.

Report of Area Administrative Secretary: D. L. Ridout requested the Conference to read his report on Group Insurance in the Daily Bulletin. (See VI. C-2.) He then read a tribute to Bishop and Mrs. Edgar A. Love on the occasion of tenth anniversary of tenure in the Episcopacy and as resident Bishop of the Baltimore Area. The members of the Conference stood in honor of their Bishop and his wife. (See VI. C-3.)

Report of the Ministers' Wives Association for Conference Claimants Fund: W. C. Strother presented Mrs. H. A. Bailey, president of the Association. Mrs. Bailey expressed appreciation to ministers' wives, ministers and laymen for wholehearted cooperation. The report was presented as follows by district superintendents' wives:

Rev. Kenneth F. Thompson of the General Board was presented. He spoke briefly of the progress of the pension program of The Methodist Church and of our Conference in entering into the general pension plan.

Noon Message was delivered by the Reverend Dr. Robert A. Raines, pastor of First Methodist Church, Germantown, Philadelphia. He spoke on the Grace of God.

Benediction was pronounced by Rev. Robert Raines.

AFTERNOON SESSION-2:00 P.M.

Devotions were led by Carlton H. Parker.

Business Session was called to order by Bishop Love.

Treasurer's Report, read by J. E. Dunn, was adopted subject to the report of the auditor. (See Statistical Tables.)

On motion of F. D. Arnold, the treasurer's report is to be mimeographed and distributed to conference members next year in order to follow report as read by Treasurer.

Motion was approved for strict observance of Conference Rule XXV on ending of fiscal year and sending of pastors' reports to treasurer and statistician.

List of pastors sending late reports was requested by Bishop.

Statistician's Report, read by S. E. Parker, was adopted. (See Statistical Tables.) Statistician stated that next year's report blanks will include additional information, namely, number of people over 65 years and number of tithers.

The Bishop urged pastors to be more accurate in making reports.

Bishop complimented the Secretary on the compiling of an excellent Conference Journal.

Board of Pensions report was made by J. H. C. Kelly and W. C. Strother. Adopted. (See VI. B-6.) A check for \$3,285.79 from The Methodist Publishing

House for pensions was acknowledged. W. C. Strother announced that the first two hundred Reserve Pension Fund stamps have been distributed, one hundred each to Bishop Love and Rev. Kenneth Thompson. The stamps are to be sold by local churches to help raise the deficit needed to enter the Reserve Pension Plan.

Rev. Kenneth Thompson greeted the Conference and spoke briefly of the group insurance plan sponsored by the General Board of Pensions.

Meritorious Service Awards were presented by Elmer P. Gibson, president of Morristown College, to the Delaware Conference for support of higher education and to Daniel L. Ridout for significant contribution in the field of music. On motion of Elwood Jewett, the certificate presented to the Conference is to be framed and hung in the church which will be the seat of the Annual Conference session.

Board of Christian Social Concerns: Rev. Richard Stazesky, chairman of the Peninsula Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns, was introduced and brought greetings. C. L. Carrington also presented Rev. Lloyd Durean, who spoke briefly, Rev. Levi B. Miller and Mr. Gloster B. Current of the New York East Conference. Dr. A. Dudley Ward, General Board of Christian Social Concerns, was presented and addressed the Conference briefly on making The Methodist Church an inclusive church.

Report of the Board was read by E. H. Crampton. (See VI. B-13.) Recommendations were read. Numbers 1 and 4 were adopted.

On motion of J. W. Elbert, Number 2 was referred to Commission on World Service and Finance. On request of D. R. Fletcher, action on number 3 was deferred until action was taken on the resolution to adopt the recommendations of the Central Jurisdiction Study Committee.

Resolution to Approve the Statement of Principles and Recommendations of the Central Jurisdiction Study Committee was adopted, 161-27, (See Resolution 4.) Recommendation 3 was adopted.

Town and Country Report, read by Augustus Chancy, was adopted. Recommendations, read by E. A. Hughes, were adopted. The financial request of \$1,525 for the Commission for 1962-63 was referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance. (See VI. B-15.)

On motion of Augustus Chancy, Nathaniel Miller, Roland Henry and Kenneth Cottman were added to the Commission.

At the request of Bishop Love, on motion of H. H. Nichols a business session would be held from 7 to 8 P.M.

Benediction was pronounced by J. E. Licorish and afternoon session was adjourned.

EVENING SESSION-7:00 P.M.

Devotions were led by John W. Coleman. This period of meditation was conducted with brief talks, songs and music based on the theme, "Jesus Christ Is Lord." Mrs. Marilyn Coleman was soloist with J. Russell Robinson at the organ.

Business Session was called to order by Bishop Love.

Report of the Committee to Study the Feasibility of Reducing the Number of Districts in the Delaware Conference was read by M. O. Ballard. After much discussion, the motion to adopt the report was defeated.

Report of Board of Trustees was read by M. O. Ballard. The report with recommendations were adopted. (See VI. B-10.) Motion that the money received from sale of abandoned property at Camden, Deleware, be used within the Dover District for other church property was approved.

The death of Roland Grant, pastor at Bridgeville, Del. who became ill during afternoon session, was announced. On motion of H. H. Nichols, moments of silent prayer for the family of the late Rev. Grant, were observed.

Anniversary of Board of Education: A drama was presented by the Conference Council of Children's workers. Participants were Mrs. Emma W. Strother, Rev. E. L. Ellis, Mrs. Pearl Spence, Mrs. Alberta Brown, Mrs. Louise Purnell, Miss Elsie Young, Mrs. Pauline LeCompte, and Mrs. Anna N. Elzey. Music was rendered by the Junior Choir of Janes Methodist Church, Germantown under the direction of Mrs. Delores Carter.

Address delivered by Dr. P. G. Gould of the Alaska Methodist University. Music was rendered by choir of Janes Church, Germantown. Ushers of Janes also served.

Devotions were led by Kenneth H. Greene.

Conference Session was called to order by Bishop Love.

Committee on Journal report made by F. D. Arnold. Minutes of previous day had been perused and corrections made. Motion to adopt was approved.

Proposed Rules of Order, presented by W. C. Strother for action. Proposed rule regarding election to elders orders was adopted. (See Rule XXXII.) Proposed rule regarding membership on boards, commissions, and committees of ministers in retired relation was adopted with amendment—"those retired ministers who are serving on a quadrennial committee upon entering retired relation may complete the term for which they were elected." (See Rule XXXIII.)

EVENING SESSION-7:30 P.M.

Devotions were led by Ewart C. Hackshaw.

Anniversary of Board of Lay Activities: Roy L. Cordery presided. A dramatic discussion of the role of the layman in the local church was presented followed by question and answer period.

Board of Christian Social Concerns Anniversary: C. L. Carrington presided. E. H. Crampton, director, presented Mr. Roger Burgess, associate secretary, General Board of Christian Social Concerns, who addressed the Conference. The address centered about three basic questions—Why should the Church be concerned? What are we concerned about? What are we doing about our concerns?

C. A. Edmonds, chairman of Temperance and General Welfare, urged that more workshops be held for increased activity in this area. H. M. Deas, chairman of Peace and World Order, gave an itinerary of the coming trip with other Methodists to Europe and Russia. Music was furnished by the choir of Haven Methodist Church. A. The District Superintendents' Reports

COMPOSITE REPORT

Bishop Love, Ministers and Laymen:

In accordance with legislation enacted at the 1958 Session of the Delaware Conference, we, your District Superintendents, are de-

lighted to present our fourth composite report.

While it falls my lot to read this report, it is not mine, rather it represents the essence of information secured by your District Superintendents. Further it sets forth ideals and goals which each of us cherish and under which we render our services.

As we attempt to highlight the achievements of the past year our hearts beat with humility and gratitude. Humility, because we have missed the mark and fallen short of God's design for our lives. Gratitude, in that despite all of our failures God has blessed our efforts and "the gospel is bearing fruit and expanding throughout the civilized world."

Evangelism

Evangelism is the heart of the Christian Church. It is vital to her strength and progress. Jesus stated His purpose for coming into the world "I am come to seek and to save that which is lost." Those who profess to be His faithful followers can do no less. We need to proclaim God's redemptive power to our sin sick world today. The church must evangelize or lose its power and fail in its true mission.

All around us are homes which do not have a single Christian within their walls. Numerous young couples attempt to establish homes in which God's presence is unknown. Multitudes slumber in darkness while others experience emptiness in their lives and are unable to find reality and meaning in life. We face the rivalry of ancient pagan faiths, the mad race for space supremacy, military might, the gods of science, fall out shelters. Some turn to antibiotics, some seek tranquilizers, but we affirm that evangelism is the answer. People need to learn that they need God. They need a personal acquaintance with Him.

We have done well, but not quite well enough. There are signs of growing enthusiasm and stronger efforts in the area of evangelism. Reports show that there have been convocations, workshops, mass evangelism, Youth Christian Witness Missions, Prayer Vigils, Conferences on Discipleship, Spiritual Life Missions, on district, subdistrict and local church levels. Many local churches have organized

"The Twelve."

The Bishop's Evangelistic Crusade failed to reach the proposed goal. We are happy to report that during the Crusade 3,891 non-

Christians were contacted, 726 were received on profession of faith 224 were transferred and 229 were restored. The total members

added to our churches were 1,223.

We recommend and strongly urge every local church Commission on Membership and Evangelism to see that the membership rolls and records are properly kept. Accurate records are desirable, however, we suggest that no name be dropped from a membership roll, except by death or transfer until every possible effort has been made to find the person, invite and seek to revitalize his life in the Christian fellowship of the local church. Let us put renewed emphasis upon caring for rather than neglecting and dropping members by action of Quarterly Conferences.

We urge our ministers to know God through personal involvement. Preach for a verdict. Proclaim the glad tidings that Jesus Christ is Lord. Select, train and inspire more laymen to be effective evangelists. Keep ever before our people that the business of the church is to seek souls and help them toward God. "The fields are white unto harvest but the laborers are few, pray to the Lord of the harvest that He will send more laborers into His harvest."

Christian Education

"The work of Christian education undergirds the total program of The Methodist Church. The church school, which is the whole local church at its educational task, serves every facet of the life and work of the church. Its teaching program deals with all areas

of Christian living."

The problem of educating our children, youth and adults in the moral and spiritual values of life still challenges us and remains our unfinished task. We seek to come to grips with every area of Christian living in such a way that all persons for whom we are responsible shall develop such spiritual maturity that ultimately they may become informed and responsible members of our

churches.

Checking available records it appears that our Conference has more than 260 church schools. That they have an enrollment of around 25,000 pupils. While this is a slight decrease in members, there is an increase in average attendance. The adult enrollment and attendance appears to be on the increase. There is a decrease in the number of church school pupils, who join church on profession of faith. There is room for improvement in the fourth Sunday offerings for World Service and Conference Benevolences. We also see the need for more pastors' membership training classes.

Through the untiring efforts of Brother Howard A. Bailey, our Conference is exposed to many helpful in-service-training opportunities. The conference and district staffs, directors, and consultants have stood by whenever called. There have been assemblies. rallies. Christian workers and leadership training schools. institutes, workshops, music clinics. Bible conferences with such leaders as Dr. Lowell Hazzard of Weslev Seminary, seminars, dealing with

pastoral counseling, and with Christian higher education.

While we have contributed to Bennett and Morristown Colleges; Morgan Christian Center, Maryland State College, and other Wesley Foundations, our support has been all too meagre. If we want Christian higher education we must dig down in our pockets

and pay the cost.

We promised to pay at the rate of \$1.50 per year per member. Our Conference needs to back up our promise with cash. If we fail our Methodist institutions of Christian higher education, then we must drift upon the sea of secularism where men have no awareness of the greater values of life.

Church Property

Throughout the long history of man he has felt an inner compulsion to erect a place where he might meet and commune with his God. Today we no longer believe that God is contained in edifices built by the hands of men. But we do feel that a physical structure is important as a place for worship, education, Christian fel-

lowship, and administration.

The time has come when we must re-evalute our church buildings. We can no longer build to meet the needs of our fathers. It is important that when we build a new church, restore or remodel an older building, that we consult the proper authority in planning our church building program. Make sure that the proposed building meets our needs, that the financial obligations incurred do not exceed our ability to pay, and that the project will offer the kind of experience that will make its communicants more spiritual minded.

During the year at least two new churches have been erected. One congregation is ready to start construction as soon as legal matters are cleared. Other churches have renovated their buildings

that better services may be rendered.

"I love thy church, O God! Her walls before Thee stand. Dear as the apple of Thine eye, and graven on Thy hands."

Christian Social Concerns

The implementation of the Christian gospel demands Christian social action. The Methodist Church has never been more aware of this fact than it is now. The purpose of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, is "to lift up before the members of the church and also the secular world, the Christian concern for personal, social and civic righteousness, to analyze the issues which confront the nation and the world as well as the local community and the person, and to propose Christian lives of action." This is our newest Commission and was made mandatory at the last General Conference.

The Conference Board of Social Concerns has been active this year. A significant joint meeting with leaders of the Peninsula and the Delaware Conferences was held at St. Marks Methodist Church. Easton, Md., November 4, 1961. This meeting was approved and supported by the two resident Bishops John Wesley Lord and Edgar

A. Love. All district superintendents from the two Conferences attended. Of the 72 representatives present, 31 were from the Delaware and 41 from the Peninsula Conference.

Tioga Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa., was host to a meeting on Christian social concerns in March. There was a lively discussion on "The Moral Implications of the Housing Problem."

The districts at their various conferences and meetings have held panel discussions, presented speakers, used audio visuals and

distributed literature relating to Christian social concerns.

Records show that the number of organized and functioning Commissions on Christian Social Concerns is on the increase. Nearly one hundred ministers from the state of Delaware marched from Whatcoat Church in Dover to the State Legislature and offered prayer in the interest of human freedom, justice and dignity. There is a growing number of inter-racial ministerial associations, inter-racial church services, inter-racial cultural programs as well as inter-racial recreational activities and choral groups. More extensive use is being made of World Peace Sunday, Commitment Sunday and Race Relations Day. Some of the local church commissions are dealing constructively with such issues as the alcohol problem, juvenile delinquency and crime, problems of the aging, mental health, planned parenthood, migratory laborers, housing and race relations.

We urgently appeal to every local church Commission on Christian Social Concerns to become more active in its community.

Stewardship

We insist that there shall be in every local church a Commission on Stewardship and Finance. The Discipline and the Handbook on the Commission of Stewardship and Finance gives detailed information as to how the Commission is to be organized and its function. The superintendents found that wherever this Commission is organized and performs its duty, there are less financial problems and misunderstandings and no one person dominates the financial life of the church.

The organization and proper function of this Commission in

each local church, constitute a must.

If time permitted, we would march before you the heroic deeds of every man on the five districts. Truly every man has wrought well in one or more concerns. The upholding of the vows of membership—"...loyal to the Methodist Church and uphold it by your attendance, your prayers, your gifts, and your service."

Some of our fellow churchmen have not remembered their stewardship. They still expect to run God's Church by the way of camp meetings, supper, bakes, rummage sales, pageants, fashion shows, popularity contests, mock trials, mock weddings, mock con-

ferences, rallies and raffles.

We rejoice that where stewardship education has been tried that more of our churches are lifting their sights and their standards. More and more churchmen are seeing their church offerings as being not apart from but as an act of worship and as a means of grace. What some churches have accomplished is almost unbelievable. Stewardship demands that "we must first give ourselves unto the Lord."

"Love so amazing so divine, demands my soul my life my all."

"Jesus Christ is Lord" Lord over all of life.

Ministerial Support

It is not charity when the Church ordains a man to the work of the ministry, she says, "Separate yourself from the sources of worldly gain. Minister to us in spiritual things and we will minister to you in material things." Judge Beaver well says: "When a minister has been solemnly ordained and thereby adopted by the Church, and has, by his ordination vows, voluntarily closed the avenues by which other men acquire a competency... it is the duty

of the Church to provide for him."

Let us look at ourselves for a few moments: There are 165 charges in our conference. From the 1961 Conference Journal, we get figures like these. Ten charges paid from \$5,000.000 to \$7,000.00; nine charges from \$4,000.00 to \$4,999.00; thirty from \$3,000.00 to \$3,999.00; sixty-nine from \$2,000.00 to \$2,999.00; thirty-five from \$1,000.00 to \$1,999.00; seven under \$1,000.00, and two with no salary at all. We wonder after a study of these figures. Have we done as well as we could have done. Let us take care of our ministers.

We wish to call our attention to the misunderstanding that many of us have. We call all claims of the church and conference, BENEVOLENCES. Under Ministerial Support, we have these items: Pastor's Salary and Expense Fund; Episcopal Fund: District Superintendents' Salary; District Superintendents' Travel and Expense Fund; Conference Claimants (12% of Pastor's Salary); Conference Claimants (Pastor's); Conference Permanent Fund; and Minimum Salary. When we divide ministerial support from our Benevolence asking, we often find that we do little for ourselves and in many instances less for others. Let us join hands and support the total program of the Church. Jesus Christ is Lord.

Christian Vocations

No occupation is automatically a Christian vocation. It becomes a Christian vocation as one brings to his work Christian attitudes, purposes, and principles. The essential characteristics of a Christian vocation as listed in Methodist Service Projects are: (1) It calls forth and makes use of the best gifts God has given you. (2) It meets real human need and serves the physical, intellectual, social and spiritual concerns of society. (3) Its motivations rise above particular attention to status, security, and salary, to consider sacrifice, suffering, and service. (4) It builds fellowship and enables one to respect all people as children of God, thus enlarging the areas

of community. (5) It provides for Christian witness through the work performed. (6) It has within it the sense of mission with the overtones of dedication. An occupation is Christian to the degree

it meets positively these tests.

Our churches must proclaim the sacredness of all useful work; but faced as we are with an acute shortage of ministers, Christian teachers in the local churches, and missionaries for home and abroad; we must of necessity challenge the finest youth of the church into its leadership. Our desperate need gives new urgency to this call.

The church must have a ministry adequate for the demands not only for today, but for the future as well. The Quadrennial Emphasis Committee of the Council of Bishops has addressed all Methodists to serve by recruiting youth and adults to listen for, and heed, God's call to the ministries of the church. What we do now in the area of recruitment will greatly determine the course of the future. Ministry Sunday which is to be observed the Sunday of or preceding May 24th (Aldersgate Sunday) offers us a glorious opportunity to emphasize the recruitment needs of The Methodist Church, and our own Delaware Conference needs in particular.

We are at work in this business of recruitment, but what we are doing is not enough. Too many churches are listed "to be supplied." Too many churches are unable to provide a full church program. This year the call has been given at all conference and district youth meetings for those who will commit themselves to Christian service through a church related vocation. In some instances, a few responded. Through the interest and concern of our beloved Bishop Edgar A. Love, Cabinet, and Commission on Christian Vocations, the Sixth Annual Conference on the Christian Ministry and Missions was held during the year. It enables us to develop a broader fellowship among the young people entering the Christian ministry and the mission field. It gives the young people an opportunity to become better acquainted with the men serving in the ministry and related fields. It also gives us an opportunity to provide counsel and guidance in preparation for the ministry and missions.

What more can be done? The district superintendents attempt to see that there is a functioning Committee on Christian Vocations in each local church. This committee should interpret to the congregation "The Call" using as a guide and manual, "The Local Church Committee on Christian Vocations." This committee should also distribute Methodist Service Projects booklets and other vocational literature to youth and adults. The cooperation of parents and the home are needed, if our recruitment labors are to bear much fruit. We solicit your prayers and your concern.

Worship

At the heart of worship lies a fundamental human need . . . the need of God. At the heart of living lies this same fundamental

need...the need for courage to face the realities of life, for innepeace and harmony to enable us to live life confidently, the need for vitality to live the creative life, and a need for the companionship

of the spirit, that we may not live alone.

Since we feel this need for God in the midst of life, and since in worship this need struggles to express itself; perhaps we ought to ask what is worship? Worship is fellowship with God. It is atime when one communes with the loving Father as he is revealed in Jesus Christ our Lord. It is an experience when the highest and best in one communes with the highest and best in the universe. All stand in need of the experience of worship, for it reveals higher values for which to live. It aids us in finding a solution to many of our problems. It renews the zest for life and unifies life around a central purpose.

The activity most characteristic of Christians as a group is to engage in worship. Not only does the assembly of the congregation center around worship; but rarely does a church committee or organization assemble for business or edification without invoking God's presence and guidance. This is as it should be, for the church's unique contribution is its effort on behalf of centering men's lives around the purpose, power and love of God. It is very important then, that both leader and people develop the art of group worship. In too many instances the leaders of worship in our churches do not have even a remote understanding of, or skills in the art which they are seeking to practice. This is called quackery in medicine. However, we condone it in the church because these faithful workers are doing their best. The best in this case is not enough.

Hence, does it not follow that education in the art of group worship should hold a position of primary importance in the church's program of Christian education. The program sponsored this year by the Conference and District Boards of Lay Activities for the training of lay speakers is commendable. We urge its continuation until all lay speakers possess understanding and skill in

the art of group worship.

Some few churches are experimenting with the Methodist Book of Worship and doing a fine job. We urge that there be a functioning commission on worship in each local church. This commission should seek to cultivate beauty. dignity, and meaning in the worship experience of the church. It should also foster the use of the best resources for worship, such as the Holy Bible, Methodist Book of Worship, and the Methodist Hymnal.

Missions

We have boasted that our mission is a world mission. We seek to teach all nations and to baptize them in the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. But oddly enough we discover that our own country is becoming "the most crucial, urgent, and needy mission field in the world." The non-Christian religions —Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism and others—consider America to be a fertile field for their missionary activities. They are among

our most aggressive rivals.

As we review our missionary endeavors, it pleases us to note an increasing number of our leaders attending classes and schools of missions in our own conference, and in those of the Northeastern and Southeastern Jurisdictions. We are happy to report that on all districts there have been missionary institutes, rallies, and general promotion of missions by district secretaries.

Church-wide schools of missions have been conducted in several local churches. Leaflets, pamphlets, study books, various kinds of missionary literature and audio visuals are finding their way into

more and more of our local churches.

Great strength has also come to the local churches through the relentless efforts of the Woman's Societies of Christian Service. These faithful women of our church have rendered valuable services in helping to keep missions alive through the constant cultivation of minds for missions by means of officers' training courses, quarterly meetings on district and sub-district levels, study courses, cooperation in church-wide mission studies, seminars, group discussions and presentation of timely inspirational messages by returned missionaries and foreign students. Through their splendid cooperation we have seen transformations take place in local church after local church.

Wherever the leaders of our churches have dramatized the nature and validity of missions, promoted sound missionary education and missionary giving by children, youth and adults, growth

has been stimulated and missions have been fulfilled.

We face difficult times but we dare not retreat. The factors confronting us must not cause us to become dispirited. Neither can we afford to turn deaf ears to the frontiers that call us. We must develop a program which will unite us whether we are among the teeming multitudes of the inner city, or the declining membership in the church in the valley of the Wildwood. There must not be a retreat, we must not falter, we have no option in this matter. Ours is a Divine mission. The voice has spoken. Listen! the echoes are resounding loud and clear "go, preach, make disciples, Lo I am with thee."

Christians, awake! Arise! Shine! Give God the glory—through reactivating our slumbering Commissions on Missions, increased World Service Giving, advance specials, and loyal support of the entire mission program. Then let us live by faith in Him who long ago proclaimed, "Whatsoever ye shall ask in my name that will I do." Truly the times are dangerous and difficult, but empowered by an unfaltering faith our church can advance with the assurance of victory.

"Jesus shall reign where'er the sun,

Does his successive journeys run; His kingdom spread from shore to shore, Till moons shall wax and wane no more."

This report gives only in part the accomplishments of this conference year. Looking at the achievements made we become sudden-

ly aware of the great debt we owe this Conference.

Our hearts are filled with gratitude to the faithful pastors who have responded to our leadership, and to their gracious wives who have walked with them through sunshine and storms. We appreciate you lay members gathered here, as well as the unseen multitudes back home whom you represent. Your prayers, loyalty, generosity, and the warm welcome extended to us in your parsonages, homes and churches have given us courage to press toward the mark of the high calling in Jesus Christ.

And to you, Bishop Love, we thank you for the opportunity to serve as members of your Cabinet. We wish that the entire Conference could know you as we do. We have found you to be unselfish, kind, sympathetic, brotherly and Christlike. Your sermons, addresses and presence have been an inspiration to us and a benediction upon us. These things we cherish and they shall linger in our

memories till life's little day shall end.

It is with profound gratitude to God for his abounding grace, and sincere appreciation to the ministers, their wives, and loyal laymen of the District that I present my third annual report of our stewardship.

Survey of Charges

BRIDGEVILLE: Rev. Roland Grant, minister. Sunday morning worship services attendance has increased. 11 conversions reported. Raised for world service and conference benevolence, \$200; for trustees, \$1,616; Reserve Pension Fund, \$93; for all causes, \$7,800.

BRIDGEVILLE CT.: Rev. C. P. Spencer, pastor. This charge presents another good report. A new parsonage in Bridgeville with all modern conveniences has been purchased. Raised for world service and Conference benevolence, \$420; ministerial support in full; total for all causes, \$6,916.

CHESTERTOWN: Rev. Howard Anderson, pastor. This charge plans extensive parsonage and church renovation. Church attendance has increased. Raised for world service and conference benevolence, \$200; total for all purposes, \$5,685.

CHESWOLD: Rev. William C. Thomas, pastor. This church plans expansion. A lot adjacent to the church property has been purchased. The church basement has been renovated and paid for. World service and conference benevolence raised; for trustees, \$3,186; total, \$5,695.

CLARKSVILLE: Rev. George Taylor, pastor. A beautiful new brick church was completed this year at Clarksville. At Zoar Church a community hall is being completed. Conversions 8. Raised for world service, \$395 in full; for trustees' expenses, \$7,859; total, \$12,100.

COLEMAN: Rev. W. C. R. Mills, pastor. This charge needs and is preparing to build a new church. Conversions 22. Total raised for all purposes, \$5,000.

CRUMPTON: Rev. I. W. Wallace, pastor. Conversion 7, world service and conference benevolence, \$165; for trustees \$450; total raised \$7,460.

DELMAR: Rev. Haswell Young, pastor. This charge shows advancement in church attendance and contributions. World Service and conference benevolence, \$138. Grand total, \$3,388.

DOVER: Rev. L. L. Hamilton, pastor. Dover makes a great report. Pastor's salary increased \$600. A new church building is planned. Pledges of over \$30,000 have been received and \$5,000 collected on the project. Church attendance greatly increased. Total for all purposes, \$19,611.

FAIRLEE: Rev. P. A. Henry, pastor. This charge continues to advance. The Mt. Pisgah Church has a financial system in which nearly every one in the community supports the church. The Asbury church plans to remodel the parsonage. Raised for world service, \$92; for trustees, \$496. Grand total, \$4,574.

HARRINGTON: Rev. Thaddeus Hackett, pastor. This small, but faithful charge does well. Raised for world service \$100; for trustees, \$700; total, \$4,505.

LAUREL: Rev. Winston C. Crosse, pastor. The present pastor finished out the year's work following Rev. C. W. Bagwell. A remarkable job has been done. Conversions 13. A new communion table and pulpit furniture costing over \$1,300 have been purchased and paid for and pastor's salary increased \$400. \$288 raised for reserve pension fund; total for all purposes \$11,259.

LEWES: Rev. Quincy D. Cooper, pastor. This charge has had another great year. The Bishop's Evangelistic Crusade was outstanding. 12 conversions and 26 persons restored to the church roll. A new piano for Israel Church, cost of \$1,200, and new robes for the choir at St. Paul Church were purchased. All claims in full, total raised, \$10,810.

LINCOLN: The late Rev. J. O. Lockman served as pastor nearly 32 years. His accomplishments here were many. Since his passing, the lay leader, Mr. R. A. Young and I have carried on. This charge is outstanding in organization and church attendance. Raised for world service, \$390. Grand total, \$5,500.

MARDELA: Lewis R. Jones, Pastor. The Bishop's Evangelistic Crusade was very successful, with 14 conversions and 3 restored to the church roll. Money is being raised to build a new parsonage. Paid for world service and conference benevolences, \$200; trustees, \$1,465; total for all causes, \$5,784.

MILFORD: Rev. William Gee, pastor. A community survey was conducted resulting in 68 persons becoming activated in the life of the church. The church auditorium has been beautified. Raised for world service and conference benevolence, \$192; for trustees, \$1,860; grand total \$6,448.

MILLINGTON: Rev. Paul R. Hilton, pastor. This charge is moving for-

ward. The parsonage has been beautifully renovated including a new bath room. Union church services are held and attendance increased. Raised for world service and conference benevolence, \$153; trustees, \$1,860; total raised, \$6,444.

MILLSBORO: C. W. D. Browne, pastor. The loyal people and pastor of this charge presents another good report of their Christian stewardship. The debt on the new parsonage is being reduced. Raised for world service and conference benevolence, \$300; for trustees, \$2,419; total raised, \$5,981.

NASSAU: Rev. W. E. Marks is the pastor. This charge presents another good report. The balance on Reserve Pension Fund, \$110, paid in full. Union communion services are held by the two churches. Raised for world service and conference benevolence, \$142; total raised, \$8,063.

NEWARK: Rev. James A. Conway is the pastor. This charge has had a good year. A successful Revival was carried on resulting in 25 conversions and 15 accessions. Raised for world service and conference benevolence, \$100. A new piano has been purchased and floors replaced in St. Peters Church. The young people are active. Grand total \$4,594.

NORTH BERLIN: Rev. A. J. Dredden, pastor. This charge presents another fine report. A new site has been purchased for a parsonage and \$1,036 has been raised on this project. All conference obligations have been fully met. Total raised for all purposes, \$12,311.

POMONA: Rev. C. R. Bryant, pastor. This charge presents a good report. Conversions 2, full members added 8. World service and conference benevolence, \$395, in full. Raised for trustees \$4,199; grand total, \$7,248.

PORT DEPOSIT: Rev. Herbert E. Palmer, pastor. This charge does well with its small but loyal membership. The young adults' work is outstanding. Raised for World service and conference benevolence, \$155; total raised, \$2,049.

ROCK HALL: Rev. E. C. Hackshaw, pastor. This charge makes another fine report. Renovations of both the church and parsonage has been done at a cost of \$3,000 and paid. World service and conference benevolence raised in full; total raised, \$6,874.

SASSAFRAS-GALENA: Rev. Ophelia James, pastor. Galena and Sassafras were combined last year. They have worked well together. The parsonage has been beautifully renovated with a new bathroom. All apportionments paid in full. Total raised, \$8,008.

SEAFORD: Rev. C. D. Gerald, pastor. This charge makes a good report considering the size of its membership. \$500 has been raised on a new carpet for the church. Conversions 3. Raised for world service and conference benevolences, \$200; Reserve Pension Fund, \$100; grand total, \$6,663.

SEAFORD CT.: Rev. C. J. Williams, pastor. The pastor has not been well this year. Report not in time for publishing.

SHARPTOWN: Rev. Houx H. Nichols, pastor. This charge under the leadership of its new pastor makes a very good report. World Service and conference benevolence, \$420 in full. The parsonage debt has been greatly reduced and the bathroom beautifully tiled. Total raised, \$6,916.

SOUTH BERLIN: Rev. Nathaniel Miller, pastor. The charge presents a good report. The church in Berlin has made much needed renovations. There has been an increase in church attendance. World service and conference benevolence, \$430, raised in full; total raised, \$9,081.

SMYRNA: Rev. Mildred White, pastor. This charge presents another fine report. The choir has been enlarged and beautifully robed. New brick steps at the church and other improvements made. World Service, \$225, in full; total raised, \$3,908.

STILL POND: Rev. Rayfield Wallace, pastor. The charge presents a good report. The people have shown an increased interest in the church program. World service and conference benevolence, \$246, trustees, \$2,335; total for all purposes, \$6,283.

TOWNSEND: Rev. Richard R. Hicks, pastor. This charge has done well under the leadership of its new pastor. Union Communion services for the three churches are held. Raised for world service, \$117; for trustees, \$2,234; total, \$8,654.

Summary and Conclusion

The charges report 170 conversions and 190 accessions of new members. They report \$1,773 for the Reserve Pension Fund; world service and conference benevolences, \$8,216; total raised for all causes \$227,323.

For a true picture of the District in detail, read the Statistical Tables.

We are very grateful for the splendid cooperation of both ministers and laymen.

Mrs. Stanley is very appreciative of the fine support given the ministers' wives in raising a little over \$2,200 for Conference Claimants.

EASTON DISTRICT

Achievements of Charges

AIREYS: E. P. Cooke, Minister. This is a rural charge which has latent possibilities. The pastor has worked hard, and makes a fairly good report.

BECKWITH: A. F. Farrare, Minister. While this is considered a small charge numerically there is none larger in heart and spirit. Because of the pastor and people's mind to work, wonderful improvements have been made on all church properties, and every claim has been met in full.

CAMBRIDGE: C. A. Edmonds, Minister. Phenomenal success has been achieved at Waugh this year. Her enviable record has been maintained. Multitudes attended the revival. The Twelve are active. Twenty-five souls have been won. The Church and parish hall have been redecorated, new furnishings have been placed in the parsonage. Church attendance has increased. The overdue Reserve Pension Fund of \$1,300 has been paid. Recently a Jurisdictional Rally was held toward the liquidation of the mortgage on the parish hall—the people placed \$4,248.45 on the table that night. All apportionments are paid in full.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT: T. M. Murray, Minister. Another good year's work has been done. The membership is increasing. St. Luke painted the exterior of its church, erected a beautiful bulletin board, purchased one hundred steel folding chairs for its all purpose room and voted a \$500 increase in pastor's salary for the coming year.

CARMICHAEL: R. S. Caldwell, Minister. Protracted illness has prevented the pastor from serving his church this year. But because of the remarkable cooperation of the churches, excellent work has been done. The charge teems with activities of youth and young adults. Church attendance has greatly increased. The financial and spiritual condition have been good. The pastor received his salary in full. All apportionments paid in full. The District Superintendent worked with the fine people of this charge and simply followed the excellent forward program which Brother Caldwell left when he entered Henryton State Hospital.

CENTREVILLE-GOULDTOWN: C. C. Thomas, Minister. Though greatly handicapped by the unavailability and inactivity of its pastor, this charge has done some splendid work. A new electric organ has been purchased and dedicated.

CHURCH CREEK: C. H. Cottingham, Minister. The shepherd and the small flock on this charge have struggled to maintain their previous record. Improvements have been made at St. Paul and John Wesley. The parsonage has been redecorated and new furnishings installed.

CHURCH HILL: E. H. Jackson, Minister. The church buildings at Mt. Zion and Mt. Olive have been improved. Mt. Vernon has raised \$8,617.00 on its building fund. As soon as some legal matters regarding title to land are cleared a new church edifice will be built.

CORDOVA-EARLES CHAPEL: H. G. Chase, Minister. Wonders never cease on this charge. A strong evangelistic program is in operation. Church attendance is growing, children and youth participate well. A central heating system has been installed at Earles Chapel at a cost of \$1,400, cash. New Zion purchased beautiful new carpet at \$500, put new floor in choir area, installed running water, and gas range in parish hall. New tile floor, cabinets and new door put in the parsonage. The Richard Asbury Church was given the Stan Methodist Church and parish hall property by the Peninsula Conference. This property has been completely renovated at a cost of \$1,800, of which \$1,300 has been paid. This is a one hundred percent charge on benevolences.

CRAPO AND GOLDEN HILL: Mrs. C. M. Pinder, Minister. Two of the churches on this charge suffer by the decline in population. Not more than three families live in either of these church communities. The John Wesley Church still thrives. An extension has been built so as to enlarge the choir area and the interior of the church has been painted at the cost of \$1,700 of which \$1,043 has been paid.

DENTON-WILLISTON: John H. Wilcher, Minister. Brother Wilcher came to us from another denomination and was appointed as a student supply. He enrolled in the American University, Washington, D. C., in the second semester. He had little time to spend on his charge. This of course is reflected in the report. We hope for brighter tomorrows.

EASTON: W. Hayward Greene, Minister. A fine year's work has been done. Twenty-six members have been added. Church attendance is increasing. The church school is growing and new life throbs within the church organization. Improvements have been made on the church building and a new \$4,600 Allen electric organ has been installed upon which \$1,000 has been paid.

EASTON CIRCUIT: A. H. Slacum, Minister. The small congregation here does exceedingly well. Church attendance is increasing. The youth are active. Both the interior and exterior of the church have been redecorated. Beautiful new carpet has been placed on the aisles and great improvements made on the parish hall.

EAST NEW MARKET: N. C. Stanley, Minister. There seems to be great possibilities on this charge, but in spite of the courageous efforts of the pastor to make progress the charge falls below its record of previous years.

FEDERALSBURG: G. L. Stanley, Minister. Progress seems to be the motto of this charge. A Boy Scout Troop has been organized, a children's choir has been formed and robes purchased for them. Pastor and people are happy over the newly erected ranch style parsonage. It is a thing of beauty. The people rejoice to have their pastor and his family living in their community.

GREENSBORO: A. P. Jenkins, Minister. This pastor was saddened early in the conference year by the loss of his life long companion. He faced his task with determination and achieved a good record despite all discouragements.

HURLOCK: Wm. Staten, Minister. Splendid work has been done on this charge. Improvements have been made on all churches. The parsonage has been decorated on the interior, new breakfast set, new rug, oil burner and the front porch screened. Best of all, Union Grove has liquidated its long standing mortgage.

LINKWOOD: Rev. Van B. Wright was appointed to this charge last year. He expired August 3, 1961. Rev. N. C. Stanley was appointed to this work. The people are still rejoicing in the fact that they have erected a new concrete block church to replace the old Mt. Pleasant Church which was destroyed by fire.

MARYDEL: James Roberts, Minister. The new pastor and people have labored together in harmony. Some accomplishments have been made. Everyone is happy.

McDANIEL: A. A. McDowell, Minister. An excellent year has been witnessed on this little charge. It is a beehive of activity. Unusual cooperation exists between pastor and people. The church has been renovated at a cost of \$1,500 of which \$1,200 has been paid. New furnishings have been put in the parsonage.

MILES RIVER—STATENS CHAPEL: Mrs. H. R. Opher, Minister. Improvements on this charge include the addition of a kitchen to the Dashield's parish hall. The church has been painted on the interior and a piano has been purchased. New carpet was bought at McGee Church. New pumps have been installed in both of the community halls and the parsonage. A church-wide school of missions has transformed this charge.

OXFORD-JOHN WESLEY: E. A. Hughes, Minister. This has been an excellent year for this charge. Every phase of the church program has been presented. The Methodist Men sent a delegate to Purdue University. Upon his return he brought new inspiration and has been instrumental in influencing the total program for good. A new lighting system has been installed at John Wesley, Oxford, and new office equipment purchased.

PRESTON: Olen Molock, Minister. The Mt. Pleasant Church building was recently destroyed by fire along with its parish hall. This has been a great blow and setback for the charge.

RIDGELY: L. W. Coltrane, Minister. The prolonged illness of the pastor's wife has put him to a great test. However, the work of the church advances. An extensive renovation job has been done at the parsonage and the charge has been greatly revitalized.

ROYAL OAK-BELLEVUE: The Rev. Eric George was appointed to this charge last year. He graduated with a B.D. degree from Howard University, Washington, D. C., last June. He was happily married to Geneva Stafford, December 9, 1961, and had met all requirements for citizenship in this country. On March 19, 1962, he was fatally stricken and died almost instantly. Great improvements have been made at the parsonage. Running water and modern rest rooms have been installed in St. Paul Church. All claims have been met in full.

ST. MICHAELS: C. B. Miles, Minister. This has been a great year for pastor and people. Thirty-two new souls have been won to the church. Church attendance has increased. The quality of the music is richer. The church and parsonage properties have been put in good style and the financial record exceeds by far the previous year's report.

STEVENSVILLE: C. M. Stafford, Minister. This charge maintains its record of previous years. The organizations are active. A good promotion job has been done on all phases of the church program. Modern rest rooms have been installed at Ezion at a cost of \$1,950. The interior of John Wesley has been redecorated, new roof on parish hall. Union has raised \$1,800 toward the building of a new church edifice. All claims paid in full.

TAYLORS ISLAND: Experienced a setback due to the illness and death of the Rev. E. N. Foster, who passed October 9, 1961. The Rev. Jeremiah R. Lee was appointed to this charge in the fall. A glorious spiritual tide has swept through the charge. The parsonage, unoccupied for years, has been completely renovated. The people are wild with excitement that the pastor is willing to live on the Island with them. They are pleading for his return.

TRAPPE: H. T. Hall, Minister. There is not a more active church on the district than Scott's Methodist. This church entertained the District Conference in an excellent manner. A new roof has been put on the church and the exterior of the church has been painted. A new living room suite has been added to the parsonage.

VIENNA-REIDS GROVE: R. W. Dennis, Minister. Another wonderful year's work has been done on this charge. The church organizations are working in a magnificent way. Conference askings are almost one hundred percent.

Construction on the proposed new parsonage has been delayed due to legal matters which are in the process of adjustment.

WITTMAN-SHERWOOD: Mrs. M. D. Hundley, Minister. The parsonage has been completely renovated at a cost of \$5,000. An interested citizen matched dollar for every dollar raised by this charge on the parsonage project. The St. James parish hall has been painted and other fine improvements made. The children and youth are very active in the program of both churches.

The total paid for pastors' salaries was \$125,637.00. On the basis of our church membership our giving was not what it should have been. These things ought not to be. In this day when we should strengthen the Christian witness at home and abroad, we need to consider the stewardship opportunities which are presented to us.

I am very grateful for the service rendered by the members of our various boards, committees, and commissions for fine leadership. The Board of Lay Activities, Methodist Men, Woman's Society of Christian Service, Wesleyan Service Guild, Young Adult Fellowship, Methodist Youth Fellowship, and Board of Education leaders carried out their assignments excellently.

Gratitude

We offer our sincere thanks to Mrs. Myrtle Hoskins, president of the district Woman's Society of Christian Service, and her officers for the excellent work being done to organize new societies and promote the interest of the women of the church.

To Mr. Roy L. Cordery and the associate lay leaders of the district we express our gratitude for their untiring efforts to enlist the men in the work of the church.

To Mrs. William C. Strother, Jr., and the officers of the Ministers' Wives' Association we express gratitude for their untiring efforts in enlisting the wives and widows in pensions cause of our Conference.

District Activities

All district meetings were held, all well attended, and much interest was manifested in the total program of the Church. Mention must be made of the fine Monthly Preachers' Meetings. All were well attended and thanks to the officers for the fine planned programs.

Emphases

During the coming year there should be a continued emphasis upon Church worship. The percentage of members who attend Sunday worship does not make exciting reading. Our aim should be a 50% increase in attendance. Secondly, in these days we need to give heed to our teaching. Every church

should strengthen its educational program through enlisting the most capable teachers and using Methodist literature.

Our third emphasis should be upon youth. The church needs to give greater consideration to the organization and program for youth. We should make a larger place for these young Christians in the life of the church.

With singleness of purpose let us all seek first the kingdom of God through prayer, fellowship, the study of the Word, and service of mankind.

Statement Concerning the Charges

BETHEL (Brooklyn)—The charge continues to advance. The faithful members have maintained the high standards. The future is great.

GRACE MISSION (Brooklyn)—This mission is in need of an adequate place of worship. In spite of the handicap the small group is moving on. We hope to find a better place of worship for this mission. The people are there.

JOHN WESLEY (Brooklyn)—Better than fifty per cent increase in church attendance. The church is growing spiritually and contributions to the church have increased. This church conducted an intensive program of stewardship, education and cultivation.

NEWMAN MEMORIAL (Brooklyn)—This year there has been an increase in membership and total interest in the general work of the Church. Projects have included the purchase of more than \$50,000 worth of real estate, including property adjacent to the church edifice. The church school membership has increased under the direction of the new director of religious education. Under the leadership of the Methodist Men, the interior decoration of auxiliary rooms, involving the services of the men of the church at an estimated value of \$3,000.00, was completed.

REDEEMER (Brooklyn)—A growing church, improvements shown along all lines. Plans on foot to rebuild, as they have outgrown their present building.

BROOKS MEMORIAL (Jamaica)—Another great year for Brooks Memorial. On Sunday, May 13, 1962, at the 11:00 a.m. worship service, the burning of the mortgage and the dedication of the church building were conducted. The edifice was erected in 1952. The church participated in the Evangelistic Mission to Alaska by sending their pastor.

CLAIR MEMORIAL (Jersey City)—This church has given a good account of its stewardship. The renovation of the social hall was a highlight this year.

ST. MARK'S (Montclair)—A great year in the history of St. Mark's. On Sunday, March 11, 1962, the mortgage burning and the dedication of the Church by Bishop Edgar A. Love were carried out. A good job and well done by the pastor, officers, and members of this great church.

ST. JOHN'S (Newark)—This church purchased a new parsonage last year, 260 Meeker Avenue. Another banner year, new heights in stewardship achieved. Great plans for tomorrow in the making.

ST. MATTHEW'S, Newark, is a growing church showing increases in all departments of the church. Well organized and working.

ST. LUKE'S (New Rochelle)—A fine year, all activities moving along in great stride. Plans on foot to build a parsonage.

BUTLER MEMORIAL (New York City)—"... the deepening of a congregational and membership faith, that would neither complain, nor shrink, though pressed by many trying situations." Erection of a new church edifice, at a cost of \$178,566.00 plus. Plans on foot to move in the next few weeks. The payment of all conference apportionments in full. Under most adverse circumstances, there was a 20 per cent increase in membership, and a 40 per cent increase in attendance.

SHAW CHAPEL (New York City)—There are signs of growth. A small, but great group of people. The future looks brighter.

ST. JOHN'S (Orange)—A better year. The interior of the church is beautiful. Plans are in store for renovation of the basement of the church building.

ST. MATTHEW'S (Ossining)—A fine year, purchased and renovated a new parsonage at 36 Ann Street. Installed a new four zone hot water heating system in the church. Fine results realized from the Bishop's Evangelistic Crusade.

BETHSAIDA (Philadelphia)—A fine year, improvements all along the line. The benevolence program is above last year's and there has been an increase of 50 per cent in giving.

CAMPHOR MEMORIAL (Philadelphia)—Another banner year. All commissions active and working. The church school and youth department are tops. A church of great choirs. Moved into a new parsonage this year—6115 W. Columbia Ave.

COMMUNITY (Philadelphia)—"There have been many achievements so far this conference year, but paramount has been the continuous growth, dedication, and industry of our membership. We lack the necessary facilities to perform our program; but, neverthless, we are giving ourselves to the building of the kingdom of God. Not only has the financial situation in the church improved, but new members are being won to Christ and His Church. The greatest desire of all is the hope that an adequate church building is secured in the near future."

CHRIST'S MISSION, Philadelphia, has the disadvantage of inadequate space and facilities. Nevertheless, it has taken on new life this year.

TRINITY, Philadelphia, is a church with all commissions and organizations working at top speed, another great year.

EMMANUEL, Philadelphia, is a church with a call to service. This church has been selected for the pilot project in the Baltimore Area. (Joint project with the Boards of Education and Missions. A carefully and well organized church, with all commissions working.

ST. THOMAS, Frankford, has completed the work on the basement of the church and is now able to use the basement for many occasions. Reduced the outstanding debts by a considerable amount. The future looks brighter.

HAVEN MEMORIAL (Philadelphia)—A fine year. Joined with Emmanuel, Mt. Zion, Tioga, and Peniel Churches in launching a revival at the beginning of the calendar year. Conducted a successful church-wide School of Missions. The church-wide every member visitation was successful. Raised this year \$14,831.00 towards the erection of a new church.

JANES MEMORIAL (Germantown)—Another fine year, all financial obligations paid in full. Has no rallies and working toward a non ticket selling church. Have 51 full tithers and 77 who tithe on the first Sunday of each month. The church participated in the Evangelistic Mission to Alaska by sending their pastor. The church continues to support their church in Japan and several mission causes in Africa, as well as special donations to many of the churches of our conference. The educational building painted by the men of the church, sponsored by the Methodist Men, and further improvements made on the parsonage and church. All commissions functioning and seeking to assimilate all members.

JOHN WESLEY (Philadelphia)—Each commission is well organized and functioning. New wiring and lighting system has been installed in the church at a cost of \$4,000.00

MT. ZION (Philadelphia)—Completion of the purchase of land for community center, \$10,000.00 paid in full. On hand for building purposes, \$6,500.00. Church attendance increased over 30 per cent.

PENIEL (Philadelphia)—Church is in fine condition spiritually and financially. Peniel is now above the water line. The future is bright.

ST. BARNABAS (Philadelphia)—The Bishop's Evangelistic Crusade was well supported. The principal on the mortgage is paid up-to-date. Ten persons have been added to the church. The Sunday morning worship services attendance increased. New water pipes installed in the parsonage.

TINDLEY TEMPLE (Philadelphia)—Another great year for a great Church. All claims taken care of. Many improvements have been made. In a few weeks ground breaking and work will begin on the new educational building.

TIOGA (Philadelphia)—Still growing by leaps and bounds. A well organized church with Christian stewardship at its heart. A young church, but a great church.

ZOAR (Philadelphia)—Mother Zoar is still acting like a Mother—leading the way in all activities of the church and its work. A church with a missionary outlook. "Where Mother Zoar leads, we follow."

ST. JOHN'S (Spring Lake)—A great Church, a unique Church, a summer appointment. People from all parts of the country and many different denominations come together to worship God. Jesus Christ is Lord. The property will be improved this summer with a donation from the Board of Missions and local aid.

ASBURY (Trenton)—A Church of Christian stewardship. All commissions organized and working. The interior of church has been painted. The work on the parsonage will soon be completed. A junior high choir and usher board have been formed. There is growing among the membership a genuine evangelistic spirit and fervor.

ST. MATTHEW'S (Trevose)—There has come an awakening to the entire program of the church. Folding doors to divide the class rooms, piano, and gas range for the kitchen have been purchased. Trees and shrubberies have been planted to beautify the grounds of this beautiful church. The Corner Stone was laid Sunday, October 8, 1961.

TRINITY (White Plains)—A great year, renovation of church at a cost of \$11,600.00 and \$6,200.00 has been paid. Thirty-one members received this year. Average attendance per Sunday 160. Proportionate giving increased 25 per cent.

SALISBURY DISTRICT

Members of the Annual Conference, I do hereby wish to present this report as a record of my stewardship on the Salisbury District for the conference year. We have been blessed in that our District has not had fatalities in our ministerial ranks. There has been some sickness among our ministers' families. Mrs. G. T. Jackson was hospitalized due to an accident, Brother Levin Purnell, after a long convalescence, is back on his work. Mrs. Hickman was hospitalized for surgery in which she lost her right foot. Mrs. Omar C. Jones was hospitalized and is recovering. We are happy to say that our son, Vance, after a serious operation is well again.

Our District has been completely organized on the commission operated procedure. More than 3,000 pieces of church material have been distributed across the district, as a means of enlightening the members of our churches in the procedure in which our present day church operates. Our lay speakers held two institutes at Maryland State College. On Saturday, May 12, 1962, fifty (50) men and women were certified as lay speakers.

The lay leaders, under the leadership of Prof. Waldo Kiah, are responding

to his professional leadership.

In our survey of the charges, there is no report as to the figures on finance or statistics. For this information, please consult Statistical Tables.

May I take this opportunity to thank the ministers, their wives, laymen of the district, for their loyal support in advancing the total program of the district.

Survey of Charges

COTTAGE GROVE-OAKVILLE-FLOWER HILL PARISH. This parish under the leadership of Rev. C. L. Handy makes an excellent report for this

conference year. The total program of the church is duly emphasized. All church properties have been renovated and the cost is paid in full.

CRISFIELD-SHILOH. This charge continues to make a fair report. The pastor, Rev. S. P. Sanders, is an outstanding leader for social justice.

UNION ASBURY and the LIBERIA PARISH has made a fair report for this conference year. There are many economic and social factors in this area that leave much to be desired. Rev. Edward Lee, pastor.

DAMES QUARTER-CHANCE-DEALS ISLAND PARISH reports a good year. The pastor, Rev. Kenneth Greene, has worked hard between school and church. The church properties have been modernized.

FRUITLAND and ALLEN PARISH. The report of this charge is equal to last year. The pastor, Rev. T. L. Ross, makes a fair report under the nature of the circumstances. The parsonage and the church plants are being modernized.

GIRDLETREE-MT. WESLEY-BOX IRON PARISH. This continues to be the leading parish of the District. Each preaching unit has a parish hall which includes adequate facilities for Christian education and recreational activities. Rev. Levin H. Purnell is the pastor.

HOPEWELL-MT. WESLEY PARISH. This parish has been rejuvenated. Both church plants, the parsonage and parish house at the Wesley Church have been modernized. Brother I. H. White, pastor.

HORNTOWN-NEW CHURCH PARISH. Both churches in the parish have been re-beautified. The pastor, Rev. Harvey J. Lambert, has given an excellent account of his stewardship.

KELLER-RED HILL-EXMORE PARISH. The parish is capable of giving a greater service in kingdom building than this report represents. The pastor, Rev. Mrs. Jessica Hickman, while handicapped by sickness, makes a fair report. The potential is here.

SALISBURY-JOHN WESLEY. Rev. Joseph I. Williams, pastor. Brother Williams was received warmly by the members. This is a small congregation, but they are willing to serve for the best interests of their church. Brotherly love is being exemplified.

MANOKIN-WESTOVER-REBELS NECK PARISH. Rev. H. F. Barclay has done well this year. The parish has grown materially as well as spiritually. The Manokin Church has built a new parish house and has beautified their church.

MARION STATION-MT. PEER PARISH. This charge is very strong potentially but the achievements from year to year do not represent its true worth. Rev. J. W. Mickle is the pastor.

MARUMSCO-KINGSTON PARISH. The parish continues to grow under the leadership of its pastor. All departments of the church are well organized and are working smoothly. Rev. O. C. Jones, pastor.

MT. VERNON-POLKS ROAD PARISH. The two church plants in this parish have been modernized. The membership in each church is growing. Rev. D. S. Quillin, pastor.

ORIOLE-VENTON PARISH. The parish has been greatly strengthened by its pastor, Rev. G. N. Jones. The parish house and church at Venton have been repaired.

POCOMOKE CITY—Rev. G. O. Commodore, pastor. This charge is one of the most strategic appointments on the District. On the first Sunday in November, Bishop Love led the congregation into their new church. This was the most historic event in the history of the Salisbury District. Rev. G. O. Commodore, Rev. G. B. Wilson, and Rev. L. H. Purnell were the builders of this new church. The charge deserves the grade, excellent, for this year's work.

PRINCESS ANNE—This charge is so situated that it is gradually becoming a college church. The pastor, S. S. Tatem, has justified every expectation of his leadership.

QUANTICO-ROCKAWALKING PARISH. Rev. Hori W. Spencer, pastor. This is a very capable three point circuit. Brother Spencer has been able to get some things accomplished—such as repairs to the parsonage. The churches at Hebron and Quantico have been beautified.

NANTICOKE—Rev. Charles L. Willis, pastor. This is our largest and strongest rural station. The results of this report are not adequate to their ability.

WHITE HAVEN-NEW TOWN PARISH. There are some very loyal and capable members in this small rural parish. Brother Roland Dennis is organizing this church in such a way as to lay a foundation for the future.

UPPER HILL and CENTENNIAL PARISH. Rev. Alexander Reid continues to give this charge a most excellent service and leadership. The parsonage has been completely modernized.

SALISBURY-WHITE TEMPLE. Rev. Charles W. Cannon began his ministry here September 15th. Since that time the church has been growing spiritually as well as financially. Brother Cannon makes a very good report.

SHILOH-HUTS PARISH. Rev. Ernest J. Johnson, pastor. Rev. Johnson, one of our retired ministers, has given faithful service to this rural parish. His report is good.

SNOW HILL. After ten years of very effective service, Pastor George Jackson is retiring with much praise from this charge. His record for the past decade has been excellent.

UNIONVILLE-ST. JAMES PARISH. Rev. Carrol Scott began his ministry here September 15th. The work has continued to grow and to prosper. He has had a good year's work.

WACHAPREAGUE-BURTON PARISH. Rev. Frank Robinson has wrought well in this small rural parish. His parish is well organized. Rev. Robinson is one of our most promising young ministers.

District Meetings

A total of \$1,500 has been raised toward the purchasing of the property adjoining the church, which will be needed for future expansion. Conversions 8. Accessions 17. Total disbursed \$12,000.00.

BRIDGETON: Rev. T. H. Pendleton, pastor. The pastor and people have enjoyed another successful year. The church is making its influence felt in the life of the community. Four choirs offer the opportunity for musical expression to all age levels. The spiritual life of the church is full and rich. Twenty new members have been added. The present plant is not adequate to meet the needs of the expanding program. Plans are being made to build larger facilities. Total disbursements \$12,020.00.

BURLINGTON: Rev. H. J. Fisher, pastor. Burlington continues to make advances. The physical plant has been completely renovated. A warm cooperative fellowship characterizes this church. A sincere effort is made to meet all askings in full. Conversions 10. Accessions 4. Disbursed for all causes \$5,880.00.

BUTTONWOOD AND CHRISTIANA: Rev. Jacob Caulk, pastor. Extensive improvements have been made to the churches. The people are cooperative, faithful and loyal. Raised for all purposes \$5,414.00. Conversions 5. Accessions 7.

EIGHTH STREET, CAMDEN, N. Y.: Rev. Charles I. Young, pastor. This church has taken on new life. The interior of the church has been redecorated. The Woman's Society of Christian Service is purchasing new carpet for the sanctuary. New members are joining. The response for connectional askings has been remarkable. Pastor and people are happy. Accessions 4, disbursed for all purposes \$4,861.00.

FERRY AVENUE: Rev. C. W. Bagwell, pastor. The work of this charge was interrupted in late July by the death of their beloved pastor, Rev. D. M. Collins. The local preacher, Mrs. Marion Washington, under the supervision of the District Superintendent kept things together in a marvelous manner until the appointment of a new pastor. The Rev. C. W. Bagwell was appointed

as pastor in September. The potential of the charge is slowly beginning to be realized. Church attendance is increasing. The organizations are active. Support of the connectional program has increased. Conversions 2, accessions 6. Total disbursed \$9,392.00.

CAPE MAY AND SWAINTON: The Rev. A. A. Berry, pastor. This charge reports an increase along all lines. The mortgage on the Franklin Street Church has been liquidated. Improvements have been made on the parsonage. Church attendance has increased. A children's choir has been organized. Disbursed for all purposes, \$5,102.00.

GRACE, CHESTER, PA.: Rev. S. L. Wilkins, pastor. This church makes another good report. A new outside bulletin board has been purchased and installed. The payments on mortgage are kept up to date. World Service and ministerial support are paid in full. Accessions 1. Total disbursements \$8,726.00.

SILOAM: Rev. M. L. McKenney, pastor. The serious illness and absence of the pastor was an unexpected and telling blow to this congregation, but in spite of it, the Church has had a good year. Much credit is due the local preachers, lay leader, officers and members who have carried on in a marvelous way. Since April 8th, Rev. J. B. Redmond in cooperation with the local preachers has had supervision over the work. This he has done without salary. His big heartedness is deeply appreciated. Pastor's salary has been paid in full. Connectional interest have been carried forward. Accessions 3. Total disbursed \$12,000.00. Our prayers shall go with Rev. and Mrs. McKenney, who have served so faithfully through the years, as they retire at this session of the Annual Conference.

ST. DANIELS: Rev. F. D. Jones, pastor. St. Daniels continues to grow. The effectiveness of the program carried on in the Center is reflected in increased church school enrollment and attendance, as well as increased financial support for the church. The church reaches families through this program that it might not reach otherwise. The interior of the church has been beautifully renovated. All claims have been met. Disbursed for all causes \$40,480.00. Conversions 11, accessions 54.

DARBY: Rev. C. E. Hammond, pastor. A significant interest in the spiritual fellowship of the church is being exemplified by the young adults in the community. This charge has realized the fulfillment of their ambition, that of dedicating their church to God. This was done on April 8, 1962. The pastor and people work harmoniously together and have had some great accomplishments. Conversions 15, accessions 21. Total disbursed \$11,009.00.

DELAIR: Rev. Rupert A. Adams, pastor. There seems to be a marked interest in the growth and outreach of the church under the leadership of an energetic pastor. Church and church school attendance has increased. Major repairs continued on the parsonage. Furnishings have been added to both the church and parsonage. Conversions 5, accessions 23. Total raised \$6,600.00.

ELKTON: Rev. Joseph Webster, pastor. Elkton is holding her own as she seeks to bring Christ to the people in her reach. She has responded to many of the district askings. Number of accessions 4, conversions 2. Total raised \$3,363.00.

FORDVILLE: Rev. William Tasco, pastor. Fordville has not reached its

potential this year. Many members withheld their support. However, those who lend their support are most loyal and sacrificing. 31 are tithers. Conversions 2, accessions 10. Total raised \$7,569.00. The improvements include the altar and pulpit redecorated and storm windows for the parsonage.

GRENLOCK-RHODES-BERLIN: Rev. M. D. Brooks, pastor. The people of this charge carry on in an heroic manner. They are very few in number, but are determined to keep striving. Some district askings have been met. Conversions 4, accessions 6. Total disbursed \$2,221.00.

LAWNSIDE: Rev. O'Connell Milbourne, pastor. Lawnside has responded like magic to the touch of a "Master." Church attendance has increased. Several church symbols of worship have been installed in the church. An increase in the pastor's salary has been made. Conversions 20, accessions 5. Total disbursed \$15,000.00.

MERCHANTVILLE: Rev. G. E. Geddis, pastor. Merchantville has had a good year. An Every-Member Canvass was successfully conducted. Conversions 3, accessions 10. The church has been beautifully redecorated on the interior. 100 chairs purchased for church dining room. Gas stove installed in the parsonage and many other improvements are evidenced. Total disbursements \$9,360.00.

MIDDLETOWN-DELAWARE CITY: Rev. L. C. Brown, pastor. This charge is progressing in several areas of church life. Some physical improvements on the church property include the installation of an oil furnace in Dales, at a cost of \$1,170.000. District askings have been met. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Total disbursements \$7,068.58.

MT. HOLLY: Rev. Walter L. Gray, pastor. Mt. Holly suffered the transfer of their pastor in September to the Tennessee Conference. This was a sudden blow to them and they were rather discouraged for a period. Rev. Walter L. Gray was appointed in the fall and succeeded in leading the congregation forward. Harmony and Christian fellowship prevail. Conversions 2, accessions 2.

NEW CASTLE: Rev. W. A. T. Miles, pastor. New Castle reports continued growth along all lines. Connectional interests of the church are cared for and the church is making itself felt in the life of the community. The congregation is planning the construction of a parish house. Conversions 10, accessions 10. Disbursements \$9,000.00.

NEWPORT: Rev. G. W. Cuff, pastor. Many achievements have been made this year, both spiritually and financially. Thirteen persons united with the church on one Sunday morning. Parsonage improvements include new porch and living room furniture. Church improvements are: new altar set, coat racks, sink for the kitchen, mimeograph machine and an offering box. Conversions 14, accessions 16. Disbursements \$6,000.00.

ODESSA-PORT PENN: Rev. Floyd Waters, pastor. Odessa and Port Penn continue to move forward in spite of their small congregations. Many inactive members have been reclaimed. Connectional obligations have been presented. Conversions 4. Total disbursements \$4,000.00.

PLEASANTVILLE-OCEAN CITY: Rev. C. W. Perry, pastor. The Ocean City church sustained a great loss as a result of the March tidal wave. With

some finanical assistance they are back in operation. Pleasantville still carries on. Spiritual fervor is high. Conversions 4, accessions 4. Raised for all purposes \$7,638.00.

PORT NORRIS: Rev. J. E. Bishop, pastor. Port Norris marches on. They sing as they march, "Don't Let Nobody Turn You Around." The spiritual condition is good. The pastor will give full time to his work next year. After 16 years of labor among these good people; the pastor and congregation request his return. Love and harmony prevail. Conversions 5, accessions 6. Disbursed for all causes \$6,662.00.

QUINTON-SPRINGTOWN: Rev. Calton Parker, pastor. The Springtown Church has just about been abandoned. The Quinton Church has great potential which has not yet been realized. A vigorous program of stewardship cultivation should help tap the resources available. Improvements include new roof on church, liquidation of organ debt, and a new water well, which serves both church and parsonage. Conversions 12, accessions 4. Disbursed for all purposes \$7,103.00.

ST. GEORGES AND KIRKWOOD: Rev. T. E. Cameron, pastor. The people on this charge are few, but faithful and loyal. The pastor has worked hard to promote the total program of the church. Youth work has been organized. The Sunday school meets regularly. The debt on the parish house has been liquidated and the sanctuary has been painted. Accessions 6. Total disbursed \$2,162.00.

SALEM: Rev. C. E. Kiah, pastor. This charge has had another good year. The church and church school attendance have increased. A Methodist Men's group has been organized. The exterior of the parsonage has been painted. Extensive improvements are being made on the church building. Conversions 8, accessions 8. Total for all purposes \$12,279.00.

COLEMAN MEMORIAL, WILMINGTON: Rev. H. R. Snead, pastor. Under the leadership of their new pastor, Coleman has taken on new life. Church attendance and youth work are gratifying. District askings have been met. Payments on mortgage are up to date. There has been an increase in giving for connectional purposes. Conversions 7. Raised for all purposes \$10,000.00.

EZION: Rev. W. L. D. Lyght, pastor. This charge maintains its former record of supporting the total program of the Church. There has been an increase in all special offerings. Church property improvements include the installation of self-service communion equipment, sidewalks repaired, parsonage redecorated, and new bathroom equipment installed. Conversions 20, accessions 20. Total disbursements \$30,000.00.

HAVEN: Rev. H. T. Moody, pastor. Haven, under the dynamic leadership of their pastor continues to improve its status each year. They have seen many dreams come true. The exterior and interior of the church building have been redecorated; new carpeting for the floor has been installed, a new piano purchased by the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and a cross and candle-lighting set for the altar have been given by individuals. Permanent awnings have been added to the parsonage. Total raised \$12,058.00. Conversions 6, accessions 16.

MT. CARMEL: Rev. E. V. Wimberly, pastor. Under the leadership of

the new pastor, the charge continues to manifest signs of growth and devel ment. Ministerial support has been increased. The organizations are work hard and trying to cooperate with the general program of the Church. Cversions 2, accessions 6. Total disbursed \$13,114.00.

MT. JOY: Rev. A. Chancy, pastor. This church is increasingly becom one of the better appointments on the district under the leadership of a ve conscientious pastor. The membership has increased. World service and co ference benevolences are paid in full. A young adult group has been organize A campaign for a building improvement fund has been initiated. The sum \$400.00 has been raised for this cause to date. Conversions 5, accessions Total disbursed \$8,966.00.

WOODBURY-JERICHO: Rev. S. G. Fullman, pastor. Pastor and peop make a good team. Ministerial support has been increased. A new oil heati system and vinyl floor covering have been installed in the parsonage. Extensiimprovements have been made to both church buildings. Conversions 1, acce sions 6. Total disbursed \$8,341.00.

Conclusion

It has been a glorious experience serving the Wilmington District th year. Wherever I have gone over the district, the pastors and people have bee

kind, congenial, loving and most cooperative.

Some of the outstanding accomplishments include the following: Fiftee charges reported that they observed the Bishop's Evangelistic Crusade. Twent; six pastors have committed themselves to give at least one tenth (a tithe) their income to help realize Christ's mission in the world. Reports indicate that there have been 220 conversions and 322 accessions to the Church.

Bishop Love, thank you for the opportunity you have given me to serve a superintendent of the Wilmington District. I have sought to execute the dutie of the office faithfully. I am grateful for the privilege that has been mine work with the many pastors and people in seeking to help bring the Kingdo a little nearer to reality. I solicit your prayers and continued blessings of Almighty God.

The Conference Treasurer's books have been audited by Certified Public Accountants, Walter P. Harris and Robert Bonner, Jr., and a satisfactory audited report has been filed with the Commission. This is the audited report filed with the Commission for the past fiscal year.

The list of other conference funds, the names of treasurers of each, and the approved depositories are as follows: Board of Education, Rev. C. D. Gerald, Treasurer, Citizens Southern Bank and Trust Co., Philadelphia, Pa.; Board of Lay Activities, J. R. Webb, Treasurer, People's National Bank, Laurel, Delaware; Board of Hospitals and Homes, Rev. C. E. Kiah, Treasurer, Salem National Bank and Trust Company, Salem, N. 3. DIRECTOR OF STEWARDSHIP

STEWARDSHIP is partnership with Christ through the Holy Spirit in fulfilling the purpose of God in the world.

CHRISTIAN ECONOMICS is defined as God's eternal ownership of property and the temporary possession of it by men dealing with one another as sons of God and as brothers among themselves.

PROMOTION OF CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP: The practice of stewardship of time, talents and possessions is the highest earthly manifestation of the Christian life. The program of stewardship cultivation is a cooperative endeavor in which both laymen and ministers share. Tithing and proportionate giving are the most fruitful and Christian of all methods of church financing. People give beyond the tithe as they more fully understand their partnership with God as Christian stewards.

TEACHING CHILDREN AND YOUTH TO SHARE: Dedication of self and gifts is an inseparable part of the Christian life. Every child and young person should make a pledge to the church from his allowance. The example of parents and church school teachers help to bring the best results. The expression of the Christian stewardship pattern early in life will bring infinite dividends in SERVICE and GIFTS through the years.

PLANNING THE ANNUAL FINANCIAL CAMPAIGN: Write the Board of Lay Activities, 1200 Davis St., Evanston, Illinois for information.

Mastery of the MANUAL ON FINANCE is essential. Success will be directly proportional to the intelligent preparatory work. Definite goals must be set. The raising of the budget ranks high among the religious services a church renders to God and humanity.

STIMULATING NEEDED PUBLICITY: The ultimate purpose of all publicity is to persuade to action. The spoken word of the minister in sermons and of laymen in discussions is an excellent form of publicity. Money spent for radio, newspaper and other sensible channels of communication such as attractively illustrated printing and mimeographing pays amazing dividends.

INCREASING STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCIAL MORALE: Enroll stewards at a Stewardship Service as the climax of cultivation, education, reading and preaching.

Information relative to the financial policy and condition of the church must be presented to the congregation. Members should be told how their gifts are being used and the results of their use.

The books of each treasurer should be audited annually by a competent public accountant.

STEWARDSHIP AND EVANGELISM: In the acceptance of partnership with Christ, Christians become the elect agency of God for carrying forward His redemptive purpose. Evangelism thus becomes a method of stewardship, the primary expression of God's stewardship to and for all of us.

Recommendations

We recommend:

- 1. That the elective course, "World Service in The Methodist Church," be used for church-wide study.
- 2. That the filmstrip, "Fantastic Journey," be utilized as a follow-up to "The Future Is Now," audio-visual filmstrip series.
- 3. That the use of "World Outlook" magazine be encouraged as a supplementary source for mission study.
- 4. That "The Methodist Story Book" which contains human interest stories illustrating World Service be circulated in each local church.

5. BOARD OF MISSIONS

It has been said by someone that World Service and the Advance belong together, that together they represent the heart of Methodism in giving.

This leads us to believe that the record of the growth in increased giving for World Service and the Advance is proof of the close relationship of these two interests, and relieves our minds of the idea of competitive relationship. They stand side by side in the proposed goal of \$15,000,000.00 for each cause each year for the quadrennium.

Furthermore, I believe that second mile giving gives us our greatest joy and most lasting rewards. Unfortunately, the cold record does not prove that we in the Central Jurisdiction believe it. The report of the General Board for 1961, states that our Baltimore Area gave to World Service during the year, twenty-one cents per person and to the Advance three cents per person, making a total of twenty-four cents per capita to these great causes of our Church. This is over three times lower than the lowest per capita giving in the entire Methodist Church. Being a low income group cannot always be an excuse for not doing our part as God has blessed us.

It is also interesting to note that the fifteen Methodist churches giving the most to World Service and the Advance come from our southern conferences. I wonder if our southern brothers are better Methodists than we of the North?

It is important that the Conference Board of Missions, through its secretaries help to keep the blood stream of the Church flowing. If we falter here, the whole structure is in danger and this must not happen.

In this brief foreword to the report of our secretaries, the Board wishes to thank these men for their loyalty and zeal in carrying the message of our connectional program to every corner of our Conference. Working without compensation, or proper support from the Conference, their only thought has been to hear the Master's, "Well done thou good and faithful servant."

The thanks of the Board also goes to our District Superintendents who have attended all of our meetings and co-operated in every phase of our program.

To those of you who made requests to the Board for assistance and did not receive it, it was because the churches of the Conference did not meet their connectional responsibilities. May we always remember the work of our Conference can only be done through consecrated team work.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

In order that we might have an "informed people" as well as a "participating people," an active Commission on Missions in every local church is a must. Every pastor has the responsibility to see that this commission is at work in his local church as an agency of promotion, cultivation and education in all phases of work of missions and church extensions.

General Recommendations

- 1. In order that an effective program of missions might be projected, it is necessary that the Executive Committee meet with the district superintendents and the district missionary secretaries in a planning conference during the month of June.
- 2. That members of the board, district missionary secretaries and interested persons endeavor to attend the missionary conferences in order to receive inspiration and information as to render larger service; Appalachian Missionary Conference, West Virginia Wesleyan College, August 6-10, and Delaware-Washington Conference on Missions, Camphor Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa., August 14-16.
- That every local church set up and maintain a functioning Commission on Missions.
- 4. That every local church in the Conference plan and conduct a Church-Wide School of Missions.
- 5. That every effort be made to increase attendance and interest in the District Missionary Institutes.
- 6. That every local church plan a "Missionary Sunday" and invite a missionary or scholarship student as speaker.
- That every minister and lay member of our churches assume personal responsibility for the recruitment of young men and women for the ministry at home and the world mission fields.
- 8. That every local church endeavor to meet its World Service apportionment in full.
- 9. That churches in urban areas establish outpost Sunday schools in relocated and newly developed areas.
- 10. That churches in farm and seasonal areas become more concerned in our ministry to the migratory and seasonal laborers.

Specific Recommendations

We further recommend:

I.—That the Delaware Conference wholeheartedly endorse and support the nation-wide study program for 1960-1964. Over-all theme: "Jesus Christ Is Lord"; specific theme: "Our Mission Today." Quadrennium Emphasis: 1—The Faith That Compels Us; 2—The Factors That Confront Us; 3—The Frontier That Calls Us: 4—The Program That Unites Us.

II.—(a) That during 1962, the Bishop, district superintendents, Conference Missionary Secretary, chairman of the Board of Missions and the district missionary secretaries plan for and promote a CONFERENCE-WIDE WEEK OF MISSIONS, allowing one day for each district. Suggested date, October 8-12. (b) That qualified personnel on the work and program of missions and members of the Conference study team be engaged to give leadership for this

week. (c) That the quadrennial emphasis, and the missionary concern of the Delaware Conference be projected and interpreted at these rallies. (d) That the Woman's Society of Christian Service be invited to share in the planning

and promotion of the WEEK OF MISSIONS.

III.—(a) That each district missionary secretary under the guidance of the district superintendent shall make special effort to get more local churches to voluntarily adopt conference initiated specials and general advance specials.

(b) That our Annual Conference Specials shall be such projects that are currently met by the Promotion-Advance Fund.

(1) That the Conference Board of Missions shall continue as the agency through which such projects are accepted, classified, and funds ad-

ministered.

(2) That every pastor and local church shall make special effort to meet the Promotion-Advance Fund asking in full during this conference year.

(3) That each District Superintendent emphasize the importance of the Promotion-Advance Fund, and receive reports of remittance at each

session of the Quarterly Conference.

(c) That every local church shall voluntarily accept to share in a General Advance Special. (1) That the following shall be accepted as "suggested" projects: Teacher's salary in Liberia—\$840.00; Books for Alaska Methodist University Library—\$200.00; Salary, Indian Mission preacher—\$640.00; Peoples Methodist Community Center, New Orleans, La.—\$400.00; LaCour Mission, Japan—\$200.00; Support hospital bed in Angola, India, Sarawak—\$100.00; Pay for an operation in a Mission hospital—\$25.00.

6. BOARD OF PENSIONS

Recommendations

1. PASTORS' ONE AND ONE-HALF PER CENT

We recommend:

- a. That the district superintendents stress the importance of the 1½% payments and urge all pastors who are in arrears to pay the amount due this fund.
- b. That in planning the appointments of the ministers, the question of their relation to the fund be taken into consideration.
- c. That in order to reduce the immense amount of 1½% due, ministers receiving \$5,000 or more cash salary should pay in full; those receiving \$2,000 to \$2,999 cash salary pay 80% of indebtedness; and those receiving less than \$2,000 cash salary pay 60% of indebtedness.
- d. That the suggested arrangements for delinquent payments be made for the conference year 1962-63.
- e. That the roll of 1½% payments be called at the Conference Executive Session.

2. PERMANENT FUND

We recommend:

That the payment of \$8,333 be made to the Permanent Fund this year and continue until we enter the Reserve Pension Fund.

3. HEALTH AND WELFARE

We recommend:

- a. That the same asking of \$500 be requested this year for the Philadelphia Methodist Hospital.
- b. That all ministers be enrolled in Health and Hospitalization policies that are available through state and local Councils of Churches.

4. RESERVE PENSION FUND

We recommend:

That the Board conduct a conference wide CONFERENCE CLAIM-ANTS STAMP SALE for the Reserve Pension Fund. Stamps are to be sold in sheets of one hundred for \$1.00 per sheet.

RESERVE PENSION: \$4.513.00 was raised for this cause last year. Many charges have not raised their original quota and there seems little inclination on their part to do so. Credit must be given to those charges who have raised their quota and who have tried to help the others by raising additional amounts in excess of their quotas.

> There are many who have not paid their pledges in full to this fund. Many seem to feel that since they did not pay their pledges in the first four years, they were excused from completing their payments. There are some who have not paid at all on their pledges for one reason or another.

> The total amount in this fund as of May 31, 1962 is \$251,500.63. We are still \$68,500 short of the original goal.

> A beautiful stamp has been provided to boost this fund. It is an inexpensive way for you to help this fund along. We trust you will buy and use them. If these stamps are sold in large numbers and the pledges as well as the charge apportionment is paid, we should reach our goal by next conference.

7. BOARD OF EDUCATION

The basic concept in the process of Christian education is that of growth and development. Our chief concern is to help persons to grow and develop in the likeness of Christ. This report calls attention to the items in our program which have been designed to help persons to grow in Christ's likeness.

Children's Work: Under the leadership of Mrs. Emma W. Strother, Con-

ference Director, work with children continues to make progress.

We are pleased that our Conference has been chosen as one in which experimental work will be carried on in the development of the new curriculum for children. Miss Elsie Young, Lincoln, Del.; Mrs. Alberta Brown, Centreville; and Miss Lucy Wricks, Chester, Pa. will conduct experimental classes in their respective churches.

We have a deep concern about the loss of church school enrollment in the children's division. According to the report of the statistician we lost 2,250 children from our rolls during the conference year 1960-1961. We also suffered a loss of 699 enrollment in vacation church schools in 1961 as compared with

1960.

Youth Work: After five years of effective work as Conference director of youth work, C. Leonard Miller, terminated his services with our staff as of August 31, 1961. The youth and adult workers with youth who have worked with Mr. Miller regret very much that he is no longer serving us. Since September 1, I have been acting as youth director with the loyal support of the district directors. I wish to make special mention of Rev. George Outen and Rev. Edwin Ellis who have been especially helpful.

Youth Assembly: Our first experience in holding a summer assembly at Haverford College, Haverford, Pa., was a good one. There were 102 youth, 11 adult workers enrolled and a staff of 22. The general spirit of the assembly was high. The association with the college staff was pleasant. We look forward to returning to Haverford July 22-28, 1962.

Progress in Junior High Work is steadily growing as evidenced by the large number of this age group served at the district assembly during the summer. We regret we were unable to carry out junior high camping last August. The campsite was not ready. We look forward to having a camp for this group August 6-11, 1962.

Missionary Rallies were well attended on all districts, Friday, November 23. On the Philadelphia District two rallies were held; the second was held on Saturday, November 24. According to the report of the Conference Treasurer, \$1,388.00 had been raised in the Methodist Youth Fund as of January 31, 1962.

Higher Education: Our Committee on Higher Education is seeking to be more effective in our ministry to students. Dr. W. R. Hazzard, the chairman, has given fine leadership. We are in the midst of a study of our student responsibility by seeking to determine the number of students who are attending colleges from the churches in our Conference. Partial reports reveal that we have 295 students. We are aware that this does not represent a true picture as many churches have not reported. With the Philadelphia Conference, we held a Convocation of Methodist Students in Philadelphia at The University of Pennsylvania, April 1.

We must take seriously our financial responsibility for student work. The Wesley Foundation at Maryland State College and Christian Center at Morgan State College, where hundreds of our Methodist students are enrolled, must have our financial support. Rev. S. S. Tatem at Maryland

State College, and Rev. Howard Cornish at Morgan State College are doing excellent work.

National Scholarship Awards: The following students from our conference received the National Methodist Scholarships this school year. Elizabeth Ann Riggs, 1367 Kenwood Ave., Camden, N. J., Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C.; Robert E. Glover, 633 N. 40th St., Philadelphia, Pa., Clark College, Atlanta, Ga.

Methodist Students Enrolled in State Colleges: Of the 588 students enrolled at Maryland State College, Princess Anne, Maryland, 237 or 40.4 per cent are Methodist. Of the 2,791 students enrolled at Morgan State College, Baltimore, Md., 686 or 24.5 per cent are Methodist.

Adult Work: Rev. Ewart C. Hackshaw and Rev. Clayton Hammond came to the Dover and Wilmington Districts respectively, as new directors during the year. They, with the Executive Secretary, spent a week at Rolling Ridge, North Andover, Mass. in a seminar on Understanding Adults. This was a most stimulating experience under the leadership of Dr. Maleum Knowles, of Boston University.

Young Adult Work: Rev. David W. Briddell, Conference Director of Adult Work, is chairman of a joint committee composed of members of the Philadelphia and Delaware Conferences. The committee is making an extensive study of the older youth—young adult situation in Philadelphia. The General Board of Education is cooperating with us in this study under the leadership of Rev. Charles E. Mowry.

General Church School Work: The Dover, Philadelphia and Wilmington Districts carried on successful church school workers' conferences during the year. The Easton district with Dr. Lowell B. Hazzard, Wesley Seminary, Washington, D. C. as the resource leader, conducted a successful Bible Conference. A Bible Conference was held in Philadelphia, April 6-8 with Dr. Clinton Armstrong as leader.

Family Life: Perhaps we have no greater need in Christian education than that in family life. As a result, our family life committee has been reorganized with Mr. James C. Hardcastle as chairman. The committee is currently making a study of the family life work carried on in the churches of our Conference. While the questionnaires which were sent have not all been returned, many interesting trends are revealed. When the study is completed, the findings will be made available to our churches and also to the General Board of Education.

Camping: We are hopeful that we will be able to do at least a modest amount of camping this summer. Due to the faithful services of a number of young adults from Philadelphia, we have been able to do a great deal in getting the campsite ready for use. Our development is progressing slowly due to lack of funds.

Certified Directors of Christian Education: At the last session of the Annual Conference we presented our first certified directors of Christian education, Miss Phyllis Henry and Rev. Edwin Ellis; Rev. Ellis being certified as minister of education. Miss Henry has since been transferred to the East Wisconsin Conference where she serves as an associate executive secretary. The application of Rev. T. C. Jones is being processed.

Incorporation of the Board of Education: In accord with the directive of the 1961 session of the Annual Conference, the Board of Education has become incorporated in the State of Delaware. A Board of Directors, as required, is now being set up within the Board of Education.

Appreciation: Space will not permit adequate expression of appreciation to the persons who have contributed to the progress of the work of Christian education. These include Bishop Love, district superintendents, pastors, members of conference and district staffs and countless workers in the local churches. We are grateful to every one.

Recommendations

A. Higher Education

1. That we continue the asking of \$1.50 per member for the support of

work with schools and colleges.

2. That the amount for this cause be placed in the regular budget of the local church with the suggestion that Layman's Day and Student Recognition Day be observed as a means of helping to raise these funds. (\$1.50

per member.)

3. That we use the amount raised for schools and colleges (\$1.50 per member) to support the following institutions on the percentage basis as indicated: Morristown College, 20 percent; Bennett College, 20 percent; Wesley Theological Seminary, 20 percent; Gammon Theological Seminary, 5 percent; Wesley Foundation, Md. State College, 10 percent; Wesley Foundation, Howard University, 3 percent; Allen High School, 2 percent; Morgan Christian Center, to support the Associate Director, 15 percent—with the understanding that there will be a priority on \$1,200.00 to develop new work within the conference territory, 5 percent-total, 100 percent.

4. That we support Morgan Christian Center with our Race Relation Day offering. Should this offering go beyond \$2,500.00 the remainder is to be

given to other institutions in the area.

5. That we urge our churches to make every effort to increase the number of students attending colleges, with special consideration given to attending Methodist Schools.

6. That we give full support to all efforts to supply student aid and scholarships to students both on the conference and local church levels.

7. That we give full support to the Chesapeake Area and New Jersey Methodist Student Movements.

B. General Recommendations

1. That we make a study of the causes involved in the decreased enrollment in the Children's division of our church schools, and seek to remedy the same.

2. That we put forth every effort to complete our campaign of \$30,000.00

for campsite development.

- 3. That we increase our emphasis on family life education and seek to send our full quota to the Fourth National Family Life Conference, Chicago, Ill., October 19-21, 1962.
- 4. That a committee be set up to study the financial support of all phases of Christian education work in the Conference, and to recommend improvement.

COMMITTEE ON FAMILY LIFE

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That district workshops or institutes on Christian family life be instituted for ministers and leading representatives of the various commissions and organizations of the churches as a means of developing appreciation, understanding and knowledge relative to this area of religious education, and promoting the program in churches.

2. That essential instruction be given to church school teachers through organized classes or conferences to prepare them for home visitation.

- 3. That more emphasis be placed on counseling in the schools of theology and that they institute in-service workshops and conferences for ministers already in the field in order to prepare them to meet the increasing demands of individuals in need of such service.
- 4. That instructional programs in family life education be provided for youth through the youth organizations of the church and through specialized classes.
- 5. That guidelines be established for developing better coordination between the church, school and other community resources which might strengthen family life activity.
- 6. That more emphasis be placed on activities in the church with father, mother, sons and daughters together as a means of playing up the "oneness" of the family unit.
- 7. That consideration be given to the promotion of such activities as: (1) sponsoring "neighborhood circles," (2) pooled transportation, (3) more Sunday morning services related to programs of family life for those communities which have difficulty in getting attendance at Sunday afternoon or evening services.
- 8. That the Conference promote the use of the Basic Christian Books Series to bring families together in a study of their faith and their responsibilities in helping youth develop a faith for living.
 - 9. That provision be made for a larger ministry to the one-parent family.

8. BOARD OF EVANGELISM

As a Board, let us call your attention to the "aim" of evangelism as it is expressed in the 1960 *Discipline*. "The aim of evangelism is to bring all men into living, active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ as divine Saviour

and through the regenerating power of the Holy Spirit; to gather them into the fellowship of the Church; to lead them to express their Christian discipleship in every area of human life that the Kingdom of God may be realized."

With this in mind, the Board has endeavored to create such enthusiasm within its members, district committees, local churches and other leaders in evangelism, that there will come a new awakening in the emphasis of evangelism.

The Board has endeavored to give particular emphasis to a well rounded program of evangelism throughout the Conference. The response has not been as expected but it is gratifying to state that there is an increase in spirit and in activity.

We live in an era of greatness. We have a great Church with great memberships, great buildings, great budgets and great programs. In this time of greatness, the demand is to launch a great program of evangelism that will challenge and match the hour of greatness. It is imperative that we as leaders in evangelism create a new image of ourselves and have again this strange heart-warming of the Holy Spirit.

John Wesley said, "I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist, but I am afraid lest they should exist only as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power."

Evangelism is challenged at this point. If we are to have that regenerating power of the Holy Spirit, we must return once more to the "Upper Room" and there remain until the Holy Spirit has filled every heart. We believe, not only as Methodists, but as representatives of Jesus Christ, that to do His work, we must be equipped with the one thing that is so essential, "the Holy Spirit." Jesus believed this was essential to his early followers. He commanded them to "tarry" until they had received this all important element in their lives. This hundred and twenty persons who comprised the first Church, waited until the Holy Spirit came and filled the whole house "where they were." Dr. William D. Longstaff has so well expressed this need in the hymn, "Take time to be holy, Speak oft with thy Lord."

The National Council of Evangelism of The Methodist Church, in session at Kingston, Okla., set forth some objectives for the remainder of 1962 and the Aldersgate Year of 1963. These years are to be a time of spiritual awakening in Methodism throughout the world. Achieving this awakening will require prayer, Bible study, repentance, theological insight, preaching, witnessing, evangelistic meetings and personal experience. These, with others will become our objectives for the coming year.

The Delaware Conference was honored by having two ministers, C. L. Carrington and Henry H. Nichols, invited by the Board of Evangelism and Division of National Missions to share in the Visitation Evangelism Mission to Alaska. The other Negro minister was R. E. Harrington of the Louisiana Conference. These three were sharing with a group of thirty-one other ministers and laymen in this Mission. It should be stated that these men were invited by our National Boards, but they assumed the financial obligations and their local churches accepted the indebtedness. We say to the local churches, "God bless you." The time has come when other churches of the Delaware Conference should enable the minister or laymen to participate in similar endeavors in order to have a part in witnessing for Christ and His Church.

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That the conference secretary of evangelism serve as convenor for "The

Twelve." This group will subsequently elect its chairman.

2. That the conference secretary of evangelism will act as adviser to "The Twelve" and as a liaison between "The Twelve" and the Board of Evangelism in accordance with the provision of paragraph 1479, Methodist Discipline.

3. That the district secretaries of evangelism will serve in a similar capacity as the conference secretary in relation to "The Twelve" on each

district.

4. That inasmuch as "The Twelve" are working in cooperation with and within the general framework of the program of evangelism, their expenses shall be borne by the Board of Evangelism.

5. That the 225th Aldersgate Year Celebration open with the observance of Family Prayer Sunday (the first Sunday in January); and that daily family

devotions be encouraged and promoted for every Christian home.

6. That Aldersgate Sunday, May 19, 1963 be used by each local church

as a day for spiritual enrichment.

7. That Pentecost Sunday, 1963 which is also Methodist Student Day, be used by the local churches as a day of spiritual enlistment and enlightenment for youth and children leading toward a decision for Christ.

9. BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The purpose of the Board of Lay Activities is to deepen the spiritual life of the lay members of the church and to cultivate among them an increasing loyalty and interest that they may become an active working force in each local church. In seeking to fulfill this purpose, the Mid-year Workshop was held again in September in Atlantic City, N. J. Many delegates from local churches were in attendance. We are hoping to have increased attendance for the Conference Workshop this year which will be held at the Ambassador Hotel, Atlantic City, N. J., November 16-18. Workshops on the work of the Official Board and Christian Social Concerns will be included.

At the beginning of last conference year, a meeting was held in Salisbury, Maryland to set up an organization on the district level for the major areas of the work of lay activities. A district director and two associate directors were elected for each district for the areas of lay speaking, Christian steward-

ship and Methodist Men.

Study courses for lay speakers, workshops on stewardship and increased emphasis on work of Methodist Men on the district level proved to be quite fruitful. One hundred fifty-six persons passed the course on lay speaking and were consecrated by Bishop Love at the Annual Conference. Many local churches were organized, with assistance of district directors of stewardship, for the every member visitation. We shall not be satisfied, however, until every local church annually carries out an every member visitation so that every member will come to understand the total program of the church.

I wish to pay tribute to Mr. Larrie Jones, conference director, and as-

sociates for the fine work they have done in the area of Methodist Men's work; to Mr. T. A. Jeter, conference director, and associates for effective leadership in lay speaking; and to Rev. J. E. Dunn, conference director, and associates for excellent work in Christian stewardship.

I want also to thank Bishop Love, district superintendents, ministers and laity for their untiring support given during this past conference year.

10. BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The trustees of the Delaware Conference submit the following report:

The Annual Conference is incorporated under the laws of the State of Delaware. 28 South Queen Street is listed as the address to which all legal papers pertaining to the corporation are to be sent. The requirement that the charter be renewed each year has been met, having been renewed in January of 1962.

The trustees hold the deeds to the following properties: Tioga Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa.; St. Matthew's Methodist Church, Trevose, Pa.; and Coleman Memorial Methodist Church, Wilmington, Del. The titles held for the property on which the proposed home for the aged is to be built and for the camp site are in the process of being transferred to the trustees of the home for the aged and the camp site respectively.

The insurance policies for the Tioga Church and the Community Church are kept in the safe deposit box at the Delaware Trust Company in Dover, Delaware. The Tioga Church is covered by \$250,000 and the Community Church by \$13,000 in insurance.

The trustees sold for the sum of \$500.00 the abandoned church property at Camden, Delaware. This sum has been deposited with the conference treas-

The list of abandoned church property is as follows:

Dover District-Portsville, Delaware and Mt. Zion Church, Lincoln, Delaware.

Easton District—Church property near Beckwith, Maryland; church property Antioch, Maryland; and Dickenson Chapel, near Cambridge. Maryland.

Salisbury District—St. Luke's Church, at Punching Landing and Lutherbury Chapel, near Salisbury, Maryland.

Wilmington District-Church property at Absecon, New Jersey.

District Superintendent J. W. Elbert reports that the St. Luke's Church of the Tindley Chapel Charge, which was abandoned church property, was illegally sold by persons described as the remaining trustees of the property.

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That the trustees be authorized to take legal action necessary to recover St. Luke's Church property or the sum of money for which it was sold.

2. That the trustees be given authority to sell the abandoned church property at Lincoln, Delaware. Dover District.

11. BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The \$30,000 Golden Age Investment Drive has been launched. Edward A. Hughes, Sr. has been appointed conference director, assisted by the following district directors, Mrs. Mable Cropper, Mrs. Helen Crippen, Edwin L. Ellis, Omar C. Jones, and M. L. McKenney.

The Board of Directors of the Home for the Aged, led by the chairman, James C. Hardcastle, is progressing in processing a loan of \$569,000 from the

Home and Housing Finance Corporation.

The General Board of Hospitals and Homes, administrators of the Kendall Fund, has given the Board of Directors during 1961-62 the sum of \$41,000. Future grants will be made to the Board depending upon the interest and support that our Conference gives and the progress made toward the building and operating of the Home for the Aged.

Recommendations

We recommend:

That every effort be made to complete the raising of \$30,000 by November, 1962.

That each local church hospitals and homes steward or stewards and all lay members of the Annual Conference work closely with the district directors and district superintendents in promotion of the drive.

That a roll call be made at each District Conference.

That the Commission on World Service and Finance approve a budget of \$5,000 to be assessed to the charges; and that each charge make every effort to raise the assessment in full.

That all Golden Cross enrollment funds be held in a separate account by the Board of Hospitals and Homes for health and welfare as recommended by the Golden Cross Society of the Conference.

That the 1962 class of directors be elected.

12. GOLDEN CROSS SOCIETY

Another year passes and it is through our Lord and loyal members of our churches that I make this report.

The Golden Cross Society stimulates a realistic attitude toward aging. A broad understanding of the aging process and the special needs of older people is of primary importance. The resources of the Board of Hospitals and Homes and the Golden Cross Society can help us gain this needed understanding. We must be concerned not only with the immediate problems of older people, but also with the solution of such problems as they affect persons of all ages. We strive to make clear the importance of preparation in younger years for the seniorship now being attained by more and more people. We also emphasize the primary responsibility of each individual in meeting the needs of the aging population.

The Golden Cross Society activity aims at full recognition of the capabilities of older persons and the contribution they can make to themselves and society. We cannot isolate the aged! This concept must be recognized and acted upon by every major group in our society. Each of us should face the realities, possibilities and responsibilities which accompany the new era of aging. All age groups should re-study their attitude toward the aging process and the opportunities which the new status of aging provides. We must realize that each of us is aging from the day he is born and that we, in our earlier years, may help to determine in large measure, security after retirement. Problems of the aged are due primarily to the decreased income at retirement, making it less easy to meet every day needs and difficult to meet large expenses.

The National Board of Hospitals and Homes reports the greater growth to be in service for the aging. There are one hundred twelve homes for the

aged today as compared to sixty in 1950.

Every local church should have a hospitals and homes steward or stewards, to represent institutional care. The Golden Cross Society considers one of its vital tasks to be that of informing Methodists of the contribution of creative group living and loving care to the meeting of needs of the aging. Persons contemplating admission to the proposed Delaware Conference Home for the Aged should have available a counselor in the hospital and homes steward. This steward, on request of the pastor, shall be in charge of the Golden Cross enrollment and the dissemination of literature to assist in relating the congregation not only to the greater philanthropy of the church, but also to the social welfare organizations.

It was a high privilege to represent the Delaware Conference at the National Convention of the Board of Hospitals and Homes in Chicago, Illinois during February and participate in the study, "Our Church's Health and Welfare Concern." It has also been my privilege to speak at local churches and district meetings concerning our cause.

We are grateful for the support given by the leaders of the Conference and local churches, and for the work of the district directors of the Society. Progress has been reported. Ours is a rich heritage and can be made more meaningful through our service in the future.

Recommendations

We recommend:

- 1. That our goal for 1962-63 should be: Every local church seeking to enroll every member in the Golden Cross Society with the contribution of \$1.00 per year.
- 2. That annual enrollment day be observed on the second Sunday in November.
- 3. That the Golden Cross enrollment receipts be labeled, Golden Cross Society when remitted to Conference treasurer.
 - 4. That we observe "Help Educate a Nurse Sunday."

13. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

The responsibility for administering the policies of the Board of Christian Social Concerns rests with the director, chairman, three vice-chairmen and district directors.

The Board has been active in the interest of temperance and general welfare, peace and world order, and human relations and economic affairs. By means of films, books, panels, lectures, and displays, we have tried to stimulate local churches, pastors and other leaders to fruitful thinking and action in the area of social concerns. The program of Christian Social Concerns is a real challenge to every Methodist Church and pastor. The effectiveness of our endeavors will depend upon our ministers and lay members.

We call the attention of the Conference to three significant meetings during this conference year. A meeting with leaders of the Peninsula and Delaware Conferences was held at Easton, Md. We were called together to discuss the major existing problems which separate us and with which we must deal if we are to bring about merger and integration; and some practical, concrete, specific things that can be done now on local, district, and conference levels that will help in meeting these problems. There were seventy-two in attendance (Delaware Conference, 30; Peninsula Conference, 41; General Board, 1). We are most grateful to Bishop Love and Bishop Lord for their strong support, presence and participation. They have shown their deep concern in the total program of Christian social action.

Our concern about new patterns in housing led us to hold a meeting in Philadelphia for the purpose of exploring the extent, causes and efforts of new patterns in housing in the Philadelphia area and to seek wholesome solutions.

At the invitation of Rev. J. W. Reynolds, chairman of the Virginia Annual Conference Board, your director met with representatives from the Virginia, Washington and North Carolina Conferences to converse on our common concerns in regard to territorial overlapping.

The question is being asked, "Is this the time to abolish the Central Jurisdiction?" Varying opinions are being expressed. One thing is certain and clear, the consciences of large sections of the Church, of both races, are troubled because the Central Jurisdiction exemplifies segregation within The Methodist Church. It was my privilege to be a delegate to the Jurisdictional Exploratory Meeting in Cincinnati, Ohio, March 26-29 to explore the problems involved in the proposed merger of the Central Jurisdiction with the geographical jurisdictions. The Board has appointed a committee to present a resolution at this session expressing the thinking of our Board of Christian Social Concerns. (See Resolution 4.)

A number of resources to help in carrying on the activities of the local church commissions are available through our office. Films, filmstrips, books, and turnover charts are included for your use. Each district has a director available for teaching, speaking and guidance, and we urge our churches to make use of these resources in an effort to make the people aware of the problems and dangers that are found in our present day society and the consequent results upon the home, the community, and the individual.

Miss Evelyn Waters, director of Philadelphia district reports attending three local church conferences held across racial lines for mutual understanding, conducted four schools and mission study courses related to peace, and sent 500 telegrams reflecting the feeling of the Philadelphia District churches to State and National legislators when issues were being decided.

Rev. LeRoy Hamilton, director of the Dover District, reports 10 churches participating in interracial meetings and other gatherings, and that through-

out the Dover District Christian Social Concerns is making itself felt. The pastor and people of Whatcoat Church joined with the legislative committee of the Peninsula Conference in a march to the State Capitol to petition the legislators to enact a bill assuring to all citizens of the State equal accommodations.

The Board wishes to express its appreciation for the support of Bishop Love, district superintendents, pastors, and lay leadership for their interest and concern for the quadrennial program on temperance, world order, and social and economic affairs.

Recommendations

We recommend:

- 1. That the Boards of Education and Christian Social Concerns work together in setting up coaching conferences for those who would prepare to teach the course on Christian social concerns in district training schools for Christian workers.
- 2. That the invitation of Dr. Carl D. Soule, executive secretary of the Division of Peace and World Order, to send a member of our Board to Europe, including Russia, with other Methodists, be accepted. Further, that the selection of Henri M. Deas, chairman of Division on Peace and World Order, be approved. We further recommend that the Conference authorize the district superintendents to ask each church to make a free will contribution to help finance the trip and send to the Conference Treasurer not later than July 1, 1962.
- 3. That in accordance with the recommendation of the Central Jurisdictional Study Conference that each Annual Conference be requested to designate its Board of Christian Social Concerns, or a special committee, as the agency to serve in setting standards for the transfer of churches under Amendment IX; we recommend that our Board will serve as the agency of the Delaware Conference in joint enterprises of study, discussion and planning with conference agencies in other Jurisdictions in preparation for contemplated local church transfers.
- 4. In order to give needed guidance to local churches and carry forward the urgently suggested activities from the General Board, we recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance and the Conference approve an increase of \$1,800 in our budget, making a total of \$3,000 for the year. The increase would be used for administrative work, office equipment, district activities, including training for division chairmen and district director, and joint study courses sponsored by Boards of Education and Social Concerns.

14. COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The responsibility of the Commission on Christian Vocations is the task of helping young people to discover the gifts with which they have been endowed by God and in light of the world's needs, make their commitment as a Christian in their life's work. We have sought to help youth understand that such a commitment carries with it a willingness to prepare for their chosen fields. "A call to serve is a call to prepare."

We recognize that counseling is most necessary in helping youth choose vocations. Names of young people who have chosen Church related vocations have been sent to our commission. Counseling has been done in local churches and on the districts at youth meetings. Following the Youth Missionary Rallies, names of youth with their chosen vocations, came from the Salisbury and Wilmington districts. As usual, the Summer MYF Assembly was a source from which we received commitments.

Much more needs to be done to help parents, pastors, church school teachers and others to become more skilled in counseling in order to help youth in the local church and in the home. The need to help youth to have a sense of mission in choosing a life work is very important in this day when so much emphasis is placed upon material gain. We are confident that our young people will rise to the challenge of service under the guidance of mature counselors who are skilled in working with them and who themselves have a sense of social concern.

Our task is two-fold: (1) Helping adult leaders to become effective counselors, and (2) Helping youth to discover God's call to service. For this task we must seek to be of greater assistance.

We are encouraged by the continued interest which our young people show in the annual conference on The Ministry and Missions held during the Christmas season. Dr. Earl Furgerson of Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D. C., was our guest this year.

While we carry quite a list of names of young people on our files, we are aware that it needs revising. Any help which pastors and others may give in bringing our records up to date, would be greatly appreciated.

Recommendations

- 1. That the district superintendents lift up the matter of Christian vocations in Quarterly Conferences, Preachers' Meetings and all district meetings.
- 2. That the district committees organize for more effective work.
- That each local church seek to organize a committee on Christian vocations in accord with the provision of the 1960 Discipline.
- 4. That the local church committee help the home to become aware of its opportunity in vocational counseling.
- 5. That every church observe Ministry Sunday using this as an opportunity to acquaint the church with the needs of the Christian ministry, as well as to challenge young men and women to serve Christ through the church.

We are grateful for the help which has been available as we have sought to serve the conference. Bishop Love has personally worked with our youth especially in choosing the ministry. His contribution to our Christmas meeting is always helpful. The District Superintendents likewise have been active in promoting this cause. Many teachers, counselors, and parents have given guidance in many ways. For all of this we are thankful.

Rev. E. A. Hughes was selected as representative to a school for Town and Country pastors, held in Washington, D. C., February 26-March 10, but insufficient funds prevented his attending.

DOVER DISTRICT . . .

- 1. Cooperating with the Commission, Superintendent W. E. Stanley held consultations with the Galena and Sassafras charges, Maryland, with the results that both charges are now one, working under the leadership of Pastor Ophelia James.
- 2. Superintendent Stanley is keeping close observation of the churches of his district with a view to uniting churches wherever and whenever it seems wise.
- 3. Chairman Chancy attended the District Conference at Dover, November 8, 1961, and addressed the meeting.

EASTON DISTRICT ...

1. On October 12, 1961, this district held its second successful Convocation on the Church in Town and Country at Oxford, Md. Superintendent C. L.

Trader, Executive Secretary E. A. Hughes, and Missionary Secretary W. H. Greene did a great job in team work.

2. Bishop Love attended this Convocation, and delivered an impressive address.

SALISBURY DISTRICT ...

- 1. At Princess Anne, Md., September 30, 1961, Superintendent J. W. Elbert held an inspiring Laymen's Conference. Your chairman attended, and addressed the Conference, explaining the effects of population changes on Town and Country churches, and some things to do to strengthen the churches.
- 2. A series of consultations have been planned by Superintendent Elbert, at Shiloh and Lawsionia charges, Crisfield; and with John Wesley and White Temple, Salisbury, looking toward some changes in the organizational structure on these charges.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT . . .

- 1. Superintendent J. R. Shockley discussed mergers and uniting with Mt. Holly and Burlington charges. He endeavored to point out ways of improving the work of those charges by some united work. No agreement could be reached at that time.
 - 2. Consultation will be held with Glenloch and Rhodes, March 24.

- 4. That the Town and Country Commission meet at least once during conference year on each predominately rural district, at the time and place arranged by respective district superintendents; for the purpose of hearing debates on suggested mergers or other problems peculiar to the rural ministry or church.
- 5. That a conference-wide Town and Country Convocation be held in an avaidable rural area in 1962.

16. TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

The primary area of work for TRAFCO this coming year will be to provide audio-visual training for our Conference. Some members of TRAFCO will attend the Audio-Visual Seminar at Williamsport, Pa. this summer. These persons will then provide leadership for our proposed district workshops.

The Conference Audio-Visual Library will be established this year. We are requesting now that local churches, conference boards and agencies, and other persons having filmstrips of value to place their materials with us for distribution. TRAFCO does not have funds available to purchase filmstrips. However, boards and agencies should consider purchasing those filmstrips that are important to their work and place them with us for effective distribution to local churches.

Many groups have sought our aid in helping them to find a movie projector for use in meetings throughout the Conference. A survey has revealed that very few movie projectors are available. We are confident that several agencies, because of their need, are so desirous of having this important equipment, that we are recommending that we purchase a movie projector. It will be the task of TRAFCO to care for and make available upon request, the projector to the boards and agencies of our Conference. We feel that the equipment may be used in a local church if two conditions are met: (1) an experienced operator to be responsible for projection and (2) the payment of a small fee to cover possible repairs. To assist local churches in using audio-visual equipment, we feel that audio-visual equipment should be standard equipment for the office of

every district superintendent. We strongly encourage district groups to assume the responsibility of providing this equipment as a special project.

The new children's television series, "Breakthru" has been released. Several members of our Conference attended the meetings sponsored by General TRAFCO to train persons in communities to serve as leaders in the placement, promotion, and use of this series. We are confident that "Breakthru" will appear in the Philadelphia area. Approval has been given by the Philadelphia Council of Churches to use this series. The organization is being perfected to do this. Members of our TRAFCO will be included in this cooperative work with other conferences and with councils of churches. Other television areas in our conference will be following the same pattern.

The Methodist Television-Radio Ministry merit the best financial support that we can give. Many of our churches made no report last year to this asking. Consequently, our giving as a conference to this fund has been meager, even smaller than other conferences of our jurisdiction. Our giving per member last year was \$.01. The minimum goal should be \$.10 per member.

Our recommendations are:

- 1. That each district shall have this year a workshop for the purpose of training in audio-visual aids.
- 2. That we purchase a movie projector for use by our conference boards and agencies. The financing of this equipment shall be by voluntary contributions by the boards and agencies.
- 3. That each local church shall conduct a special offering for the Methodist Television-Radio Ministry and send to the Conference Treasurer no later than the first Sunday of September. We further recommend that our minimum goal for giving by local churches shall be 10 cents per member.

17. COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Commission on Worship is promoting the trial use of the Proposed Revisions for *The Book of Worship* in all of the churches of the Delaware Conference. The Commission recommends:

1. That the pastors will urge all officials to purchase the book that is published in compliance with the order of the General Conference of 1960.

2. That the two Orders of Worship will be tried by both small and large churches because the orders can be adapted for use by both. The first order is being adapted from John Wesley's Sunday Service for the Methodist Societies in America. The second order follows the pattern of the Wesley service and has all of the basic elements of Christian worship.

3. That the pastors will interpret to the people the meaning of the other General Services: The Sacrament of Baptism; the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper; the Service of Marriage; and the Order for the Burial of the Dead—so that they may not be mere "tokens" of the Christian's profession.

4. That section two, Services for the Christian Year, will be used to provide variety and change in the services. All materials follow the traditional year, beginning with Advent and concluding with Thanksgiving.

5. That section three, the General Aids to Worship for Personal and Public

Worship, can be used in several ways. It is intended to offer pastors and people a portion of the heritage which is ours in the Christian worship of God. It will provide prayers, sentences, versicles (a short verse in a service that is spoken by the minister), canticles, and litanies.

6. That the suggestions for improvements for the Proposed Revisions for The Book of Worship will be mailed not later than December, 1962, to the office of the Book Editor of The Methodist Church, 201 Eighth Avenue, South,

Nashville 3, Tennessee.

7. That the pastors and other leaders of worship will study the great hymns of faith, and that they will use them to enrich the worship experiences of their congregations.

8. That workshops be held in every local church to acquaint the members

with the meaning of public and private worship.

19. COMMITTEE TO STUDY MINIMUM SALARY

In accordance with the action of the 1961 Annual Conference, "that a committee be formed to study minimum salary and its distribution and present its plans for approval to the next Conference Session . . ." (see Conference Journal of 1961, p. 39), we submit this report for your consideration.

We have studied the records of past proceedings of the Commission on Minimum Salary. An investigation of minimum salary plans of other Annual Conferences was conducted. A request was made to each district of our Conference to submit information regarding ministerial support and employment of ministers. Reports were received from four districts. We deeply appreciate this splendid cooperation.

I. Evaluation of Present Plan

- (1) It is not a minimum salary plan as provided by our Methodist Discipline (see Par. 826). It represents merely a system of donations to some ministers. The funds are collected during the year and at the beginning of a conference year distribution is made to various ministers. Because of meager funds, no minister is assured that he will receive the amount needed to bring his salary to the minimum salary schedule adopted by the Annual Conference. Gifts have ranged from \$25.00 to \$300.00, depending upon the decision of the Commission on Minimum Salary. The amount that the minister receives is hardly ever equal to his need, or our approved minimum salary scale of \$1,800.00. For example: Minister A received from his church a salary of \$1,400.00; he received from the Minimum Salary Fund \$125.00; total salary was \$1,525.00; thus, total salary is \$275.00 less than the approved scale. Until we provide some reasonable assurance that each eligible minister will receive the basic minimum salary as approved by the Annual Conference, we cannot claim that we have a minimum salary plan as recommended by the Discipline of the Church. Our present plan may only be termed a donation to some ministers.
- (2) The Commission that is responsible for the distribution of minimum salary is often in need of information regarding the applicants. The lack of information regarding the applicant's income prevents the Commission from

making a fair evaluation of his need. Furthermore, some criteria are needed by the Commission to determine whether an applicant is eligible to receive minimum salary. Under the present plan, distribution has been made to:

- (a) retired ministers (without regard to pensions received);
- (b) ministers who had "low salaries" but their salaries exceeded the minimum salary scale;
- (c) ministers who received income from other occupations;
- (d) students serving as part-time supplies;
- (e) ministers who had emergency needs.

In fact, any minister receiving a low salary from the church he served could receive support from minimum salary, without regard to other factors that may determine his need or eligibility. In some cases minimum salary has been used as a fund to meet emergency needs of ministers. The Discipline provides a basic distinction between a Sustentation Fund and a Minimum Salary Fund. We have sometimes used the same fund for both purposes. Until some standards are provided for proper distribution of funds, we shall not be fulfilling what we regard as the basic intent of a minimum salary plan—which is, to give adequate support to the full-time pastor of a church. Such standards are needed to guide the Commission in its work.

(3) Our minimum salary plan has not been growing through the years to provide ministers with adequate income to meet rising costs of living. In 1954 the minimum salary schedule was \$1,800.00. In 1961 the minimum salary schedule was \$1,800.00. In 1954 the Annual Conference budget for minimum salary was \$8,500.00. In 1961 the Annual Conference budget for minimum salary was \$8,500.00. In 1964 we received from churches for minimum salary \$4,724.00. In 1961 we received from churches for minimum salary \$5,108.00. Certainly, our scale was inadequate in 1954. Since then, no significant advance has been made in raising the scale, or appropriating and receiving additional money for this purpose.

II. Ministerial Salaries-Delaware Conference

The salaries which our churches pay are below by districts:

111 churches (67%) pay a salary of less than \$3,000.00. 42 churches (25%) pay a salary of less than \$2,000.00. There are not twenty ministers in the entire Delaware Conference who receive a salary that is equivalent to the starting salary of a young teacher in the public school system of Philadelphia.

For pension purposes, the average salary of our Conference is \$3,398.00.

The highest average salary of a Conference in The Methodist Church is \$6,931.00. However, the computation of the average salary for our Conference for pension purposes, includes an evaluation of parsonage rent and allowances. Without this inclusion, the average cash salary paid to the ministers of our Conference is \$2,566.00 (less than \$50.00 per week).

III. Other Related Concerns

1. There is a relationship, we feel, between our salary scale and the number of ministers who consider it necessary to seek employment in occupations other than the ministry. Employed men by districts are:

Approximately 25% of our ministers are employed. We simply raise the question, would it make any real difference in the vitality and quality of the local churches which these men serve, if they were able to give full-time service? An adequate salary would enable some of these ministers to give full-time service.

2. We feel that there is a definite relationship between the salaries paid in our Conference and the recruitment of men to serve the pastoral charges. Many seminarians are reluctant to accept membership in a Conference where there is no assurance that they will receive a salary that is adequate for a minimal standard living. The adoption of an adequate salary plan could serve to attract more trained men to the ministry. The different scale for supply pastors and full members of the conference is being proposed with the hope that it will serve as an incentive for all of our ministerial candidates to receive their formal training and accept full membership in our Conference as pastor of a church.

IV. Recommendations

1. That all ministers who are members of the Annual Conference (probationers included) serving a pastoral charge and not gainfully employed in any other occupation, shall receive \$3,000.00 minimum per annum.

2. That all approved supply pastors giving full-time service to a pastoral charge and not gainfully employed in any other occupation shall receive

\$2,600.00 minimum per annum.

 That the minimum salary plan of our Conference shall not include retired ministers, student approved supply pastors and part-time approved

supply pastors.

4. That the minimum salary of a minister shall include the amount paid for salary by the local church and the amount received for salary from any other source of The Church (e.g., Division of National Missions, Promotional Fund). The Committee discourages persons from asking

for consideration who receive an income from other sources whereby they attain the minimum salary level.

- 5. That the apportionment for minimum salary for each pastoral charge be equal to 5% of the pastor's salary, paid by that charge.
- That the Minimum Salary Commission administer and distribute the funds for minimum salary.
- 7. That payments be made to ministers quarterly (September, December, March and May).
- 8. That the Commission on Minimum Salary shall recommend to the Conference each year, the proposed schedule of minimum salary.
- 9. That no pastor be granted minimum salary who does not submit to the Commission on Minimum Salary the information that is required to determine his eligibility. We further recommend that the request of each minister shall be made to the Commission not later than 30 days following the beginning of the conference year.
- 10. That the proposed apportionment for minimum salary shall be paid this coming conference year, but that the distribution of the funds as proposed in these recommendations begin the conference year of 1963-1964.
- 11. That a local church shall be reapportioned the next conference year any unpaid amount for minimum salary within a conference year. We further recommend that the provisions of paragraph 823, Methodist Discipline, regarding minimum salary as an essential part of the proportional payment of ministerial support be practiced by all pastoral charges.

We are grateful for the privilege of working on this study and preparing this report for your consideration. Our labors have made more firm our convictions that every minister of the Delaware Conference serving as a full-time pastor of a charge should be given the means whereby he may faithfully perform his tasks with some reasonable assurance that he will receive an adequate salary.

There is one unresolved issue that is related to minimum salary that needs our attention. Five churches in our Conference pay extremely low salaries. Two churches reported that they pay no salary at all to their minister. If other conditions are met, these ministers may justifiably make a claim upon the minimum salary plan under the present rules. This could cause a considerable drain upon the funds available for minimum salary distribution. We regard minimum salary as the means to supplement the salary of the full-time pastor, rather than to provide the basic salary. To be responsible for the basic salary of a minister would seriously impair the true functions of the Minimum Salary Fund.

The solution that is possible is not within the province of this committee to make. However, two lines of action will help. First, that new church situations shall continue to be a responsibility of the Board of Missions and Promotional Fund.

Second, speed our efforts wherever possible and feasible, to effect mergers and consolidations of churches that are unable to give adequate support to a pastor.

Third, that more emphasis be placed upon the distinctions between a minister serving as a full-time supply pastor and a part-time supply pastor. If an approved supply pastor does not devote his entire service to the charge

that he is appointed, and if he does not receive a salary that is equivalent to the minimum salary established by the Annual Conference, he should be assigned to the category of part-time approved supply pastors (See par. 317 and par. 1631, *The Methodist Discipline*, 1960). We are convinced that greater care in assigning ministers to these categories, would help to reduce the disproportionate amounts that minimum salary may find it necessary to contribute. This will help considerably in the minimum salary plan as well as in our pension plans.

22. HISTORICAL SOCIETY

As chairman of the Historical Society, I availed myself of the opportunity to attend the annual meeting of the Association of Methodist Historical Societies of the Northeastern Jurisdiction, held at Drew University, Madison, N. J., April 24-26, 1962. The contact with the Association is valuable for the future work of the Conference Historical Society, as it is presently concerned with research and publication of historical facts about Methodism. Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That each delegate read paragraph 663 of the 1960 Discipline.

2. That a budget of two hundred dollars (\$200) be approved for the work of the Historical Society.

3. That the Delaware Conference become a financial member of the

Northeastern Jurisdictional Historical Society.

- 4. That in 1963, the 225th Anniversary of John Wesley's Aldersgate experience be observed throughout the Conference, in every local church; and further, that studies in the areas of (a) Life of John Wesley, (b) History of Methodism, (c) The Negro in Methodism, and (d) Methodist Beliefs, be encouraged.
- 5. That an organized effort be made to gather historical data and documents on Methodism in the Delaware Conference.
- 6. That the Historical Society assume the initiative to circulate historical data of the Conference in Methodist historical circles and publications.
- 7. That the Society become the Conference agency responsible for the sale and distribution of the Conference History to be published in 1964.
- 8. That congregations be encouraged to make colored pictures, slides, and cards of their local churches for distribution.

For this reason, I am inclined to suggest that the effort of this committee be limited (1) to working out a program of not more than two hours for presentation to an evening session of the 1963 annual conference; (2) that great effort be made to make it an impressive registration of our gratitude to Almighty God for deliverance that will also serve as a vehicle for teaching those who are younger the enlarged opportunities that bless their lives; and finally, as an inspiration to all, to be more consciously motivated by the spiritual as we seek to make the most of our lives in an unselfish way.

24. STATE OF THE CHURCH

The church is challenged today to meet the needs of a rapidly changing social order. She is deeply conscious of the scientific progress which is being unfolded in our so-called "space age" and of the increased opportunities that these media present. Ninety-five percent of the householders in the United States have radios and ninety-nine percent of the people are in reach of at least one television station. Men in all walks of life are being challenged.

Even with all of these media and opportunities at our command we still find men who are confused and frightened. The possibility of a nuclear explosion is causing men to run to the rocks in search of a hiding place. Fallout shelters are becoming a reality in our day. With the coming of the "Spy Satellites" men are able to explore the darkest corners of the world. The Church cannot become content until it penetrates the darkest reaches of the souls of men and until they turn to the secret places of the pavilion of God for safety rather than their fallout shelters.

The world watched in awesome wonder a few days ago as one man proclaimed the wonders of God as he watched "four glorious sunsets and sunrises in one day." We must not become contented to let the world take the witness which should be ours and twist and slant it to give to themselves a false sense of security.

Sensitivity to world events is a prerequisite to the victories which the Church seeks. Let us not repeat the mistakes of the past when so often the Church missed the great chance by ignoring the uncomfortable realities of the world which was its parish.

Let the Church know the world it is to serve, and go forth to serve in the consciousness of its nature, its authority, its mission, and its power.

To this age the Church is expected to minister with a firm and steady hand and to speak with a clear and commanding voice. An artificial climate of authority has been created by the external pressures of coercion and persecution designed to shatter the inner compulsions of life on which all valid authority is based.

The disciples of Jesus met successfully the resistance to their new religious experience because they knew what they were commissioned to do.

Recommendations

1. One area which commands our immediate attention is the Christian education of young people. The total educational program of the Church

cannot be overemphasized. If we are to go forward in this age we must be

prepared.

2. We live in a world whose very existence is threatened by group tensions, misunderstanding, and incited hostilities. We therefore urge every church to exert all of its energy to create real brotherhood which will transform tension into participation, misunderstanding into appreciation, and hostility into cooperation.

3. We urge every church to speak with authority on all matters of social

concern and especially those where neglect and injustices are evident.

4. That we endeavor to have a spiritual reawakening throughout the Church.

5. That we strive to become ". . . doers and not hearers only."

6. That we reevaluate our mission in today's troubled world in relation to the teachings of Jesus.

The road ahead is a long one, but it is no longer than that which our Lord walked on the way to Calvary. The burden may be heavy, but He never puts more on us than we can bear.

Rise up, O men of God! Have done with lesser things;

Give heart and soul and mind and strength to serve the King of kings.

1. WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

For the privilege and honor of serving such a cooperative, sacrificial, kind and helpful group of women for four years, I am grateful to Almighty God. This has been a rich experience.

Many activities have been carried on, and I mention a few: The burning of the mortgage of Friendship House; renovation of the same including modernizing of the kitchen by the Wesleyan Service Guild at a cost of \$1,500 and upholstering of furniture; and the annual fall luncheons planned and conducted by experts to a crowded house.

Close grows the bond between the Wesleyan Service Guild and the Women's Society of Christian Service. I always attend their weekends and conduct the Bible Hour.

The districts under the efficient presidents have done a marvelous piece of work, i.e.—training programs, educational seminars, district and subdistrict meetings held, along with the presentation of the work at the District Conferences and visitations to the local societies. Last, but not least, "budgets are paid in full." A tribute to our Treasurer is the poem, "A Treasurer Has Sense." Responsibility, stewardship, humor, values, duty and willingness to spend time and energy in detailed work, accompanied by joy, are the characteristics conveyed.

We are proud of the continued growth of the School of Missions. More women are taking advantage of this means of learning, through study classes, the interpretation of the work and how to apply the message, "Go ye." The team, "Miss Theressa Hoover and Mrs. W. C. Strother" did a great job last summer.

During these four years, Miss Dorothy Barnett, field worker of the Woman's Division of Christian Service, brought inspiration and information to the Conference for two years.

The officers and secretaries have been untiring in their efforts to do a good job. They have had the privilege of attending Jurisdiction and Conference Schools of Missions, and other meetings to which their respective offices entitled them.

The support of our Division member, Mrs. W. C. Strother, Jr., and Jurisdiction member, Mrs. William A. Henry, has been most gratifying.

The committees of extra curricular activities have accomplished the following outstanding work: the first Year Book, Revision of Rules and Regulations for Friendship House, and Policy revision for the Conference.

I would indeed be ungrateful if I didn't mention the Board of Trustees and Managers of Friendship House who have served cooperatively, never tiring, always willing to assume responsibilities.

After such a rich experience, I close with these words: God bless the women of the Delaware Conference as you go forward in His name, may there be a continual growth, and a greater enthusiasm for *spiritual values*. May our spirits be quickened and our lives more keen in understanding, "The Church in the World."

2. AREA ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

Bishop Love, Father, Brothers, Sisters, Friends:

This is my 10th annual report to the Conferences of the Baltimore Area. It is not a report in the sense that it attempts to detail my activities over the past twelve months. Briefly, I will say that I have been privileged to serve in all our Annual Conferences—the Delaware, Washington, and North Carolina. I have attended Annual Conference Sessions, district meetings, workshops, convocations, institutes, and have preached in many pulpits. On many of these occasions, I have substituted for Bishop Love; on others, I have responded to personal invitations. But these things, as important as they are, do not constitute my major responsibility, which is to help the bishop carry the heavy administrative load which is his, in office routine and in executing the program of the General Church. These have been happy and challenging years, and, with all members of the Baltimore Area family, I anticipate the sorrow which will be ours on the bishop's retirement two years hence. No one could work for a more understanding, tolerant and companionable person.

This report will deal essentially with one vital responsibility of our office, that of caring for our pastors' group insurance plan. It is a great responsibility, requiring much of our time, and for which we receive no compensation. We recommended the plan to the Conference because we know of its great need. We have had some 15 deaths among the insured members of our Conference in the last two years and nine months since the plan became effective on September 1, 1959. Every one of these claims has been paid. The money was a veritable God-send to the widows of the deceased brethren. It was practically all some of them had. There is desperate need

for this type of insurance for us. Many of us could not possibly get similar insurance so cheaply, if indeed at all. The thing that distresses us is the fact that many of our men still do not pay their insurance premiums. In many cases of the deaths among us, the insurance was not paid in full, if at all, either year. Happily, we can report that in every case, however, the widow did reimburse the Conference treasurer, who advances the premium each month for the entire Conference.

I am making this appeal to my fellow workers: Brothers, please support this plan. None of us like to anticipate death; we all want to live as long as possible. But we must face facts: Life is uncertain, and we owe it to those whom we love to leave them as much protection as possible for the

time when they will need it most, probably.

Our insurance happens to be with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. This is a good plan, but there are others as good, doubtless some better. Which plan is not important to us, except the one most practicable. Until we can find a better plan, let us support the one that we have. Our Conference treasurer reports that this has been our best year in receipts from the charges on the group insurance. But the response is far from 100%, and we simply cannot expect to burden our treasury much longer carrying a load that we should carry ourselves. Let us review the facts:

The cost of the insurance is only \$39.00 a year. The benefits are \$2,000.00 payable to the beneficiary at death; \$4,000.00 in accidental death. All full-time employees, lay as well as ministerial, of our churches are likewise eligible for the insurance. The church is asked to pay the premiums for the pastor and/or lay employees. At age 70, the accidental death and dismemberment clause automatically ceases, but full natural death benefits are effective until age 72 (or retirement, if a member retires before age 72). The benefits are then reduced one-half, or to \$1,000.00. It should be remembered that the Conference voted two years ago to pay the premiums for all retired men. (Note: Men already retired at Conference session of 1959 were not insurable.)

We have kept the policies on file in our Area Office, on advice of the company, if the policy holders so consent. However, we have brought all policies to this session, and those desiring them may have them, or they may examine them and return them to us, if they desire us to keep them on file in our office. Let me repeat our plea: BROTHERS, PLEASE SEE THAT YOUR GROUP INSURANCE IS PAID, for it is being paid for you otherwise. If you do not desire this protection, kindly inform us.

RETREAT: This next word is to our pastors' wives regarding the 1962 Ministers Wives Retreat, which will be held at Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C., July 3-5. All wives of ministers, or widows of ministers, or women pastors are eligible to attend. The Retreat is always a rich spiritual and fellowship experience for the women attending; it will be especially so this year, for the North Carolina Conference women want to be our hostesses and plan many fine things for us in the way of entertainment.

WORKSHOP: I would like to call attention of pastors to our workshop on Church Music which will be held at Camphor Church, Philadelphia, August 14-16, concurrently with the Delaware-Washington Conferences Conference on Missions. This will be a great opportunity for your organists

and choir directors and singers to get help and directions which they may need to improve the music of your churches.

I wish to thank Bishop Love for the confidence he imposes in me in entrusting to me responsibilities of major proportions: to the district superintendents, pastors and laymen of all our Conferences for their cooperation and help and, above all, to give thanks to Almighty God, who has preserved my health and who has safely guided my feet through these ten years of service in my present work.

May the peace of God be with you all, now and evermore. Amen.

3. APPRECIATION TO THE LOVES

Bishop Love, Fathers, Brethren and Sisters of the Conference:

It was Lord Bacon who said, "Reading maketh a full man, writing an exact man, and conference a ready man." I want to be exact, so I am writing what I wish to attempt to say at this time. I want to be full, so I am reading. I want to be ready, so I am conferring with you on this important matter.

I am free to confess that the words I am about to speak sound for all the world like a first-class eulogy. Such, however, is not the case, for I come not to bury a friend, but to praise him. I see nothing wrong, however, about paying eulogistic encomiums to the living. Perhaps if we did more of that sort of thing, we would all live longer.

"If you have a friend worth loving, love him— Yes, and let him know that you love him, Ere life's evening tinge his brow with sunset glow Why should good words ne'er be said Of a friend until he's dead?"

We are on the eve of a very significant anniversary—one that means much and is close to the hearts of us all. It was ten years ago that two of Methodism's ablest sons were elevated to the episcopacy of The Methodist Church by the vote and through the wise choice of the delegates to the Fourth Central Jurisdictional Conference. One of those sons was assigned to the Baltimore Area, and for ten years, we have been blest with the able leadership of Edgar Amos Love. No one was more deserving than he of the honor which came to him; no one could have graced the office with more dignity and with greater efficiency. Wherever he has worked, and wherever he has gone, he has commanded the confidence and respect of all whose lives he has touched—for he has evidenced dedication of purpose, keenness of intellect, sagacity of mind, and immaculacy of heart, coupled with the common touch, which has made him the friend of all, both great and small.

After having worked intimately with him for ten years as his most unworthy administrative assistant, I want to give you a true picture of what I think of him.

1. He is capable. He knows the church. He is a great administrator. He leaves a profound impression upon the Annual Conferences of the church

over which he presides outside his own Area. Some have been in the South, among our own people of color; some have been in the North, among people of fairer skin. They all join in one accord in saying: "His name

is Love; his manner bespeaks love."

2. He is honest. Some well meaning Christians fall short of the mark of the high calling of God in Christ through some so-called minor sinning, committing such "little sins" as falsifying their ages to get insurance or jobs, or to have a year or five longer to remain effective. Any of us who travel on expense accounts without too much compunction of conscience may pad them a little—or much—to make sure that we come out all right. When Edgar makes his monthly expense account and sends it to the World Service treasurer, if there is doubt in his mind about an expenditure, he cuts it out. I am in position to know that the church owes him hundreds of dollars that he failed, indeed refused, to include in a perfectly legitimate statement of expense.

3. He is courageous. His name has been associated by his enemies with that of another Methodist bishop, G. Bromley Oxnam, both of whom have been called Communist sympathizers and fellow travelers of those martyrs of the faith who refuse to bow to bigotry and who dare to defend liberty and justice and equality with honor and truth. Thank God, all of us who may have been so labeled by the conservatives, the recalcitrants, the diehards and the enemies of social change count it an honor so to be called. For they are the enemies of democracy. They are the traitors to the ideals

and principles of the founders of the American Republic.

As president of the controversial, all-but-outlawed Methodist Federation of Social Action, and of the even more controversial and pinkly labeled Southern Conference Educational Fund, Bishop Love has for many years championed the cause of the underprivileged, the down-trodden, the oppressed, and the disenfranchised. He has done this where it might hurt his personal reputation and prestige most—in the deep South. On last April 13—Friday, the 13th, of all days!—he went to the citadel of American bigotry and brutality—Birmingham, Alabama—and presided over a meeting of the Southern Conference Educational Fund—the first integrated meeting in Birmingham in 25 years.

4. He is a big man—not physically, no, no—but morally and spiritually. You can differ with him vigorously and remain his friend. I have written some strong editorial comments in THE BALTIMORE AREA MESSENGER the last ten years. He has never read a line of anything before it appeared in print. He has not once said, "Dan, this is a little too strong. I am not so sure that you should be so critical of our Methodist Church." . . . I have known pastors literally to insult him as he sat in the chair presiding over an Annual Conference. He has yet to get ruffled, or upset, nor has used vengeance as a weapon in dealing with any man. I have known men to malign him and lie on him, but he has dealt with them, in the making of appointments, on the basis of what they have done and can do to promote the interests of the Kingdom of God. That, my friends, is an evidence of true religion, pure and undefiled.

5. And finally, he is compassionate, as any bishop or priest or minister or lay Christian must be. He is touched by the feeling of the infirmities

of his brethren. I thought, until I went to work with him, that I was the world's softest touch, but not so, Brethren. Edgar is softer. Where there is destitution, or emergency, or mental anguish, or distress of any kind, he helps. (Don't anybody get destitute or distressed before you go home, please, or he'll go home broke!) It can be said of him, as it was said of our Master, "He looketh upon the multitudes, and He was moved with compassion."

It is a cliché to say that behind every good man there is a woman—a mother or sister, or especially a wife. And what shall we say of Virgie? Blessed with the graces of charm and beauty, Virginia Ross Love is the kind of woman who Shakespeare describes as having "a voice, gentle, soft and low—an excellent thing in woman." Time does not permit us to pay her the tribute that she highly deserves.

I only need to say that I wonder how Edgar fooled her into marrying him. I have always said that however good a man is, he is undeserving of the good wife he has. Perhaps he quoted poetry to her. Indeed, he must have quoted to the love he sought this greatest of love poems, LOVE'S APOTHEOSIS, by Paul Laurence Dunbar:

"Love me, I care not what the circling years to me may do, If, but in spite of time, and tide, and tears, you prove but true.

"Love me. Albeit grief dim mine eyes, and tears bedew, I shall not e'en complain, for then my skies shall still be blue.

"Love me, and though the winter's snows shall pile and leave me chill, Thy passion's warmth shall make for me, meanwhile, a sunkissed hill.

"Love me, and when the days have lengthened into years, and I grow old, O spite of pains, and griefs, and cares, and fears, grow thou not cold.

"Then hand in hand we shall pass up the hill—I say not down,
That twain go up of love, who've loved their fill, to gain love's crown.

"Love me, and let my life take up thine own, as sun the dew, Come, sit my Queen, for in my heart a throne awaits for you."

And so, Edgar and Virgie, we take this time to congratulate you on your 10th anniversary in the bishopric of The Methodist Church. You have maintained the nobility and integrity of the office, and you have honored it, as the church has honored you. We have not attempted to canonize you, or to deify you, or to immortalize you. The length of days and the record of history will determine that. We offer you no material gift, but we give you renewed assurance of our love and of our devotion and our appreciation for your safe and consecrated leadership. May God give you length of years, health of body, ever-increasing wisdom of mind, and strength of spirit, that you may continue to serve him with vigor and with fruitfulness.

4. DELAWARE STATE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

I am pleased to report that the Delaware State Council of Churches has had another successful year in its effort to render greater service in Delaware and nearby Maryland areas.

During the past year, the Council was successful in getting the following service departments organized and functioning: Departments of Pastoral Ministry, Migrant Ministry, United Church Women, Administration, Christian Education, and Church and Community. Each department has a chairman and has set out to perform the duties as prescribed by the General Assembly of the Council.

The most significant action taken by the General Assembly at its Annual Meeting on January 25, 1962, was the approval of plans and recommendations for the employment of a full time executive secretary. Duties of the executive

secretary were presented and approved.

Another important action taken by the General Assembly was the approval of a pilot school for the children of migrant workers. This program is in cooperation with the Delaware State Board of Education and the Department will finance it.

I, your lay representative, was re-elected for a second three year term on the executive committee.

The financial asking from the Delaware Conference this year is \$1,000.

5. NEW YORK METROPOLITAN AREA PLANNING COMMISSION

After nearly two years of meetings and preliminary work by the New York Metropolitan Area Planning Commission of The Methodist Church, its activities in the fall of 1961 were marked by the establishment of an office in the Inter-Church Center in New York City and staff began its task of study and planning.

Since then, The Commission through its staff has completed 10 projects which related to 96 local churches; in addition, evaluations of several church extension sites were made. Presently, an additional 11 projects involving 46 local churches are in process. Several other projects have been scheduled to be started either in late May or early fall. These studies—completed, in process, or scheduled—have been made in line with a set of priorities determined at a meeting involving all of the district superintendents. To date, the studies have been spread among churches in the Newark, New York, and New York East Conferences. A study which will have particular reference for the Delaware Conference will be started in the fall.

The projects which have been completed or are at present being made, in many ways reflect the whole spectrum of concerns facing Methodism in the region. From studies and planning consultations involving inner city churches to concerns of strengthening Methodist witness in the Town and Country areas, from relocations to new church extension sites, from mergers to major program adaptations has been the involvement of The Commission.

Also, one major study was produced for the Department of City Work of the Newark Conference which outlined proposed investment areas for the urban funds from the Faith-In-Action Crusade.

The above projects have been basically considered as short-term. Work has been initiated on a long-range area study which is constantly being developed. Part of the work on this long-range project was utilized in preparing the URBAN HIGHLIGHTS book for the New York Area Urban Convocation held in Stamford, Connecticut, during April. Completion of Phase I of this study is anticipated within the year. This study will provide an understanding of factors at work in the area and the resources with which Methodism moves to meet these forces. At the same time, it will provide the basic framework for indicating the needs and present the basic foundation for planning for inner city, suburban, town and country areas.

The Commission is grateful to all who have invested their time and efforts in co-operating with its work.

6. GREATER PHILADELPHIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES 1961 in Retrospect

The following is a month-to-month glimpse of some of the results of the cooperation of nearly 600 churches of 24 denominations. Their support made possible a balanced budget in 1961, a fact gratefully acknowledged to all who helped make this possible.

JANUARY: The Council year began with an activity which brought it into close touch with its full membership, through the annual SUPPORT PLAN. The second Sunday in January was designated as "Council of Churches Sunday."

FEBRUARY: In more than 110 worship centers over 14,000 people, young and old, gathered to observe WORLD DAY OF PRAYER. The worshipers participated in a world-wide program, the purpose of which was "to unite all Christians in a bond of prayer and Christian Fellowship around the world and to make an offering for interdenominational projects at home and abroad." Almost \$10,000 was received in offerings.

MARCH: The first sessions of the series of EDUCATION FOR MARRIAGE seminars drew an enrollment of 35 young people already engaged to be married. Practical problems of marriage as budgeting, insurance, installment buying, inter-personal adjustments, and the like were discussed. This series is unique in that it emphasizes the paramount importance of spiritual values undergirding the whole marriage experience. Designed as a preparatory course, it makes possible more effective marriage counseling by clergymen.

APRIL: The completion of a LISTENING AREA SURVEY was conducted by Council staff for Station WRCV-TV. We discovered a potential of over nine million viewers of religious programs sponsored by the Council.

MAY: MAY FELLOWSHIP DAY was the occasion for the women of the Church to hear Margaret E. Kuhn, of the United Presbyterian Board of Christian Education, speak on the subject, "Our Churches—Free and Responsible." Representatives from several churches led discussions on the impact the Church has on the community.

JUNE: CHURCH-COMMUNITY COOPERATION in the field of recreation received recognition at a program honoring volunteers who had participated in bringing wholesale recreation to crisis areas devoid of community facilities.

JULY: The annual VACATION CHURCH SCHOOL FIELD TRIPS were arranged for over 1,000 Junior and Junior High youngsters to tour Fellowship House and Fellowship Farm and historic churches in Philadelphia. Following the theme, "Personal and Group Relationships," the tours gave the young

people fellowship experience across national and racial lines, through worship, work, group singing and folk games.

AUGUST: In cooperation with Scout councils, full-time CHAPLAINS were assigned to summer BOY SCOUT CAMPS. The Chaplains made arrangements for midweek and Sunday worship services, gave advice and counsel to the sick and homesick, and stimulated interest in Scouting's religious awards. During the 1961 summer season, over 1,300 Scouts indicated their interest in beginning work for the religious awards in their local churches.

SEPTEMBER: THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS FOR MENTALLY RETARDED CHILDREN operating in the Philadelphia area began their new classes. New teaching materials have been developed, for radically different levels of comprehension. Working under the sponsorship of the Council, the Rev. T. C. Cooke, Chaplain for the Philadelphia Youth Study Center, has been responsible for recommending curriculum materials and for organizing special Sunday Schools for the Mentally Retarded.

OCTOBER: A Host Family Tea highlighted the beginning of another season for the Council-sponsored HOME HOSPITALITY PROGRAM FOR FOREIGN STUDENTS. Over 2,000 students from 85 foreign countries, who are enrolled in colleges, universities and other educational institutions in the Greater Philadelphia area, are given an opportunity through this program to experience the hospitality of a Christian home. Upwards of 500 Protestant hostesses are participating in the program.

NOVEMBER: "An Effective Church for an Urban Society" is the name of a pilot course being added to the curriculum of the Conwell School of Theology. The Council's COOPERATION WITH CONWELL on this project is assured by the appointment of staff and departmental board members to the Administrative and Advisory Committees. This program will emphasize In-Service Training Seminars for ministers in active pastorates. Students will be given special work in modern sociological and scientific disciplines outside the church. The emphasis will be to challenge and train the ministers in the techniques of change, so that they can lead their churches into becoming positive influences in their own rapidly changing communities.

DECEMBER: City Hall was host to a contingent of 25 Protestant ministers new to the Philadelphia area. The occasion was the POLICE BRIEFING FOR CLERGY designed to acquaint them with the work of the Police Department.

Other many services which the Council provides to help the local clergy to be more effective in their ministry include: preparation of the "Pastor's Information and Referral Guide," training seminars in communication skills, Income Tax and Social Security Clinic, audio-visual workshops, Blue Cross group coverage not only for ministers but for full-time church staff as well.

The Reverend Henry H. Nichols has been representing the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church on our Board of Directors in 1961.

8. STATEMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE CENTRAL JURISDICTION STUDY CONFERENCE

Sheraton-Gibson Hotel, Cincinnati, Ohio March 26-28, 1962

Introduction

This Study Conference was called by the College of Bishops of the Central Jurisdiction upon the request of the Central Jurisdiction Study Committee (Committee of Five), which was established by the 1960 Central Jurisdictional Conference. The participants attending the conference consist of a representative group of lay and clerical leaders of the annual conferences of the Central Jurisdiction.

The purpose of the conference is to counsel with and assist the Committee of Five in its efforts to (1) determine where The Methodist Church is today in the matter of readjusting the jurisdictional structure of the church so as to abolish the racially segregated Central Jurisdiction; (2) identify possible alternatives that are available to The Methodist Church in general and the Central Jurisdiction in particular; and (3) explore the procedures for seeking consensus within the Central Jurisdiction with respect to achieving the goal of an inclusive Methodist church at all levels of church life.

We, the participants in this conference, having been requested by the Committee of Five to give our counsel and prayerful reflections on the important

matters with which the committee is concerned, respectfully make the following statements of convictions and recommendations:

Statement of Purpose

We endorse the statement of the 1960 Central Jurisdictional Conference recognizing "the inevitability of the abolition of the Central Jurisdiction as a racial unit in the structure of The Methodist Church." Similarly, we endorse that Jurisdictional Conference's expression of a "willingness and intention to help develop satisfactory plans and procedures to abolish the Central Jurisdiction with as much speed as sound and satisfactory planning may permit."

We believe that progressive movement toward the goal of the abolition of the Central Jurisdiction should proceed in an atmosphere of prayerful concern that is free from any pressures except those exerted by the imperatives of our

Christian faith.

We regard the Central Jurisdiction as both a fact and a symbol of racial segregation in The Methodist Church. But it is also obvious to us that this racially segregated administrative structure is only one of a number of unmistakable manifestations of racialism within the fellowship and polity of The Methodist Church.

We are confident that we articulate the genuine aspirations, desires, and concerns of a great majority of Negroes who are members of The Methodist Church when we affirm our dedication to the principle of the achievement of an inclusive Methodist Church. Lest there be some misunderstanding, we must indicate here what we mean by an inclusive Methodist Church.

For us an inclusive Methodist Church is one whose life and practice are based upon the great Christian affirmation of unity. It is a church composed of persons who respond to the call of Christ in love and obedience and who are, therefore, members of a new kind of fellowship which transcends all ethnic, racial, and class barriers.

We believe that all Methodists ought to be reminded continuously that this conception of inclusiveness is both implicit and explicit in the 1956 and 1960 pronouncements of the General Conference on "The Methodist Church and Race."

We believe that all Methodists must be led to understand that the ultimate and fundamental objective to which we are committed in seeking to abolish the Central Jurisdiction is the achievement of an inclusive Methodist Church.

We believe that it is of decisive importance that abolition of the Central Jurisdiction must be sought by The Methodist Church as a whole within a framework of over-all planning, procedures, programs and Christian understanding designed to promote in demonstrable and concrete ways ultimate achievement of an inclusive Methodist Church.

We are agreed in principle on the realignment of annual conferences of the Central Jurisdiction in order to facilitate transference to geographical jurisdictions.

There is not agreement, however, on the transfer of the North Carolina Conference to the Northeastern Jurisdiction, on the grounds that the North Carolina Conference is outside the geographical boundary of the Northeastern Jurisdiction. This would cause the Northeastern Jurisdiction, which is geographical, to overlap the Southeastern Jurisdiction, which is also geographical.

cal. It is also the feeling of this Study Conference that the North Carolina Conference should remain within the Central Jurisdiction until such time as it might transfer with other Central Jurisdiction Conferences into the Southeastern Jurisdiction.

It is the feeling of this body that the first report of the Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations, dated April 29, 1961, did not allow sufficient time for appropriate action by the several annual conferences of the Central Jurisdiction. This has resulted in some unfortunate criticism of the Jurisdiction. We believe that the Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations will recognize that the letter accompanying its first report was embarrassing to the Central Jurisdiction. We are all involved in the total program of the church and should be treated accordingly. It is our conviction that the principle of voluntarism should be operative in the case of the Central Jurisdiction as in all other jurisdictions.

Recommendations

We recommend that:

- (1) With regard to the matter of transfer of annual conferences under Amendment IX, no annual conferences of the Central Jurisdiction be transferred into a regional jurisdiction in which it is not located geographically.
- (2) The period between now and the 1964 General Conference be one of intensive study and preparation to create a suitable climate for the transfer of local churches and annual conferences from the Central Jurisdiction to the five regional jurisdictions. This should include:
 - (a) The sponsoring of preparatory inter-conference and inter-area meetings to study and make specific recommendations regarding the problems that may be involved in the transferring of local churches and annual conferences.
 - (b) The further implementation of the Quadrennial Emphasis on Race through the 39 Regional Consultative Committees.
 - (c) The development of a definite plan of action for presentation to the 1964 General Conference by the Committee of Five in consultation with the Commission on Interjurisdictional Relations. This plan of action will take into account the decisions reached at this Study Conference. Further, this plan of action will involve the preparation of proposals for General Conference legislation.
- (3) The 1964 Central Jurisdictional Conference realign the boundaries of its annual conferences so that each conference will be located within the boundary of not more than one regional jurisdiction. In preparation for this action the Committee of Five, in consultation with the College of Bishops and selected leaders of the Central Jurisdiction, should develop a proposal for presentation to the 1964 Jurisdictional Conference.
- (4) Following the 1964 Central Jurisdictional Conference, the realigned annual conferences and remaining local churches of the Central Jurisdiction be transferred to the Northeastern, North Central, South Central, Southeastern and Western Jurisdictions with all deliberate speed; and wherever possible, the transfer of Central Jurisdiction churches, confer-

ences, institutions, etc., be consummated in terms of merger with the existing geographic units.

- (5) Each annual conference be requested to designate the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns, or a special committee, as the conference agency to:
 - (a) set up the standards or criteria for the transfer of all churches under Amendment IX;
 - (b) receive, study, and make recommendations to the conference on all matters relating to local church transfers on which the conference must act:
 - (c) serve as the agency of the conference to engage in joint enterprises of study, discussion and planning with conference agencies in other jurisdictions in preparation for the local church transfer contemplated.
- (6) The Committee of Five be urged to work out criteria for the guidance of the respective conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, with a view to establishing some degree of uniformity in the transfer of local churches under Amendment IX; and that such criteria or standards be made available to the agency of each annual conference charged with responsibility for its information and guidance.
- (7) The 1964 General Conference be memorialized to declare in unequivocal terms that the entire Methodist Church and all of the institutions related to it, such as educational institutions, homes, hospitals, assembly grounds, etc., should be desegregated and that no person should be denied admission or employment because of color or racial identity.
- (8) The 1964 General Conference raise an Interjurisdictional Commission for the 1964-1968 quadrennium to:
 - (a) encourage further integration on conference and local church levels.
 - (b) develop programs for communication, understanding, and co-operation.
 - (c) indicate specifics to protect minority rights.

The Study Conference presents this report with full awareness that the magnitude and complexity of the problems faced have not been fully explored. These explorations and confrontations must be continued in order to progressively move toward our goal of an inclusive church.

9. "THE PROBLEM OF THE NEGRO IN THE METHODIST CHURCH"

Address by Charles L. Carrington, Pastor, Brooks Memorial Methodist Church, Jamaica, N. Y., To the Genesee Annual Conference in Session at Christ Methodist Church, Buffalo, N. Y., June 7, 1962

Bishop Lord, members and friends of the Genesee Conference, we are very pleased to be with you in your consideration of one of the gravest problems of our time—the race problem—and its peculiar manifestation in the structure and life of The Methodist Church—the Central Jurisdiction.

We are particularly gratified for your interest in the issue of the Central Jurisdiction, for we do not believe that your conference territory overlaps any part of the Central Jurisdiction. We can appreciate your concern, however, for the bi-racial structure of American Methodism is a blight on the whole Church, and as such, should be of vital concern to every Methodist, every Conference and every deliberative body in the denomination. Though somewhat removed from the core of the problem geographically, your involvement and your vote on certain aspects of the issue will be required before the matter is resolved. But what is more, being somewhat removed, it may be your privilege to be less emotional, and thus to give much more sober leadership to the entire Church as it seeks to see and pursue a Christian path through the morass of emotionally-charged issues as we make our way toward the high ground of a truly Christian fellowship.

Before God, and before mankind, The Methodist Church cannot long remain where it now stands with respect to its Constitution and its practices on the issue of race. The Church's bold and often-quoted pronouncements on race will not suffice. The social ferment of our time—in America—all over the world—demands that these bold pronouncements be speedily supported by the structural, spiritual, and social changes within our fellowship which will bring our practices on race into harmony with our preachments concerning brotherhood and love. To do less is to risk the effectiveness of our whole Christian witness.

We are grateful, therefore, that you are concerned, and that seeking an honest and fair solution, you have asked a member of the Central Jurisdiction to speak to you. Let me hasten to say that we speak only as a person, not as an official representative of the Central Jurisdiction. We do speak, however, out of a background of long concern over the issue before us, and of some involvement with the efforts across many years within the Central Jurisdiction to seek a more equitable solution than as yet has been attained by our Church. It was also my privilege to be a part of the committee which planned the one meeting held by the Central Jurisdiction in all the 23 years since Union, to assess its thinking on the myriad issues involved in the projected dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction. The reports of this meeting, held in Cincinnati, Ohio, March 26-28 of this year, are being circulated. In what we have to say here, we shall try to reflect as fairly as possible the substance and the spirit of that meeting, and of the dominant attitude of the Central Jurisdiction as nearly as we have been able to assess it.

Before proceeding further, let me point out that your interest in trying

to find a better solution than the Church has as yet attained is not shared by all. It really needs not be said that there is a considerable "hard core" group who apparently believe that separation—segregation in the Church as well as in the schools and other areas of our society is not only desirable, but right. Some, we gather, sincerely believe that this position is ordained of God. They vigorously promote this point of view, and, like Shakespeare's

Devil, they "quote Scriptures for their purpose."

Believing, as we must, that in time—perhaps "God's good time"—such bigotry will pass away, we fret not so much about these who, "though they have eyes, see not; and ears, hear not." It is disturbing, however, that touted liberals—some nationally known—join the reactionaries in effect by parroting the phrase: "It's up to the Central Jurisdiction." They hold that in Amendment IX the Church has acted sufficiently, and that the Central Jurisdiction should avail itself of the privilege offered under Amendment IX, and speedily move to dissolve itself. They maintain that the General Church can do no more, and that the burden of any further action leading to the dissolution of the bi-racial structure of The Methodist Church rests with the Central Jurisdiction.

I feel confident that you do not agree with this position. It is true that Amendment IX has been offered, and Amendment IX has some possibilities. It is an over-simplification, however, to assume that the problem of race in The Methodist Church would be solved—or significantly improved—by the mere transfer of churches, conferences, areas and the like, under the provisions of Amendment IX.

Even if this were true, it seems to be a callous brushing aside of one's own responsibility as a Methodist, to say, in the light of the Negro's hesitance to use the provision, that Amendment IX is the one and only way—there is nothing further needed—take it or leave it—it's up to you.

Frankly, even more harsh things are said. The impression has been spread that the abolition of the Central Jurisdiction is being delayed by certain ambitious and politically astute leaders in the group who are influencing the rest of the Jurisdiction to hold back because they are hopeful of becoming bishops. This argument is a bit absurd. Of the 360,000 Negro Methodists in the Central Jurisdiction, several thousand of them are eligible for election. It would be the most consummate of faith for several thousands of men to hold back the wave of the future because they were hopeful of a job to which over a period of many years only six men could possibly be elected.

In a serious vein, however, the argument that the Negroes of the Church want to keep the Central Jurisdiction is not consistent with the record. From the start, the Central Jurisdiction was not to the Negro's liking. Because of its segregating features, 36 of the 47 Negro delegates to the General Conference of 1936 voted against the Plan of Union. For the same reason, when the plan was submitted to the 19 Negro Annual Conferences several months later for ratification, the vote was heavily negative. Throughout all the years since, the Central Jurisdictional Conference sessions have consistently produced pronouncements condemning the structural arrangement of their jurisdiction based on race.

The most recent meeting in Cincinnati echoed all other pronouncements of podicy and attitude expressed by responsible persons and groups within the Central Jurisdiction when it said:

"We endorse the statement of the 1960 Central Jurisdictional Conference recognizing 'the inevitability of the abolition of the Central Jurisdiction as a racial unit in the structure of The Methodist Church.' Similarly, we endorse the Jurisdictional Conference's expression of a 'willingness and intention to help develop satisfactory plans and procedures to abolish the Central Jurisdiction with as much speed as sound and satisfactory planning may permit."

The failure of large segments of the Central Jurisdiction to move under Amendment IX has perhaps given rise to some question as to its motives and intentions. There is one over-lying issue in which, in our opinion, the major part of the answer is to be found. The Cincinnati Convocation summarized it very well. Taking its cue from the General Conference pronouncements of 1956 and 1960, it said:

"We believe that all Methodists must be led to understand that the ultimate and fundamental objective to which we are committed in seeking to abolish the Central Jurisdiction is the achievement of an inclusive Methodist Church."

The statement continues:

"We regard the Central Jurisdiction as both a fact and a symbol of racial segregation in The Methodist Church. But it is also obvious to us that this racially segregated administrative structure is only one of a number of unmistakable manifestations of racialism within the fellowship and polity of The Methodist Church."

The Central Jurisdiction is not exactly naïve. It is certain that it does not want to be structurally set apart as now. Yet, it is equally certain that the mere transfer of churches, conferences and the like, as provided for in Amendment IX, is only a part of the answer. In some things it is willing to move forward in reasonable faith, but it feels that it is in the interest of all that it be clearly evident that the entire Church understand the implications of its basic aim: inclusiveness in structure and practice at all levels of the Church's life. The Negroes of the Church feel that they have something to offer, and that their status after dissolution should be that accorded any man on the basis of merit.

It is felt that in the interest of long-range out-working of many problems, movement should largely be "en masse" so that the danger of being "swallowed up" might be lessened, and that a mere "token" integration of a few churches might not be permitted to suffice for a forthright handling of the whole of the problem. The whole of the problem must be dealt with—not simply an area, or a few churches here and there.

There are certain "advantages" which the Negro has judged that he has culled out of the segregated mold into which he has been forced for these 23 years. Of these he is quite conscious—and the most important of these he does not wish to lose.

One of these "advantages" is his right to be represented at the highest policy-making levels of the Church's life. By his membership as a representative of his Jurisdiction on general boards and agencies of the Church he has been able to share in the plans for his Church. His presence and participation in many of the programs of the Church are guaranteed by his right of jurisdictional representation.

Secondly, and quite frankly, he has been able to elect bishops whose rank placed them on par with other bishops of The Methodist Church. This is a different thing from personal position-seeking mentioned above. While the episcopate would be a desirable achievement which the least apt of us would not spurn if we thought we could win it, the Negro's pride in this matter is a pride of group achievement. Considering his history and the odds against it, this particular pride might quite understandably be judged pardonable.

These are things which the Negro frankly considers he may lose. He does not want to lose them, not merely because he has a selfish personal or group ambition, but because he feels that through these two avenues of high-level participation and respected leadership, he has much to offer The Methodist Church. The Methodist Church needs his involvement at these levels as it works its way through the long period of adjustment through which the Church must go as it dissolves the Central Jurisdiction and gropes its way toward true inclusiveness. The issue of high-level representation and authoritative leadership in the transition period is as important for the "white" section of the Church as it is for the Negro. Such of these things as can be salvaged should be. Though it is not usually openly expressed, it would not be unreasonable to conclude that wisdom would dictate an election of two Negro bishops to replace the two retiring in 1964. These men would be available to the entire Church for a type of understanding leadership the Church will need to best plan and promote the program of post-Central Jurisdictional adjustments.

Whether these two "advantages" are retained or not, it is of record that the Central Jurisdiction is committed to dis-member itself, if in the spirit of true inclusiveness The Methodist Church can move to a more tenable position on race.

Certain other factors are in the picture of the dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction. They are more psychological and emotional than the two mentioned above, but no less real.

An illustration of what we have in mind is such a thing as the pain involved in giving up an Annual Conference alignment. You in this Conference, now on the verge of being split up and re-aligned with several other conferences, can easily understand how emotionally tedious the prospect of such an experience can be.

An Annual Conference relationship is so packed with nostalgic memories of events, of years, even of lifetimes of common sharing, that the natural reticence to part with these experiences is easily understood. Yet, this has been faced up to by the members of the Central Jurisdiction. Some have admitted the difficulty of making the adjustment, and others have asked, "Why do we have to make all the sacrifices?"; and still others have proposed that integration in the Church should be a "two-way street"—with "white" Annual Conferences joining a jurisdiction with Negro Annual Conferences, and "white" churches joining Negro Annual Conferences. The Cincinnati meeting has made the over-all position clear: This, too, the Negro would yield as he has often done in the past—that American Methodism might purge itself of the horrible picture it paints for all the world to see in its version of "The Body of Christ." I think of that picture sometimes, and see it as a picture of a body with one heart, but with two vascular systems, one pumping white blood, the other black!

Just one other emotional psychological factor is in the picture, and it might just as well be admitted. There is to some degree an underlying mistrust of the white man by the Negro in the matter of his promises of brotherly treatment should he give up the "colored" but in a sense the solid sovereignty of his own jurisdiction for proffered "fellowship" within the geographical jurisdictions. This lack of confidence is perhaps not altogether unwarranted.

The Negro is quite conscious of the ill-concealed attitudes of rejection toward him in the total American scene. Attitudes toward, and treatment of the Negro are better by far than they have been at times in the past. But, the Negro is not blind to the fact that every inalienable right granted to him by the Constitution for nearly 100 years has had to be bitterly fought for, and in many areas of his day-to-day living, the battle is not nearly won.

The Negro is conscious of his gains: his general acceptance in the field of sports, the arts, and in the markets of the common laborer. In far too many areas of his life, however, he has had to cry like the Prophet of old: "How long, O Lord, how long?" as he views the plodding pace of the "deliberate speed" with which the public schools across the Southland are being desegregated; or, how little fair employment practices are being observed; or, how in housing—even federally-supported housing—he finds himself proscribed into ghettoes in the North as well as in the South.

He is conscious that even in church circles these attitudes of questionable brotherly conduct leak over. It is a mystery to him that the Christian consciences of his fellow church members in such groups as The Methodist Circuit Riders seem not to be disturbed over the race-baiting they espouse. He hears—as I myself heard, and shall ever hear—the harsh howl of derision on the part of some 600 delegates to the 1960 Methodist General Conference in Denver shouting a raucous "No!" at the reading of a resolution by the eminent Dr. Harold Case calling upon that Conference to take steps leading toward the dissolution of the Central Jurisdiction by 1968. He understands the jabbing implications behind the urging of a certain General Board executive that the Negro use Amendment IX to dismember the Central Jurisdiction, while warning that "mergers of Central Jurisdictional conferences and areas with the geographical jurisdictions will mean one thing in the Northeastern Jurisdiction and perhaps in the North Central Jurisdiction, but an entirely different thing in the Southeastern and South Central Jurisdictions."

The Negro, I say, is aware of the common attitudes of rejection which he experiences every day—both in the life of the American community, and too often in the church community of which he is a part. He is willing, even so, to yield himself to a great Christian experiment. Basically, he has little reason to trust mere promises. He is encouraged, however, by such friends as you have proven yourselves to be in this Conference.* Indeed, the Negro is certain that there are at least a few persons in all sections of the Church who are genuinely interested in making the Church a truly inclusive fellowship—persons whose interest is not only in removing the stain from the outward appearance of American Methodism, but who, as Jesus suggested, would like to "cleanse the *inside* of the cup." It is with faith that the spirit of such as these who seek a truly inclusive fellowship will prevail, that we move forward hopefully in this great and challenging experience.

Lest, however, the whole movement be aborted, the Central Jurisdiction

would like to suggest several actions which, if viewed realistically, would not only seem reasonable, but essential to sound planning and progress toward the goal of an inclusive Methodist fellowship.

The first of its proposals, in the words of the Cincinnati Convocation, is that the 1964 General Conference make a firm, declarative statement "in unequivocal terms that the entire Methodist Church and all of the institutions related to it, such as educational institutions, homes, hospitals, assembly grounds, etc., should be desegregated, and that no person should be denied admission or employment because of color or racial identity." It is heartening to note that Duke University decided it need not wait on such a pronouncement.

Secondly, in order that the Central Jurisdiction may move orderly and with strength, that the Jurisdictional Conference meet in 1964, elect the episcopal leaders and other administrative officers which the several areas will need during the transitional period, and realign conference and area boundaries to make for easier transfer of large units. (This action does not suggest the preclusion of transfer of individual churches in the interim where such transfers are desired.) These larger units—conferences, areas, etc.,—are then to be transferred to the geographical jurisdictions with all deliberate speed, and, whenever possible, these units should be "merged" with existing geographical units—conferences, districts, etc., to make all Methodist work in a given geographical area one work.

Thirdly, intensive study and program planning and action seeking to create a suitable climate for union and an inclusive fellowship at all levels of the Church's life should begin now and should proceed with all vigor. The Quadrennial Program on Race and its study-action materials, "We Can and We Will," would be helpful at this point.

In conclusion, one other thing needs to be said here. As we envision a new and "inclusive" life in the Church, the changes needed are not purely structural. In the Church—and indeed, in all of us—the changes most needed are spiritual.

We must come to see each other in a new spiritual light. Negroes might search for a new sincerity in his white brother. The white Methodist can begin to see the Negro in a new light, too—not as one for whom something must be done, but as a contributor with whom to work in the building of a better kingdom and a better Methodism. As we move together in creative Christian enterprise following the mergers which are sure to come, it is certain we will have a better base from which to move toward a deeper understanding and appreciation of each other, and by the grace of God and the spirit of Christ which we pray shall ever mark our attitudes, we may even learn to love one another.



^{*} The Genesee Conference has had a Negro minister as a member for over 30 years. He and his congregation are well-integrated into the organization

and life of the conference. This pastor says, "This Conference makes me forget that I am a Negro."

The Conference this year received into full membership a second Negro minister.

One of the churches of the Genesee Conference with an all-white membership employs a Negro as minister of education. "We employed him," said the pastor, "because he was the best-qualified applicant for the job."

X. Miscellaneous

RULES OF ORDER

DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Revised 1956

RULE I.—Decisions

The president shall decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Conference. The appeal shall be taken without debate. The appellant and the Chair may state the reason for their position. In case of a tie vote, the Chair is sustained.

RULE II.—The Appointment of Committees and Commissions

The bishop shall nominate all committees and commissions, unless the Discipline, the Charter, or the Conference specifically orders otherwise.

RULE III.—Securing the Floor

The member shall respectfully address the presiding officer as "Mr. Chairman." The member shall not proceed to speak until he has been recognized by the presiding officer. He shall give his name before beginning to speak.

RULE IV .- Interruption of Speaker

No member who has the floor shall be interrupted, except for a breach of order or misrepresentation, arrival of time for special order, or urgent question of high privilege. The speaker may explain if he thinks he is misrepresented.

RULE V .- Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech

No member shall speak twice on the same question, if any member, who has not spoken, desires the floor; or more than twice on the same subject under the same motion; nor longer than FIVE minutes, unless the time be extended.

RULE VI.-Attendance Upon Sessions

No lay or ministerial member shall be absent from the Conference Sessions without its consent, unless ill; and no reserve lay delegate shall be seated until he has been certified by the district superintendent to the Conference secretary.

RULE VII .- Voting

No member shall be permitted to vote or speak who is not within the legal limits of the Conference.

RULE VIII.—Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions, except those noted below, shall be mimeographed and distributed a day in advance of consideration. The following reports and resolutions are not subject to this rule:

Resolution of Welcome; Resolution of Appreciation; Report from the Board of Ministerial Training and other reports that are to be considered in the Executive Session. These reports must be presented in triplicate.

RULE IX.—Tabling Motions

A motion may be laid on the table any time prior to the vote is taken. A motion to lay on the table takes with it all motions to which it adheres and which adheres to it.

RULE X.-Non-Debatable Questions

- To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn to the Conference finally.
- 2. To suspend the rule.
- 3. To lay on the table, providing a representative of the committee shall have the right to speak.
- 4. To take from the table.
- 5. To call for a previous question.
- 6. To reconsider a non-debatable question.
- 7. To limit or extend the time of debate.
- 8. To call for order of the day.

RULE XI.—Precedence of Secondary Motions

When one or more motions are pending, the order of a precedence in relation to each other shall be:

- To fix the time to adjourn (subject to amendment, or may be laid on the table).
- 2. To adjourn.
- 3. To take recess.
- 4. To order a previous question.
- 5. To lay on the table.
- 6. To limit or extend limits of debate.
- 7. To postpone to a given time.
- 8. To commit or refer.
- 9. To amend or substitute (one amendment being allowed to an amendment).
- 10. To postpone indefinitely.

RULE XII.-Motion to Adjourn

A motion to adjourn when unqualified shall be taken without debate and shall always be in order except:

- 1. When a member has the floor.
- 2. When a question is actually put or vote is being taken and before it is finally decided.
- 3. When the previous question has been ordered and action thereunder is pending.
- 4. When a motion to adjourn has been lost and no business or debate has intervened.
- 5. When a motion to fix the time for the Conference to adjourn is pending.

RULE XIII.—Reconsideration

A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order if offered by a member voting with the prevailing side. If the motion it is proposed to reconsider is non-debatable, the motion to consider is non-debatable.

RULE XIV .- The Previous Question

The previous question shall be taken without debate when ordered by two-thirds of those present and voting. If any secondary motion, or motions are pending, the mover shall indicate to what he intended the motion to apply. If he does not, the motion shall be regarded as applying only to the immediately depending question. The previous question shall not apply in cases where the character of a member is pending, or on matters of conference relations.

RULE XV .- Written Motion

All motions shall be in writing when requested by the presiding officer or secretary.

RULE XVI.-Unlawful Motions After Speech

It shall not be lawful for a member, after discussing a pending question and before he has relinquished the floor, to make a motion whose adoption would limit or stop the debate.

RULE XVII.—Division of Question

Before the vote is taken, any member shall have the right to call for a division of any question if it is subject to such division as he indicates.

RULE XVIII.—Suspension of Rules

These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

RULE XIX.-Amendment of the Rules

Rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, providing the amendment has been presented one day in advance of voting.

RULE XX.-Robert's Rules of Order

In any parliamentary situation not clearly covered by these rules, the Conference shall be governed by the current edition of the Robert's Rules of Order.

MISCELLANEOUS LEGISLATION

RULE XXI.-Admitted on Trial

A person may be admitted on trial who meets the Disciplinary requirements and who, on the opening day of the Conference, has not reached his fifty-third (53rd) birthday.

RULE XXII.—Retirement of Ministers

Ministerial members shall be retired according to the Discipline. In cases where two or more ages have been given, the age first given shall be the retirement age.

RULE XXIII.—Fifty Years of Service

The Conference shall take special recognition of those ministers serving fifty (50) years.

RULE XXIV.-Appointment of Assistant and Associate Pastors

Assistant and associate pastors shall be appointed by the Bishop and his Cabinet from the ranks of the ministers upon request of a local church. The appointment must be satisfactory to the regular pastor.

RULE XXV.-Fiscal Year

The Conference fiscal year shall end twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. Pastors' reports shall be in ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the Conference.

RULE XXVI.-Conference Entertainment Fund

The amount for conference entertainment shall be determined by the Conference upon the recommendation of the Commission on World Service and Finance. This amount shall cover the cost of entertaining the ministers and their wives, lay delegates, special Conference guests, members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, widows and two assistants on the Daily Bulletin staff.

RULE XXVII.—The Conference Program Committee

The Conference Program Committee shall be composed of one minister and one layman elected by each of the District Conferences, the district superintendents, the host pastor, the Conference lay leader and the president of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

RULE XXVIII.—Program Planning

The Board of Ministerial Training, the Board of Pensions and the Board of Missions shall have authority to plan respectfully the Ordination Service, Memorial Service and the Missionary Sermon, including the selection of respective speakers without regard to district lines. In each instance the program must be approved by the presiding bishop.

RULE XXIX.—Board of Education

The Board of Education shall consist of two (2) ministers, two (2) laymen from each district, six (6) members at large and such other members as the Discipline may direct.

RULE XXX.—Pictures in the Journal

Pictures in the Conference Journal shall be limited to: deceased ministers, newly appointed district superintendents, host pastor and the presiding bishop.

RULE XXXI.—Organization of Conference

The secretary shall prepare the resolution of organization for the Delaware Annual Conference after consultation with the Bishop and the Cabinet with the exception of quadrennial officers. The same to be printed in the Pre-Conference Report booklet. Other nominations may be made from the floor.

RULE XXXII.—Elders Orders

Only those persons shall be elected to local elders orders, either man or woman, whose appointment to a charge as a preacher in charge has been requested by the district superintendent.

RULE XXXIII.—Ministers in Retired Relations—Membership on Boards, Commissions and Committees

A minister holding a position on a quadrennial board, commission or committee upon entering the retired relation, may complete the term for which he was elected.





COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

The Commission On World Service and Finance humbly submits this its twenty-first annual report and recommend its adoption. We are grateful to God for His loving care over us, and to our Bishop, ministers and laymen, whose spirit of cooperation has made this report possible.

GENERAL ITEMS

The treasurers of all Conference boards and agencies have not been bonded in companies approved by Commission. The books of all Conference boards and agencies have not been properly audited for the past fiscal year.

The Conference Treasurer's books have been audited by Certified Public Accountants, Walter P. Harris and Robert Bonner, Jr., and a satisfactory audited report has been filed with the Commission. This is the audited report filed with the Commission for the past

fiscal year.

The list of other conference funds, the names of treasurers of each, and the approved depositories are as follows: Board of Education, Rev. C. D. Gerald, Treasurer, Citizens Southern Bank and Trust Co., Philadelphia, Pa.; Board of Lay Activities, J. R. Webb, Treasurer, People's National Bank, Laurel, Delaware; Board of Hospitals and Homes, Rev. C. E. Kiah, Treasurer, Salem National Bank and Trust Company, Salem, N. J.; Board of Evangelism, Helen Loatman, Treasurer, Wilmington Trust Company, Wilmington, Delaware.

RECOMMENDATIONS

STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE

STEWARDSHIP is partnership with Christ through the Holy Spirit in fulfilling

the purpose of God in the world.

CHRISTIAN ECONOMICS is defined as God's eternal ownership of property and the temporary possession of it by men dealing with one another as sons of God and as

brothers among themselves.

PROMOTION OF CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP: The practice of stewardship of time, talents and possessions is the highest earthly manifestation of the Christian life. The program of stewardship cultivation is a cooperative endeavor in which both laymen and ministers share. Tithing and proportionate giving are the most fruitful and Christian of all methods of church financing. People give beyond the tithe as they more fully understand their partnership with God as Christian stewards.

TEACHING CHILDREN AND YOUTH TO SHARE: Dedication of self and gifts is an inseparable part of the Christian life. Every child and young person should make a pledge to the church from his allowance. The example of parents and church school teachers help to bring the best results. The expression of the Christian stewardship pattern early in life will bring infinite dividends in SERVICE and GIFTS through the years.

PLANNING THE ANNUAL FINANCIAL CAMPAIGN: Write the Board of

Lay Activities, 1200 Davis St., Evanston, Illinois for information.

Mastery of the MANUAL ON FINANCE is essential. Success will be directly proportional to the intelligent preparatory work. Definite goals must be set. The raising of the budget ranks high among the religious services a church renders to God and humanity.

STIMULATING NEEDED PUBLICITY: The ultimate purpose of all publicity is to persuade to action. The spoken word of the minister in sermons and of laymen in discussions is an excellent form of publicity. Money spent for radio, newspaper and other sensible channels of communication such as attractively illustrated printing and mimeographing pays amazing dividends.

INCREASING STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCIAL MORALE: Enroll stewards at a Stewardship Service as the climax of cultivation, education, reading and preaching.

Information relative to the financial policy and condition of the church must be presented to the congregation. Members should be told how their gifts are being used and the results of their use.

The books of each treasurer should be audited annually by a competent public accountant.

STEWARDSHIP AND EVANGELISM: In the acceptance of partnership with Christ, Christians become the elect agency of God for carrying forward His redemptive purpose. Evangelism thus becomes a method of stewardship, the primary expression of God's stewardship to and for all of us.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

It has been said by someone that World Service and the Advance belong together,

that together they represent the heart of Methodism in giving.

This leads us to believe that the record of the growth in increased giving for World Service and the Advance is proof of the close relationship of these two interests, and relieves our minds of the idea of competitive relationship. They stand side by side in the proposed goal of \$15,000,000.00 for each cause each year for the quadrennium.

Furthermore, I believe that second mile giving gives us our greatest joy and most

lasting rewards. Unfortunately, the cold record does not prove that we in the Central Jurisdiction believe it. The report of the General Board for 1961, states that our Baltimore Area gave to World Service during the year, twenty-one cents per person and to the Advance three cents per person, making a total of twenty-four cents per capita to these great causes of our Church. This is over three times lower than the lowest per capita giving in the entire Methodist Church. Being a low income group cannot always be an excuse for not doing our part as God has blessed us.

It is also interesting to note that the fifteen Methodist churches giving the most to World Service and the Advance come from our southern conferences. I wonder if our

southern brothers are better Methodists than we of the North?

It is important that the Conference Board of Missions, through its secretaries help to keep the blood stream of the Church flowing. If we falter here, the whole structure is in

danger, and this must not happen.

In this brief foreword to the report of our secretaries, the Board wishes to thank these men for their loyalty and zeal in carrying the message of our connectional program to every corner of our Conference. Working without compensation, or proper support from the Conference, their only thought has been to hear the Master's, "Well done thou good and faithful servant".

The thanks of the Board also goes to our District Superintendents who have attended

all of our meetings and co-operated in every phase of our program.

To those of you who made requests to the Board for assistance and did not receive it, it was because the churches of the Conference did not meet their connectional responsibilities. May we always remember the work of our Conference can only be done through consecrated team work.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

In order that we might have an "informed people" as well as a "participating people", an active Commission on Missions in every local church is a must. Every pastor has the responsibility to see that this commission is at work in his local church as an agency of promotion, cultivation and education in all phases of work of missions and church extensions.

GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS

1. In order that an effective program of missions might be projected, it is necessary that

the Executive Committee meet with the district superintendents and the district missionary secretaries in a planning conference during the month of June.

2. That members of the board, district missionary secretaries and interested persons endeavor to attend the missionary conferences in order to receive inspiration and information as to render larger service; Appalachian Missionary Conference, West Virginia Wesleyan College, August 6-10, and Delaware-Washington Conference on Missions, Camphor Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa., August 14-16.

3. That every local church set up and maintain a functioning Commission on Missions.

- That every local church in the Conference plan and conduct a Church-Wide School of Missions.
- That every effort be made to increase attendance and interest in the District Missionary Institutes.
- That every local church plan a "Missionary Sunday" and invite a missionary or scholarship student as speaker,
- That every minister and lay member of our churches assume personal responsibility for the recruitment of young men and women for the ministry at home and the world mission fields.
- 8. That every local church endeavor to meet its World Service apportionment in full.
- That churches in urban areas establish outpost Sunday schools in relocated and newly developed areas.
- That churches in farm and seasonal areas become more concerned in our ministry to the migratory and seasonal laborers.

SPECIFIC RECOMMENDATIONS

We further recommend:

- I. That the Delaware Conference wholeheartedly endorse and support the nation-wide study program for 1960-1964. Over-all theme: "Jesus Christ is Lord"; specific theme: "Our Mission Today". Quadrennium Emphasis: 1—The Faith That Compels Us; 2—The Factors That Confront Us; 3—The Frontier That Calls Us; 4—The Program That Unites Us.
- II. (a) That during 1962, the Bishop, district superintendents, Conference Missionary Secretary, chairman of the Board of Missions and the district missionary secretaries plan for and promote a CONFERENCE-WIDE WEEK OF MISSIONS, allowing one day for each district. Suggested dates, September 24-28, or October 8-12. (b) That qualified personnel on the work and program of missions and members of the Conference study team be engaged to give leadership for this week. (c) That the quadrennial emphasis, and the missionary concern of the Delaware Conference be projected and interpreted at these rallies. (d) That the Woman's Society of Christian Service be invited to share in the planning and promotion of the WEEK OF MISSIONS.
- III. (a) That each district missionary secretary under the guidance of the district superintendent shall make special effort to get more local churches to voluntarily adopt conference initiated specials and general advance specials. (b) That our Annual Conference Specials shall be such projects that are currently met by the Promotion-Advance Fund.

(1) That the Conference Board of Missions shall continue as the agency through which such projects are accepted, classified, and funds administered.

(2) That every pastor and local church shall make special effort to meet the Promotion-Advance Fund asking in full during this conference year.

(3) That each District Superintendent emphasize the importance of the Promotion-Advance Fund, and receive reports of remittance at each session of the Quarterly Conference.

(c) That every local church shall voluntarily accept to share in a General Advance Special.

(1) That the following shall be accepted as "suggested" projects: Teacher's salary in Liberia—\$840.00; Books for Alaska Methodist University Library—\$200.00; Salary, Indian Mission preacher—\$640.00; Peoples Methodist Community Center, New Orleans.

La.—\$400.00; LaCour Mission, Japan—\$200.00; Support hospital bed in Angola, India, Sarawak—\$100.00; Pay for an operation in a Mission hospital—\$25.00.

We are grateful to our conference board chairman, Mr. Roy L. Cordery, to the district missionary secretaries: Rev. Rupert Adams, Rev. J. I. Williams, Rev. W. H. Greene, Rev. R. B. Thompson, and Rev. W. R. C. Mills, and to the District Superintendents. It is because of their untiring efforts that the MISSIONARY STORY has been told on each district.

DOVER DISTRICT . . .

- 1. Cooperating with the Commission, Superintendent W. E. Stanley held consultations with the Galena and Sassafras charges, Maryland, with the results that both charges are now one, working under the leadership of Pastor Ophelia James.
- 2. Superintendent Stanley is keeping close observation of the churches of his district with a view to uniting churches wherever and whenever it seems wise.
- 3. Chairman Chancy attended the District Conference at Dover, November 8, 1961, and addressed the meeting.

EASTON DISTRICT ...

- 1. On October 12, 1961, this district held its second successful Convocation on the Church in Town & Country at Oxford, Md. Superintendent C. L. Trader, Executive Secretary E. A. Hughes, and Missionary Secretary W. H. Greene did a great job in team work.
- 2. Bishop Love attended this Convocation, and delivered an impressive address. SALISBURY DISTRICT...
- 1. At Princess Anne, Md., September 30, 1961, Superintendent J. W. Elbert held an inspiring Laymen's Conference. Your chairman attended, and addressed the Conference, explaining the effects of population changes on Town and Coutry churches, and some things to do to strengthen the churches.
- 2. A series of consultations have been planned by Superintendent Elbert, at Shiloh and Lawsionia charges, Crisfield; and with John Wesley and Whites Temple, Salisbury, looking toward some changes in the organizational structure on these charges.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT . . .

- 1. Superintendent J. R. Shockley discussed mergers and uniting with Mt. Holly and Burlington charges. He endeavored to point out ways of improving the work of those charges by some united work. No agreement could be reached at that time.
 - 2. Consultation will be held with Glenloch and Rhodes, March 24.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

The basic concept in the process of Christian education is that of growth and development. Our chief concern is to help persons to grow and develop in the likeness of Christ. This report calls attention to the items in our program which have been designed to help persons to grow in Christ's likenes.

Children's Work: Under the leadership of Mrs. Emma W. Strother, Conference

Director, work with children continues to make progress.

We are pleased that our Conference has been chosen as one in which experimental work will be carried on in the development of the new curriculum for children. Miss Elsie Young, Lincoln, Del.; Mrs. Alberta Brown, Centreville; and Miss Lucy Wricks, Chester, Pa. will conduct experimental classes in their respective churches.

We have a deep concern about the loss of church school enrollment in the children's division. According to the report of the statistician we lost 2,250 children from our rolls

during the conference year 1960-1961. We also suffered a loss of 699 enrollment in

vacation church schools in 1961 as compared with 1960.

Youth Work: After five years of effective work as Conference director of youth work, C. Leonard Miller, terminated his services with our staff as of August 31, 1961. The youth and adult workers with youth who have worked with Mr. Miller regret very much that he is no longer serving us. Since September 1, I have been acting as youth director with the loyal support of the district directors. I wish to make special mention of Rev. George Outen and Rev. Edwin Ellis who have been especially helpful.

Youth Assembly: Our first experience in holding a summer assembly at Haverford College, Haverford, Pa., was a good one. There were 102 youth, 11 adult workers enrolled and a staff of 22. The general spirit of the assembly was high. The association with the college staff was pleasant. We look forward to returning to Haverford July 22-28, 1962.

Progress in Junior High Work is steadily growing as evidenced by the large number of this age group served at the district assembly during the summer. We regret we were unable to carry out junior high camping last August. The campsite was not ready. We look forward to having a camp for this group August 6-11, 1962.

Missionary Rallies were well attended on all districts, Friday, November 23. On the Philadelphia District two rallies were held; the second was held on Saturday, November 24. According to the report of the Conference Treasurer, \$1,388.00 had been raised in the

Methodist Youth Fund as of January 31, 1962.

Higher Education: Our Committee on Higher Education is seeking to be more effective in our ministry to students. Dr. W. R. Hazzard, the chairman, has given fine leadership. We are in the midst of a study of our student responsibility by seeking to determine the number of students who are attending colleges from the churches in our Conference. Partial reports reveal that we have 295 students. We are aware that this does not represent a true picture as many churches have not reported. With the Philadelphia Conference, we held a Convocation of Methodist Students in Philadelphia at The University of Pennsylvania, April 1.

We must take seriously our financial responsibility for student work. The Wesley Foundation at Maryland State College and Christian Center at Morgan State College, where hundreds of our Methodist students are enrolled, must have our financial support. Rev. S. S. Tatem at Maryland State College, and Rev. Howard Cornish at Morgan State

College are doing excellent work.

Adult Work: Rev. Ewart C. Hackshaw and Rev. Clayton Hammond came to the Dover and Wilmington Districts respectively, as new directors during the year. They, with the Executive Secretary, spent a week at Rolling Ridge, North Andover, Mass. in a seminar on Understanding Adults. This was a most stimulating experience under the leadership of Dr. Malcum Knowles, of Boston University.

Young Adult Work: Rev. David W. Briddell, Conference Director of Adult Work, is chairman of a joint committee composed of members of the Philadelphia and Delaware Conferences. The committee is making an extensive study of the older youth—young adult situation in Philadelphia. The General Board of Education is cooperating with us in this study under the leadership of Rev. Charles E. Mowry.

General Church School Work: The Dover, Philadelphia and Wilmington Districts carried on successful church school workers' conferences during the year. The Easton district with Dr. Lowell B. Hazzard, Wesley Seminary, Washington, D. C. as the resource leader, conducted a successful Bible Conference. A Bible Conference was held in Philadelphia, April 6-8 with Dr. Clinton Armstrong as leader.

Family Life: Perhaps we have no greater need in Christian education than that in family life. As a result, our family life committee has been reorganized with Mr. James C. Hardcastle as chairman. The committee is currently making a study of the family life work carried on in the churches of our Conference. While the questionnaires which were sent have not all been returned, many interesting trends are revealed. When the study is completed, the findings will be made available to our churches and also to the General Board of Education.

Camping: We are hopeful that we will be able to do at least a modest amount of camping this summer. Due to the faithful services of a number of young adults from Philadelphia, we have been able to do a great deal in getting the campsite ready for use. Our development is progressing slowly due to lack of funds.

Certified Directors of Christian Education: At the last session of the Annual Conference we presented our first certified directors of Christian education, Miss Phyllis Henry and Rev. Edwin Ellis; Rev. Ellis being certified as minister of education. Miss Henry, has since been transferred to the East Wisconsin Conference where she serves as an associate executive secretary. The application of Rev. T. C. Jones is being processed.

Incorporation of the Board of Education: In accord with the directive of the 1961 session of the Annual Conference, the Board of Education has become incorporated in the State of Delaware. A Board of Directors, as required, is now being set up within the Board of Education.

Appreciation: Space will not permit adequate expression of appreciation to the persons who have contributed to the progress of the work of Christian education. These include Bishop Love, district superintendents, pastors, members of conference and district staffs and countless workers in the local churches. We are grateful to every one.

RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Higher Education

 That we continue the asking of \$1.50 per member for the support of work with schools and colleges.

2. That the amount for this cause be placed in the regular budget of the local church with the suggestion that Layman's Day and Student Recognition Day be observed as a

means of helping to raise these funds. (\$1.50 per member.)

- 3. That we use the amount raised for schools and colleges (\$1.50 per member) to support the following institutions on the percentage basis as indicated: Morristown College, 20 percent; Bennett College, 20 percent; Wesley Theological Seminary, 20 percent; Gammon Theological Seminary, 5 percent; Wesley Foundation, Md. State College, 10 percent; Wesley Foundation, Howard University, 3 percent; Allen High School, 2 percent; Morgan Christian Centeer, to support the Associate Director, 15 percent—with the understanding that there will be a priority on \$1,200.00 to develop new work within the conference territory, 5 percent—total, 100 percent.
- 4. That we support Morgan Christian Center with our Race Relation Day offering. Should this offering go beyond \$2,500.00 the remainder is to be given to other institutions in the area.
- 5. That we urge our churches to make every effort to increase the number of students attending colleges, with special consideration given to attending Methodist Schools.
- 6. That we give full support to all efforts to supply student aid and scholarships to students both on the conference and local church levels.
- 7. That we give full support to the Chesapeake Area and New Jersey Methodist Student Movements.

B. General Recommendations

- 1. That we make a study of the causes involved in the deceased enrollment in the Children's division of our church schools, and seek to remedy the same.
- 2. That we put forth every effort to complete our campaign of \$30,000.00 for campsite development.
- 3. That we increase our emphasis on family life education and seek to send our full quota to the Fourth National Family Life Conference, Chicago, Ill., October 19-21, 1962.
- 4. That a committee be set up to study the financial support of all phases of Christian education work in the Conference, and to recommend improvement.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The responsibility of the Commission on Christian Vocations is the task of helping young people to discover the gifts with which they have been endowed by God and in light of the world's needs, make their commitment as a Christian in their life's work. We have sought to help youth understand that such a commitment carries with it a willingness to prepare for their chosen fields. "A call to serve is a call to prepare."

We recognize that counseling is most necessary in helping youth choose vocations. Names of young people who have chosen Church related vocations have been sent to our commission. Counseling has been done in local churches and on the districts at youth meeting. Following the Youth Missionary Rallies, names of youth with their chosen vocations, came from the Salisbury and Wilmington districts. As usual, the Summer MYF Assembly was a source from which we received commitments.

Much more needs to be done to help parents, pastors, church school teachers and others to become more skilled in counseling in order to help youth in the local church and in the home. The need to help youth to have a sense of mission in choosing a life work is very important in this day when so much emphasis is placed upon material gain. We are confident that our young people will rise to the challenge of service under the guidance of mature counselors who are skilled in working with them and who themselves have a sense of social concern.

Our task is two-fold: (1) Helping adult leaders to become effective counselors, and (2) Helping youth to discover God's call to service. For this task we must seek to be of greater assistance.

We are encouraged by the continued interest which our young people show in the annual conference on The Ministry and Missions held during the Christmas season. Dr. Earl Furgerson of Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D. C., was our guest this year.

While we carry quite a list of names of young people on our files, we are aware that it needs revising. Any help which pastors and others may give in bringing our records up to date, would be greatly appreciated.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- That the District Superintendents lift up the matter of Christian vocations in Quarterly Conferences, Preachers' Meetings and all district meetings.
- 2. That the district committees organize for more effective work.
- 3. That each local church seek to organize a committee on Christian vocations in accord with the provision of the 1960 discipline.
- 4. That the local church committee help the home to become aware of its opportunity in vocational counseling.
- 5. That every church observe Ministry Sunday using this as an opportunity to acquaint the church with the needs of the Christian ministry, as well as to challenge young men and women to serve Christ through the church.
- That the financial support of the commission be increased in order to be of greater service to pastors and others who need resources.

We are grateful for the help which has been available as we have sought to serve the conference. Bishop Love has personally worked with our youth especially in choosing the ministry. His contribution to our Christmas meeting is always helpful. The District Superintendents likewise have been active in promoting this cause. Many teachers, counselors, and parents have given guidance in many ways. For all of this we are thankful.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

As a Board, let us call your attention to the "aim" of evangelism as it is expressed in the 1960 Discipline. "The aim of evangelism is to bring all men into living, active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ as divine Saviour and through the regenerating power of the Holy Spirit; to gather them into the fellowship of the Church; to lead them to express their Christian discipleship in every area of human life that the Kingdom of God may be realized."

With this in mind, the Board has endeavored to create such enthusiasm within its members, district committees, local churches and other leaders in evangelism, that there will come a new awakening in the emphasis of evangelism.

The Board has endeavored to give particular emphasis to a well rounded program of evangelism throughout the Conference. The response has not been as expected but it is gratifying to state that there is an increase in spirit and in activity.

We live in an era of greatness. We have a great Church with great memberships, great buildings, great budgets and great programs. In this time of greatness, the demand is to launch a great program of evangelism that will challenge and match the hour of greatness. It is imperative that we as leaders in evangelism create a new image of ourselves and have again this strange heart-warming of the Holy Spirit.

John Wesley said, "I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist, but I am afraid lest they should exist only as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power."

Evangelism is challenged at this point. If we are to have that regenerating power of the Holy Spirit, we must return once more to the "Upper Room" and there remain until the Holy Spirit has filled every heart. We believe, not only as Methodists, but as representatives of Jesus Christ, that to do His work, we must be equipped with the one thing that is so essential, "the Holy Spirit". Jesus believed this was essential to his early followers. He commanded them to "tarry" until they had received this all important element in their lives. This hundred and twenty persons who comprised the first Church, waited until the Holy Spirit came and filled the whole house "where they were". Dr. William D. Longstaff has so well expressed this need in the hymn, "Take time to be holy, Speak oft with thy Lord".

The National Council of Evangelism of The Methodist Church, in session at Kingston, Okla., set forth some objectives for the remainder of 1962 and the Aldersgate Year of 1963. These years are to be a time of spiritual awakening in Methodism throughout the world. Achieving this awakening will require prayer, Bible study, repentance, theological insight, preaching, witnessing, evangelistic meetings and personal experience. These, with others will become our objectives for the coming years.

The Delaware Conference was honored by having two ministers, C. L. Carrington and Henry H. Nichols, invited by the Board of Evangelism and Division of National Missions to share in the Visitation Evangelism Mission to Alaska. The other Negro minister was R. E. Harrington of the Louisiana Conference. These three were sharing with a group of thirty-one other ministers and laymen in this Mission. It should be stated that these men were invited by our National Boards, but they assumed the financial obligations and their local churches accepted the indebtedness. We say to the local churches, "God bless you". The time has come when other churches of the Delaware Conference should enable the minister or layman to participate in similar endeavours in order to have a part in witnessing for Christ and His Church.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend:

- 1. That we continue the quadrennial program of evangelism as it applies to the needs of our Conference.
 - 2. That we shall fully participate in the Aldersgate program of 1962 and 1963.
- 3. That in October, 1962, or at a time that is more suitable, the Bishop shall set a day for a Spiritual Life Retreat for ministers.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The \$30,000 Golden Age Investment Drive has been launched. Edward A. Hughes, Sr. has been appointed conference director, assisted by the following district directors, Mrs. Mable Cropper, Mrs. Helen Crippen, Edwin L. Ellis, Omar C. Jones, and M. L. Mc-Kenny.

The Board of Directors of the Home for the Aged, led by the chairman, James C. Hardcastle, is progressing in processing a loan of \$569,000 from the Home and Housing Finance Corporation.

The General Board of Hospitals and Homes, administrators of the Kendall Fund, has given the Board of Directors during 1961-62 the sum of \$41,000. Future grants will be made to the Board depending upon the interest and support that our Conference gives and the progress made toward the building and operation of the Home for the Aged.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend:

- 1. That every effort be made to complete the raising of \$30,000 by November, 1962.
- 2. That each local church hospitals and homes steward or stewards and all lay members of the Annual Conference work closely with the district directors and district superintendents in promotion of the drive.

3. That a roll call be made at each District Conference.

- 4. That the Annual Conference approve the revised Constitution and By-laws.
- 5. That the Commission on World Service and Finance approve a budget of \$5,000 to be assessed to the charges; and that each charge make every effort to raise the assessment in full.
- 6. That all Golden Cross enrollment funds be held in a separate account by the Board of Hospitals and Homes for health and welfare as recommended by the Golden Cross Society of the Conference.

7. That the 1962 class of directors be elected.

GOLDEN CROSS SOCIETY

Another year passes and it is through our Lord and loyal members of our churches that I make this report.

The Golden Cross Society stimulates a realistic attitude toward aging. A broad understanding of the aging process and the special needs of older people is of primary importance. The resources of the Board of Hospitals and Homes and the Golden Cross Society can help us gain this needed understanding. We must be concerned not only with the immediate problems of older people, but also with the solution of such problems as they affect persons of all ages. We strive to make clear the importance of preparation in younger years for the

seniorship now being attained by more and more people. We also emphasize the primary

responsibility of each individual in meeting the needs of the aging population.

The Golden Cross Society activity aims at full recognition of the capabilities of older persons and the contribution they can make to themselves and society. We cannot isolate the aged! This concept must be recognized and acted upon by every major group in our society. Each of us should face the realities, possibilities and responsibilities which accompany the new era of aging. All age groups should re-study their attitude toward the aging process and the opportunities which the new status of aging provides. We must realize that each of us is aging from the day he is born and that we, in our earlier years, may help to determine in large measure, security after retirement. Problems of the aged are due primarily to the decreased income at retirement, making it less easy to meet every day needs and difficult to meet large expenses.

The National Board of Hospitals and Homes reports the greatest growth to be in service for the aging. There are one hundred twelve homes for the aged today as compared

to sixty in 1950.

Every local church should have a hospitals and homes steward or stewards, to represent institutional care. The Golden Cross Society considers one of its vital tasks to be that of informing Methodists of the contribution of creative group living and loving care to the meeting of needs of the aging. Persons contemplating admission to the proposed Delaware Conference Home for the Aged should have available a counselor in the hospital and homes steward. This steward, on request of the pastor, shall be in charge of the Golden Cross enrollment and the dissemination of literature to assist in relating the congregation not only to the greater philanthropy of the church, but also to the social welfare organizations.

It was a high privilege to represent the Delaware Conference at the National Convention of the Board of Hospitals and Homes in Chicago, Illinois during February and participate in the study, "Our Church's Health and Welfare Concern". It has also been

my privilege to speak at local churches and district meetings concerning our cause.

We are grateful for the support given by the leaders of the Conference and local churches, and for the work of the district directors of the Society. Progress has been reported. Ours is a rich heritage and can be made more meaningful through our service in the future.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend:

- 1. That our goal for 1962-63 should be: Every local church seeking to enroll every member in the Golden Cross Society with the contribution of \$1.00 per year.
 - 2. That annual enrollment day be observed on the second Sunday in November.
- 3. That the Golden Cross enrollment receipts be labeled, Golden Cross Society when remitted to Conference treasurer.
 - 4. That we observe "Help Educate a Nurse Sunday".

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

The responsibility for administering the policies of the Board of Christian Social Concerns rests with the director, chairman, three vice-chairmen and district directors.

The Board has been active in the interest of temperance and general welfare, peace and world order, and human relations and economic affairs. By means of films, books, panels, lectures, and displays, we have tried to stimulate local churches, pastors and other leaders to fruitful thinking and action in the area of social concerns.

We call the attention of the Conference to three significant meetings during this conference year. A meeting with leaders of the Peninsula and Delaware Conferences was held at Easton, Md. We were called together to discuss the major existing problems which separate us and with which we must deal if we are to bring about merger and integration; and some practical, concrete, specific things that can be done now on local, district, and conference levels that will help in meeting these problems. There were seventy-two in

attendance (Delaware Conference, 30; Peninsula Conference, 41; General Board, 1). We are most grateful to Bishop Love and Bishop Lord for their strong support, presence and participation.

Our concern about new patterns in housing led us to hold a meeting in Philadelphia for the purpose of exploring the extent, causes and efforts of new patterns in housing in the Philadelphia area and to seek wholesome solutions.

At the invitation of Rev. J. W. Reynolds, chairman of the Virginia Annual Conference Board, your director met with the executive committee of the Virginia Conference and representatives from the Washington and North Carolina Conferences to converse on our common concerns in regard to territorial overlapping.

The question is being asked, "Is this the time to abolish the Central Jurisdiction?". Varying opinions are being expressed. One thing is certain and clear, the consciences of large sections of the Church, of both races, are troubled because the Central Jurisdiction exemplifies segregation within The Methodist Church. The Board has appointed a committee to present a resolution at this session expressing the thinking of our Board of Christian Social Concerns.

The Board wishes to express its appreciation for the support of Bishop Love, district superintendents, pastors, and lay leadership for their interest and concern for the quadrennial program on temperance, world order, and social and economic affairs.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. In the light of many calls for help and guidance and the urgently suggested activities from the General Board, we recommend an increase in our budget of \$1,800, making a total of \$3,000 for the year. The increase is to be used for administrative work and district activities, including training for division chairmen and district directors at conferences and workshops; donations to official Christian action groups and the new Methodist Building at the United Nations in New York City.
- 2. We further recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance approve and the Conference endorse an increase of \$1,800 for our expanded budget to be used as indicated above.
- 3. We recommend that the invitation of Dr. Carl D. Soule, executive secretary of the Division of Peace and World Order, to our Conference to send a member of our Board with him and thirty other Methodists to Europe, including Russia, in July be accepted. Further, that the selection of Henri M. Deas, chairman of Division on Peace and World Order, be approved. We further recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance approve and the Conference endorse and authorize the district superintendents to present this opportunity to the pastors and congregations and ask for a free will contribution to finance the tour which will cost approximately \$1,700.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. PASTORS' ONE AND ONE HALF PER CENT

We recommend:

- a. That the district superintendents stress the importance of the 1½% payments and urge all pastors who are in arrears to pay the amount due this fund.
- b. That in planning the appointments of the ministers, the question of their relation to the fund be taken into consideration.
- c. That in order to reduce the immense amount of 1½% due, ministers receiving \$5,000 or more cash salary should pay in full; those receiving \$2,000 to \$2,999 cash salary pay 80% of indebtedness; and those receiving less than \$2,000 cash salary pay 60% of indebtedness.
- d. That the suggested arrangements for delinquent payments be made for the conference year 1962-63.
- e. That the roll of 1½% payments be called at the Conference Executive Session.

2. PERMANENT FUND

We recommend:

That the payment of \$8,333 be made to the Permanent Fund this year and continue until we enter the Reserve Pension Fund.

3. HEALTH AND WELFARE

We recommend:

- a. That the same asking of \$500 be requested this year for the Philadelphia Methodist Hospital.
- b. That all ministers be enrolled in Health and Hospitalization policies that are available through state and local Councils of Churches.

4. RESERVE PENSION FUND

We recommend:

That the Board conduct a conference wide CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS STAMP SALE for the Reserve Pension Fund. Stamps are to be sold in sheets of one hundred for \$1.00 per sheet.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The trustees of the Delaware Conference submit the following report:

The Annual Conference is incorporated under the laws of the State of Delaware. 28 South Queen Street is listed as the address to which all legal papers pertaining to the corporation are to be sent. The requirement that the charter be renewed each year has been met, having been renewed in January of 1962.

The trustees hold the deeds to the following properties: Tioga Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa.; St. Matthew's Methodist Church, Trevose, Pa.; and Coleman Memorial Methodist Church, Wilmington, Del. The titles held for the property on which the proposed home for the aged is to be built and for the camp site are in the process of being transferred to the trustees of the home for the aged and the camp site respectively.

The insurance policies for the Tioga Church and the Community Church are kept in the safe deposit box at the Delaware Trust Company in Dover, Delaware. The Tioga Church is covered by \$250,000 and the Community Church by \$13,000 in insurance.

The trustees sold for the sum of \$500.00 the abandoned church property at Camden, Delaware. This sum has been deposited with the conference treasurer.

The list of abandoned church property is as follows:

Dover District—Portsville, Delaware and Mt. Zion Church, Lincoln, Delaware. Easton District—Church property near Beckwith, Maryland; church property Antioch, Maryland; and Dickenson Chapel, near Cambridge, Maryland.

Salisbury District—St. Luke's Church, at Punching Landing and Lutherbury Chapel, near Salisbury, Maryland.

Wilmington District-Church property at Absecon, New Jersey.

District Superintendent J. W. Elbert reports that the St. Luke's Church of the Tindley Chapel Charge, which was abandoned church property, was illegally sold by persons described as the remaining trustees of the property.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend:

1. That the trustees be authorized to take the legal action necessary to recover St.

Luke's Church property or the sum of money for which it was sold.

That the trustees be given authority to sell the abandoned church property at Lincoln, Delaware, of the Dover District.

STATE OF THE CHURCH

The church is challenged today to meet the needs of a rapidly changing social order. She is deeply conscious of the scientific progress which is being unfolded in our so-called "space age" and of the increased opportunities that these media present. Ninety-five percent of the householders in the United States have radios and ninety-nine percent of the people are in reach of at least one television station. Men in all walks of life are being challenged.

Even with all of these media and opportunities at our command we still find men who are confused and frightened. The possibility of a nuclear explosion is causing men to run to the rocks in search of a hiding place. Fallout shelters are becoming a reality in our day. With the coming of the "Spy Satellites" men are able to explore the darkest corners of the world. The Church cannot become content until it penetrates the darkest reaches of the souls of men and until they turn to the secret places of the pavillion of God for safety rather than their fallout shelters.

The world watched in awesome wonder a few days ago as one man proclaimed the wonders of God as he watched "four glorious sunsets and sunrises in one day." We must not become contented to let the world take the witness which should be ours and twist and slant it to give to themselves a false sense of security.

Sensitivity to world events is a prerequisite to the victories which the Church seeks. Let us not repeat the mistakes of the past when so often the Church missed the great chance by ignoring the uncomfortable realities of the world which was its parish.

Let the Church know the world it is to serve, and go forth to serve in the consciousness

of its nature, its authority, its mission, and its power.

To this age the Church is expected to minister with a firm and steady hand and to speak with a clear and commanding voice. An artificial climate of authority has been created by the external pressures of coercion and persecution designed to shatter the inner compulsions of life on which all valid authority is based.

The disciples of Jesus met successfully the resistance to their new religious experience because they knew what they were commissioned to do.

Recommendations:

1. One area which commands our immediate attention is the Christian education of young people. The total educational program of the Church cannot be over emphasized.

If we are to go forward in this age we must be prepared.

2. We live in a world whose very existence is threatened by group tensions, misunderstanding, and incited hostilities. We therefore urge every church to exert all of its energy to create real brotherhood which will transform tension into participation, misunderstanding into appreciation, and hostility into cooperation.

3. We urge every church to speak with authority on all matters of social concern

and especially those where neglect and injustices are evident.

4. That we endeavor to have a spiritual reawakening throughout the Church.

5. That we strive to become " . . . doers and not hearers only".

That we reevaluate our mission in today's troubled world in relation to the teach-

ings of Jesus.

The road ahead is a long one, but it is no longer than that which our Lord walked on the way to Calvary. The burden may be heavy, but He never puts more on us than

Rise up, O men of God! Have done with lesser things;

Give heart and soul and mind and strength to serve the King of Kings.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Commission on Worship is promoting the trial use of the Proposed Revisions for The Book of Worship in all of the churches of the Delaware Conference. The Commission recommends:

- 1. That the pastors will urge all officials to purchase the book that is published in compliance with the order of the General Conference of 1960.
- 2. That the two Orders of Worship will be tried by both small and large churches because the orders can be adapted for use by both. The first order is being adapted from John Wesley's Sunday Service for the Methodist Societies in America. The second order follows the pattern of the Wesley service and has all of the basic elements of Christian worship.
- 3. That the pastors will interpret to the people the meaning of the other General Services: The Sacrament of Baptism; the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper; the Service of Marriage; and the Order for the Burial of the Dead—so that they may not be mere "tokens" of the Christian's profession.
- 4. That section two, Services for the Christian Year, will be used to provide variety and change in the services, All materials follow the traditional year, beginning with Advent and concluding with Thanksgiving.
- 5. That section three, the General Aids to Worship for Personal and Public Worship, can be used in several ways. It is intended to offer pastors and people a portion of the heritage which is ours in the Christian worship of God. It will provide prayers, sentences, versicles (a short verse in a service that is spoken by the minister), canticles, and litanies.
- 6. That the suggestions for improvements for the Proposed Revisions for The Book of Worship will be mailed not later than December, 1962, to the office of the Book Editor of The Methodist Church, 201 Eighth Avenue, South, Nashville 3, Tennessee.
- 7. That the pastors and other leaders of worship will study the great hymns of faith, and that they will use them to enrich the worship experiences of their congregations.
- 8. That workshops be held in every local church to acquaint the members with the meaning of public and private worship.

The Commission on Worship will have on display in the prayer room at Tindley Temple appropriate symbols representing the special seasons and services of the Christian Year. The display will be in the church from Wednesday, May 23, to Saturday, May 26, 1962.

For this reason, I am inclined to suggest that the effort of this committee be limited (1) to working out a program of not more than two hours for presentation to an evening session of the 1963 annual conference; (2) that great effort be made to make it an impressive registration of our gratitude to Almighty God for deliverance that will also serve as a vehicle for teaching those who are younger the enlarged opportunities that bless their lives; and finally, as an inspiration to all, to be more consciously motivated by the spiritual as we seek to make the most of our lives in an unselfish way.

That in 1963, the 225th Anniversary of John Wesley's Aldersgate experience be observed throughout the Conference, in every local church; and further, that studies in the areas of (a) Life of John Wesley, (b) History of Methodism, (c) The Negro in Methodism, and (d) Methodist Beliefs, be encouraged.

6. That an organized effort be made to gather historical data and documents on

Methodism in the Delaware Conference.

7. That the Historical Society assume the initiative to circulate historical data of the Conference in Methodist historical circles and publications.

8. That the Society become the Conference agency responsible for the sale and distribution of the Conference History to be published in 1964.

9. That congregations be encouraged to make colored pictures, slides, and cards of their local churches for distribution,

GREATER PHILADELPHIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

1961 IN RETROSPECT

The following is a month-to-month glimpse of some of the results of the cooperation of nearly 600 churches of 24 denominations. Their support made possible a balanced budget in 1961, a fact gratefully acknowledged to all who helped make this possible.

JANUARY: The Council year began with an activity which brought it into close touch with its full membership, through the annual SUPPORT PLAN. The second Sunday in January was designated as "Council of Churches Sunday."

FEBRUARY: In more than 110 worship centers over 14,000 people, young and old, gathered to observe WORLD DAY OF PRAYER. The worshipers participated in a world-wide program, the purpose of which was "to unite all Christians in a bond of prayer and Christian Fellowship around the world and to make an offering for interdenominational projects at home and abroad." Almost \$10,000 was received in offerings.

MARCH: The first sessions of the series of EDUCATION FOR MARRIAGE seminars drew an enrollment of 35 young people already engaged to be married. Practical problems of marriage as budgeting, insurance, installment buying, inter-personal adjustments, and the like were discussed. This series is unique in that it emphasizes the paramount importance of spiritual values undergirding the whole marriage experience. Designed as a preparatory course, it makes possible more effective marriage counseling by clergymen.

APRIL: The completion of a LISTENING AREA SURVEY was conducted by Council staff for Station WRCV-TV. We discovered a potential of over nine million viewers of religious programs sponsored by the Council.

MAY: MAY FELLOWSHIP DAY was the occasion for the women of the Church to hear Margaret E. Kuhn, of the United Presbyterian Board of Christian Education, speak on the subject, "Our Churches—Free and Responsible". Representatives from several churches led discussions on the impact the Church has on the community.

JUNE: CHURCH-COMMUNITY COOPERATION in the field of recreation received recognition at a program honoring volunteers who had participated in bringing wholesale recreation to crisis areas devoid of community facilities.

JULY: The annual VACATION CHURCH SCHOOL FIELD TRIPS were arranged for over 1,000 Junior and Junior High youngsters to tour Fellowship House and Fellowship Farm and historic churches in Philadelphia, Following the theme, "Personal and Group

Relationships," the tours gave the young people fellowship experience across national and racial lines, through worship, work, group singing and folk games.

AUGUST: In cooperation with Scout councils, full-time CHAPLAINS were assigned to summer BOY SCOUT CAMPS. The Chaplains made arrangements for midweek and Sunday worship services, gave advice and counsel to the sick and homesick, and stimulated interest in Scouting's religious awards. During the 1961 summer season, over 1,300 Scouts indicated their interest in beginning work for the religious awards in their local churches.

SEPTEMBER: THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS FOR MENTALLY RETARDED CHILDREN operating in the Philadelphia area began their new classes. New teaching materials have been developed, for radically different levels of comprehension. Working under the sponsorship of the Council, the Rev. T. C. Cooke, Chaplain for the Philadelphia Youth Study Center, has been responsible for recommending curriculum materials and for organizing special Sunday Schools for the Mentally Retarded.

OCTOBER: A Host Family Tea highlighted the beginning of another season for the Council-sponsored HOME HOSPITALITY PROGRAM FOR FOREIGN STU-DENTS. Over 2,000 students from 85 foreign countries, who are enrolled in colleges, universities and other educational institutions in the Greater Philadelphia area, are given an opportunity through this program to experience the hospitality of a Christian home. Upwards of 500 Protestant hostesses are participating in the program.

NOVEMBER: "An Effective Church for an Urban Society" is the name of a pilot course being added to the curriculum of the Conwell School of Theology. The Council's COOPERATION WITH CONWELL on this project is assured by the appointment of staff and departmental board members to the Administrative and Advisory Committees. This program will emphasize In-Service Training Seminars for ministers in active pastorates. Students will be given special work in modern sociological and scientific disciplines outside the church. The emphasis will be to challenge and train the ministers in the techniques of change, so that they can lead their churches into becoming positive influences in their own rapidly changing communities.

DECEMBER: City Hall was host to a contingent of 25 Protestant ministers new to the Philadelphia area. The occasion was the POLICE BRIEFING FOR CLERGY designed to acquaint them with the work of the Police Department.

Other many services which the Council provides to help the local clergy to be more effective in their ministry include: preparation of the "Pastor's Information and Referral Guide," training seminars in communication skills, Income Tax and Social Security Clinic, audio-visual workshops, Blue Cross group coverage not only for ministers but for full-time church staff as well.

The Reverend Henry H. Nichols has been representing the Delaware Conference of the Methodist Church on our Board of Directors in 1961.
