The Honorable Richardson Dilworth, Mayor of the City of Philadelphia, presenting letter to The Rev. Noah W. Moore, Jr., for presentation to His Honor, Dr. Wilhelm Daniels, Mayor of Bonn, Germany

Quoted, below, is an excerpt from a letter received by Dr. Moore in March, 1959, from Dr. von Trutzschler, representative of the Federal Republic of Germany and Berlin (West), inviting him to participate, as a member of The Methodist Committee for Oversea Relief, in a Study Tour:

Dear Pastor Moore:

On behalf of the German Federal Government I have the honor to invite you on a four weeks' study of the Federal Republic and Berlin (West) as guest of the Federal Government.

This study tour is intended to enable you to acquaint yourself personally with the new Germany. You will be given opportunities to become familiar with conditions in the Federal Republic in general and in your own sphere of interest in particular. As guest of the Federal Government you will meet leading personalities in public, political and cultural life and be able to discuss with them questions of interest to you. Furthermore, the program provides for sufficient spare time so as to give you every opportunity to study our conditions from your own point of view.

The participants in this hospitality program will be formed into small groups according to fields of interest and will travel as such.

The tour of your group has been scheduled from Nov. 1 to 30, 1959.



III. Journal of Daily Proceedings

FIRST DAY-TUESDAY, May 19, 1959, 7 P.M.

The Laymen's Meeting followed the devotional period with Elmer T. Hawkins, Vice-President of the Conference Board of Lay Activities, presiding. "The Connectional Church" was the general theme for this discussion. A charge to the laymen to unite with pastors in facing the wider responsibilities of the church was given by the presiding officer as he presented opening remarks and purposes. Mr. Roy L. Cordery, Lay Leader of the Philadelphia District, in his address on "A Connectional Church," stressed the meaning and benefits of being associated with a connectional church. He further pointed up our obligations to the General Church for the financial assistance which has come to the churches of our jurisdiction. Mr. Hally P. Johns, Conference Lay Leader and a vice-president of the General Council of Evangelism, stressed the need of much greater effort in the area of evangelism by laymen as well as ministers. He stated that a church that is not making people Christ-conscious does not have the right to exist and is not representing Jesus Christ.

Welcome Program: With the choir of Mt. Carmel Church, Wilmington, Delaware rendering the music, greetings were received from Dr. Harry Green, president of the Philadelphia Branch, N.A.A.C.P. He referred to the pastor, Dr. Noah W. Moore, of the host church as "a leader in everything progressive in Philadelphia." Dr. John D. Bright of Mother Bethel A.M.E. Church, speaking for the clergy of the City, pointed up the "grave responsibility of a dedicated, united ministry, preaching a gospel whose sermons are better seen than heard." The Rev. Marshall Sheppard represented the Mayor of Philadelphia and the City Administration. City Detective Ralph H. Jones, who has been church school superintendent of Tindley Temple for twenty-four years, gave greetings for the host church. Rev. Edwin L. Ellis, in his response to the welcomes, noted that forty-five of the ninety-seven sessions of the Delaware Conference have been in Philadelphia. "This," he said, "attests the Delaware Conference's love for your city, and we hope our being here will be an asset to your standards."

Pageant—Delaware Conference History: The high point of the evening was the pageant, "The Delaware Conference, Its Past and Its Prospect," prepared by the Rev. Charles L. Carrington. Every church would do well to present this clever pageant of optimistic Harry Hopeful (Rev. E. L. Ellis) and pessimist Danny Doubtful (Rev. M. R. Honor Hampton T. Johnson: Signally honored in the pageant with a scroll authorized by the Committee on Delaware Conference History as the embodiment of history itself, the Rev. H. T. Johnson declared, "I have given my life to the church. I am grateful to God, and if I never answer another roll call here, I will see you there."

SECOND DAY-WEDNESDAY, May 20, 1959

Holy Communion: Bishop Edgar A. Love, assisted by the District Superintendents and the host pastor, Noah W. Moore, Jr., conducted the service of Holy Communion and administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper to the members of the Conference and visiting laymen. The presiding Bishop delivered the meditation on "The Glory of This Hour," using the Scripture John 12:12 and Psalm 23. An offering of \$250.00 was given for missionary work

in Liberia, West Africa.

Anniversary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes: C. B. Miles, presiding. Dr. Hobart C. Jackson, administrator of the Stephen Smith Home for the Aged, 4400 W. Girard Ave., Philadelphia, was the speaker. He emphasized some of the basic needs for the successful operation of a home for the aged; among them being, a religious atmosphere, skilled personnel, doctor and registered nurse affiliated with a hospital, physical and occupational therapists, social case worker, and workshops. It must be a first class hotel as well as a home.

Anniversary of the Board of Lay Activities: Hally P. Johns, presiding? Mr. Robert G. Mayfield, Executive Secretary, General Board of Lay Activities, was the speaker. His subject was "Stewardship and Duties of the Board of Lay Activities." Other guests were, Mr. Herbert J. Chiltoff, Lay Leader of the New Jersey Conference; Mr. G. Stanley Lynch, Lay Leader of the Philadelphia Conference and Manager of the Methodist Book Store; and Mr. Clinton Brown, Lay Leader of the Peninsular Conference. THIRD DAY—THURSDAY, May 21, 1959 Morning Session, 9 A.M.

Lay Delegates' Session at the First Colored Wesley Methodist Church was called to order and devotions were led by Mrs. Helen C. Waters. Elmer T. Hawkins presided during the business session. Motion by W. C. Jason that an agenda be made before continuing the meeting was accepted. Following items

were placed on the agenda: Reading sections of the *Discipline* concerning the duties and responsibilities of the lay members of the Annual Conference and election of delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences; Introduction of candidates as delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences; and a discussion of the composite report of the District Superintendents.

Executive Session: Devotions were conducted by David B. Nickerson.

Board of Ministerial Training report was presented by D. R. Fletcher and adopted. (See IV. The Disciplinary Questions, Part II. 21-34.) Portions of the report were referred to Committee on Conference Relations.

Bishop Love stated that the district superintendents should report list of approved supply pastors to be turned over to the Board of Pensions for question 22 of Disciplinary Questions.

J. R. Bowdoin, seeking credit for additional two years of service not recorded, was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

Service Record: Question of responsibility for service record was raised. Bishop Love desires a record of every pastor in the Conference. The Secretary suggested cooperation of the Board of Pensions, Conference Relations Committee, Board of Ministerial Training and Secretary to create a comprehensive record for every pastor.

Joint Meeting: After the question of cooperation between the Board of Ministerial Training and Committee on Conference Relations was raised by C. E. Kiah, the motion that said boards, with the chairman of the Commission on Christian Vocations shall meet, jointly, one month in advance of Annual Conference to expedite matters which are to come before the conference for action, was approved.

D. R. Fletcher, after consultation with J. W. Elbert, stated that all reports and recommendations of district and interim committees should be sent to the joint committee early for satisfactory consideration before the convening of Annual Conference.

Pension Board requests the complete salaries of the Area Secretary and Executive Secretary of Christian Education to be included in the minutes for annuity purposes. Bishop Love requested the secretary to secure from every detached ministerial member his salary and print same in the Journal according to P. 830, Discipline, 1956.

Committee on Conference Relations report was adopted. (See IV, 34-44, VI-B-1.)

W. C. Strother reported that J. R. Bowdoin was entitled to eleven years of service instead of nine and this correction should be recorded by the secretary under question 46.

Withdrawal: Warren Marshall, probationer, having withdrawn from The Methodist Church has surrendered his credentials.

Additional Report: Conference Relations Committee recommendation that Ewart Hackshaw be received as full member and that his orders as deacon be recognized from The British Methodist Church, was adopted.

At the secretary's request, cards were filled out giving number of Conference Journals needed for each charge.

Devotions were led by Ralph B. Thompson.

Conference Session: Ewart C. Hackshaw who had been received into the Conference on credentials as a full member from The British Methodist Church was presented by Bishop Love.

Election of Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences: Tellers were named by the Bishop. Ministerial: C. E. Kiah, C. A. Edmonds, I. R. Elzey, E. L. Ellis, C. W. Perry. Lay: William Hamilton, J. L. Coleman, H. D. Brown, Harrison Matthews, Mrs. Dorothy Morris.

Instructions were given by the Bishop regarding proper voting procedure. One hundred thirty ministers are eligible to vote. Delegates may vote for any person who is a member of the Delaware Conference, and must have been for four years, a member of The Methodist Church and at least twenty-one years of age.

First ballots were cast.

Visitors Presented: Delegation from the A.M.E. Zion Conference, now in session in the city, was presented. Rev. Alfred G. Dunston, Wesley A.M.E. Zion Church presented Mrs. Elsie Keys, Vice-President of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, Rev. J. H. Satterwhite, instructor of Philosophy, Washington, D. C., and Rev. Franklin Jackson, pastor of A.M.E. Zion Church, Washington, D. C. A response to their greetings was made by Walter R. Hazzard.

Report of the Board of Education: John R. Shockley, chairman, stated that the report would not be read as it has been printed and distributed to the delegates. H. A. Bailey, executive secretary, was presented and the following members of the staff were then presented: C. Leonard Miller, conference director of youth work, who spoke briefly of the plans for new camp site which is to be developed for adult, youth and children's work.

Sercy L. Jones, dean of the Youth Assembly, to be held July 26-Aug. 1 at Delaware State College, Dover, Delaware, stressed the importance of preregistration by July 12. The cost will be \$24.50 per delegate.

David W. Briddell, director of adult work, directed attention to the section of the report on adult work and stressed the importance of adult education.

Herman D. Brown, director of older adult work, stated that The Methodist Church was foremost in adopting the program for older adults and that much has been accomplished in the Delaware Conference.

Recommendations of the Board read by J. R. Shockley were adopted. Motion was passed that complete report of Board of Education be adopted. (See Report B-5.)

J. R. Shockley announced that Mrs. Helen C. Waters who has served as secretary of the board for twenty years will resign at the end of the present quadrennium.

Order of the Day: Continuation of the report on Christian Education in the afternoon session.

William R. Mayberry was reported to be ill.

Report of Election: Noah W. Moore, Jr. was elected as ministerial delegate to the General Conference on the first ballot with 74 votes.

Noon Address was delivered by Dr. James S. Thomas, Associate Director of the Department of Secondary and Higher Education of the General Board of Education of The Methodist Church. He commended the members of the

Board of Education for the "very significant and well worked out report," and brought greetings from the General Board of Education. Dr. Thomas' subject was, "Building Strength for the Future."

The Benediction was pronounced by Bishop Edgar Love.

THURSDAY-AFTERNOON SESSION, 2:30 P.M.

The Missionary Service was not held because William R. Mayberry who was to deliver the Missionary Sermon had become ill on the previous day.

Report of Election: Mrs. Helen C. Waters was elected lay delegate to the General Conference on the first ballot with 74 votes.

Commission on Christian Vocations: Recommendations read by Miss Florence G. Wilson and adopted. (See Report B-7.)

Commission on Christian Higher Education: Report read by N. W. Moore

and adopted. (See Report B-6.)

The resolution read by N. W. Moore from the Commission on Christian Higher Education was adopted and is to be sent as a memorial to the General Conference. Three copies are to be sent to the Secretary of the General Conference. (See Resolution 5.)

Prayer was offered for William R. Mayberry who earlier was reported ill. Committee on Courtesy presented the following visitors: From the Washington Annual Conference, The Reverends J. B. Dyson, B. M. Hargrove, J. W. Carroll, Roscoe C. Williams, E. P. Clark, J. D. Foy, F. J. Frye, S. M. Carter, Ramsey Bridges, E. D. Hall; New York Conference, J. O. Williams, W. M. James, I. H. Bivens, Irving Lockman; Rev. Raymond J. Tarr, Philadelphia Conference; Rev. James H. Powell, Baltimore Conference of A.M.E. Church; Rev. V. H. Hodges, American Bible Society; Rev. T. B. Rule No. 8 of the Conference was suspended that action might be taken. Resolution was tabled. Motion that the secretary mimeograph copies of resolution to be distributed for action on Friday morning was adopted.

Election of Delegates to Jurisdictional Conference: Elected were D. R. Fletcher, M. O. Ballard, and W. L. D. Lyght as ministerial delegates to Jurisdictional Conference who become automatically alternates to General Conference

ence.

James C. Hardcastle and Elmer T. Hawkins were elected as lay delegates. Protest Methodist Publication: D. L. Ridout reported that the Abingdon Press had published a book, "Let's All Sing," containing two songs that are contrary to the practices of The Methodist Church. A motion was adopted urging discontinuance of this publication. A Memorial protesting this publication was adopted to be sent to the General Conference. (See Resolution 13.)

Hospitals and Homes report was read by E. A. Hughes and adopted. (See

Resolution 3.)

Elders orders were recommended for Cyrus Martin Stafford on motion of D. R. Fletcher and approved.

The motion of D. R. Fletcher to place Eric George and Floyd Waters on the Approved Student Supply Pastors list was adopted.

The election of the last lay delegate was to be first on the agenda on Fri-

day morning.

Bishop Love requested all ministers and lay delegates of churches having paid mortgages during the past year to be present for the mortgage burning ceremony at the evening service.

Session was adjourned.

THURSDAY-EVENING SESSION, 7 P.M.

Evangelistic Service, George T. Jackson, presiding. The sermon was delivered by Ralph B. Thompson using the text, Luke 15, Parable of the Lost Sheep. Solo was rendered by Mrs. Thelma Perrin and benediction pronounced by R. B. Thompson.

Conference Session was called to order by Bishop Love.

Minutes of the previous sessions were read and adopted.

Correction: Continuation of Election: Bishop Love stated that the Secretary had called to his attention the fact that we have only 130 full ministerial members and therefore entitled to only four delegates. Motion by C. L. Carrington that the minister who received the third highest number of votes in Thursday's balloting become the first reserve was adopted. W. L. D. Lyght thus became the first reserve. Ministers were then instructed to elect one more reserve and laymen to elect two reserves. On the next ballot, no minister was elected; James R. Webb was elected as first lay reserve.

Motion of D. L. Ridout that the minister receiving the highest number of votes be declared elected was adopted. Howard A. Bailey was thus elected as second ministerial reserve.

Motion of Dewey Townsend that the layman receiving the highest numbers on votes on next ballot be declared elected was adopted. Mrs. Helen Loatman was elected the second lay reserve delegate.

Group Insurance: Bishop Love asked that the order of the day be changed in order to permit D. L. Root and Mr. William T. Attison presented the plan for full members of the Conference, full time approved supply pastors and full time lay employees of local churches; no age limit required to join. Benefits: \$2,000.00, natural causes; \$4,000.00, accidental death; insurance becomes automatically paid up if one becomes totally and permanently disabled before 60 years. Three-fourths of members of the Conference must join if the plan is to be valid. After discussion, the plan was adopted on motion of D. W. Briddell and turned over to the Board of Pensions to work out details.

Recess for ten minutes called by Bishop Love.

Fraternal Delegate: The Rev. David VerNooy brought greetings from the New York East Conference, now in session at New Haven, Connecticut. On motion of R. B. Thompson, the Secretary was authorized to send a telegram of greetings to the New York East Conference.

Bishop Love announced that the afternoon session would be devoted to the agenda originally prepared for the morning session: reports from the Conference Treasurer, Commission on World Service and Finance, Director of Wills and Legacies, The Golden Cross Society and Television, Radio and Film Commission.

Visitor, Dr. Marcus L. Harris, President of Philander Smith College, Little Rock, Arkansas, presented by Bishop Love, spoke briefly and brought greetings from the Lexington Annual Conference.

Mr. Lake, director of the American Bible Society spoke briefly of the work of the Society and left literature to be distributed.

Dr. Leon T. Moore, secretary of The General Conference of The Methodist Church, spoke briefly. The motion was adopted that Dr. Moore be our official delegate to Claffin College, Orangeburg, S. C., where he will deliver the commencement address and also take greetings to Resident Bishop J. W. E. Bowen and Dr. H. V. Manning, president of the college.

Treasurer's Report: Financial report was made by J. E. Dunn. Total receipts for conference year, 1957-58, \$256,460.55; conference year, 1958-59, \$274,113.15. Total receipts increased \$17,652.60 over previous year by districts as follows: Dover, \$496.54; Easton, \$4,157.01; Philadephia, \$8,416.27; Salisbury, \$2,662.81; Wilmington, \$1,919.97. The treasurer commended the ministers of the Salisbury, Easton and Dover Districts for promptness in sending in reports.

The treasurer's report was adopted subject to the report of the auditor.

Board of Pensions Financial Statement read by Miss Florence Wilson and adopted. (See Report B-12.) W. C. Strother, chairman, stated that the annuity rate for the Conference year will be increased from \$30.00 to \$31.00.

Motion by W. C. Strother that we ask the General Pension Board to make a study of our Conference next year toward the end of our participation in the Ministers' Reserve Fund was adopted.

Pensions—Supplemental Report read by James H. C. Kelly on uncollected conference claimants funds to May, 1958, Reserve Pension Fund pledges paid in full and 1958 Honor Roll for Ministers 1½%. He then referred to P. 1634, Discipline concerning the penalty for unpaid funds for conference claimants. (See Report B-13.)

Report of Commission on World Service and Finance made by F. D. Jones. (See Report B-2.) An additional recommendation concerning combining part of Non Ratio Askings was not adopted.

All recommendations adopted except No. 5. On motion of W. C. Jason, action on No. 5 was withheld until Saturday morning.

On request of H. M. Deas, an analysis of the duties of a full time conference treasurer and director of stewardship was to be brought to the Conference on Saturday morning.

Bishop Love announced the program for the evening and urged all to be present.

Adjournment: After other announcements had been made, the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Love.

Benediction was given by Rev. Wheeler in the language of the people among whom he works as a missionary.

Proposal that the Delaware Conference join the Council and accept the proposed share of the budget which is to be paid by the churches of the Conference in the State of Delaware, was approved.

Representatives Elected: Two ministers: G. H. McMurray, D. B. Nickerson; two laymen: Mrs. Cleo Henry, T. A. Jeter were confirmed by the Conference as representatives to the General Assembly of the Delaware Council of Churches. Superintendents of the Dover and Wilmington Districts are ex-officio members.

8. DISCRIMINATION IN HOUSING

Mr. Charles J. Mills, Chairman Committee on Law and Order House of Representatives Harrisburgh, Pennsylvania

At a session of the Delaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, representing 14,000 citizens living in Philadelphia the following resolution calling for State legislation to outlaw discrimination in housing was passed:

Whereas, a good home in a good neighborhood should be an obtainable goal for everyone regardless of race, religion, or ethnic origin; and

Whereas, discrimination in selling, leasing and financing of housing accommodations makes this impossible,

Be it, therefore resolved that the Conference call upon the General Assembly, now in session, to enact legislation at the 1959 session prohibiting discrimination in the selling, leasing, and financing of housing accommodations in Pennsylvania.

9. OPPOSITION TO TESTING OF NUCLEAR WEAPONS

Whereas, the increased testing of nuclear, hydrogen, and atomic weapons has been declared by the most competent bodies of world scientific authorities to be detrimental and deleterious to the human upon this planet, and

Whereas, the increased amount of strontium, a bivalent element whose serious potential for the retardation and physical distortion of human growth and reproductivity, has already been found to be only one of the vastly devastating and destructive elements of these bombs; be it

Resolved, That the Delaware Conference go on record as being opposed to the continuance of the testing of such weapons by the United States government, and that in addition, this resolution be sent as a memorial to the General Conference urging upon it the use of the full influence and authority of The Methodist Church upon the President and Congress to bring about the peaceful employment of such information of nuclear and atomic energy as has already become a part of already tested knowledge.

Whereas, the General Conference of 1956 authorized the creation of a commission to study and recommend action concerning the jurisdictional system, to carry on studies and conduct hearings in all jurisdictions on racial segregation in The Methodist Church and other problems related to the jurisdictional system, to develop courses of action directed toward interracial brotherhood and the spirit of Christian love; be it therefore

Resolved that the Delaware Conference shall defer action on the transfer of any local church to another conference and jurisdiction until the General Conference shall have given specific directives in light of the report of the commission that was created to study and recommend action concerning the jurisdictional system.

VI. The Reports

A. The District Superintendents' Reports

COMPOSITE REPORT

Bishop Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Delaware Conference:

The district superintendents are pleased at this time to present their first composite report on the status of the work in the five districts of the conference. This account which we give in this form constitutes a general statement on the condition of our work. A more detailed evaluation of the accomplishments wrought in the pastoral charges will be found in the individual report given

by each district superintendent.

It is very difficult in a report of this nature to satisfactorily cover all areas of our concern. While we have sought diligently to gather all information necessary to the proper formation of such an account as this, it was not possible to obtain all the data we deemed needful for the purpose of forming this report. Our report, therefore, is based upon such information as we have been able to secure through the various media open to us in our capacity as district superintendents. The report in a very true sense represents the combined efforts of the district superintendents.

We have not covered the respective work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Board of Lay Activities in this report, so it should be stated that in all the activities in which our churches have been engaged, these two groups have played a very significant part. Indeed, few of our accomplishments could have been possible without the active participation of the very loyal people who compose these organizations. Let it be said, therefore, that in all our endeavor, in evangelism, stewardship, Christian education and Christian community projects, the people of these organizations have provided our principal support.

Evangelism

The task of evangelizing the unreached in our districts remains to challenge us and to remind us of our unfinished mission. Everywhere on our districts, multitudes of persons are stricken with the ailments of a secular and materialistic world. Exposed to noble lies and half truths, they mill around with divided loyalties and a lack of a proper sense of values. Many are dazzled by the brilliant demonstration of science and technology and grope their way through paths that lead to destruction.

We have taken the position that no man needs to remain as he is, for there is a way out. He can be transformed, he can be made a new creature in

Christ. "Now is the accepted time." "Today is the day of salvation."

On July 3, 1958 the district superintendents, many pastors and laymen from various districts attended the Convocation on Evangelism, Washington, D. C. Emphasis was placed on local church evangelism. This meeting so thrilled and inspired us that similar convocations were held with great success on district, sub-district and local church levels. Many churches conducted revivals, using the mass evangelistic approach, but the most significant evangelistic effort was the Bishop's Evangelistic Crusade held February 9-15, 1959. The five districts started out with 2,892 prospects; 516 visitation teams. These teams interviewed 244 persons in their 3,507 visits. The results were 923 won by Professions of Faith; 118 transfers from other Methodist churches; 48 from other denominations and 307 were restored to church rolls making a grand total of 1,396 persons added to the churches of the entire Conference.

Wherever the effort was made good results were obtained. The hearts of lay visitors were cheered in charge after charge, on district after district. Because these fine lay visitors gave the necessary time to be trained, to be prepared in heart and mind in the techniques of soul winning before going out to press the claims of Christ upon the unchurched, they were blessed in their labors and came back rejoicing "Bringing in the sheaves." There have come reports that some of the visitors themselves made new commitments, while others thrilled at the idea that evangelism is not reserved solely for the pastor. They went into homes of young married couples, in homes where there were new babies which needed to be baptized and dedicated to Christ, into homes where there were little children to be led to Christ; on the streets; in places of business; on the job among older people. They were on the job to commit people to Christ, believing that with Christ there are no hopeless cases, that persons can be born again—anytime.

Our job is just started. We need to invade the ranks of our church members. We must evangelize the evangel. Too many Methodists are satisfied to meet just the minimum requirements of church membership. We need the power to awake our half-hearted, half-asleep Methodists. Too many pews are empty in our churches. We are too prone to shorten our membership by removing members by action of the Quarterly Conferences. Too many doors are closed too long in many of our churches. There are some features about which we can rejoice in our evangelistic efforts, but can we be truly happy as long as we behold what men could be and have not yet become? Can we really be contented over conversions which should come but have not? Our task requires that through-out our districts we shall work and pray that there might come a baptism of fire upon our churches until our members are transformed from nominal Christians to concerned Christians, where the altar fires shall be rekindled to give new power for living and capable of setting other hearts on fire. May we not give up until the hearts of pastors, adults, youth and children are aglow, and violently alive, ready to go forth with new enthusiasm, new faith and as new channels through which the grace of God can save the world.

Christian Education

The Methodist Church has always considered education as one of its chief responsibilities. Throughout the history of our denomination the promotion of educational interests has been among our primary activities. We know that if we are to fulfill our mission, this phase of our program must not be abandoned. It is the best means through which we may give men, women, boys and girls the Christian mind.

Long ago Methodist leaders heard and responded to our blessed Lord's command: "Go ye into all the world and teach. . . ." This accounts for the extensive system of schools, colleges and educational buildings established and maintained by the Methodist Church.

As we survey the educational accomplishments of the five districts for

this conference year, it becomes evident that we have had a measure of success in extending and improving upon the work of Christian education which has

been so faithfully done by those who preceded us.

Our Quarterly Conferences have indicated that commissions on education are organized and functioning in varying degrees of effectiveness in most of the charges on all districts. While our statistics are not complete at this stage, we have the assurance that there is in operation about two hundred and sixty church schools, into which more than twenty-five thousand pupils are enrolled; that on any average Sunday around ten thousand persons are attending these schools. About the same number of pupils attend our Vacation Church Schools and many others are found in additional sessions, week day schools and in Membership Training classes. Many of these persons join the church on Profession of faith, and substantial contributions are given to World Service through fourth Sunday contributions.

Through the able assistance given by the Rev. Howard A. Bailey and his district staffs, great opportunities by way of in-service training are given to our many, many volunteer officers, teachers and workers. This training has come through Christian Worker's Schools, Vacation Church School Institutes, Coaching Conferences, District and Sub-District Workshops, Seminars, Observation Schools, District Assemblies, etc. While we rejoice over the progress made, we are not satisfied as long as we know that among those we have reached that there is found too much indifference and irregularity, in attendance. Too many are satisfied with cheap, questionable magazines, comics, movies, and with the downright silliness of many of the commercial radio and T.V. programs. While we are happy for the signs of hope and promise here and there we realize that our task is far from complete in our local church schools.

We have been greatly concerned about Christian higher education. Personalities must be moulded, good patterns for our social order need to be created. Our Christian colleges and Wesleyan Foundations must lead the way. We have drawn a little closer to these institutions this year. We have seen how their very existence is threatened by tax supported colleges which compete with us for qualified teachers and proper facilities. Our institutions of higher education are best with even rising costs, and ever mounting deficits and these result in less adequate facilities and salaries.

We have emphasized raising \$1.50 per member as one means of solving our problems. The response has been gratifying. We have no doubt broken all previous records in this particular fund. But even this is far from adequate. We desperately need Christian higher education if we are to cope with the materialistic philosophy of life, which dominates so many minds today. If we are to have it, we must pay for it. Our local churches must not only accept, but pay the \$1.50 per member, and give again and again that young men and women may be schooled in a sense of values, and motivated to follow in the steps of one who said long ago, "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life."

Missions

We have not reached all of our missionary goals; however, we have endeavored on each district to create or promote a "Christian program which will cause each church member to experience such dedicated and trained relationship to Jesus Christ and his Church that God can use him for a more perfect realization of his purposes in every area of personal and social liv-

ing, and that others may be brought to join in this active fellowship, prepared to cooperate with all Christians toward achieving a Christian world community." Somebody said, "Science has made the world a neighborhood, now religion must make it a brotherhood." The supreme aim of missions is not simply to make the world a brotherhood, but also to make disciples for the Lord Jesus Christ and to enlist them in the building of the Kingdom of God.

Our progress in missions has not been without a struggle because too many of our local churches now function imperfectly, the migration of people from the rural areas and from other sections of the Nation to the metropolitan centers, the changing neighborhoods of the inner city, the need for new churches, and the inadequate financial support of some churches magnify our problems. The commission on missions is the weakest and most inactive of the four commissions in the local church because of insufficient interest, motivation and creative activity. There is, however, a growing sense of ecumenicity and responsibility within the fellowship of Christians across the Conference. Not only are more commissions organized and active today, but many members have increased their offerings for World Service and Conference Benevolences because they have a larger vision of their purpose in life and because they feel their brother's care. We are reminded of a story told of two children: "A little boy was carrying a child that seemed much too heavy for him to carry. An old man approached him and said, 'Isn't that boy too heavy for you to carry?' The little boy replied, 'He is not heavy, he is my brother.'" This little boy was more than his brother's keeper. He was his brother's brother. Giving our financial and moral support to help the weak and the needy around the world is not a burden to members who are fully committed to Christ and his way of self-denial for the welfare and salvation of mankind.

Our progress in missions has been facilitated by emphasizing Christian teaching in the Sunday school and in the administrative organizations of the church, by promoting a school of missions in some of the local churches, conducting district missionary institutes, and by preaching the Gospel. In some instances missionaries and foreign students have enlightened and inspired Methodists with their messages about our missionary challenges and opportunities in foreign fields. The churches are not static, however, a far more impressive record could be written for the Delaware Conference as a whole if all of our local churches were fully organized according to the provisions of the Methodist Discipline and if all of them could be brought to a fresh vision of their potentialities as churches, a proper sense of their responsibility as Christians, and a fuller dedication of their resources to the causes of the Kingdom of God.

Although the church must have the World Service budget, our major concern is not money but men. We therefore focus our attention upon people and their movement from place to place. Most significant of all shifts is that which is taking place in the movement of Negrocs from the South to the urban North to realize a larger freedom, more opportunities, and a better livelihood. Churchmen among the laity and clergy know how urgent it is for the Delaware Conference to be effectively organized with a strategy and adequate funds to meet the missionary challenges in certain changing neighborhoods in the metropolitan areas of New York City and Philadelphia and in certain communities of Northern New Jersey.

As we endeavor to strengthen and promote Methodism in the Metropolitan

areas, we must consider certain basic needs:

(1) A district missionary society or committee to function in the interest of missions and church extension.

(2) A better working relationship between the churches of the Philadelphia and Wilmington districts of the Delaware Conference and the respective

City Missionary Societies.

(3) A committee with representatives from all conferences and districts within the metropolitan areas to plan and work a strategy for Methodist church extension.

(4) A clarification of the pattern of Methodist representation in interdenominational bodies such as the Protestant Council that will lucidate the official status of representatives of churches of the Delaware Conference.

(5) Joint participation of the area, conference, and district leaders in planning and promoting Methodist programs in the areas of evangelism, Christian education, missions, stewardship, and Christian social relations.

(6) We need to be strong and very courageous in the application of the prin-

ciples of Jesus to the problems of our day.

While we promote missions in the cities, we must also develop a strategy and a financial plan to strengthen the churches in the rural sections. These churches have developed not only lay members but leaders for the leading churches across our conference. Today, many of these small rural churches are struggling to maintain an adequate ministry, to function systematically with a well organized society and church school, and to meet all financial obligations in full.

How can the rural churches be strengthened to meet their missionary challenges in this new day? While there is no simple answer to this question, the following suggestions may be related to the problem:

1. Small churches within a three mile radius may be merged.

2. Several churches or circuits may be combined to form a larger parish.

A group ministry or a larger parish or subdistrict level may stimulate and help members and ministers of the churches involved.

Christian teaching and Christian stewardship practices must be stressed.
 Members who are best qualified in body, mind, heart, and spirit should be

given opportunities to lead.

It is not easy to merge churches that are in proximity, neither is it easy to combine churches or circuits to form a larger parish. It is often difficult to effect a practical group ministry. These difficulties are some of the hurdles that we must overcome before the rural churches can do their best to make disciples for Jesus Christ and to enlist them in the building of the Kingdom of God.

Somebody said, "If there were no missions in the Christian church we would have to invent something like them to keep the church alive and growing." Since our major concern is missions we urge every church to be active and vigorous in its Christian outreach and endeavor to reach the following goals:

 The Commission on Missions in each local church shall perform all of its duties as outlined in the Methodist Discipline, paragraph 257.

2. Each local church shall observe the following special days for the promotion of missionary interest: World Service Sunday—the fourth Sunday of each month, World-wide Communion Sunday—the first Sunday in

October, the Week of Dedication, Rural Life Sunday, and Youth Missionary Rally Day.

 Each local church shall contribute to advance specials for missionary and church extension objects within the district, conference, or General Church.

The reaching of these and other important goals may be facilitated by an extensive and thorough survey in each local church that will enable the laity and clergy to know the social, economic, and religious trends and other significant changes that are taking place in the parish. But it is not enough to know the trends which may largely determine the future of a local church. Leaders and other members of the church must be ready and willing to work even under pressure to meet the emerging demands of this new day.

The migration of people from the rural areas and from other sections of the Nation to the metropolitan centers, the changing neighborhoods of the inner-city, and the need for new churches should challenge the Delaware Conference to respond with a deep sense of responsibility for taking the necessary and proper steps to evangelize the unevangelized and to promote an effective missionary program in communities where the challenge and the opportunity are greatest.

Stewardship

Stewardship is established on faith in God, the Creator, Owner, Sovereign Ruler of His creation, and on confidence in ourselves as stewards who by grace can do His will. Bishop Costen J. Harrell was right when he said, "We believe that God is all over, that our powers and possessions are a sacred trust, and that we are accountable to him for the use we make of them. A genuine Christian cannot believe less. If one has no respect for these essentials of the faith, religion is for him an empty shell."

A deeper and richer faith produces a more evident and practical stewardship. Despite the fact that Christian stewardship understanding and practices need a firmer grip upon the minds and hearts of some pastors and people, churches in every district of the Annual Conference have improved their methods of raising funds. Many have learned through experience that tithing or proportionate giving is the best way of meeting the financial needs of the church and that every charge needs twelve months to do twelve month's work. Starting in time beats running. Pastors and members must plan carefully and work diligently to meet the annual budget, not at the end of the year, but from the beginning. Several church leaders were very happy this year because they had raised their budget in full before the pre-conference rally or efficiency conference.

How have some churches managed to reach their goals so early during the conference year while others continued to struggle without much progress? There is no single answer to this complex question; however, the following practices were evident in some of the most successful churches:

- 1. The pastor preached and practiced stewardship.
- 2. Consecrated laymen were tithers or proportionate givers.
- 3. A thorough every-member canvass was conducted and members pledged their generous financial support.
- 4. Presenting offerings was an act of worship.

In one area of our conference, where public school integration has been most difficult to achieve, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Dover District, Peninsula Conference, in co-operation with the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Dover District, Delaware Conference, have done a noble service by sponsoring intercultural workshops designed to ease tensions and smooth the path for the integration that is to come.

Ministerial Support

Our Methodist Discipline states in paragraph 821, "Assumption of the obligations of the itinerancy required to be made at the time of admission into the traveling connection puts upon the church the counter obligations of providing support for the entire ministry of the church. In view of this, the claim for ministerial support in each pastoral charge shall include provision for the support of pastors, district superintendents, bishops, and conference claimants."

The items that are listed under ministerial support are the pastors' salary, the district superintendents' salary, the Episcopal Fund, Conference Claimants, Conference Permanent Fund, Minimum Salary, and Reserve Pension Fund.

Each Annual Conference is asked to determine the plan and method to be used in distributing the apportionments to its several districts and charges. This method may be by percentages based on the current cash salary paid to the ministers serving pastoral charges under episcopal appointments and to supply pastors, or by some other method.

The total paid for pastors' salaries in the year of 1914 was \$31,422. The average salary was \$574.00, and the annuity rate was \$8.00 per year. In 1920 the total paid for pastors' salaries was \$102,400. The average salary was \$800.00 and the annuity was \$11.50 per year. In 1949 the total paid for pastors' salaries was \$260,751. The average salary was \$1,600. The annuity rate was \$14.00. In 1954 the total paid for pastors' salaries was \$381,788. The average salary was \$2,800 and the annuity was \$30.00.

During a period of 45 years, the average salary has increased from \$574.00 to \$2,800. The total paid for pastors' salaries has increased from \$31,422 to \$381,788. The annuity rate per year has increased from \$8.00 to \$30.00, and \$32.00 is in the offing.

Thirty-seven charges increased the pastor's salary. The increase is 35%. The average salary is over \$2,800. Sixty-six charges pay more than the average salary. Twenty-five charges are on the borderline. More than one hundred and thirty-six charges are 100% in ministerial support. Fifty-two charges paid in full the Reserve Pension Fund.

It now becomes evident that while a period of forty-five years shows some gain in ministerial support, the increase in salary has not kept pace with the high cost of living. The salary of the minister lags far behind the salary of other professions. We need to rethink and replan the matter of ministerial support, and present a plan that will furnish a sufficient and equitable support for the pastors and district superintendents of the conference; including the salary, travel expense, utilities, office expense, and a suitable dwelling.

Four years ago our conference adopted a plan to raise \$320,000 for the

Reserve Pension Fund. The purpose was to provide an adequate, and comfortable support for the retired ministers, their widows, and children. We have not yet reached our desired goal. Some charges are 100% in this cause, others have done well, some fair, while others remain near the starting line.

The raising of the Reserve Pension Fund is a fact to be accomplished. It is a must. We can do it, if we think we can. All we need to do is ask God to

"Kindle a flame of sacred love, In these cold hearts of ours."

The Annual Report of the ministers' wives to the conference shows that they are perpetually rendering faithful service. Each district is thoroughly organized. Meetings are held monthly which give time for fellowship, and which stimulate a deeper love for all.

During the year, many educational, inspirational and recreational programs are sponsored intermittently by the ministers' wives. These programs are given in order to enable the ministers' wives to reach their set goals. Such programs consist of: picnics, pageants, fellowship dinners, song festivals,

dramas, study classes, and Christmas parties.

Profound praise and high honors should be given to the ministers' wives, for their loyal cooperation and gigantic work in helping to raise the conference claimants and other askings for the conference. Year after year they render faithful service, without seeming to tire, as they help to advance the "Kingdom of God."

Christian Vocations

The church is concerned with Christian vocations because the redemption of the world is at stake. Many young people have not thought in terms of church related vocations as a means of livelihood because they felt that there was no future financial security. Today, Christian vocations are becoming very popular in the churches of the Delaware Conference with both young people and the adults. The laymen in many of our churches are becoming concerned about the needs in our ministry, missionary personnel, and many other Christian services that must be supplied by competent workers.

Each district can, and is able to report some tangible gains in the recruitment in the areas of Christian vocations. The Dover District holds a yearly conference on Vocational Guidance. Through the influence of this conference, two young people have committed themselves to the missionary work of the church. The Eastern District reports four recruitments for full time ministry and one recruitment for missionary work. Under guidance of the educational staff of the district, the Philadelphia District reports a total of fifteen recruitments, classified under these captions: seven candidates for the field of nursing; one for the field of Christian education; and one for social work. The Salisbury District reports eleven young men who have committed themselves to a full time Christian ministry, and six candidates for missionary service. The Wilmington District like the other four, takes great delight in reporting eleven young men who have committed themselves to the Christian ministry and one young man who has gone to Russia to study the life of that country.

The fields of service other than the Christian ministry and missionary service are as follows: Christian education—four; Nursing—nineteen; Church music—two; and Social Service—eleven.

The field looks bright for Christian vocations. Give the young people a chance, they will redeem the world.

Church Property

The expansion idea has begun to break through the battle lines of indifference and is actually beginning to function, especially in the urban areas of our conference where large numbers of people are congregated. The Dover District reports one new church being built. The Philadelphia district in the metropolitan area of our conference is reporting one new church building in Englewood, N. J.; plans a new church in the Bronx, New York; and also negotiations to purchase a Jewish Synagogue in Southwest Philadelphia.

Expansion on the Philadelphia and Wilmington Districts is moving forward and as more people become mission minded, there will be more churches

and out-post church schools in these metropolitan areas.

Improvements: Many of the churches have improved their properties, some to a greater degree than others. In their improvements, they have taken into consideration the broad educational program of the church. This is reflected in their additional and more adequate educational facilities. Space for classrooms has been added to many churches, and some have bought abandoned school buildings for this purpose.

Conclusion

We are grateful that we can report steady progress in most phases of our work. There are signs which indicate a resurgence of religious faith and activity, renewed determination to meet the needs of the hour and a strong desire to fulfill the true mission of the church. Ministers and laymen have been kept fully informed of the pressing needs of our world and many have courageously given freely of their time, money and talents to alleviate suffering and promote the cause of righteousness through-out the world. Church membership continues to increase, due in no small measure to the participation of laymen and ministers in visitation evangelism. Christian education was never more strongly emphasized in our churches than it is today, and Christian stewardship is gaining an ever wider acceptance. New churches are being erected, new congregations are coming into being and more people seem now to understand the world-wide mission of the church.

But we cannot pause to rest for one brief moment, for new frontiers await us, new challenges appear, and additional requirements surge forward demanding our attention. Remembering the words of our Master when He said, "So you, also, when you have done all that is commanded you, say, 'we are unprofitable servants; we have done only what was our duty.'" We know that whatever goals we have reached, there are still others that must now occupy our attention. We must move on to new attainments lest one momentary pause of personal satisfaction should weaken and corrupt our resolve to press on in quest of the realization of the Kingdom of God on earth.

Let us therefore say with the poet:

We shall build on! We shall build on! On through the cynic's scorning, On through the coward's warning, On through the cheat's suborning, We shall build on!

DOVER DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Ministers and Laymen of the Delaware Conference:

For six years we have been entrusted with the leadership of the Dover District and, at this conference session, through the operation of our Methodist law, this leadership will be surrendered to another. These have been years crowded with many varied activities, out of which have come some very rich experiences which will abide through the years. The fellowship with members of the cabinet and the ministers and laymen of the district have all served to make the years spent as a district superintendent full of meaning. These associations have had the effect of relieving some of the tensions and strain that are an unavoidable part of the district superintendency. We have labored together in harmony and love to do the work of the church and help build a better world. We are thankful for having had the privilege of working with such understanding and kind people. The experiences gained through these associations will be helpful down through the years.

Some Items of Our Concern

The Tatems of South Berlin have enjoyed the birth of a son; Brothers Clifford Landrum and L. L. Hamilton have been married during the year. Brother J. O. Lockman, Mrs. C. D. Gerald and Mrs. C. H. Molock have suffered illness, but all have now recovered and have assumed their full responsibilities. We have sustained one loss by death from the ranks of the ministry, Brother Joshua Ingram. Other deaths which should be noted are the loss of a father by Mrs. C. W. Bagwell and Mrs. A. J. Dredden.

District Activities

We have witnessed intense activity this year by the organizations which serve the cause of the church; and no interest which it has been our duty to promote has been neglected or treated lightly, for we have considered that all our responsibilities demand the very best service which we are capable of rendering.

The District Board of Lay Activities has been active in the promotion of its assigned responsibilities. District and sub-district meetings have been held under the leadership of the district and associate district lay leaders. The purpose of these meetings has been to help the people of the local churches to know and assume their full responsibilities as officers and members in the local church. The *Discipline* has been widely used as a source book of information on the activities of the local church. Wherever such meetings have been held

the people have acclaimed them as being needed to help in the making of a

stronger local church.

Stewardship has been stressed as a means of giving more financial support to the church. Our total life as a trust from God has also been emphasized, because it was realized that where a full life commitment had been made, all other things would follow as a natural sequence. The roll of tithers has continued to increase; more churches have been conducting effective everymember canvasses and the results have been gratifying.

The quarterly meetings of the Woman's Society of Christian Service have increased in interest and attendance. These meetings have provided opportunities for the officers of the local church societies to come together and discuss the problems involved in their work; they have provided inspiration, training and understanding for both ministers and laymen who must cooperate in a common cause. The district society has performed worth-while service to

our local churches.

The ministers' wives have, as usual, been active on behalf of the Conference Claimants cause. Only those who get a close-up view of the work done by the women of the parsonage, under the leadership of the district superintendent's wife, can realize the labor required to report to this conference the sum of money which is received yearly for the cause which they represent. They render their service willingly under some discouraging situations at times, for they must cope with indifference and a lack of zeal on the part of many who should be most willing to give them full support. What they have been asked to do is no easy task and requires no small degree of wisdom and tact to accomplish. But they have never failed, they always reach their goal. We are proud of the service which they render for this very vital cause, and we express our gratitude to them and the many laymen who help to carry on year after year. God's blessings be upon them all.

We must not fail to mention the excellent work done by the district staff on Christian education. It is in this group that all the planning for vacation church schools, youth assemblies, missionary rallies, leadership training schools, children's institutes and vocational conferences was done. We have been blessed with a group of devoted workers whose interest in their work could never be called into question. They have served most effectively in the task allotted to them. All the agencies which have been sponsored under their direction have been successful, and out of such meetings have come invaluable help for

our local church workers.

Other activities which we have sponsored on the district were: training sessions for local preachers, Missionary Institutes, Bishop's Evangelistic Crusade, District Conference, District Steward's Meeting and Efficiency Conference. These meetings have all been helpful.

Changes in Appointments

Following the death of Brother Joshua Ingram, pastor at Nassau, Delaware, Brother G. B. Wilson was transferred from the Rock Hall charge to Nassau. Brother William W. Scott, a local preacher on the Rock Hall charge, was appointed to supply Rock Hall.

Total raised, \$6,964.00.

The charge has had a commendable success in evangelism. New pulpit furniture has been purchased for the Morgnec church. Salaries have been paid in full and benevolences have been fully met. The pastor is an untiring worker who always succeeds in getting things done. Total raised, \$10,178.

CHESWOLD, W. C. Thomas, pastor: Conversions 27. Cheswold always has a good success in evangelism, corresponding achievement in other phases of its work would make this a first rate charge. The salary is woefully inadequate in spite of the fact that there are sufficient financial resources to lift it far beyond its present level. World Service and conference benevolences have been fully met. Total raised, \$3,458.

CLARKSVILLE, G. W. Taylor, pastor: The pastor has proved himself to be an able administrator. Conversions 12, accessions 10. The people at Clarksville have erected a beautiful church building. It is a credit to the people of the charge and the conference. While they have been building there has been no let up in contributions for benevolences. All apportionments have been paid in full; this is indeed a remarkable achievement, considering the fact that this has been done while an extensive building program has been in progress. The full amount apportioned for the Reserve Pension Fund has been paid. Total raised, \$16,762.

COLEMAN, W. C. R. MILLS, pastor: Conversions 6, accessions 2. The pastor does his best to achieve success here but it has not been possible to realize the full potential of the charge. Some defections from the membership have occurred, but there are still many people in the church and in the community. It is very difficult to determine the factors needed to change the fortunes of this charge. Total raised, \$5,825.

CRUMPTON, I. W. Wallace, pastor: Conversions 17, accessions 15. World Service and conference benevolences have been paid in full. Preparations are being made to install a bath in the parsonage. Financial contributions are above those of the previous year. Total raised, \$5,060.

DELMAR, Roland Grant, pastor: Conversions 7, accessions 5. Some interior and exterior improvements have been made on the parsonage. Delmar seems to have some difficulty finding itself and doing the work which it is fully capable of achieving. No pastor seems to get the complete cooperation needed to pay the benevolences apportioned to the charge. Some members do their best

to meet their obligations but others fail to cooperate. It is for this reason that

the charge does not meet expectations. Total raised, \$4,777.

DOVER, W. E. Marks, pastor: Conversions 8, accessions 9. The campaign of evangelism was carried on vigorously with very good results. The church has undergone both interior and exterior renovation and a new heating system installed. All apportionments have been paid in full including the total sum apportioned for the Reserve Pension fund. Dover is a strong charge with great possibilities. Many things are done well here. The church school is a model for the district and perhaps for the conference. All apportionments are always fully met. The outstanding need is for an educational building. Pastor Marks has made his mark at this charge. He is to be commended for the good leadership which he has given. Total raised, \$9,811.

FAIRLEE, P. A. Henry, pastor: Conversions 2, accessions 4. The charge is growing in numbers and importance. It is one of our advancing rural charges in which many young people marry and settle down at home, rather than seek their fortunes in distant cities. World Service and all salaries have been fully paid. The Melitota church, which now is part of the Galena charge, will become a part of the Fairlee charge for the ensuing conference

year. Total raised, \$3,956.

GALENA, Rev. Mrs. Rachel Brown, pastor: Conversions 4, accessions 4. A community building has been purchased for the Olivet Hill congregation. Because of a membership that has dwindled the Davis Hill church voted to become a part of the Olivet Hill congregation. The pastor and people have done well to raise the amount of money reported to this conference. Total raised, \$5,132.

HARRINGTON, Thaddeus Hackett, pastor: Conversions 1, accessions 2. Here is another small congregation that supports its pastor well and and generally succeeds in doing very good work. Both churches have been renovated on the interior and new furnishings purchased. The pastor closes his 10th year and seems ready to sing, "Forever Here my Rest Shall Be." Total raised, \$4,906.

LAUREL, C. W. Bagwell, pastor: Conversions 5, accessions 4. The interior of the church has been improved. This is a charge with a church school that is growing very fast causing a shortage in teachers. The pastor is an active worker in all community affairs. He is a leader in the interdenominational ministerial alliance. All salaries have been fully met. World Service and con-

ference benevolences have been paid in full. Total raised, \$7,300.

LEWES, Quincy Cooper, pastor: Conversions 10, accessions 2. Lewes has done well under its youthful but very capable student pastor. The work of the charge has suffered some from the defections of the previous year, but those who have remained have been very loyal to their church and the charge has done creditable work in spite of handicaps. The membership at the Lewes church has been increased, the church repainted, parsonage renovated, mortgage reduced substantially, and new pews are soon to be installed. The Israel church has carried out extensive renovation of the interior and new pews are to be installed very soon. Total raised, \$6,765.

LINCOLN, J. O. Lockman, pastor: Conversions 6, accessions 6. Lincoln is one of the outstanding charges of the district. At our last annual conference the pastor was too ill to attend the session. His illness has extended over a large part of this conference year, but the people of the charge have not faltered in their loyalty to the church. Past years of pastoral leadership and

training came to full fruition in this crisis. The congregation rose to the occasion and did all that could be expected. The result is that all apportionments have been fully met. The full apportionment for the Reserve Pension Fund has been paid. The pastor closes his 28th year of service to a very faithful people. Total raised, \$7,346.

MARDELA, L. R. Jones, pastor: Conversions 11, accessions 10. All salaries have been paid in full, a good revival was held, contributions have increased, the community hall at the John Wesley church has been remodeled, new furnishings have been purchased for the parsonage and for the Mount Nebo Church. The Mount Nebo Church has also made extensive repairs on the com-

munity hall. Total raised, \$5,765.

MILFORD, David Nickerson, pastor: Conversions 2, accessions 22. Milford is a much improved charge. The district superintendent has not hesitated to be critical of the congregation when criticism was justified. Now we congratulate the pastor and people on the new spirit which seems to dominate them. The pastor is painstaking and thorough in his methods and gives a strong and positive leadership. The people have increased the salary. Contributions for all apportionments have increased far above that of the previous year. Total raised, \$9,327.

MILLINGTON, C. J. Williams, pastor: Some advances are to be noted in the Millington charge. The John Wesley church has purchased a community building to be used for social and recreational purposes. A considerable sum has also been raised for remodeling the church building. The charge always conducts a very good vacation church school. Total raised, \$4,796.

MILLSBORO, C. W. D. Browne, pastor: Conversions 2. The Harmony Church has met in full its portion of the apportionment of the charge. The Friendship congregation has been cooperative and has done its best to meet its share of the budget, but adverse circumstances militated against them and prevented the full realization of their goals. The pastor has been very dutiful in seeking to fulfill his mission. Total raised, \$5,822.

NASSAU, G. B. Wilson, pastor: Conversions 8, accessions 10. Brother Joshua Ingram was appointed to the Nassau charge at the last conference session. The work of the charge progessed well under his direction, until he was fatally stricken in January. Brother G. B. Wilson was appointed to the charge in February. The report of the charge, therefore, represents the work of both Brothers Ingram and Wilson. A new organ has been installed in each of the churches. New pews, the gift of Mayor Otis Smith of Lewes, have been placed in the Belltown church. Other church furnishings have also been installed. The pastor's salary has been increased. The charge has paid all apportionments in full. Here we have a growing charge and we are hopeful that it will continue to expand under the able leadership of its efficient pastor. Total raised, \$8,200.

NEWARK, J. A. Conway, pastor: Conversions 11, accessions 10. Some improvements have been made in the St. Peter's church. The Cedar Chapel church has been completed at a cost of \$2,500. Advances have been made in contributions for benevolences and other causes. The pastor has received cooperation from the people of both churches to make possible the success which has been achieved. Total raised, \$5,148.

NORTH BERLIN, A. J. Dredden, pastor: Conversions 33, accessions 36. The pastor has produced great results as an evangelist. An excellent work of

exterior beautification has been done on the church. The church school continues to grow and has outgrown its quarters. It is an inspiration to see the large number of children and youth in attendance at the Sunday morning service in this church. New equipment has been purchased for the church and church school. An increase in church attendance is to be noted. All apportionments have been fully met. The full amount apportioned for the Reserve Pension Fund has been paid. The pastor and people have done well. Total raised, \$10,325.

POMONA, C. R. Bryant, pastor: Conversions 9, accessions 8. The salary of the pastor has been advanced beyond that of the previous year. Improvements have been made on the exterior of the parsonage and new furniture has been installed. The charge is in good spiritual and financial condition and will continue to make gains under the capable leadership of its pastor. The year was begun under some unfavorable conditions, but all goes well now. Total

raised, \$6,393.

PORT DEPOSIT, Clayton Hammond, pastor: Conversions 6. Brother Hammond is a student pastor who has given excellent leadership to this charge. The people are few in number, but what they lack in numbers is compensated for in spirit and zeal. There is no more faithful group of Methodists than is to be found here. World Service and conference benevolences have been fully met and other items advanced. The Cokesbury church has un-

dergone extensive exterior repairs. Total raised, \$4,962.

ROCK HALL, W. W. Scott, pastor: Conversions 1, accessions 2. G. B. Wilson was appointed pastor at Rock Hall. Upon his being transferred to the Nassau charge in February, Brother W. W. Scott was appointed pastor. Brothers Scott and Wilson, therefore, are responsible for the work. The charge has prospered well. All salaries have been paid. Renovations have been made on both the exterior and interior of the parsonage with preparations for a new bath at the parsonage. World Service and conference benevolences have been met in full. The people are due great credit for their response to the program of the church. Total raised, \$6,721.

SASSAFRAS, Rev. Mrs. Ophelia James, pastor: Conversions 4, accessions 7. World Service and conference benevolences have been fully met; all salaries have been paid. The charge is led by a very faithful pastor, and the response of the people to her leadership is gratifying. A very good year's work has been accomplished in this ninth year of the pastor's service to this charge. Total

raised, \$3,870.

SEAFORD, C. D. Gerald, pastor: Conversions 6, accessions 5. All salaries have been paid—other items have been advanced above that of the previous year—installments on the organ have been completed—rest rooms have been installed in the church and a new altar set has been purchased. The pastor and people have worked hard to make possible their good report. Total raised, \$7,141.

SEAFORD CIRCUIT, D. S. Quillen, pastor: Conversions 5, accessions 2. The charge has made many improvements under the leadership of its present pastor. Its pulpit utterances have never been greater, and a good response to all requests has been made. All benevolences have been advanced. The charge is handicapped by the lack of a parsonage for its minister who must drive a long distance to serve the charge. An increase in the allowance for travel is much needed. Total raised, \$2,162.

SHARPTOWN, L. L. Hamilton, pastor: Conversions 3, accessions 23. World Service and conference benevolences have been met in full. All salaries have been paid. A completely new parsonage with all modern conveniences has been built and an increase has been granted in the salary of the pastor. The work has been advanced far beyond that of the previous one. The charge has a very bright future. Total raised, \$7,771.

SMYRNA, J. J. Webster, pastor: Conversions 1, accessions 3. The charge has a small membership but manages to do well. The pastor has done his best to bring success to his charge, but results have not reached his expectations. Total raised, \$2,831.

SOUTH BERLIN, S. S. Tatem, pastor: Conversions 15, accessions 16. South Berlin has experienced another banner year. The pastor has proved himself to be a good organizer and planner, and the people have responded well to his leadership. Modern rest rooms have been installed in the St. John's church, the interior of the church has been beautified. The church school has been increased by fifty per cent. The debt at the New Bethel church has been substantially reduced. The attendance at services of both churches has almost doubled. All apportionments have been fully met. The full apportionment for the Reserve Pension fund has been paid. This charge has enjoyed a very unique success led by her dynamic pastor. Total raised, \$11,325.

STILL POND, P. R. Hilton, pastor: Conversions 1, accessions 2. The interior of the Mount Zion church has been redecorated. The Fountain church has made a much better response to the program of benevolences. The pastor is to be commended for the very important part he has played in effecting some great changes in the attitudes of many of the people of this charge. He is proving himself to be a resourceful leader who knows how to make a long-term pastorate successful. The charge has greatly exceeded its work of the previous year. Total raised, \$6,329.

TOWNSEND, Clifford Landrum, pastor: Conversions 1. Townsend has a very energetic and forward-looking pastor who has succeeded in doing well. The accomplishments of this year exceed that of the previous one. The organizational structure of the churches has been greatly strengthened. Total raised, \$4,499.

Summary

Significant gains have been made in all of our activities. We have no barren charges. Conversions for the year, 259, an increase of 40; accessions for the year, 247, an increase of 21. We held 44 vacation church schools, an increase of 2. The enrollment for vacation church schools was 1,550. Five Christian workers' schools were held with a total enrollment of 448.

We must express our gratitude for the faithful service that has been rendered by both ministers and laymen of the district. They have not hesitated to accept any assignment, however great the work that was involved. The district superintendent is deeply grateful for all the service that has been rendered by such loyal people.

We express our sincere appreciation to all who did so much to make our stay on the Dover District a pleasant one, who provided homelike comforts when we were compelled to remain away from home and whose counsels gave help and guidance in the pursuance of the common task which was set before us. To all of you we owe a debt which we shall not be able to pay. We shall

cherish in our memory all the kindness you have shown.

We come to you for the second time to give an account of our stewardship in the Easton District. We are grateful to our Heavenly Father for life, guidance and the power to endure. We are thankful to our thirty three pastors and wives, and to the many laymen for their prayers, love and loyalty without which this our second annual report could not be made.

Sickness and Death

There has been much sickness among our laymen. Sickness among our ministers and families includes: Rev. W. C. West, Rev. E. A. Hughes, Rev. S. E. Armstrong, Rev. E. H. Jackson, Rev. Van B. Wright, Rev. L. C. Waters, Rev. Randolph Fisher, Rev. T. M. Murray, Mrs. R. S. Caldwell, Mrs. E. H. Jackson, Mrs. A. P. Jenkins, Mrs. Anna Bella Jones. Those hospitalized were: Rev. Mrs. Hester Opher, Mrs. T. M. Murray and Rev. I. B. Bivens. Mrs. R. C. Whittington has been translated from the church militant to the church triumphant.

District and Sub-district Activities

The District Steward's meeting at Easton, Monthly Preacher's Meetings, Youth Assemblies, Vacation Church School Institute, Observation Schools, District Conference at Oxford, Youth Rallies, Christian Workers Schools, District Convocation on Evangelism at Cambridge, Missionary Institute at Hurlock, Town and Rural Life Institute at Cambridge, District Choir Fest at Easton and Efficiency Conference at Royal Oak were all well attended and served as rich sources of information and inspiration.

In cooperation with our six sub-district conveners, namely: Rev. Claude Edmonds, Rev. R. S. Caldwell, Rev. W. J. Mills, Rev. S. L. Jones, Rev. H. R. Snead and Rev. E. A. Hughes, we held on each sub-district (a) A Cultivation and Promotion Institute on Missions, (b) A Workshop for Commissions on

Education, and (c) An Evangelistic Rally.

Through the leadership of our District Lay Leader, Mr. Larrie Jones, and the assistance of the Associate Lay Leaders: Mrs. H. C. Waters, Mrs. V. M. Brown, Mr. Edward Dodson, Mr. Harrison Johnson, Mr. D. Townsend and Mr. P. Ringgold excellent promotional aid was given particularly through their quarterly meetings and other district and sub-district activities.

Mrs. Helena Murray, President of the W. S. C. S., and officers have done much to stimulate the women's work, through their regular quarterly meetings

and promotion programs on the sub-districts.

Migrant Ministry

Through the combined aid of the National Board of Missions and the Choptank Migrant Ministry Committee, the wonderful services of Miss Mildred Scott, Director of the Bayside Larger Parish Program was available to our district until the end of March. During the summer months when the agricultural migrants came to Dorchester, Caroline, and Queen Anne Counties, she ministered to many of their needs. She operated the "Harvester" and transported many, especially children and youth to church schools, skating rinks, and play grounds. She distributed clothing to the needy through thrift sales, and more than 1,000 free health kits and toys for Christmas. When the migrant season ended, her services were entirely available to us. She was a tower of strength as she gave her full time to our churches in the Wittman-Sherwood-McDaniels area.

The Charges

AIREYS: This charge is happy now. A fine spirit of understanding and cooperation exists between pastor and people. Advances are being made in benevolent giving, children and youth work and the general work of the charge, under the judicious leadership of their pastor. Many of her great potentials are being tapped. Conversions 5; accessions 1. Raised for all causes, \$6,229. Rev. E. P. Cooke, pastor.

BECKWITH: The two very small congregations of this charge delight in the following of their aggressive and humble leader. Excellency seems to be their motto. A new well has been drilled and a new gas stove installed at the parsonage. A new roof has been placed upon Zoar church and its interior beautifully painted, new runners on the floor, and new pulpit furnishings purchased for both churches. Zoar has liquidated debt on parish hall and dedicated same. Conversions 12; accessions 12. Raised for all purposes, \$2,699. Rev. Frank Farrare, Pastor.

CAMBRIDGE: This is one of the most beautiful and best organized churches in our conference. This charge continues to grow and serve as a model for our district under the leadership of its competent and gracious pastor. The pastor not only preaches powerful sermons habitually, but is engaging also in a great teaching ministry. He keeps before his people the total program of the Methodist church and finds among this great flock consecrated laymen ready to respond and to believe that it is "better farther on." They have marched on beyond last year's noble accomplishments. Conversions 10; accessions 12. Raised for all purposes \$18.273.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT: The many potentialities of this charge are slowly but surely being harnessed, and things are being done as a result. The pastor's wife was discharged from the hospital a few weeks ago after two years' absence from the parsonage. The pastor has continued to do a commendable job when we consider the obstacles which have faced him. St. Luke is making the greatest progress in increased membership and attendance in both church and church school. Children and youth are being won and the prospects for the future are bright. Conversions 6; accessions 10. Raised for all purposes \$6,223.

CARMICHAELS: This charge completes another year's good work under the faithful leadership of its quiet unassuming pastor. The debt on the John Wesley Parish Hall has been liquidated. The parsonage was hit by lightnir and the necessary repairs have been made. New furnishings have been puchased for the parsonage. Bryan's Church has one of the finest church schoon on the district. Conversions 2; accessions 2. Raised for all purposes \$5,71 = Rev. R. S. Caldwell, Pastor.

CENTREVILLE: Centreville and Metropolitan Church at Gouldtowmerged last year. While Centreville remains about the same, Metropolitan has
experienced new hope and new life. Here is a congregation eager to improvand to be real Methodists. Charles Wesley Church, Centreville, has installed
new hot air heating system at a cost of about \$1,400. This charge has not ye
utilized its available resources. It is our prayer that a genuine spirit christian love and fellowship will eventually possess the pastor and people of
this charge, and that the charge will move on. Conversions 3; accessions 15
Raised for all purposes \$5,529.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT: This charge continues to experience difficulties. The pastor, saddened by the death of his companion last fall, has labore earnestly, but too much success has not attended his tireless efforts. Earle Chapel desires to be a station since Metropolitan severed its relationship lass year, but as faithful as some of these members are, their membership is factor small to stand alone. Conversions 2; accessions 1. Raised for all purposes \$1,722. Rev. R. C. Whittington, Pastor.

CHAPEL: This charge has failed to reach last year's mark. The paston has struggled and made sacrificial efforts to get the church marching in gear. There seems to be a lack of sympathetic understanding and cooperation between pastor and people, consequently, not too much has been accomplished. Conversions 1; accessions 2. Raised for all purposes \$2,310. Rev. S. E. Armstrong, Pastor.

CHURCH CREEK: The pastor's health became seriously impaired early in the conference year. The faithful few have cooperated as best as they could with his good wife. Substantial improvement has been made on the parsonage and a new parish hall of cinder block construction has been erected by the John Wesley church. Raised for all purposes \$2,388. Rev. I. B. Bivens, Pastor.

CHURCH HILL: This charge maintains its good works and has advanced under the good guidance of its smiling pastor. The parsonage has been treated to a new roof, new living room suite and a new refrigerator. Mt. Zion put on a new ceiling at a cost of \$875.00, all of which has been paid. Mt. Vernon is still in its financial campaign to raise needed funds to rebuild its church which was totally destroyed by fire. Conversions 6; accessions 9. Raised for all purposes \$6,353. Rev. E. H. Jackson, Pastor.

CORDOVA: This little giant excells its previous record. The Zion church has been completed. Now they have a beautiful new church. This project began as a \$2,000 repair job for which around \$1,000 was borrowed. But as they went to work they had to just about completely demolish the frame building. Materials alone cost them over \$4,000, but without flinching, they accepted the challenge and built on a pay-as-you-go basis. The church is well organized and operated. The people are happy with their energetic, dynamic pastor. Conversions 2; accessions 7. Raised for all purposes \$5,986. Rev. Harvey G. Chase, Pastor.

CRAPO-GOLDEN HILL: This charge continues to suffer for lack of a

resident pastor or at least a pastor who can share more of his time performing pastoral duties. Unfortunately, the salary is miserably low. Raised for all

purposes \$----. Rev. L. C. Waters, Pastor.

DENTON-WILLISTON: This charge now has a very fine resident pastor. Significant advances have been made in organizational structure, financially and spiritually. The three churches of the former Williston charge agreed to merge into one official Board and to meet at one church each Sunday for worship. They have cooperated in a fine way. The pastor is able to preach to the combined membership at one of their churches instead of three churches each week. John Wesley Church in Denton has been renovated at a cost of \$550 and a new oil burner unit installed at a cost of \$285. Little Mission has liquidated its remodeling indebtedness. Throughout the membership of all five churches, there is one purpose, "We want to keep our pastor." Conversions 2; accession 1. Raised for all purposes \$6,363.00.

EAST NEW MARKET: The longer the pastor stays on this charge, the better he is understood and appreciated. He approached the Board of Education of Dorchester County and was granted the free use of a two-room abandoned school building adjacent to the church property. Supervised recreational activities are held regularly. The youth, young adults, and Woman's Society of Christian Service are solidly behind the pastor. It is amazing to note the transformation taking place in this charge. Mt. Zion Church has been newly wired for electricity. Conversions 8: accessions 8. Raised for all purposes \$5,286. Rev.

Nelson Stanley, Pastor.

EASTON: The parsonage has been completely renovated; walls papered, woodwork painted, floors sanded and new combination range installed, new linoleum laid in kitchen and bathroom, new rugs and runners in other rooms. The Easton parsonage is now one of the most beautiful and comfortable parsonages of the district. The people have labored well in cooperation with their quiet, untiring leader. The attendance in church and church school is on the increase. The organizations work well, peace and harmony prevails. Conversions 15; accessions 17. Raised for all purposes \$7,483. Rev. Randolph Fisher, Pastor.

EASTON CIRCUIT: The health of the pastor of this charge has not been the best this year. At the writing of this report, the pastor is a patient in the Cambridge Hospital. The newly acquired parish hall has been painted, both the interior and exterior. The water system has been improved and a new heater purchased for the parsonage. Conversions 3; accessions 3. Raised for all purposes \$2,435. Rev. Mrs. Hester Opher, Pastor.

FEDERALSBURG: This charge has excelled her last year's record. The youth and young adults are very active in this church and are assuming an ever increasing degree of responsibility for its operation. The pastor is training this group in churchmanship. The results are gratifying. Conversions 8; ac-

cessions 8. Raised for all purposes \$6,714. Rev. S. G. Dix, Pastor.

GREENSBORO: This charge has had a fine year. Union Church has a new ceiling and painted its interior. The parish hall at Mt. Pleasant has had new siding put on and the interior painted. The Methodist Men are in the process of building a new cinder block garage. The pastor's wife remains in a state of almost helplessness while he courageously looks after her comforts and advances the program of the church in a remarkable way. Conversions 5. Raised for all purposes \$8,101.00. Rev. A. P. Jenkins, Pastor.

HURLOCK: This charge continues to grow in good works. The past diligently leads his dear people along. His smiles are contagious. A wonder Christian spirit of love prevails between pastor and people as they promothe interests of the kingdom. Conversions 9; accessions 11. Raised for all proses \$8,114. Rev. W. J. Mills, Pastor.

LINKWOOD has not yet qualified financially for the loan and gift offer by the Board of National Missions for the purpose of erecting a new churbuilding to replace the one destroyed by fire. The pastor has tried hard to less and inspire his people. While the faithful few have made real sacrifices, muremains to be done before this small congregation can rebuild. St. James heliquidated its debt and church has been dedicated. Conversions 3; accessions Raised for all purposes \$3,609.00 Rev. C. H. Cottingham, Pastor.

There has been some premeditated resistence against the benevolent program, but under the circumstances, the pastor and his loyal members have wrought well. Conversions accessions 7. Raised for all purposes \$5,412. Rev. C. I. Young, Pastor.

McDANIEL has just about held her own this year. The church at Bozmaseems headed for extinction, less than six members remain in that parish. The pastor strives hard to promote all causes. This is one point where great assistance was given to children's work by the migrant worker. Conversions 2 Raised for all purposes \$3,209.00. Rev. A. H. Slacum, Pastor.

MILES RIVER marches on surpassing last year's achievements in spit∈ of some internal strife and a few administrative rough spots. Deshields Church purchased an abandoned public school building and ground for \$600. Smooth sailing and harmony exists at McGee Church. It is well organized and the organizations are active for the good of the Kingdom. Conversions 17; accessions 5. Raised for all purposes \$5,323. Rev. E. N. Foster, Pastor.

OXFORD does it again. This progressive charge rejoices in work well done. The pastor and people are wonderful and together, they move like a mighty army. This host did credit to itself in the marvelous manner in which it served as host to our District Conference. The church is well organized and every department is active. At a cost of \$300, they put curbing and gutter in front of the parish hall and Waters church. The interior of the church and pews were painted, new runners on the floor, refrigerators were purchased for the parish halls of both churches, hot water heater at Waters parish hall, a 16mm movie projector and new roof put on Wesley church. This charge conducted a very successful every member canvass last year. Conversions 28; accessions 2. Raised for all purposes \$8,451. Rev. E. A. Hughes, Pastor.

PRESTON has had a banner year. The parsonage has been renovated. It is now among the best of the parsonages of the district. This work was done at a cost of \$1,400. All old debts have been liquidated. All three of the churches have been put in good condition. The Mt. Pleasant Cemetery is kept in excellent condition. The pastor is conscientious. He carefully plans and organizes, and through responsive lay leadership, is able to execute his plans. There is a sense of togetherness and enthusiasm that is wonderful to behold. Conversions 3; accessions 4. Raised for all causes \$9,177. Rev. Trevor C. Jones, Pastor.

RIDGELY: The faithful shepherd of this charge continues to experience

poor health. He has been forced to be absent from his pulpit a few Sundays. However, he planned his work and his faithful laymen responded to his requests to the extent that the work has advanced this year in many areas. The pews have been painted in both churches. The Methodist Youth Fellowship, young adults and Methodist Men are taking an active part along with the other organizations of the charge. Conversions 8; accessions 8. Raised for all causes \$6,462.00. Rev. Van B. Wright, Pastor.

ROYAL OAK and BELLEVUE have joined the lines of advance. St. Paul has installed a new heating system at a cost of \$600 of which \$400 is paid. St. Luke Church is now in the process of building a new parish hall which will include modern rest rooms and new heating system adequate for heating parish hall and church. Much voluntary labor has been donated to this project in order to keep the building costs as low as possible. This church has paid its full share of the apportionments. The pastor and people work together in a very fine manner. Conversions 6; accessions 19. Raised for all purposes \$8,504.00. Rev. Joseph I. Williams, Pastor.

ST. MICHAELS has experienced another fine year. The leadership of the pastor is effective. He has won the interest of church and community. A fine hot air heating plant has been installed at a cost of \$1,400. One drive was put on for this project. It resulted in bringing in \$1,500. All interests of the church are given consideration. This church has requested the return of its pastor and has voted a substantial increase in salary for the coming year. Conversions 2; accessions 9. Raised for all purposes \$8,293.00. Rev. H. R. Snead. Pastor.

STEVENSVILLE has rallied with continued enthusiasm to their excellent shepherd. Great success has attended their efforts. Their theme song seems to be, "We'll never say fail." Wesley Church has been painted on the interior. Ezion has redecorated the interior of its parish hall and covered the exterior of same with shingles. The youth have shown a new interest—their membership and attendance 100%. The young adults have put new concrete steps and run a pavement from the parsonage to the road. Attendance has been sharply increased at Union Church. Harmony, peace and goodwill reigns throughout the charge. The fourth quarterly conference voted a \$400 increase. Conversions 14; accessions 17. Raised for all purposes \$7,278.00. Rev. C. Martin Stafford, Pastor.

TAYLORS ISLAND, not only keeps up its good work but has seen the worth of its vigorous pastor. At long last they have given a \$200 increase in salary. The four churches of this charge are kept in first class condition. The pastor keeps all the causes of the church before his people. Their response grows stronger. Conversions 7; accessions 8. Raised for all purposes \$5,202.00. Rev. George Stanley, Pastor.

TRAPPE presents another good report of its stewardship this year. The interior of the church has been painted, floors sanded, and a new communion table and altar set purchased. This church carries on a great program. Its doors are open not only on Sunday mornings, but Sunday nights and week nights as well. This charge was the first on our district to conduct a Convocation of Evangelism. The results were amazing. Conversions 7; accessions 7. Raised for all purposes \$6,565.00. Rev. H. T. Hall, Pastor.

VIENNA and REID'S GROVE have experienced a good year. Zoar at Reid's Grove bought and paid for an abandoned public school building to be used as a parish hall. Little Zion, painted both the interior and exterior of itchurch. Wesley installed new stove at a cost of \$275 and paid for it in full. The pastor has served this charge for 25 years in succession. Conversions 6; accessions 6. Raised for all purposes \$5,575.00. Rev. A. A. McDowell, Pastor.

WITTMAN and SHERWOOD have surprised themselves this year. A first quarterly conference, the pastor's salary was raised by \$300. A new gaheating plant has been installed at Wittman at a cost of \$800 and has been paid. Several other improvements have been made. This church has taken on new hope, new attitudes, new life, and were happy to make a \$400 increas in salary for the coming year. Conversions 6; accessions 6. Raised for all causes \$5,159.00. Rev. C. C. Thomas, Pastor.

We have endeavored to give due consideration to every interest of the Methodist Church on the Easton District. Ministers and laymen have pooled their energies in the promotion of our varied program this year. The figures se upon the foregoing pages are inadequate expressions of our accomplishments. Our sincere appreciation goes out to them We pray that God in His infinite mercy and boundless love will ever sustain them.

Survey of Charges

BETHEL (Brooklyn, N. Y.) has completed another good year despite the set-back due to the death of the pastor's husband. We have no record of anyone who has given as much of himself, his time, and possessions to start a Methodist mission as Brother Eugene Redfield gave to establish Bethel Church. The gracious, effective pastor of this 100 per cent church is the Rev. Mrs. Amy Redfield. The church reports 19 conversions, 16 accessions, 54 full members; \$30 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$50 for the Pension Reserve, and \$3,133 for all purposes.

GRACE MISSION (Brooklyn, N. Y.) has increased the Sunday School attendance and organized a children's choir. It is difficult, however, for this church to involve an increasing number of adults in the worship and service activities. Without either a salary or a strong Official Board, the Rev. Mrs. Mary L. Slade has done her best to give pastoral leadership to her congregation. The church reports 15 conversions, 5 accessions, 60 full members; \$35 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and \$996 for all causes.

JOHN WESLEY (Brooklyn, N. Y.) has adequate facilities for worship and an extensive educational program. Although this church has a great potential it has not done its best this year because of misunderstandings, lack of effective motivation and concentrated efforts to forge ahead. The blame for this lethargy cannot be rightly pinned on any one person. Despite some difficulty and tension, the Rev. O'Connell Milbourne worked faithfully as pastor in discharging his duties and he gives a good account of his stewardship. The church reports 47 conversions, 25 accessions, 547 full members; \$875 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$136 for the Pension Reserve, and \$30,000 for all causes.

NEWMAN MEMORIAL (Brooklyn, N. Y.) is one of our most progressive churches. Four years ago it had 563 members. Today the membership exceeds 1,000. The outstanding achievements include the installation of a modern stainless steel kitchen, the expansion and completion of the gymnasium with modern facilities, and a greater manifestation of stewardship. The church reports 44 conversions, 14 accessions, 1,042 full members; \$1,070 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$100 for the Pension Reserve, and \$40,127 for all causes. The Rev. Henri M. Deas is the proficient, successful pastor.

REDEEMER (Brooklyn, N. Y.) has completed its tenth successful year under the wise pastoral leadership of the Rev. A. E. Martin. The church reports improvements in the church and parsonage, 2 conversions, 12 accessions, 258 full members; \$200 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$44 for the Pension Reserve, and \$12,500 for the total budget.

GALILEE (Englewood, N. J.) has plans set to rebuild on a new location one mile from First Methodist Church at an approximate cost of \$85,000.

Under the leadership of Attorney Charles Parlin and the Mayor of Englew and with the cooperation of the National Board of Missions and the Delaw Conference, this church has sufficient funds in sight to begin the construct of the new edifice. The Fourth Quarterly Conference met on Monday, Ap 13, 1959, and voted (9 in favor and 1 against) to transfer Galilee church fruthe Delaware Conference to the Newark Conference. The Rev. Walter Taylor is the active pastor. The church reports 10 conversions, 10 accession 136 full members; \$60 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolence \$40 for the Pension Reserve, and \$38,000 for all purposes.

BROOKS MEMORIAL (Jamaica, N. Y.) has ended the best year in history. Progress is evident in the church school which has an enrollme of 1,227 with an average attendance of 580 and in every other area of thurch. During the year the church purchased a site for a parsonage at a cof \$6,400 cash. The plan is to break ground in June and build a new parsonage at an estimated cost of \$30,000. The Rev. Charles L. Carrington has just close the finest year of his long pastorate at Brooks Memorial. The church reportation of the conversions, 71 accessions, 1,087 full members; \$900 raised for Worservice and Conference Benevolences, \$1,100 for the Pension Reserve, are \$68,000 for all purposes.

CLAIR MEMORIAL (Jersey City, N. J.) had increases in membershi and church school enrollment. It could do better if it had a stepped-up program in evangelism, Christian education, and stewardship. The church reports conversions, 9 accessions, 341 full members; \$258 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$194 for the Pension Reserve, and \$10,150 for a

causes. The Rev. Willard G. Brown is the faithful pastor.

ST. MATTHEW'S (Linconia, Pa.) has received a donation of \$8,000 from the Delaware Conference, a donation of \$8,000 and a loan of \$25,000 from the National Board of Missions for the construction of a new church in Linconia (better known as Trevose). The church school is growing and the attendance is good. The Rev. James L. McClendon has given good pastoral leadership in this parish. The church reports 5 conversions, 20 accessions, 25 full members \$3 raised for World Service, \$5 for the Pension Reserve, and \$1,372 for all purposes.

ST. MARK'S CHURCH (Montclair, N. J.) had another good year despite the fact that the pastor, Rev. W. A. Harewood, was ill several weeks and hos pitalized. Improvements were made in the driveway, the sidewalk, and the from steps of the parsonage. The church reports 5 conversions, 24 accessions, 820 ful members; \$1,000 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences \$1,150 for the Pension Reserve, and \$28,243 for all causes.

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH (Newark, N. J.) paid more than \$2,000 on the mortgage and \$900 for the completion of a new floor in the basement of the church. The church has made progress in spiritual enrichment and Christian stewardship under the good, effective leadership of the Rev. C. B. Miles who is promoting an intensive stewardship program. Forty persons have recently begun to tithe. The charge reports 21 conversions, 19 accessions, 904 ful members; \$1,400 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$312 for the Pension Reserve, and \$24,000 for all causes.

ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH (Newark, N. J.) is a young church that moves forward with a steady stride. Since last May, the National Board of Missions and the Delaware Conference gave this church \$7,500 to help liquidate

the mortgage. The Rev. W. R. Mayberry is the successful pastor who leads with herculean ability. The church reports 2 conversions, 23 accessions, 237 full members; \$175 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$60 for the Pension Reserve, and \$7,275 for all causes.

ST. LUKE'S (New Rochelle, N. Y.) needs a full-time pastor and a concentrated emphasis in Evangelism, education, missions, and Christian Social Relations. The pastor, Rev. Lester V. Baker, declares that "The general spirit for working is good and the concept of purpose and duty is encouraging." The church reports no conversions, 8 accessions, 172 full members; \$190 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$30 for the Pension Reserve, and \$5,231 for all purposes.

BUTLER MEMORIAL (New York, N. Y.) has increased the membership, reactivated 23 of the 43 inactive members, and increased the church attendance 20%. Realizing that the congregation has outgrown its present facilities, the church plans to relocate and build a new edifice for worship, Christian education and other activities. A total of \$10,000 was raised this year for the building fund. The Rev. W. P. Johnson has completed his seventeenth successful year as pastor of this most promising church. The church reports 12 conversions, 15 accessions, 204 full members; \$413 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$180 for the Pension Reserve, and \$19,727 for all causes.

SHAW CHAPEL (New York, N. Y.) has taken a new lease on life since relocating in the old E. Calvary Church at 2085 Fifth Avenue. The membership has increased from 10 to 15. The church must continue to grow, and we think it will because there is a warm spirit in the fellowship and a desire for progress. The Rev. S. A. Bellamy has been the pastor fifteen years. The church reports 5 conversions, 5 accessions, 15 full members, \$55 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$3 for the Pension Reserve, and \$1,297 for all purposes.

ST. JOHN'S CHURCH (Orange, N. J.) welcomed the new, friendly, progressive pastor, Rev. Curtis A. Elder and his wife. The church is well organized for service and progress has been made. The parsonage has been beautified, the church attendance has increased, and the pastor's support was increased \$400. The church reports 3 conversions, 17 accessions, 228 full members; \$631 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$600 for the Pension Reserve, and \$10,439 for the total budget.

ST. MATTHEW'S CHURCH (Ossining, N. Y.) had another good year under the leadership of the Rev. D. M. Collins who has helped to establish better Christian social relations in the city. Plans have been developed to liquidate the mortgage on the church this summer. The church reports 11 conversions, 11 accessions, 238 full members; \$150 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$15 for the Pension Reserve, and \$7,135 for all causes.

BETHSAIDA (Phila., Pa.) had a set-back this year partly because of the illness of the pastor who always endeavors to make his charge a 100 per cent church. This church is in a changing community, many families have moved out and dwellings have been razed. A new housing project will be established in proximity to this parish. The growth of Bethsaida will depend largely upon a vigorous, enthusiastic leadership, a new emphasis in Christian education, a more effective program of Christian social relations, and a carefully planned visitation evangelism campaign. Somebody must ring door bells. The church

reports no conversions, 2 accessions, 86 full members; \$55 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$100 for the Pension Reserve, and \$7,350

for all causes. The Rev. A. L. Scriber is the pastor.

CAMPHOR MEMORIAL (Phila., Pa.) raised \$6,000 to rebuild the organ and to install chimes. The church school was strengthened by the addition of 118 new scholars and renewed activities in the Youth Division. The church reports 18 conversions, 58 accessions, 893 full members; \$860 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$1,200 for the Pension Reserve, and \$32,387 for all causes. The Rev. Walter E. Stanley is the faithful, conscientious pastor.

CHRIST MISSION (Phila., Pa.) has grown larger and stronger since the congregation moved from 2034 South Street to 1621 Bainbridge Street. The building provides more and better facilities for religious activities. The church reports 10 conversions, 15 accessions, 106 full members, \$40 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$25 for the Pension Reserve, and

\$3,800 for all causes. The alert, loyal pastor is the Rev. E. T. Randolph.

TRINITY (E. Germantown) has a wonderful opportunity for growth and expansion because more and more people are establishing homes in proximity to the church. The members must contribute more sacrificially to the building fund to make their dream a reality. The church reports 3 conversions, 3 accessions, 119 full members; \$364 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$175 for the Pension Reserve, and \$6,520 for all purposes. The Rev. J. E. Dunn is the wise pastor.

EMMANUEL (Phila. Pa.) has made progress this year by stimulating and arousing more laymen to a deeper sense of responsibility in the church and community. Volunteer workmen made physical improvements in the basement of the church. The Rev. David W. Briddell is the good pastor who has been a happy father ever since the birth of his daughter, Joselyn Davida, on February 14, 1959. The church reports 16 conversions, 33 accessions, 250 full members; \$100 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$75 for the Pension Reserve, and \$12,593 for all purposes.

ST. THOMAS (Frankford) is the only old building standing in the block. Other old buildings have been razed to provide space for the new housing project which is now under construction. To meet this new challenge, all divisions of the church school have been strengthened and more members have been activated. The Rev. Robert L. Harris is the affable pastor. The church reports 1 conversion, 2 accessions, 55 full members, \$69 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$0.00 for the Pension Reserve, and \$4,562 for all causes.

JANES (Germantown) continues to grow numerically and spiritually. Physical improvements include a new return line heating system, new roof on the education building, and a brick porch and shingles added to the parsonage. Missionary aid has been given to the Izuo Church in Taisho-ku, Osaka, Japan, and \$100 to support a student in India. The stalwart pastor, Rev. Henry H. Nichols, and his wife were granted a six week leave of absence to visit Africa, Holy Land, India, Hong Kong, and Japan. The church reports 69 conversions, 39 accessions, 891 full members, \$1,350 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$1,050 for the Pension Reserve, and \$35,490 for all causes. The pastor's salary was increased to \$5,800.

HAVEN (Phila., Pa.) raised nearly \$6,000 for expansion. The Quarterly

Conference voted to relocate Haven Church, and to purchase the Tioga Presbyterian Church at 16th and Tioga Streets if and when it is for sale. The well trained, dignified, efficient pastor is Rev. Earl H. Crampton. The church reports 30 conversions, 30 accessions, 1,213 full members, \$1,720 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$1,325 for the Pension Reserve, and \$46,982 for all causes.

JOHN WESLEY (Phila., Pa.) has completed its "banner year" under the fine pastoral leadership of the Rev. Irving R. Elzey. The outstanding achievements include the laying of the Cornerstone on July 20, the burning of the mortgage on November 16, and the dedication of the church on January 25. All lower rooms including the Fellowship Hall have been painted and the floors have been covered with asphalt tile. The church reports 19 conversions, 36 accessions, 1,017 full members; \$1,225 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$1,150 for the Pension Reserve, and \$31,043 for all causes.

MT. ZION (Phila., Pa.) is realizing new financial and spiritual strength to meet the challenges of a changing community. There has been marvelous increase in church attendance. The sum of \$4,500 was raised for expansion purposes. The Rev. R. B. Thompson is the capable, versatile, successful pastor. The church reports 30 conversions, 30 accessions, 886 full members; \$800 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$400 for the Pension Reserve, and \$22,126 for all causes.

PENIEL (Phila., Pa.) had another good year under the effective pastoral leadership of the Rev. J. W. Elbert. A forward stride in evangelism and stewardship has put the church ahead of last year's record. The church reports 12 conversions, 12 accessions, 269 full members; \$350 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$100 for the Pension Reserve, and \$11,250 for all purposes.

PINKETT TABERNACLE (Phila., Pa.) is dissatisfied and desires to sever all official relationships with the Delaware Conference because The Methodist Church did not take over their heavy mortgage or help them substantially to liquidate it. From the beginning there has been some misunderstanding; and now the pastor and some members declare that their church has never been an integral part of the Delaware Conference. Perhaps this is legally true. When the church was admitted in the year 1954, Attorney John Owens drafted a resolution to the effect that the charter of the said church should be amended to make it subject to the Discipline of The Methodist Church. The charter was never amended and the Official Board members voted to withdraw from the Delaware Conference. The pastor and officials who had been duly elected refused to make any regular report to the Fourth Quarterly Conference.

ST. BARNABAS (Phila., Pa.) was ordered by the City to remove the belfry of the church and make other improvements for the safety of the public. This project will cost approximately \$5,600. Despite this unanticipated emergency, St. Barnabas has ended another good year under the good leadership of the experienced, sagacious pastor, the Rev. J. O. Stanley. The church reports 6 conversions, 12 accessions, 359 full members: \$420 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$0.00 for the Pension Reserve, and \$9,860 for all causes.

TINDLEY TEMPLE (Phila., Pa.) has made progress this year. During a special financial crusade a total of \$62,534 was received in cash and pledges

to purchase a parking lot and to erect the educational building. In addition the regular services, members were inspired and strengthened by the specimental services. Emergency lighting in the church has been installed and extensive repairs on the organ have been made. The church reports 44 convesions, 70 accessions, 5,629 full members; \$2,917 raised for World Service are Conference Benevolences, \$3,000 for the Pension Reserve, and \$72,000 for purposes. The Rev. N. W. Moore, Jr., is the proficient, successful pastor.

ZOAR (Phila., Pa.) had another good year under the wise pastoral leade ship of the astute pastor, the Rev. J. E. Licorish. The trustees were authorize to borrow \$18,000 to make necessary repairs and other improvements in the church property that had been neglected for years. Marvelous progress he been made in evangelism and stewardship. More members are giving more the financial support of the church. The church reports 25 conversions, 35 accessions, 960 full members; \$1,500 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$1,150 for the Pension Reserve, and \$28,749 for all purposes. The pastor has been granted a leave of absence to participate in the Lacour Mission to Japan this summer.

ST. JOHN'S, the Friendly Church in Spring Lake, had another goo summer under the leadership of the new pastor, Brother Martin U. Riley, wh is a student at Drew Theological Seminary. The charge reports no conversions no accessions, 24 visiting members for the summer; \$5 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$400 for the pastor's salary, and \$1,043 for all

causes.

ASBURY (Trenton, N. J.) has completed its finest year with many evidences of progress. There has been a large increase in church membership and attendance. The congregation is alive with a vital stewardship spirit that enabled the church to meet all financial obligations in full, to increase the pastor's salary from \$3,660 to \$4,000 for the ensuing year. The church reports 3-conversions, 46 accessions, 395 full members; \$550 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$725 for the Pension Reserve, and \$19,690 for all purposes. The new, thoroughly trained, competent pastor, the Rev. F. D. Arnold, and his family were graciously received by the church and community

TRINTY (White Plains, N. Y.) continues to make progress in its efficiency, growth and outreach. An Advance Special was provided to purchase a motor scooter for a pastor in India. Plans are being considered to enlarge the church building and increase the facilities for the growing church school. The church reports 31 conversions, 31 accessions, 342 full members; \$600 raised for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$700 for the Pension Reserve, and \$10,711 for all causes. The faithful, efficient, dynamic pastor is the Rev. T. M.

Booth.

SUMMARY OF STATISTICS

The district has given a good account of her stewardship. The thirty-four charges reported 592 conversions, 758 accessions, 19,838 full members, \$20,370 for World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$15,194 for the Pension Reserve Fund, and a grand total of \$663,781 raised for all causes. Despite the fact that St. Paul Church of Jamaica was transferred to the New York East Conference last year and the fact that Pinkett Tabernacle gave no report of its stewardship, the churches of the district reported an increase of \$68,057 raised for all causes this year. Within two years the total amount raised by the

Philadelphia district has grown from \$536,319 to \$663,781. This is an increase of \$127,462.

Twenty-two charges paid the apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences in full: Bethel, Grace, John Wesley and Newman of Brooklyn, Brooks Memorial, St. John's and St. Matthew's churches in Newark, New Rochelle, Butler, Orange, Camphor, Christ's Mission, E. Germantown, Janes, Haven, John Wesley of Phila., St. Barnabas, Tindley Temple, Zoar, Spring Lake, Trenton, and White Plains.

The following sixteen churches paid the Pension Reserve in full for this year: Bethel, Brooks, Montclair, Butler, Orange, Bethsaida, Camphor, Christ's Mission, Emmanuel, Janes, Haven, John Wesley of Phila., Tindley Temple, Zoar, Trenton, and White Plains.

We have made progress; however, some of the churches have not done their best. They are not making the best use of their leadership abilities to strengthen the fellowship of believers, to promote all interests of the Church, and to meet all obligations in full.

Plans for a New Church

The best immediate opportunity within our district for organizing a new church is in the area of West Philadelphia. A down payment has been made on the purchase of the synagogue at 5861 Cedar Avenue. This corner location is one block from the large public elementary school and main bus route. It is almost the center of the area extending from Market Street to Baltimore Avenue, from 63rd Street to 54th Street. The development of a Methodist congregation at 59th Street and Cedar Avenue is the first step in our long range program to establish a major Methodist Church in this area. Plans for this new project have been approved by the proper Boards and other authorities.

We are requesting the Delaware Conference to authorize its trustees to take title to this property on or before June 19, 1959, which is the legal date for the settlement. The cost of the synagogue is \$10,500. The expected income during the first year is as follows:

Within a few weeks after an appeal for funds was made, local churches of the Philadelphia district contributed \$1,240 on next year's budget for the support of this new church project.

Conclusion

The progress of the Philadelphia District is not the result of one man's efforts. The District Council which represents every interest of the Church has worked cooperatively with the district superintendent in planning and promot-

ing various programs on district and subdistrict levels. The District Board of Lay Activities, the District Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Young Adult Fellowship, the District Staff on Christian Education, Committees, the Board of Trustees, Inc., District Directors and Secretaries, and lay members in the local churches have helped to make the Philadelphia District stronger and more progressive. We have not reached the summit, but we are still climbing. The morale of ministers and lay members is high. We believe the district will continue to advance because the people have faith and a mind to work.

I am grateful to our Heavenly Father for his mercy and love toward me, and to the laymen, ministers, and their families for the fine cooperation given in the promotion of the work during this very difficult year.

In spite of the many hardships that were encountered by minister and laymen alike, we are closing a most successful year's work. For this we give God the praise. We were plagued with sickness and death during the year in the families of the ministers and laymen. Rev. Mrs. Adah Coffey lost her father, Mrs. N. B. Derrickson lost her only aunt, and Rev. David T. Lewis lost his uncle.

District Activities

The following is a brief resume of the activities for the year. The year's work began with the District Stewards' Meeting, Union Asbury Methodist Church, Crisfield, Md., June 3, 1958.

Thirty-eight churches held Vacation Church Schools. Two Observation Schools were held in strategic areas of the district. The Youth Missionary Rally was held in November at Marion Station, and the District Missionary Institute in March at Maryland State College. The District Convocation on Evangelism was held at Metropolitan Church, Princess Anne, Md., December 9. Dr. W. D. Lester from the Board of Evangelism was present and shared in the program.

The Pre-Conference Rally brought the year's work to a close on April 22 at Metropolitan Church, Leemont Charge.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service is continuously growing under the guidance of its dynamic leader, Mrs. G. T. Jackson. The lay work of the district has enjoyed the fruits of another successful year. Mr. T. Waldo Kiah district lay leader, has rendered untiring service in promoting lay activities of the district. Mrs. Carolyn C. Dorman, general church school superintendent of the district continues to give effective leadership to the Church Schools The Ministers' Wives continue to give a good account of themselves under the leadership of Mrs. Nancy B. Derrickson. They count it a high privilege to send their leader, Mrs. Derrickson, to this Annual Conference with an extra amount toward Conference Claimants.

Report of Charges

COTTAGE GROVE (I. H. White, pastor). This charge is in a rural area with limited possibilities. Brother White has striven hard to make these limited possibilities count in the advancement of God's Kingdom. Conversions 7, accession 7, Raised for all causes \$3,645.00. The people ask for his return.

CRISFIELD: SHILOH (S. P. Sanders, pastor). This charge has had another good year's work in spite of circumstances. They believe that where there is a will, there is a way. Under the skillful guidance of Pastor Sanders, another good year's work has been done. Physical improvements on the parsonage and church were made this year. Conversions 5, accessions 5. Raised for all causes \$7,948.00.

CRISFIELD: UNION-ASBURY & LIBERIA (C. B. White, pastor). The pastor of this charge has been sick the greater part of the year. In spite of the many difficulties which he had to face, there is an advance over last year. Conversions 1, accessions 1. Raised for all causes \$4,197.00. His return is requested.

DAMES QUARTER (R. T. Wallace, pastor). There are a few good people in this charge who are very much concerned about the church and the cause of the Kingdom. These few have not been able to create a concern for Christ and his Church in the majority. This makes Dames Quarter one of our most difficult charges. Because of the general lack of concern in the congregation, the results are very meager. Brother Wallace is a hard worker. Conversions 0, accessions 0. Raised for all causes \$1,710.00.

DEAL ISLAND (Grover N. Jones, pastor). Pastor Jones, one of the veterans of the cross, has led his little army to a great victory. This has been a baner year for Deal Island even in the face of unemployment and a very hard winter. Conversions 7, accessions 7. Raised for all purposes \$3,543.00. His return is requested.

FRUITLAND (J. E. McBride, pastor). Fruitland, true to her former years, has another good report. Pastor McBride has the know-how and gets his work done. Conversions 4, accessions 4, 20 subscriptions to the *Christian Advocate*. Raised for all causes \$5,676.00. They request his return.

GIRDLETREE (L. H. Purnell, pastor). Girdletree is known for doing big things. The pastor and his wife are a good team, they have the knowhow. This charge has the best educational set-up on the district, a church school of four-hundred fourteen. Average attendance on Sundays is above three hundred twenty-five. Conversions 6, accessions 6. Raised for all purposes \$10,541.00. They say "send Purnell back."

GREENWOOD (E. J. Johnson, pastor). The pastor and people have worked well to make this report. This is a farming area. Crops have been a failure, yet, this report is an advance over last year. Brother Johnson gives good leadership. Conversions 9, accessions 9. Raised for all causes \$3,900.00. The people are saying—"send Johnson back."

HOPEWELL (H. J. Lambert, pastor). This is a two point charge, capable of doing fine work. The charge was left vacant at the beginning of the conference year. Pastor Lambert came to this work at the middle of the year.

He has wrought well. This report is very commendable. Conversions 5, acces-

sions 5. Raised for all causes \$3,980.00. His return is requested.

HORNTOWN (Carrol Scott, pastor). Pastor Scott is a good leader and does his work well. The people have been very responsive to his leadership. This charge reports another good year's work. The pastor and his wife are a good team. Conversions 3, accessions 3. Raised for all causes \$5,088.29. His return is requested.

KELLER-EXMORE (Jessica Hickman, pastor). This charge has had its difficulties through the years. The pastor has done her best to advance all of the causes with a degree of success. The long standing debt on Spence Memorial has been liquidated. Conversions 20, accessions 20. Raised for all causes

\$2,543.00.

LEEMONT (W. H. Greene, pastor). This charge has had one of its best years. At the coming of the new pastor, the people took on new courage. The pastor and his wife are giving splendid leadership and the people are willing to follow. The future is bright for Leemont Charge. Conversions 37, accessions 37. Raised for all purposes \$11,113.00. The people want to keep Greene.

MANOKIN (Howard Barclay, pastor). This is a new pastor in a new place. The old saying, "A new broom sweeps clean" is true to form in this case. Manokin has never been able to see the need of supporting the program of Methodism. This year she has broken all records under the leadership of Pastor Barclay. The interior of the church is being beautified and many other things are being done around the church. Conversions 21, accessions 21. Raised for all purposes \$1,616.00. They want their pastor to be returned.

MARION STATION (J. W. Mickle, pastor). This charge has had a most difficult year. Employment was of such that the people had to live on the little social security that they received. In spite of conditions, they are making another good year's report. Conversions 3, accessions 3. Raised for all causes

\$5,205.00.

MARUMSCO-KINGSTON (O. C. Jones, pastor). The people and pastor are singing their praises to the high heaven for their achievements. The charge reports its best year's work. Pastor and wife have given good leadership. Conversions 34, accessions 34. Raised for all purposes \$6,471.00.

MOUNT VERNON (Edward W. Lee, pastor). The pastor and people have discovered that the possibilities for a good year's work were in their very grasp. The pastor's report to this conference is the best in the past five years. The pastor and people have wrought well. Conversions 1, accessions 1. Raise for all causes \$5,510.50.

NANTICOKE (G. O. Commodore, pastor). Nanticoke has advanced beyond last year, even though unemployment, crops, and the severe winter played havor with the people. The people responded very favorably to the pastor leadership. A good year's work is the result. Conversions 0, accessions Raised for all causes \$5,892.00.

OAKVILLE (Clarence E. Handy, pastor). Oakville Charge is very small in fact, there are eighty members comprising the entire membership. In spit of weather conditions, crop failures, and unemployment, this charge equalits record of last year. Pastor Handy knows how to get things done. Conversions 6, accessions 10. Raised for all causes \$5,581.00. They are saying—"lesus keep Handy."

ORIOLE-VENTON (David T. Lewis, pastor). The pastor is a hard

conscientious worker. The people have responded very well to his leadership. The charge was advanced over last year on all causes. Little David believes in getting things done. Conversions 5, accessions 5. Raised for all purposes \$5,474.00. His return is requested.

POCOMOKE (S. E. Parker, pastor). This charge has had a steady growth along all lines, since Parker became its pastor. The people are sacrificial and loyal. They need a new church building, and they are soliciting the cooperation of the Conference Board of Missions in this matter. There is an advancement on all causes this year. A good year's work has been done. Conversions 14, accessions 14. Raised for all causes \$7,315.00. Their plea is "return Parker."

PRINCESS ANNE (Edwin Ellis, pastor). Metropolitan Church has grown in many areas under its dynamic leader. The church takes pride in rendering service, not only to its own members, but to the college community as well. This church has one of our best prepared and most aggressive young pastors. What will Metropolitan do now? The report is in advance over last year. Conversions 28, accessions 28. Raised for all causes \$9,708.00. His return is requested.

QUANTICO (H. W. Spencer, pastor). Pastor Spencer has given good leadership to this charge, and in response, the two smaller churches have paid the asking in full, also increased the pastor's salary. There are a few loyal members in the larger church that want to take their rightful place of leadership in the charge, but the majority have not caught the Spirit of Christ as it is demonstrated by Pastor Spencer. St. Mark, and St. Luke are saying, "Let us make Quantico a first rate charge." Mt. Zion has not caught that spirit. Conversions 2, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$5,950.00. His return is requested.

SALISBURY-JOHN WESLEY (H. E. Anderson, pastor). Pastor Anderson has the know how and he is able to get things done, without too much display. Under his leadership, John Wesley reports a good year's work in all of the activities in the church. He gives close supervision to all of the educational activities. Conversions 0, accessions 0. Raised for all causes \$7,531.00.

SALISBURY-WHITE TEMPLE (S. Winston C. Crosse, pastor). White Temple, under the leadership of its new pastor, reports an advance over last year along all lines. Pastor Crosse is able to get things done in spite of misunderstanding and the many difficulties that arose during the year. A good year's work has been done. Conversions 24, accessions 24. Raised for all causes \$8,910.00. His return is requested.

SHILOH-HUTT'S (Emerson Jolly, pastor). The people and pastor are cooperating lovely. This charge is making one of the best reports it has ever made. New pulpit furniture has been installed at Shiloh Church and new doors at Hutt's Memorial. The people have a mind to follow leadership. Conversions 4, accessions 4. Raised for all causes \$2,550.00. The people requested their pastor's return.

SNOW HILL (G. T. Jackson, pastor). Pastor and people of Ebenezer have wrought well in spite of the many unfavorable circumstances that arose during the year. This charge is enjoying another good year's work. The work is well organized. Conversions 13, accessions 13. Raised for all purposes \$9,135.00. The pastor's return has been requested.

STOCKTON (A. W. Coffey, pastor). This is a very small congregation, but a loyal group of people. The pastor has done well when considering the

few she has to work with. She continues to train the younger group into church-manship. Conversions 9, accessions 9. Raised for all causes \$3,622.00.

UNIONVILLE (C. W. Cannon, pastor). This charge under the fine leadership of Pastor Cannon has advanced beyond all previous records. Each year they have made an increase in the conference askings. The evangelistic fire is forever burning. This little pastor can get things done. Harmony prevails among people and pastor. Conversions 26, accessions 26. Raised for all causes \$5,693.00. The people say "Please return Cannon."

ST. ANDREWS LARGER PARISH (UPPER HILL-FAIRMOUNT) (Alexander Reid, pastor). Pastor Reid is one of the great leaders of the Methodist Church. He was called out of retirement to take the leadership of these good people. The people and pastor have wrought well. This charge reports one of its best year's work. Conversions 9, accessions 9. Raised for all causes \$5,064.00.

His return is requested.

WACHAPREAGUE (Frank Robinson, pastor). This charge had to be left without a pastor at the beginning of the year because there were not enough ministers to supply the needs of the conference. We secured this young man from Maryland State College. He has proved a blessing to Wachapreague Charge and the Delaware Conference. This charge reports its best year's work. This young man and the people have wrought well. Their parsonage burned on December 23rd and the pastor and his wife barely escaped with their lives. Conversions 0, accessions 0. Raised for all causes \$7,031.00. His return is requested.

WATTSVILLE (Rupert A. Adams, pastor). Pastor Adams is one of our well trained men, and is able to get things done. The charge is well organized. The pastor and people are in harmony. All causes of the church have the close supervision of its pastor. This report is in advance over last year. The membership shows an increase of 16%. Conversions 62, accessions 62. Raised for all purposes \$7,267.00. His return is requested.

WETIPQUIN (W. A. Nichols, pastor). This charge has not been able to carry out its full responsibility this year because of the disunity among the pastor and the people, and the effects of the recession. Pastor Nichols tried to advance but did not come up to the report of last year. Under the circumstances, the charge has done well. Conversions 12, accessions 12. Raised for all causes \$4,000.00.

WHALEYVILLE (R. W. Dennis, pastor). Pastor Dennis believes in going to the top. To him, there are no side tracks. At the beginning of the year, he sets his goals for the top, and never takes his eyes from them until he reaches the top. The charge has had a banner year. Conversions 19, accessions 19. Raised for all causes \$7,161.75.

WHITE HAVEN (Jeremiah Lee, pastor). Pastor Lee is a hard worker and deserves a much better report than this charge is making. The pastor supplies the leadership, but there is an attitude of "wait and see" on the part of too many of the members. The people have not responded to the call of the church. Conversions 1, accessions 22. Raised for all causes \$3,252.00.

WITHAMS (R. T. Croswell, pastor). Pastor Croswell is a hard worker and is able to get his work done when conditions are favorable. For eleven years he has given splendid leadership to this fine group of people. Unemployment has

done much to handicap the work in these areas. This charge makes another good year's report. Conversions 17, accessions 30. Raised for all causes \$6,228.00. His return is requested.

Summary

This resume of the charges does not in any way give a true picture of the sacrificial work that has been done, neither does it relate accurately what our ministers and their wives have encountered during the year. There were times when the sun even withheld her warmth from the weary traveler. In the midst of those times, the minister and his family kept up a stout heart and a cheery smile. Each minister did his best to promote the total program of the church, with special emphasis on evangelism. There are four charges, however, that had no additions to the church rolls.

Our youth work on the district continues to grow under the efficient leadership of Rev. Edwin Ellis. There is a place for the youth on every district program. They assemble in large numbers on these occasions.

Our Missionary Secretary, Rev. W. H. Greene, is giving untiring leadership in his effort to promote missions in every charge on the district. Each sub-district held a local church school of missions.

There were thirty-eight Vacation Church Schools on the district this year. Miss Sallye Derrickson is giving splendid leadership in the children's work of the district.

May I express to the Rev. Howard A. Bailey and Mr. C. Leonard Miller our appreciation for their most effective leadership given to each charge and the district.

The ministers' wives are a very loyal group of women. Many of them are concerned not only about their individual charge and the special work they are called upon to do, but they are concerned about the work of the entire district. They are a dedicated group of women. They are always ready and willing to help to advance the Kingdom of God through all activities, both in local churches and district wide.

May I call upon the laymen of these lower districts to begin now planning for the consolidation of many of the smaller churches. If our churches are going to have an effective ministry in these rural areas, we must combine our forces, and pay salaries at least equal to the highest paid laymen in the individual charges. Otherwise, you will have to employ leaders who cannot command the respect of your own members. The majority of our laymen are ready and willing to promote the program of the church, but they need good leadership. Our laymen are loyal and many are making real sacrifices in order for these charges to make the type of reports that are being presented to this conference. To the laymen, I say "thank you, and may God's blessings ever remain with you."

Thank you, Bishop Love, for your kind consideration and understanding of these problems that one faces in his endeavors to carry on the work of the Kingdom. Regardless of the rush of business, you take time to give assistance. Your administrative secretary has no equal when it comes to rendering assistance. He knows how to deal with problems.

May God's blessings rest upon you and Mrs. Love, and may He ever keep

each of you in gracious care, and may He give you "wisdom, faith, and courage, for the living of these days."

With beautiful and modern improvements made, the district parsonage remains free of debt.

An Epitome of Charges

ASBURY, ATLANTIC CITY. This charge has taken on a new exterior and interior look. The outside stone is washed and pointed, and new front doors are purchased. Inlaid tile floors are finished in the lecture room, kitchen and lavatories. The adjacent Apex Hair and News Company building was purchased at a cost of \$17,000. \$3,474.00 is in the Building Fund for the erection of a new parsonage. The ministerial support and many other askings are paid in full, paid for improvements \$18,767.00. Conversions 29, accessions 25. Raised for all causes \$35,912.00. Rev. O. H. Spence, Pastor.

HAMILTON MEMORIAL has paid in full the mortgage on the parsonage. A new heating system has been installed in the Community Center at a

cost of \$1,000. The pulpit, choir loft, pastor's study and ladies' lounge are furnished and modernized. A concrete driveway and a patio has been erected. This charge is 100% in ministerial support, non-ratio and district askings. Improvements \$1,970.00. Raised for total purposes \$10,744.00. Conversions 21, accessions 9. Rev. H. D. Davis, Pastor.

BRIDGETON. This charge is bringing to a close its most successful year. The church school is growing, and new workers are being recruited to enlarge and enrich the total program of Christian education in the church. Here there is no recession in the work of the Lord. The exterior of the church has been painted. The parsonage has been painted, with a bath room furnished, and other improvements added. All major conference items are paid in full. Conversions 6, accessions 4. Paid for improvements \$3,100. Raised for everything \$11,500. Rev. T. H. Pendleton, pastor.

BURLINGTON has made beautiful improvements. A plywood ceiling, fluorescent lights, new folding tables, new chairs and a new heating system were purchased. Paid for improvements \$1,600.00. Conversions 4, accessions 2. Raised for all causes \$5,228.00, 100% charge. Rev. Horace Fisher, Pastor.

BUTTONWOOD AND CHRISTIANA. These people perpetually keep up their record of excelling all previous records, by raising all of their apportionments in full. The churches have been beautifully painted inside and out, while other improvements are made at a cost of \$2,000.00. Conversions 2, accessions 3. Raised for all obligations \$6,300, 100% charge. Rev. S. L. Wilkins, Pastor.

EIGHTH STREET has made some marvelous improvements. The old mortgage on the church is paid in full. The church is incorporated for the first time, and adequately covered with fire insurance. The church has been painted down stairs, and major repairs are finished at a cost of \$5,780.00. The spiritual life of the church is much improved. Total raised for all obligations \$7,600. Conversions 6, accessions 15. Rev. M. D. Brooks, Pastor.

FERRY AVENUE reports great gains over last year. The R. P. F. is raised in full for the first time. The ministerial support is raised, and other askings show substantial increases. The people are acquiring a mind to work, as a result of faithful leadership. Improvements are made in the church and parsonage at a cost of \$2,684.00. Raised for all obligations \$9,040.00. Conversions 2. accessions 6. Rev. M. L. McKenney, Pastor.

CAPE MAY AND SWAINTON. This charge has taken on new life. The Reserve Pension Fund is raised in full and other offerings are advanced. A large window and a furnace were placed in the church at Cape May. Beautiful improvements are made in the Swainton Church. Paid for improvements \$2,000.00. Raised for all causes \$5,000.00. Conversions 10, accessions 20. Rev. E. M. Dean, Pastor.

GRACE, Chester, Pa., has had another fruitful year. The ministerial support including the R. P. F. is paid out, and other askings show a decided increase. The payments on the mortgage are up to date. ST. DANIELS. This has been another great year for St. Daniels. The great record of raising all assessments in full is maintained. Beautiful renovations are completed in the church and parsonage. The program at the center is moving forward, with unusual success. The combined choirs will sing at

this Conference. Disbursed for renovations \$411.00, acquired for all allocations \$32,467.00. Conversions 26, accessions 12. Rev. F. D. Jones, Minister.

SILOAM. This church was sadly bereaved, by the loss of her pastor, Rev. J. N. C. Davis. The people were sympathetic and loyal to the widow, by paying her the estimated salary, for one month, while she lived in the parsonage until a vacancy was apparent to move in. Rev. J. B. Redmond was appointed to serve this unexpired term. The report of the charge is very near 100%. All of the ministerial support and the R. P. F. is paid out, with other causes increased. The church was painted, and improvements are completed in the parsonage. Disbursed for renovations \$1,717.00; acquired for all allocations \$15,204.00. Conversions 2, accessions 10. Rev. J. B. Redmond, Pastor.

DARBY makes her greatest report in the history of the church. The church is still young, but the people have caught the vision-splendor. The old mortgage has been cancelled. There is only a balance of \$666.95 to be paid. Then the Church will be free of debt. All assessments are paid, acquired for all allocations \$10,491.00. Conversions 2, accessions 8. Rev. W. C. Strother,

Pastor.

DELAIR. This charge has been given a new look. The exterior of the church has been painted, and a stone siding was installed. A new piano was purchased, and improvements were made in the parsonage. Paid for renovations \$2,200.00, raised for all purposes \$7,257.00. Conversions 12, accessions 15. Rev. M. C. Blakely, Pastor.

ELKTON reports the Reserve Pension Fund raised in full. Other askings are slightly increased. Improvements have been made in the Church and parsonage at a cost of \$1,860.00. Raised for all obligations \$4,600. Conversions 2,

The resources that lurk here are being gradually utilized. The Reserve Pension Fund for four years is paid. Other offerings are slightly increased, acquired for all obligations \$4,228.00. Conversions 5, accessions 5. Rev. Carl Taylor, Pastor.

SALEM sustains her fine record. The ministerial support, the nonratio askings and the Reserve Pension Fund are paid. The parsonage is being renovated in its entirety. Beautiful improvements are completed in the church. Paid for renovations \$500.00, acquired for all obligations \$9,100. Conversions 3, accessions 4. Rev. Augustus Chancy, Pastor.

ST. GEORGES AND KIRKWOOD. As usual this was the first charge on the district, to report all conference askings paid. A parish house has been erected at St. Paul's Church, Kirkwood. Improvements were made in St. James Church, St. Georges. Total disbursed for all allocations \$3,487.00. Con-

EZION. From time immemorial, this great historical church has maintained her ascending record of being 100% along temporal and spiritual lines. \$1,450.00 was disbursed for improvements in the church and parsonage. The church, and church school enrollment has increased. Conversions 40, accessions 24. Disbursed for all allocations \$30,428.00, 100% charge. Rev. J. R. Shockley, Minister.

HAVEN has had the greatest year in her history. A new oil furnace was installed in the church. A new gas heater was erected in the parsonage, with renovations finished, at a cost of \$1,716.00. Disbursed for renovations \$1,000.00. All debts are paid. Conversions 18, accessions 36. Acquired for all assessments \$10,366.00. Rev. R. C. Hughes, Pastor.

WOODBURY AND JERICHO. This charge has had another prosperous year. The Reserve Pension Fund is paid out. Other offerings are advanced. Renovations are complete in the churches and parsonage. 2. COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

The Commission on World Service and Finance of The Delaware Conference humbly submits this its eighteenth annual report. We are grateful to God for His loving care over us, and to our Bishop, ministers and loyal laymen, whose wonderful spirit of cooperation has made this report possible.

General Items

The Conference Treasurer for the quadrennium is Rev. J. E. Dunn, 4715 Duffield Street, Philadelphia 24, Pa. He is bonded for \$50,000. The depository for our conference funds is The Girard Trust Corn Exchange Bank of Philadelphia. Rev. Dunn is the treasurer for the Board of Missions and also serves as treasurer for the Board of Pensions. The depository for this fund is the Fidelity-Philadelphia Trust Co., Philadelphia, Pa. (Discipline 1956, Par. 792 and 803).

The treasurers of all Conference Boards and Agencies have not been bonded in companies approved by the Commission. The books of all Conference Boards and Agencies have not been properly audited for the past fiscal year. (Discipline 1956, Par. 807.)

The Conference Treasurer's books have been audited by Certified Public Accountants, Walter P. Harris and Robert Bonner, Jr., and a satisfactory

audited report has been filed with the Commission. This is the audited report

filed with the Commission for the past fiscal year.

The list of other conference funds, the names of treasurers of each, and the approved depositories are as follows: Board of Education, Rev. C. D. Gerald, Treasurer, Citizens Southern Bank and Trust Co., Philadelphia, Pa.; Board of Lay Activities, J. R. Webb, Treasurer, People's National Bank, Laurel, Delaware; Board of Hospital and Homes, Rev. C. E. Kiah, Treasurer, Baltimore Trust Co., Bridgeville, Delaware; Board of Evangelism, Mrs. Helen Loatman, Treasurer, Wilmington Trust Co., Wilmington, Del.; Commission on Christian Vocations, Leonard Miller, Treasurer, Citizens Southern Banking and Trust Co., Philadephia, Pa.; Board of Social and Economic Relations, Rev. O. H. Spence, Treasurer.

Recommendations for the conference year 1959-1960

1. We recommend that each local church shall faithfully observe the days as follows: (a) World Service Sundays, (b) Church School Rally Day, (c) Race Relations Day, (d) Methodist Student Day, (e) Golden Cross, second Sunday in November, (f) Laymen's Day.

2. We recommend that all boards and agencies receiving financial support from the Conference shall submit to the Commission (a) The name and address of their respective treasurers, and (b) The name and place where the confer-

ence monies are deposited by June 30th, 1959.

3. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer shall continue to give priority to (a) District Superintendents Salary and Expense Fund, (b) The Ministerial Training School, (c) Morgan Youth Assembly, (d) Salaries of Board of Education and (e) Baltimore Area Leadership School. These items are to be supplemented through the current Reserve Fund.

4. We recommend that no request shall be made on the Conference floor for finances unless it has first been presented to the Commission On World

Service and Finance.

- 5. We recommend that we employ a treasurer, full time, and a director of stewardship, whose salary is to be \$8,000.00 a year. These two offices are to be filled by the same person. It is expected of this person to conduct workshops on every district and give direction to Every Member Canvass in each local church. The \$8,000.00 salary is broken down to include the following: salary, \$6,000; house rent, \$725; travel, \$800; office expense, \$475.
- 6. We recommend that the Children Service Fund and Methodist Youth Fund be remitted monthly.
- 7. We recommend that the Reserve Fund of \$10,000 be restored to the Budget and whatever is received of the \$10,000 be deposited in a savings account.

3. BOARD OF MISSIONS

Basing its program on two words "Consciousness" and "Conscience," a church in western New York has increased its giving to missions and other causes almost 600 per cent.

Said the chairman of the Commission, "Our missionary progress comes from a growing 'consciousness' on the part of our people of the privileges of stewardship in the world-wide field of Christian endeavor and a growing 'conscience' that we must do our full share in the task."

I pass these courageous words on to the Delaware Conference and its member charges in the hope that at least one church may catch the significance of this message. If we ever needed instruction on the meaning of a "Connectional Church" we need it today, and the efforts of this Board will in a large measure be directed toward this end.

When a great Conference like ours comes up with a mere pittance for a very laudable cause, with two of its leading districts "batting" zero, we need to ponder the words of the Master, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." I dare the Delaware Conference and its member charges to accept the slogan "as much for others as for ourselves." Carry it out, and watch what happens.

Let us now look at our obligations to the National Board of Missions. A strong current of personal responsibility must be built up and sustained. With the co-operation of our superintendents we must see to it that the enormous debt against some charges is gradually reduced. There can be little excuse for delinquent interest. Somehow there must be established and put into operation a workable theory that the strong help the infirmities of the weak, in that the churches of a district shall share the indebtedness of a struggling congregation to a point where it is again solvent with the General Board. We would like to explore the idea anyhow.

May we thank the Secretaries of Missions for a very faithful performance of their duties during the year. They have given many hours of planning and work, traveled extensively in the conference, have attended conferences and workshops on Missions, and deserve our highest thanks for a job well done.

May we also thank the District Superintendents who have given excellent co-operation, attended all meetings and whose assistance and advice have been invaluable.

As we close the year with regrets for the things left undone, we have gained much in knowledge and inspiration from touching the lives of others, and we look to the future with hope and confidence.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

It is with gratitude to Almighty God and appreciation to the members of the Conference Board of Missions, the District Superintendents, ministers and laymen, that I submit this my second annual report, to the Delaware Annual Conference.

The churches of our conference have in most cases, done a commendable job in raising the World Service apportionments. But our missionary obligation will not be fulfilled until a better job is done in the field of missionary education, promotion and cultivation. Missionary education must be at the heart of our missionary program, not merely the satisfaction of a budget raised in full if we are to reap the benefits of Christian stewardship year after year, as it relates to Christian missions.

In order that we might have an "informed people" as well as a "paying people," an active Commission on Missions in every local church is a must. Every pastor has the responsibility to see that this commission is at work in his local church, not merely as a fund-raising agency, but as an agency of promotion, cultivation and education in all phases of the work of missions and church extensions.

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. Every local church in the conference strive to set up and maintain a functioning Commission on Missions.

- Every effort be made to increase attendance and interest in the District Missionary Institutes.
- Encourage the use of returned missionaries and scholarship students in our churches, in order to afford local congregations a "grass root" report of the work of missions.
- 4. Every local church cooperate wholeheartedly with the Commission on Christian Vocations in the recruitment of young men and women for service in the field of missions, both national and world.
- 5. Every local church to sponsor a School of Missions and stimulate the circulation of missionary study books.
- 6. We further recommend:
 - (a) That a self-study and analysis of each local congregation be systematically and diligently executed. And that where necessary, the newly appointed Committee on Research and Survey be employed to make further study and recommendations.
 - (b) That churches particularly in relocated urban areas and new developments might set up outpost Sunday Schools after adequate study and consultation with the District Superintendent have been made.
 - (c) That churches in farm and seasonal areas become more concerned in our ministry to the migratory and seasonal laborers.

Finally, we would like again to urge two things upon each church, first—organize and activate your local church Commission on Missions; second—conduct a School of Missions in each local church.

Conclusion

We are grateful to our conference board chairman, Mr. Roy L. Cordery, to the District Missionary Secretaries: Rev. O. H. Spence, Rev. J. I. Williams, Rev. W. H. Greene, Rev. R. B. Thompson and Rev. W. R. C. Mills and to the District Superintendents. Without the assistance of these brethren, the promotion of missions in our conference could not be carried out as successfully. It is because of their untiring efforts that the MISSIONARY STORY has been told in each district.

4. THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

• The migration trend toward the urban centers of our nation is in opposition to many of the gains made by churches in the rural and town areas of The Methodist Church. Three-fifths of the churches comprising the Delaware Conference fall into this category.

On the Salisbury District, the Wachapreague Charge suffered the total loss of its parsonage by fire, Tuesday, December 23, 1958. Progress attends the ceaseless efforts of the people. Under the leadership of Superintendent C. W. Derrickson, a building committee has been organized on this charge and has begun raising funds to rebuild a six room parsonage, estimated to cost \$6,500. On the Exmore Charge, \$3,600 is being invested in a church edifice.

On the Dover District, under the guidance of Superintendent M. O. Ballard, the Clarksville Charge is nearing the completion of a new church edifice at a cost of \$22,000.

Meetings

W. H. Greene and Augustus Chancy were delegates in attendance at the Northeastern Regional Town and Country Conference held at Goucher College, Goucher, Maryland, June 24-26, 1958. Brother Greene represented our Conference well on a Town and Country Panel Discussion and Brother Chancy served as leader of one of the Exploration Groups. This Regional Town and Country Conference will continue its meetings, one mid way between National Methodist Town and Country Convocations and another during the National Convocation at the same place. A continuing committee was set up to keep up frequent exchanges of Town and Country information. Brother Chancy was elected to membership on this committee which will meet at Wichita, Kansas. July 21-24, 1959.

Your chairman met with district superintendents and pastors during the conference year seeking to create adequate interest in the Farm and Home Committee Movement in local churches, the Group Ministry, and the Larger Parish Work by means of addresses and distribution of appropriate literature. He attended four District Conferences and a District Town and Country

Convocation at Cambridge, Md., on the Easton District, Dec. 11, 1958.

Our Annual Business Meeting was held at the Odessa Charge, Wilmington District, Rev. C. H. Parker, pastor, on February 20, 1959.

Survey

Three special trips were made to Philadelphia and Chester, Pa., in the interest of the Survey of the Dover, Easton and Salisbury Districts. The highlights are: 1. Dr. Roy Sturm's office, a section of the Division of National Missions, was chosen to direct the survey. 2. Bishop Love is requested to appoint a Survey Committee (the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work will suffice). 3. A meeting of the Survey Committee with Dr. Sturm is set tentatively at Dover, Delaware, June 18, 1959. 4. The field work is to be done during the summer or early fall of 1959. 5. After the field work has been completed and the data analyzed, another meeting of Dr. Sturm and the Survey Committee will be held to discuss preliminary findings. 6. The final report will be published prior to 1960 Annual Conference and made available at the Conference Session. 7. The cost will be \$1.00 per booklet, which will contain detailed report.

5. BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Executive Secretary

I am grateful for the privilege of the opportunity to report to you some of the activities engaged in during the conference year. As my associates will report many of the phases of our program for which they have a responsibility, I shall mention only those matters which are not covered by them.

In this period of rapid change in all areas of life, we see our task as one which is to help persons, not merely to change, but that this change is guided into Christian growth. All of our programs and procedures are beamed in that direction. Our goals are always two fold: (1) The growth of persons into Christlikeness and (2) The accomplishing of numerous tasks which constitute our program. We are ever conscious that organization, program, and procedure, must ever be geared to the first goal-helping persons to grow as Christians. Therefore, as we evaluate the work of the year we do so by asking the question: What has happened in the Christian growth of persons?

Staff Changes: When Rev. E. H. Holmes was transferred to serve in Liberia, Africa, it became necessary to fill the vacancy in the Directorship of Adult Work. Rev. David W. Briddell was elected to this post and has served most acceptably during the year. His report to this body will reveal the manner in which he has met the challenges in adult work, and how he has planned to improve this phase of our program. We are grateful for his services.

There were likewise vacancies to be filled on the district staffs. Rev. Henri Deas was elected as District Director of Adult Work for the Philadelphia District. On the Salisbury District, Miss Sallye Derrickson succeeded Mrs. C. A. Elder as Children's Director and Rev. H. E. Anderson succeeded Rev. S. E. Parker as Adult Director. Each of these workers has made a real contribution to his particular area of responsibility.

Other members of our Conference and district staffs have given the usual devotion and efficient service which always characterizes their work. We are confident that a more loyal and dedicated group of Christian workers could not be found. We shall ever be grateful for their fine fellowship of service.

Church School Enrollment Increases: The report of the Conference Statistical Secretary to the 1958 Session of The Annual Conference reveals that in all divisions of the Church School there were gains made during the conference year. The increases were as follows: Children 477; Youth 132; Adults

357. There was also an increase of 75 officers and teachers. Only in the adult home membership did we suffer a loss, where the number was 11. Thus we had an overall gain of 1030. We are grateful for this increase. We feel that it is due to great emphasis on the improvement of the local church school.

General Church School Work: We are pleased with the ever increased interest in the promotion of general church school work. Under the district directors in this field, much progress is being made. District-wide meetings were held on all districts with one exception. In these meetings a total of 326 persons were present and engaged most actively in the program arranged by the director of General Church School Work.

Leadership Education: The Area Leadership School at Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C., gives us a good beginning in the area of leadership education each year. We have maintained the usual good attendance and keen interest at this school. We are confident that it makes a significant contribution to our work. Our attendance this year was 39 including members of the staff from our conference.

There have been 17 subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools conducted. The schools are characterized by the usual high interest and efficient administration on the part of their staffs and the pupils enrolled. These schools are making a real contribution to the church school work in the local churches participating. To the District Superintendents, the 17 deans and some 100 instructors, we are most grateful.

Camp Development: We are pleased to report that on June 26, 1958, final settlement was made for the purchase of our camp site. The deed for the same is duly recorded in the court house at Centerville, Maryland. We now own this 50 acre tract of land, located on Route 213, five miles north of Centerville, Maryland.

Finances: We are grateful for the loyal support given by an increasing number of our churches, to the causes which support the many phases of Christian education. We are, however, mindful that a number of churches have not as yet done their best in this regard. Because of the pressing need for giving Christian guidance to the children, youth, and adults, who look to us for guidance, we feel that we must do our uttermost to carry on the ministry of teaching. The future leadership of our church and indeed, of our world, may very well depend upon our willingness to support our program of Christian education.

Cooperation with Other Boards and Agencies: It has been a real joy to have worked with the Commission of Christian Higher Education. I was appointed by the commission to serve as a part-time director of its program. A more detailed account of my activities in this agency will appear in the report of that Commission.

We have enjoyed the usual fine fellowship with the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Their help in the promotion of Missionary Education with children and youth has been invaluable.

Mission to Japan: May I express once again my gratitude to this Board of Education and to the conference for the opportunity to serve as a member of the Lacour Centenary Mission to Japan last summer. This was one of the most meaningful experiences of my life.

From time to time I have sent out reports of the work accomplished in the

place where I worked for the summer. Also I have appeared on thirty-seven occasions with illustrated lectures on the mission.

Here, I need only to say, thank you for the privilege of sharing my experience of Christ with the Japanese Christians and non-Christians in Miki City, Japan, where we are seeking to establish a growing Christian Church. Thanks also for the contributions to support this work.

It was likewise my privilege to serve as follows; in addition to the many contacts on the districts, and local churches: As Dean of the Baltimore Area Leadership School, Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C.; as leader in National Meeting of Executive Secretaries, Nashville, Tenn.; participated in Workshop in Group Leadership, Temple University; and served as official Methodist delegate to the Fourteenth World Convention on Christian Education, Tokyo, Japan. In addition I have served on committees of the Council of Churches of Philadelphia, and Maryland and Delaware.

Appreciation: My appreciation grows with the years, for the confidence which this Board, Bishop Love, district superintendents, pastors, and countless local church workers, express in the work in which we are engaged.

To members of the staff, who share with real devotion our joint responsibility, I express thanks. To my wife, who serves as our office secretary, and shares the many concerns of the total task, I am eternally grateful.

Finally, "Thanks be to God" for his sustaining love and for his bountiful grace. To serve Him is my greatest joy.

Recommendations

- That we request each District Superintendent to have a "Roll Call" for Church School Rally Day at each District Conference.
- 2. That a pamphlet be published giving the following information on Special Days: The nature of the observance; the purpose for which the funds are raised and the benefits which come to the churches as a result of these funds. These pamphlets are to be made available to local church leaders in church school work.
- That the Director of the Morgan Christian Center send a report of Methodist Student Work at Morgan College to be published in the Conference Journal.
- 4. That we continue to make our Race Relations Day offering available to The Morgan Christian Center up to the amount of \$2,500.00. All over this amount is to be designated for a college in our Area.
- That we set up a procedure for financing a program of camp development, with a view to conducting a camping schedule in 1960.

THE DIRECTOR OF YOUTH WORK

We recognize that the situation facing our youth in the world and in the Church is a complex one. It is a world of immortality, of secularism and a world full of fear, suspicion and tensions. We are aware of the vast number of youth outside the fellowship of the church and that our program within the church needs improving. It is left to us to build an adequate youth program that will meet the needs of youth in this age of outer space exploration, rising nationalism, and racial strife. Our program must help provide the faith necessary to live disciplined, witnessing lives able to speak to these issues.

Toward this end we have done the following things:

600 persons participated in summer beyond the church meetings discussing the theme: "Our Spiritual Awakening."

Twenty-five youth and adults won 80 to Christ and 10 to the M.Y.F. in the

Christian Witness Mission.

One thousand were present at the Missionary Rallies and raised over \$1,500.00 for the Methodist Youth Fund.

\$1,550.00 has been raised for our ongoing program. We need at least an-

other \$1,000.00 to meet our budget.

Courses for youth and the adults who work with them have been offered on all districts in Observation Schools, Christian Workers' Schools, and at the Church School Superintendents Conferences. Members of our staff have helped select or teach these courses. Fine cooperation exists between us, the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Laymen's Association.

We have had an informative page in each issue of "The Informer." Field Work includes visits to 22 local churches and at least 2 visits to each district.

Interracially and interdenominationally, we have worked with the Philadelphia, Wilmington, and Virginia Council of Churches, the Chesapeake U.C.Y.M. and five other annual conferences.

A new youth paper "Delcoyo" has been started with a circulation of 350. We have gained new members and are moving toward a goal of 7,000.

Thirty-four attended the vocation conference and 50 the Christmas dinner.

New ventures include a job analysis of leaders of summer meetings, preassembly staff meetings, a resource guide for leaders, and consultations for new workers.

Projected before June are the Older Youth Week-end, a Camping Workshop, Training for leaders of summer meetings.

A study on audio-visuals Curriculum, in cooperation with the General Board is under way.

Recommendations: We recommend

 That in 1960 the Christian Workers' Schools use the following courses for Adult Workers:

Understanding Teeners, Understanding the M.Y.F., Guiding Youth, Guiding Seniors and Older Youth, and The Adult Worker in Methodist

Youth Fellowship.

- 2. That we hold a Social Concerns Seminar on a week-end basis early in October for 4 youth and 1 adult from each district, at a cost of \$6.00 per person, in a central location. That this be planned in conjunction with the newly formed Board of Christian Social Relations. That we draw upon the resources of the General Board of Temperance and other agencies for leadership.
- That we seek the use of other conference equipment to help us in our projected work camps; that we seek to recruit adults for leadership in these enterprises; that some financial plan be set up to help underwrite

the development of our newly acquired site.

4. That in 1960 a top level strategy conference be held to review our present youth program and give guidance for future programming and planning in the area of district and subdistrict work, local church and community needs, camping, finances, scholarship, and promotion: That this conference be composed of the District Superintendents, District

Directors and Secretaries of Youth Work on the District level in the W.S.C.S., the Youth Council of the Conference, at least 3 other youth from each district, dean of the summer assemblies, as well as the conference staff; that each agency or groups will bear the expenses of their own persons to the meeting.

We could not close this report without words of deep appreciation to the staff of youth workers on our districts who have labored long hours to accomplish what has been done, they are Estelle B. Armstead, Edwin Ellis, C. Edgar Jordan, Charles Kiah, Carlton Parker and Lillian Brown. To my coworkers on the conference staff I shall be ever grateful for the encouragement and advice given. We are grateful to the youth, their adult workers, pastors, and District Superintendents who have cooperated and who make it possible for us to report.

YOUNG ADULT FELLOWSHIP

I am happy to report that the work of the Young Adult Fellowship is still on the road of progress and outreach.

Our year began with our fourteenth annual Young Adult Conference on the campus of the Delaware State College, Dover, Delaware, June 13-15. The conference with its theme: "The Power of Churchmanship, as it comes from God, as it relates to others and as it relates to me," was a positive challenge to the conference delegates. The concensus of opinion led us to believe that all present were greatly inspired and informed. They were eager to return home to their several local churches equipped to do a more thorough job of kingdom building. The Rev. F. Norman Van Brunt, from the Methodist Board of Education, Nashville, Tenn., did a splendid job of setting the climate and stage for each of our group discussion sessions.

Several young adults attended the various leadership conferences and training schools during the year. Persons representing each of the districts attended the area Leadership Training School, Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C. Two delegates were sent to the Middle Atlantic Convocation, Buck Hill Falls, Pa. These persons were able to get professional training in specific areas of interest and need, that they might return prepared to help any of the local churches to strengthen their Young Adult programs throughout the Conference.

It was suggested in our initial council meeting by Rev. David Briddell that a survey be made of the educational status of the local churches in our conference area. I am happy to say that appropriate forms have been drawn up and sent out to every pastor with a few items to check and return. Our plans also call for us to meet at least once with each district and sub-district director in order that they might understand our future plans on a mutual basis, to the end that more effective work may be done. The workshops were quite successful this year throughout the districts with much enthusiasm derived by those who played an integral role. The council members are still on call as the servants of the conference. Many are responding to the request in the areas of their speciality and are doing a commendable job.

The conference young adults contributed \$200.00 to the Campsite to help make the development program possible. We contributed \$100.00 for the Miki City Church in which Rev. Howard A. Bailey, our Executive Secretary, worked while on the Lacour Mission in Japan.

Many thanks to Rev. Howard A. Bailey, Rev. David W. Briddell, Mr. C. Leonard Miller and Mr. Leon Bevins for their council and guidance. I am proud of the local churches for their concerted efforts to carry on the program of the young adults. May we ever continue to lead people out of the darkness of selfishness into the glorious sunlight of brotherhood and cooperation.

OLDER ADULT WORK

There are more older people in our parishes and in our nation than ever before. The congregation can help them meet their needs for security, love, and usefulness. It can develop an understanding of older people which will make their added years opportunities for growth in the favor of God and man and for expression of their God-given talents. Never forget that while the congregation serves older people, older people are serving the congregation by helping themselves and by helping others.

Divine Worship with the Congregation: Fellowship of worship in the sanctuary is the highest fellowship and the best way to arrest the feeling of

loneliness.

Pastoral Counseling: This is a normal part of any pastor's work. The basic principles of pastoral counseling are followed, with special application to the problems of older people. Older people also have spiritual problems, and they will appreciate help in retaining or regaining spiritual security.

Friendly Visitors to Older People: This service may be an extension of the "home department." Develop a group of skilled visitors including older people. Use recordings of worship services. Films can be used for shut-in individuals.

Be sure that older people in hospitals and homes are visited.

Group Activities: Use church facilities for club activities for older people. Most parishes have organizations for every age except the "65 plus" group. Hold daytime meetings. Include both men and women from all economic groups. When groups exceed twenty-five to thirty persons, start additional ones. Practice democracy, older people know how to conduct group activities.

Open House for Older People: Depending upon the location of the church building and number of older people in the vicinity a room or rooms may be opened to them for constant use for reading, sitting, visiting, and playing games. This will be especially valuable in a rooming house neighborhood. A

luncheon club will be very popular.

Assistance in Housing: According to individual needs, assistance may be given older people in their housing problems by:

- Assistance in finding suitable houses, apartments, rooms, or boarding homes.
- b. Assistance in finding nursing care in family homes, commercial nursing homes, or in suitable homes, when this type of special care is needed.
- c. Development of special cottages or apartments for older people in the community. If parish has funds, perhaps some investment could be made in low rental housing facilities.
- d. Careful, selective referral for admission to Homes for Sheltered Care.

Housing Services: For those who can no longer carry the burden of house-keeping, assistance in securing adequate people to do this work will make it possible for older people to remain in their own place of residence for a longer period of their lives. Some will need help chiefly with their shopping.

Meeting Money Needs: Old Age Assistance is available to every person over sixty-five years of age who can prove financial need. Many older people, receive their basic income through the Old Age and Survivors' Insurance program. As at any age, the use of money may be more important than the amount of money.

Work Opportunities: Work is an integral part of life for most older people. Age alone should not deny an individual and equal opportunity to be employed. A less exacting job with no loss of status will make life happier for many older workers.

Health Services: Encourage the doctors in the community to help older people keep good health through the practice of medical care for older people. Cooperate with the hospitals. Hospitals are reluctant to admit older people who might not have any place to go when they are ready for discharge. Inactive trained nurses in the parish might help to develop a home nursing care program. Rehabilitation of older people is a social necessity and a Christian obligation.

Cooperation With Other Community Organizations: The congregation cooperates, as a part of the total team, with other organizations in efforts to

benefit the people in its community.

Suggestions: 1. A director of Older Adults in the local church; 2. A director of older adults on every district; 3. District and sub-district conferences and workshops; 4. Annual Conference Assembly for older adults; 5. Annual Older Adult Day in the local church; 6. Recognition of older adults in the local church annually.

6. COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

Christian Higher Education is a large term! When it is broken down in simple language it means that we in our conference are showing a vital concern that our youth shall have the opportunity to pursue an education and develop their minds and spirits under Christian guidance. They should have an atmosphere that seeks the mind of Christ rather than being dominated by the secularism of our age. It is our responsibility to see that our students are assured this Christian atmosphere. To this position your Commission is committed, and in this spirit has carried on its work during the past year.

We, therefore, have a very deep concern for the welfare of our church related schools and colleges. We believe that these institutions have a very great stake in developing the future leadership of the church and of our society. This conviction has been the motivation underlying our efforts in promoting the

program of your commission.

Our Promotion: Following the district convocations which were held on each district in April 1958, we began to plan the next steps. Having been authorized by The Annual Conference to ask each pastoral charge to contribute the sum equal to \$1.50 per member, we set up the following plan: (1) In cooperation with the Board of Lay Activities to ask each church to observe Layman's Day and lift an offering for Higher Education. (2) In cooperation with The Board of Education to ask each pastoral charge to observe Student Recognition Day and to lift an offering. (3) To have each charge to do the same on National College Day. The financial statement of the Conference Treasurer will reveal the results which have been realized in this regard.

At a meeting of the Commissions of the Area at Bennett College in June, it was agreed that we should make a special effort to help Bennett College this conference year. The request of the college was a campaign for \$75,000.00. Of this sum we accepted the responsibility for \$25,000.00. On December 16, 1958 a sum of \$7,250.00 was paid to the college by our Conference Treasurer. There are other commitments which we hope to meet by the end of the conference year.

During the year, the director has done the following in cooperation with the chairman, Dr. N. W. Moore, Jr.:

Spoke at many district meetings in the interest of Higher Education.

Visited local churches and given guidance to students in choosing colleges through use of visual aids, etc.

Represented Christian Higher Education at Vocational Conferences on the district and conference levels.

Promoted the program through our Conference education bulletin, The Informer.

Through The Interboard Scholarship Committee issued scholarship awards as registrar for the committee.

In cooperation with The Board of Education worked with college staffs in setting up Methodist student work.

Represented our conference at the meeting of The General Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education held in Kansas City, Mo., January 8-10, 1959.

In cooperation with The Board of Lay Activities and The Board of Education sent out letters and other direct mailings to the pastors in promoting the program.

Appreciation: Bishop Love's well known concern for Christian Higher Education has manifested itself at every turn. The support of the District Superintendents in accepting the promotional responsibility has been indispensable in realizing the results achieved. The Conference Lay Leader, Mr. Hally P. Johns, and his co-workers have given us great encouragement in their fine spirit of cooperation in requesting the laymen to observe Layman's Day in the interest of Christian Higher Education. To the pastors and members of our churches we are ever grateful.

On behalf of the colleges and the students whom they serve, we say thank you one and all. It has been a joy to serve the commission in this manner. In serving you we are serving Him who is our Lord and Master, even Jesus Christ Our Lord.

Recommendations

- That we continue to request \$1.50 per member from each pastoral charge. The same to be divided as follows: \$1.00 for schools and colleges.
 30 cents for Wesley Foundations and 20 cents for promotion within the conference.
- 2. That we hold a series of district meetings for the purpose of assisting local churches promote the cause of Christian Higher Education.
- That we request The Board of Lay Activities to again observe Layman's Day in the interest of Christian Higher Education, with an offering being lifted.
- 4. That we request The Board of Education to promote Student Recognition Day and National College Day in the interest of Christian Higher Education, with an offering being lifted.
- 5. That, in cooperation with The Board of Education and The Inter-Conference Methodist Student Movements, we continue to organize Methodist student work on the college campuses within the territory of of our conference.
- 6. That we promote a special campaign for Morristown College setting as a goal \$15,000.00. The funds to come from the \$1.50 per member referred in No. 1.
- 7. That we give to the following institutions amounts equal to the giving to them in the year 1957-58: Bennett College; The Wesley Foundations, Howard University and Bluefield, West Va.; Morgan Christian Center (not including Race Relations Day offering); Gammon Theological Seminary and Allen High School.
- That we again employ a part-time director for the commission. The support of this office to come from the 20 cents referred to in recommendation No. 1.

7. COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

We are pleased to report that there is an increasing interest in the area of Christian Vocations throughout our conference. It is not at all unusual for pastors or local church school workers to send to our office, names of young people who wish to enter a church vocation. Many youth express the same desire in their contacts with the Chairman of the Commission, the Youth Director, and others who have responsibility for working with youth.

We have in our files a list of young people's names according to their church vocational choice. We have sought to make this list as accurate as possible, though we are aware that it needs to be constantly reviewed or revised and kept up to date. However, we evaluate the list, it is safe to say that it beyond a doubt shows a trend which is indeed encouraging in terms of the future leadership of the church.

The list referred to has come as a result of the active work done on the local, district and conference levels where youth have been challenged to give themselves in lives of Christian service.

A Conference on Church Vocations was held at Maryland State College, Princess Anne, Maryland, December 5-6, 1958. This was the first conference of its kind held in our conferences wholly by our own commission. Previously we had joint conferences with the Commission of the Washington Conference; in 1951 in Wilmington, Delaware; and in 1956 at Morgan State College, Baltimore, Maryland. The following is a listing of those who attended the conference in accord with their chosen vocations:

Our leadership was very good, including Rev. C. L. Carrington, pastor of Brooks Memorial Church, Jamaica, N. Y.; Miss Jane Stentz, Associate Secretary of Missionary Personnel of The Board of Missions; Miss Alberta Martin, Superintendent of Nurses at The Methodist Hospital, Philadelphia, Pa., and Miss Mary Chaney, Director of Christian Education, St. Daniel's Church, Chester. Pa.

The Christmas Dinner Meeting was held on December 30 at Ezion Church, Wilmington, Del. Invited to this meeting were the youth committed to the Ministry and Missions. Our part in this occasion was to cooperate with the Cabinet and The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications. The fine fellowship of this meeting becomes more significant with the passing of the years. Both the young people and adult counselors have come to look forward to this occasion with great anticipation. There were 33 youth in attendance.

Presentation of our Youth at the Ordination Service at The Annual Conference is also an occasion to lift up Christian Vocations. The testimony of the young men who have been presented to the Bishop on these occasions is that they have been greatly inspired.

Promotion of Our Work: We have greatly benefited by the suggestions made at the last meeting of our commission by the committees. This report thus far has been largely a review of this promotion. We have in addition used the pages of The Informer and some direct mailings as means of promotion.

As a commission, we feel that we have done the main part of our work when we have recruited these youth and have given guidance in the follow-up. When they have reached a certain place in their development we pass them on to other Boards and Agencies, especially fitted to help them. Thus in 1958 we turned over to The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, 11 names of young men entering the ministry. We are suggesting that 9 more names be thus sent to that Board this year. This will give us a total of 20 names sent to the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications. It is worthy of note that we will still have remaining in the Pastoral Ministry section 40 names.

A summary of the current listings of our records reveals the following: (not including the 9 turned over to The Board of Ministerial Training.)

8. THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

It is impossible to read the story of the life of Jesus without getting an impression, vivid and lasting, both from what He said and what He did, of His sense of the inestimable worth of each soul. Jesus saw in men, all men, the high potentialities for endless unfolding and eternal blessedness. He never failed to press home the infinite love and forgiving grace of God for all men. His "come unto me," uttered in words and actions which have rung out over the centuries in tones of sweetest music, is one of the highest tributes which has ever saluted human ears.

No work for Christ is more imperative, has more promise in it, or is more fruitful in blessings to one's spiritual life than earnest and well directed efforts in Evangelism. The service of personal Evangelism, the winning of this man, that man, or the other man into the faith of the Son of God, and thus putting him in the way of doing the divine will, is a form of service which may not be omitted in our programs of Christian service. One of the best proofs that our lives are in touch with Christ is to feel the urge and know the delight of winning others to His side.

The Washington Convocation, in July, was well attended by our conference. Each district secretary, the chairman of the Board and conference secretary, district superintendents and a number of pastors and laymen were present. This Convocation was a stimulus for a greater program of Evangelism in our conference. There were District, Sub-district, and a number of Local Church Convocations held. Many of the inactive were re-activated, the unconcerned were challenged, and many new commitments were made.

Our Conference Secretary, the Reverend George T. Jackson, has availed himself of every opportunity possible to expand this important phase of the work of our Conference. He has made personal visits to most of the districts and has given guidance and inspiration in the training of Visitation and Personal Evangelism. Under his dynamic leadership, we are looking forward to greater accomplishments.

Recommendations

In view of the pressing need for the deepening of the Spiritual Life of the active members of our churches, the activating of the inactive, and the winning of the unsaved, we make the following recommendations:

- That a Convocation on Local Church Evangelism be held on each district and in each local church again this year.
- 2. That there be a week of Visitation Evangelism as well as a week of Mass Evangelism in each local church, and that we seek to evangelize those persons in prisons, detention homes, juvenile courts, hospitals, and such other places as we see the need of Christ.
- That there be training classes for the purpose of preparing teams of visitors. We urge that at least 10% of the total membership of each church be enlisted.
- 4. That each local church observe the following:
 - a. Prayer Vigils, having at least one 24-hour Prayer Vigil.
 - b. That Youth Christian Witness Missions be conducted.
 - c. Have a Great Day of Witnessing, and strengthen the Commission on Membership and Evangelism.

- 5. We urge that the Religious Census be kept up to date.
- 6. We further recommend for each district:

a. A Spiritual Life Retreat.

- b. That the Conference Secretary of Evangelism and the Cabinet plan a Retreat for ministers.
- c. That we also plan a Spiritual Life Retreat for the laity.

9. BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

At the last session of our Annual Conference a forward step was taken when the Conference Commissions on Peace, Temperance, and Social and Economic Relations were combined into the Board of Christian Social Relations.

Slowly, but surely, churches of every denomination are assuming their rightful role of leadership in the application of Christian principles to current issues such as: segregation, housing, war, peace, temperance, and industry. Religious conventions and conferences, when they meet, should not adjourn without taking a stand on matters affecting the welfare of the nation; and their concern should not be restricted to racial problems. The tremendous influence of the churches, increasingly being brought to bear, is an indication that movement toward integration and universal justice will not die.

The Church is not the Church if it is not affecting life, changing the community and the world in which we live. We are reminded that religious leaders from the early days of history have shown, by precept and example, their belief that God wants mankind "to do justly and to have mercy." Jesus, the carpenter of Nazareth, and his disciples have shown down through the centuries a vital concern for the poor and needy and for the victims of social and economic injustice.

Dr. C. I. Winslow, Professor of Political Science at Goucher College has said, "Laws are weak as public opinion allows, as strong as public opinion demands." Our job, as followers of Jesus, is to continue to exert persistent, determined, and untiring public opinion to the end that the Christian conscience of all America is sufficiently aroused to preserve our concern for justice and Christian brotherhood. "Let us not grow weary in well-doing, for in due season we shall reap, if we do not lose heart." (Galatians 6:9.)

Our Needs

Our problems and concerns, being technical, call for prayer, study and dedication. We need to get more facts and a better understanding of what the Gospel demands.

- 1. The Church should care whenever a social system denies any man full freedom.
- 2. Housing is also a Christian concern. Every man is entitled to house his family in a clean, healthful home with sufficient space.
- 3. The Church believes every man has a right to work for a just wage, in a wholesome atmosphere with both employers and employees recognizing their mutual responsibility.
- 4. Every child deserves the very best facilities and education that the community can offer, regardless of background or color of skin.

5. America's alcoholics number over four million. These are people who need the help of the church. Often the social drinker causes traffic accidents.

6. Our faith in the sovereignty of the God revealed to us by Jesus Christ compels us to renounce the heresy that war is inevitable. We must work for

peace. We need to get Christian opinion involved in this area.

The Methodist Church can and must meet these needs by doing something about them. The agency in The Methodist Church charged with leadership in this responsibility is the *Annual Conference Board of Christian Social Relations*.

Recommendations

We recommend:

- That a Commission on Christian Social Relations be made mandatory for the local church.
- 2. That for the next quadrennium the Board of Christian Social Relations shall consist of two laymen and two ministers from each district; presidents of Board of Lay Activities, Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild; and five members at large elected by the Annual Conference, one of which shall be a young adult and one a youth.

We commend the General Board of Social and Economic Relations for the excellent work which has already been accomplished. We are grateful for the leadership of Dr. A. Dudley Ward, Executive Secretary, under whose guidance new frontiers of social and economic relations are being blazed within the fellowship of The Methodist Church.

10. BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The purpose of the Board of Lay Activities is to deepen the spiritual life of the lay members of the church and to cultivate among them an increasing loyalty and interest that they may become an active working force in each local church.

The board shall promote a program of lay activities which shall include the following: Christian stewardship, Christian fellowship, personal evangelism, lay speaking, Christian literature, benevolences, adequate support of the ministry, sound church financing, attendance upon public worship, men's work, training of official boards, and Christianization of personal and community life.

Christian stewardship is basic to Christian living. We must acknowledge that God is the owner of everything and we are the stewards intrusted with His goods.

Christian fellowship is growing among us. We have fellowship with other denominations and growth can be seen in the exchanging of plans and ideas. Workshops are being sponsored inviting different races and faiths.

We have noticed a marked degree of growth in personal evangelism among our laity through our workshops. Many are making every opportunity count on their jobs and through social contacts. We know that we can work for Christ at all times. We have lay speakers in many of the local churches. We urge that every lay speaker become well informed on the work of The Methodist Church.

We hope that each local church will lay more stress on the circulation and use of more Christian literature. We suggest a table or rack in the rear of the church with church papers and tracts.

I am glad to report that our churches are understanding more about benevolences. We must teach every member how benevolent dollars are used.

People will give if they know the purpose for which they give.

It is gratifying to learn that most churches are paying their pastors a more adequate salary. It is true that no one can do his best unless receiving

normal support.

Sound church financing is a matter that is most urgent. For a number of years our churches have not been sound in financing. We urge every local church have each year an every member canvass to underwrite its budget. Let each member know the cost of operating the church. It needs the support of all its members.

We have never stressed as a conference the attendance upon worship services which is very vital to our church life. We recommend that the official board of each local church take at least ten minutes each meeting stressing

the importance of attendance upon worship services.

It is the job of the Board of Lay Activities in each local church to give special attention or consideration to men's work, correlating it with the total program of lay activities. The men's organization of each church should be chartered. Each chartered club receives the monthly publication, "Methodist Layman," which has an outlined program for men and also gives them information about the activities of other men around the world. We hope to have one hundred per cent chartered churches of our conference by 1960.

No local church can be any stronger than its official board. The weakness of the local church is its officials. Too many officials have not learned to perform their duties. Each office in the church has a purpose. The conference board of lay activities recommends that workshops to train officials in the local

church be held on a sub-district or local church level.

No church can accomplish the great task of building Christian character and leading men and women into the knowledge of Jesus Christ without reaching out and taking part in the life of its community. The influence of the Christian church can mean much to such agencies as the Community Chest, Y.M.C.A., Y.W.C.A. and others.

Our mid year conference, district annual meetings, and workshops have enriched the lives of those who attended. We urge all laymen to attend.

I could not close this report without thanking Bishop Love, the district superintendents, pastors, and our loyal laymen for their fine cooperation in making this conference year a success.

Recommendations

The Conference Board recommends:

 That a committee on men's work in each local church promote the training and active participation of men under the leadership of the General Board of Lay Activities as stated in paragraph 278, section 10.

2. That the official board of each local church, in cooperation with the

pastor, be responsible for the program of lay activities as outlined in paragraphs 286-292, 1956 Discipline.

3. That each local church hold an every member canvass as suggested in paragraph 267, 1 of the 1956 Discipline.

We further recommend that the canvass be held in March on a district or subdistrict level and that the district superintendent, lay leader and director of Christian Stewardship cooperatively be responsible for training, promotion of workshops and compiling of results.

- 4. That a committee on Christian Stewardship promote stewardship in the local church as outlined in paragraphs 1512 and 1513, 1956 Discipline.
- 5. That each local church set up a Commission on Christian Social Relations according to paragraph 276, sec. 6, 1956 Discipline.

11. THE GOLDEN CROSS SOCIETY

Permit me to express my sincere thanks for the opportunity that is mine to present this report in the interest of the Golden Cross Society. When Bishop Love and the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes selected me for this task, they chose one who pleaded ignorance regarding the scope and depth of the work. Since serving as directress, my eyes have been opened and I have become sensitive to the essential responsibility of my work. Further enlightenment has been gained by attending the Annual Meetings of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes each year. Frank discussions with the personnel leadership of the general board have given meaningful insight toward the realization of our immediate objective, a Home for the Aged of the Delaware Conference.

Our local churches must consider the total program of Christian service. We must take stock of our needs, responsibilities and opportunities. The ministry of health and welfare must be included in the program of every local church. The responsibility of the healing and helping ministry begun by Christ, propagated in The Methodist Church by John Wesley, is extended through the Board of Hospitals and Homes.

In Methodism we have 229 affiliated institutions throughout the United States serving annually more than a million persons. This is an increase of 16 such institutions during the past year. Our Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes is seeking to stimulate the local churches to add the 'plus' to Christian service in order that the Delaware Conference will be one of the next to have a home for the senior citizens who have served well.

For the conference year, 1957-58 the districts reported as follows: Easton, Mrs. Blanche Jewett, director, \$362.50; Dover, Mrs. Violetta Duckery, director, \$351.00; Philadelphia, Mrs. Anna Jones, director, \$810.00; Salisbury, Mrs. Theodosia Hayward, director, \$149.50; Wilmington, Mrs. Cleo Henry, director, \$640.00; total—\$2,313.00. Our financial goal is \$1,000.00 from each district.

My thanks to all who have in any way contributed to our cause. Will you and your church take more seriously the mandate of the New Testament that we express our Christian faith in deeds of love and service to all?

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. The support of the conference in the annual Golden Cross rally.

2. That a Golden Cross Committee be named in each local church and that the chairman be named at the first quarterly conference.

3. That the annual enrollment fee of \$1.00 per person be continued.

4. That Golden Cross Day be observed on the second Sunday of November, 1959.

12. BOARD OF PENSIONS

The care of the aged or disabled servant of any society or organization is universally recognized as a paramount duty. Men every where point the finger of scorn at those institutions which enrich themselves on the fruitage of human toil and cast aside the toiler in his old age or disability. The producer of values, whether spiritual or material, deserves a fair share of that which he produces. This duty is both economic and moral. From an economic point of view, an old age pension may be regarded as a "wage earned during productive years and wisely deferred for payment to the years of disability," and from a moral point which regards the obligation to care for the dependent as fundamentally just. This applies fully as much to the Church as it does to an industrial concern. The adequate care of the disabled servants of the Church is one of the clearest duties outlined in the Word of God.

The demands which the church makes upon her ministers enforces the reasonableness and importance of this service. They are to be set apart from a secular to a sacred calling, encouraged to undergo a long period of preparation involving a constant outlay of money without appreciable return as income during the days of apprenticeship. They are to give unstituted energy and undivided time. The church discourages diversion of time and talent into channels of material prosperity for themselves and often rewards them with a bare competence, which, when it is averaged with the returns in any other high calling, falls far below the level. The church pleads with them to establish Christians homes in which children may grow and points with pride to the choice products of ministers' homes, the men and women who are found in all walks and stations of life, occupying worthily high positions. As the church makes these demands, she owes it to the ministers to be fully provided for in the day of old age and disability.

The mission of the Church to evangelize the world, so clearly recognized as her supreme duty, demands new efficiency in leadership. Every great economic, social and moral challenge which is voiced in the unrest of the world comes eventually to the Church for its solution. The redemptive forces of the race must be kindled into a glow at the altar of the Church. The Church must not turn aside from leadership in the days of adversity. The choicest flower of youth must be encouraged to offer themselves for leadership in the days of their prosperity in order that the Church may prove to a gain-saying world that she believes in her mission and in her power to fulfill it.

The approval of the Lord awaits her fulfillment of an imperative command. He who said, "Go into all the world," also said, "I was hungry and ye

gave me to cat. Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye did it unto me." It is well for Christian men and women to give largely to build, maintain and endow institutions, but if the Church shall do all these things, "even giving her body to be burned," and have not charity, that grace of love for those who have served her, it "will profit her nothing." "The Lord is mindful of His own," and if the Church has the mind of Christ, she will seek the welfare of those who most clearly, although all too imperfectly, represent Him on earth.

During the past ten years the Delaware Conference has progressed. Ten years ago it paid an annuity rate of \$17.00, today it is \$30.00. Ten years ago we had a Permanent Fund of \$93,186.04, today it is \$166,287. Ten years ago our Stabilization Fund was less than \$4,000, today it is \$32,000. We are in the midst of raising \$318,000 for the Pension Reserve Fund of which on May 15, 1958, \$142,782.11 had been raised. This is the fourth year of the campaign. Let us major this coming conference year in paying out all pledges and delinquent church assessments and next year restudy the program.

We must express gratitude for the leaders of our Conference who had visions of this day and greater days yet to come and laid a firm foundation upon which to build. We pray that we shall not fail them, but will bring to full fruitage their dreams and visions of the day when a retired minister or widow will not look upon retirement as a burden, but as a period of relaxation and joy with few worries about shelter, clothing and food. Let us stand by this noble cause. We do not ask for charity but justice. I pray that we may continue to progress in this fine field of service.

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. Payment of \$8,333.00 to the Permanent Fund this year.

2. That there be two separate reports for the $1\frac{1}{2}$ % and 12%. In each case,

the balance due be reported.

3. That identification be made by the cabinet in concurrence with the Board of Pensions as to who the associate pastors of the Conference are for whom 12% will be expected from the local church. The respective district superintendent shall inform the pastor, associate pastor and quarterly conference of this decision. The local church is responsible for the payment of 12% for the pastor and associate pastor.

4. That a plan be worked out with the superintendent of the Methodist Hospital, Philadelphia, Pa., whereby the ministers of the Delaware Conference and their families, through our financial contributions, may become a part of that hospital's plan for Methodist clergymen.

5. That a representative of the Pension Board visit the churches annually to acquaint the people with the Methodist Hospital; to encourage medical check-ups and to give volunteer service to the hospital that better social relations might be established.

6. That during the conference year, 1959-60, we concentrate on encouraging charges and persons to pay up, if possible, the reserve

pension apportionment and individual pledges.

15. COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

Commission on Worship recommends the following:

1. That pastors make faithful use of the regular materials provided by the church as aids in building orderly and effective services of worship, such as the Orders of Service to be found in the Hymnal, and additional services to be found in the Book of Worship.

2. That each church make an effort to supply its congregation adequately with Methodist Hymnals, and, as soon as practicable, with a sufficient quantity

of the Book of Worship.

3. That pastors purchase the new Wedding Manual just jublished by The Methodist Publishing House, and follow its suggestions carefully, counselling those who are to be married on all matters relating to preparation for the ceremony, with special attention given to the proper music to be used. (A similar manual is in preparation on the funeral service).

4. That pastors discourage the use of an inferior type of music in the worship services of our churches, and, if pastors are in doubt as to what is not good in music, that they urge the musicians of the churches to utilize the unexplored sections of our *Hymnal* and consult with qualified musicians for di-

rection as to the use of other suitable music to be used in worship.

16. TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

Since television and radio are here to stay and have been proven to be effective media through which people may grow in Christian understanding and living, we are tremendously excited about the work which we are beginning in the Delaware Conference. More opportunities are now available to present the Christian gospel through mass media than ever before. We pray that we will grow in our skills in order to make use of these opportunities.

We can report to you the following areas of progress during the past year. "TALK BACK," which was produced by the Television, Radio and Film Commission of The Methodist Church was launched on May 10, 1959 in the Philadelphia area. Members of our Conference Commission have helped in the planning and execution of this project and representatives from churches of our Conference have been asked to be guest panelists. Letters have already been received praising and quality of the "Talk Back" programs. The Reverend Daniel L. Ridout, representing the Delaware Conference, will serve as guest preacher for "The Church of the Air" program on WCAU, CBS, on Annual Conference Sunday, May 24th. Through this program a large radio audience

in the Delaware Valley will know of our meeting here this week. The choir of Haven Methodist Church will provide the music.

We wish to express our appreciation to Mr. David Gockley, Director of Public Relations, Philadephia Council of Churches, for granting us increasing opportunities in this area of service.

Your attention is called to the method of financing the work of the Television, Radio and Film Commission of The Methodist Church. The Annual Conference cannot apportion its churches for The Methodist Television Ministry. Therefore, this item has been removed from the non-ratio askings and placed as a *free-will offering*. Unless we support The Methodist Television Ministry, the future programming of this commission will have to be curtailed. The success of the first "Talk Back" series demands that the second series be produced.

Recommendations

1. That every church take a *free-will offering* for The Methodist Television Ministry on the third Sunday in September.

2. That we send a letter of commendation from this Conference to station WFIL-TV, Philadelphia, for its willingness and cooperation in producing "Talk Back" in the Philadelphia, Delaware and New Jersey area.

17. THE STATE OF THE CHURCH

We believe that the Church has great underdeveloped resources, and also that she lags miserably behind when compared with other social institutions. She has not yet fully awakened to the task of exerting genuine Christian influence in a world where powerful secular movements vie for the loyalty of mankind.

We think that the Church should be more zealous in assuming her whole responsibility, without compromise, in the struggle against social evils and injustices, such as are evident in the fields of education, labor, industry, commerce, and religion. We believe that it is not enough to voice mere opinions through pronouncements or resolutions, but she must move out into actual real life situations, and come into direct contact with those who are troubled, burdened, exploited, lost, and disinherited.

We feel that by launching into action, under the sovereignty of God, and the strength of the Gospel, the Church will have influence of dynamic quality, and her action will reflect more truly the absolute will of God for today's world.

> "Lo, the hosts of evil round us, Scorn Thy Christ, assail His ways, Fears and doubts too long have bound us, Fill our hearts to work and praise, Grant us wisdom, Grant us courage, For the living of these days."

We recommend that the Church:

1. Emphasize through preaching and teaching, the impact of the full Gospel message, and its challenge to take action.

Exert dynamic leadership in vital areas of social concern where neglect and injustice are evident.

18. COMMITTEE ON WILLS AND LEGACIES

The manner in which we use our money is a matter of individual choice. The way it is used after we have gone from this world isn't always our choice. It isn't our choice because fifty percent of the people of the United States die without making a will. Some feel that making a will hastens death. This is a superstition which should have no place in Christian planning. Some folks face the problem of a will by avoiding the question, then fate steps in and forces them to take the consequences.

Remembering the church in a will sounds simple but needs to be handled wisely. We recommend the following steps: 1. Seek the will of God in prayer; 2. Seek the service of a lawyer; 3. Keep the will in a safe place. We further recommend that in remembering the church in your will, the following may be considered: Building and improvement of church property, hospitals and homes, world service, schools and colleges, and scholarships. Any amount of money can be used.

Recommendations

We recommend:

 That the local churches make "Wills and Legacies" a paramount issue in its cultivation and promotion.

That the pastors seek to have each charge send its apportionment by September in order that this committee will have ample time to cultivate this important work.

3. That the filmstrip, "Over the Wall" be shown on each district, and if possible, on each charge. (This filmstrip can be obtained without cost through the district superintendent from the Council on World Service and Finance, Chicago, Ill.)

19. THE EMANCIPATION PROCLAMATION CENTENNIAL

Another year has given more light, more freedom and more truth concerning the background and the destiny of The American Negro. In spite of his innumerable shortcomings and glaring faults he carries within his breast 'an indispensable element' that our nation needs in the present crises.

This year marks our Fourth Pre-Jubilee Hour. Three years hence will find us upon the threshold of the 100th Anniversary of the issuance of the

Emancipation Proclamation.

Our Fourth Annual Exhibit in the rear of this auditorium is centered around a replica of THE TOMB TO THE UNKNOWN SLAVE to be erected in Swainton, New Jersey, 1963. Here the bones of an unknown slave will be placed in a sarcophagus and laid in a tomb amid insignia of more than 6,000 years of recorded history. This will be the fruition of a long overdue mission of love to the forgotten person who laid the economic foundation of our great country with 'a thrill of joy prophetic, trembling on from east to west.'

Excavations have been made for The Emancipation Centennial Park, and drawings and castings for the tomb.

Recommendations

- A place on our Annual Conference Program, 1960 for the Fifth Jubilee Hour.
- 2. Historical displays to be carried to many parts of each district of the Delaware Conference bounds and regions beyond.
- 3. A continuous program of forums, workshops, discussion groups and retreats.

20. EDITORS OF THE HISTORY OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE

The publication of a History of the Delaware Conference has not been realized; however, the editorial staff has made some progress. In addition to the Conference Journals, books, papers, and mimeographed copies of the manuscripts of the late Doctors F. J. Handy and Wm. C. Jason, Sr., the editors have acquired and reported more than 239 double-spaced pages or fact sheets of classified, relevant data on such subjects as the following: "Action and Reaction of Methodism on Negroes of the Area from Earliest Times to the Organization of (Negro) Societies, Missions and Churches," "Pre-Delaware Conference Organization," "Organization and Early Development of the Conference," "Earliest Beginnings of Methodism on the Eastern Shore," "Camp Meetings of Early Methodism," "The Methodist Aid to Negro Freedom," "Early Independent Church Movement," "Establishment of Missions," "Vote for Conference Changes," "Report of Epworth League Committee," "Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society," "Delaware Conference History Since Unification," etc.

Among other things, the study of this history reveals that "the phenomenal spread of Methodism through Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and Maryland, especially on the Eastern Shore (The Peninsula) was due largely to a group of intrepid young men from Ireland, England, and also America, who, imbued with the true spirit of evangelism, gave themselves with almost incredible abandonment to the spread of the Gospel. These men sowed the seed which made this territory a fruitful soil; and as they labored among both the whites and the Negroes, the field became ready for the labors of the forefounders of the Dalaware Conference who subsequently took over the responsibility of serving their own people in this area."

The historical findings also give brief biographical sketches of such important men as Isaiah Henson who was affectionately called the Father of the Delaware Conference, James Davis who died at the seat of the Conference in 1870, Harrison Smith who because of the power of his voice was called a "Son of Thunder," Wilmore S. Elzey who was the first Secretary of the Conference, and Frost Pullett who was the first after organization of the Conference to be received as a member.

Tradition has preserved the following humorous story about Brother Pullett. Dr. F. J. Handy declares in his manuscript that "Frost Pullett went to Deal Island to preach. He was threatened with bodily harm by ruffians, these same brutal fellows had previously captured a colored preacher named Buyman Brown, tied him and made him run behind a horse until he was completely exhausted and fatally injured, this group finally apprehended Frost Pullett to whom they said, 'Old man, if we let you go, will you promise us that you will not be seen again?' Frost at once, with his characteristic wit said, 'If you will let me go, you may see frost here again, but you will never see Pullett here any more." With profound devotion and great sacrifices Frost Pullett persisted in preaching the gospel and helped to establish Methodism on the Eastern Shore.

The last meeting of the editorial staff was held on Saturday, April 25, 1959, at Mt. Carmel Church in Wilmington, Delaware. While some of the editors believe we have sufficient data to complete the proposed volume, most of the staff members see the necessity of further research and "digesting of reported materials" before a satisfactory History of the Delaware Conference is ready for publication. Our primary concern is not to write a "quick, short story," but an accurate, readable, interesting account of the signal events, the struggles and the progress of the great, historic Delaware Conference.

The editorial staff agreed upon the following procedure to facilitate the writing of the History of the Delaware Conference:

- That relevant materials in the Pratt Library, Baltimore, Maryland, in the Philadelphia Public Library, and in the library of the Old St. George's Church be secured and reported on fact sheets.
- That a further study be made of Methodism on the Eastern Shore, especially on the Peninsula.
- 3. That the necessary and proper steps be taken to complete the chapters and the whole volume with deliberate speed.
- 4. That adequate funds be provided by the Conference to cover all expenses involved in mimeographing, editorial clinics or workshops, and the publication of the volume.

C. Other Reports

1. WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

I am indeed happy to present to you, my first report.

During these forty days of Lent, we have been following Jesus, as He taught, healed, and witnessed how the "Spirit of Christ Is Sufficient for All of Life." The significant thing about Jesus was His power to attract people of so many different personalities. His interest and love drew them. This is our aim to win and help to unite all women of the church in Christian living and service. The reports are as follows:

Dover District: Mrs. Isaac Crippen, the new president, and officers found a well organized district. The work is progressing. They continue to march forward with strength to achieve the goals for the year, namely: sub-district group organizations, 100% reporting, budget paid in full, more prayer circles, a few more accredited courses and two workshops. Special emphasis has been placed on Children and Youth work. An Officers Training Day was held on each sub-district. An Educational Seminar proved a great benefit to the district, with its theme, "Reaching Out to Others Through Study." Miss Dorothy Barnett, Field Worker of the Woman's Division of Christian Service, toured the district. She brought information and inspiration. We will again attend the Delaware United Church Women's Session in Christ Church, Dover, Delaware. The bond grows stronger.

Easton District: Mrs. Joseph Murray, president, proudly reports an increase in membership, study courses, and subscriptions to the Methodist Woman and World Outlook. Four societies have received Jurisdiction recognition. In the Church Wide Study, the members of Waugh Church, Cambridge, Maryland, donates a special gift of \$125.00 to help build a college in Alaska. The chairmen of the sub-district groups are doing a magnificent job in promoting the work. We were greatly benefited by the visit of Miss Dorothy Barnett on our district. She had the opportunity to speak at three high schools. Our Eleven-Eleven Rally, Vice President Workshop, and Clinic for Children's Workers were very successful. Spiritually and financially the district prospers.

Philadelphia District: Report progress under the leadership of their president, Mrs. Geneva H. Summers. There were two Officers Training Days, an Education Seminar and district meetings with outstanding guests, who presented courses that were full of information as well as inspiration. We are still striving to realize our chief aims: To recruit some young person for full-time service; To urge every member to pledge freely and then pay in full; To co-

operate with the total program of the Church. We have faith to know that this will be accomplished, so, we will endeavor to Go, labor on! spend and be spent-'Tis joy to the Father's will; It is the way the Master went-Should

not the servant tread it still?

Salisbury District: Mrs. Odelle Jackson, president, makes the following report of the work accomplished with the assistance of loyal, consecrated women. An Educational Seminar was well attended. Study courses were so interestingly presented that books were sold to the amount of \$68.55. "To read is to know, and to know is to do." The Inter-Cultural Workshop was at last realized, Mrs. Pope was elated over the attendance of both groups, 93 and 95. Rev. Otho J. Brewer, visited the meeting and spoke on Migrant Work, another step toward integration. We gave hymnals to Friendship House. Our desire is to complete our budget in due time. Miss Dorothy Barnett, of the Division, rendered wonderful services.

Wilmington District: Mrs. Mary Miles, president, reports progress. The faithful and cooperative officers work earnestly to achieve the goals set for the year. The year began with an Officers Training Period conducted by our Conference Sec. of Promotion, Mrs. Boyd Alford. The Educational Seminar was in charge of Mrs. Edith Prideaux. This was a source of much needed information. The observance of the Week of Prayer and Self Denial was quite a success all over the district. November 16th and 19th, Miss Dorothy Barnett, Field Sec. of the W. D. C. S. visited our district. Her wealth of information is proving of great value to the work. At our district meetings, we aim to present the most needed areas of work in skit forms. Mrs. R. C. Hughes, our Vice-President, aided by Mrs. Pearl Spence are doing commendable work along the drama line. We are moving on, "In His Name."

The Wesleyan Service Guild, with the newly elected Secretary of the Conference, Mrs. Harry A. Henry, continues to progress along all lines of work. The Guild's aim is to have 100% cooperation. They have had two executive meetings, one of which I attended, at Friendship House. They have donated twelve hampers to Friendship House. A new Guild has been organized at Trinity Methodist Church, Germantown, Pa. Mrs. Harry Henry has visited each district on which Guilds are organized. Miss Lillian Johnson, Division Secretary of Guilds, has also visited our Conference to further enlighten us in Guild work. This report would not be complete if I did not mention our School of Missions, Friendship House and Jurisdiction representatives. Mrs. William A. Strothers who is Secretary of Children's Work of the Jurisdiction and Mrs. William Henry who is Treasurer of the Jurisdiction, are rendering valuable services in the Conference, wherever needed, especially at Friendship House-

The School of Missions continues to grow. The type of faculty is always the best. The dedicated and consecrated officers are like jewels, shining in splendor, doing their best, that "Christ's Kingdom May be Realized." Our Conference knows the value of this school and each year sends as many as possible to be instructed. We are indeed pleased with the cooperation of our ministers with this work, and hope the time will soon come when we will have a large attendance of the clergy.

Mrs. Florida Graves, the director of Friendship House, is doing a good job. There are twelve girls living here. A great deal of work has been done, and I'm sure, when you see it during the Conference, you'll be pleased that you have helped to support such a beautiful and worthwhile project. This is your own Friendship House with its mortgage paid off. The Mortgage Burning will be 4 o'clock Saturday, May 23rd, Bishop E. A. Love, Resident Bishop participating. The Wesleyan Service Guilds and Woman's Societies of the Philadelphia Area have held many meetings here. The Annual Fall Luncheon continues to be a great success, until now, we wonder—"Where will we hold it?"

2. AREA ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

In making this—my seventh report to the Annual Conferences of the Baltimore Area, I must say, first, a word of profound gratitude to all those who have contributed in any way in making my work most enjoyable and challenging. In a measure this means not only Bishop Love, with whom I am directly associated, but his Area Cabinet—the 18 district superintendents of our conferences, the conference officers, the pastors, and the laymen of our church, including the thousands I have never met or even seen.

It is, of course, this feeling of oneness among us, despite our widespread territory, which enriches our total program and which strengthens our fellowship.

We urge support of the two major projects which will be presented by our office this year:

1. The Area Ministers' Wives Retreat, to be held at the Morgan Christian Center, July 15-18. Because of the unprecedented success of last year's retreat for the women of the Delaware and Washington Conferences, the ladies almost unanimously requested that the retreat be enlarged this year to embrace the entire area.

It will doubtless be necessary for the women of the East Tennessee and North Carolina Conferences to come in car pools as a matter of economy. They should thus make travel plans early. Advance registration of \$2.00 must be in the area office by July 1st.

2. The bi-quadrennial Area Council will meet October 7-9, in John Stewart Church, Bluefield, West Virginia. Official delegates are listed in the Area Council by-laws, found in the journals of each Annual Conference.

Superintendents are requested to see that pastoral delegates representing the various districts be elected as soon as practicable after the Annual Conferences.

The Council will meet for the first time within the bounds of the East Tennessee Conference. Because of the travel distance, all delegates must come in car pools, if at all possible. Superintendents are requested to plan such pools from their respective districts by July 31, so that the delegation can be determined before the August vacation month.

We recommend that Sunday, June 28, be observed as Baltimore Area Messenger Day in our churches, and that each pastor be requested to report a minimum of five subscriptions for the paper during the week following. Promotional materials will be sent each charge from the Area Office.

3. AREA DEPARTMENT OF RESEARCH AND SURVEYS

The service of Research and Surveys of the Area Office submits its report for the conference year 1958-59.

It has been our privilege to provide service in the following: 1. Make two special reports for Bishop Edgar A. Love in the North Carolina, Washington, and East Tennessee Conferences. 2. Two research trips to Norfolk, Virginia, studying the possibility of securing the Memorial Methodist Church for the use of Negro Methodists within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference. 3. A study in Richmond, Virginia, recommending that the Washington Conference acquire the Branch Memorial Methodist Church as an additional church for the expanding Negro population of Richmond.

The following conferences were attended: Regional meeting of the American Society of Planning Officials, New York City, October 16-18, 1958; Washington-Delaware Conference on Missions, Morgan State College, Baltimore, Md., July 15-18, serving as consultant on urban life as it effects the church; Conference on "The Role of the Church in Urban Renewal," auspices of Council of Churches and Baltimore Urban Renewal and Housing Authority, April 8, 1959, Brown Memorial Presbyterian Church, Baltimore; Annual Meeting, Maryland State Conference of Social Welfare, Goucher College, Towson, Md., May 7, 1959.

During the year, served as a member of the following boards and commissions: Board of Missions, Washington Conference; Commission on Town and Country Life, Washington Conference; Comity Commission, Council of Churches for Maryland and Delaware; Comity Commission, Washington, D. C. Council of Churches; Department of Urban Church, National Council of Churches, U. S. A.; National Probation and Parolee Association; National Conference of Social Work; American Society of Planning Officials; Maryland State Conference of Social Welfare; and Executive Board, Baltimore Branch, NAACP.

Recommendations

1. That the Board of Missions in each of the four conferences of the Area study carefully the urban and rural territories, planning to meet the needs of missions and church extension within their bounds, including ample funds for the boards of missions to promote urban and rural church extension.

2. That we re-study our Town and Country program and plan wisely

for a Rural and Town ministry to meet present day needs.

3. That the Annual Conferences select proper lay and ministerial representatives for the Conference on Town and Country Work, July, 1959.

4. PROPOSAL FOR CREATION OF NEW YORK AREA METROPOLITAN PLANNING COMMISSION

The Story of Methodism in the metropolitan area of New York in recent years is largely the story of massive changes of urban population and the attempt of the church to relate itself to them. Thousands of Negroes and Puerto Ricans have become the neighbors of churches which have traditionally had white congregations. Many of these congregations have "moved out" to new neighborhoods while others have remained with ever diminishing resources of

manpower and money. Some have continued to serve the immediate parishes attempting to minister to all the people. For the most part the efforts have been limited and usually rather local in approach. Meanwhile the opportunities and the problems have continued to mount until they have become almost overwhelming. It was evident that Methodism needed to make a greater and more creative approach if it is to render its part of Protestantism's witness to the metropolitan area.

Consequently in June of 1957 Bishop Frederick B. Newell appointed a New York Area Study Committee, charged with the responsibility of developing a more adequate strategy for the church. As this committee began its work two things became evident: (1) that it was necessary to take a more careful look at the entire picture, and (2) that the relationship with the Negro churches of the Delaware Conference needed to be clarified. Bishop Edgar A. Love was asked to appoint three representatives from the Delaware Conference to this Study Committee.

This augmented committee then sponsored, with the Department of City Work of the Division of National Missions, the Conference Board of Missions, and the Urban Work Committees, a New York Metropolitan Area Urban Workshop. This was held at Buck Hill Falls, January 6-8. Thirty-seven ministers and laymen including eight district superintendents, with eight resource persons and five staff members of the Division of National Missions, studied with Bishop Newell, the various aspects of Methodism in metropolitan New York.

Among the recommendations from the Workshop was one—that the Area Study Committee develop a plan for a Metropolitan Area Planning Commission and that this plan be presented to each of the four annual conferences at their next sessions.

After further careful study this Area Committee herewith presents to the respective annual conferences for adoption the following:

Function

(1) To develop, after careful study and research, a comprehensive plan and strategy, both immediate and long-range, for the Methodist Church in the metropolitan area of New York.

The metropolitan area involved in this study being the counties of the Bronx, Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens and Staten Island in New York; the Northern, Eastern, and Southern Districts of the Newark Conference; and the New York metropolitan area of the Philadelphia District of the Delaware Conference.

- (2) To recommend to the proper agencies and/or societies appropriate action in support of the plan.
- (3) In implementing the plan, to correlate the areas of responsibility and function of the various existing agencies presently involved and cooperate with other denominations and interdenomination agencies.
- (4) To develop a plan for, or program of continuing financial support for the work of the inner city.
- (5) To provide a thorough educational program on the Commission's plans so as to reach the Annual Conference involved with particular emphasis on reaching the people in the local churches of the inner city.

Composition

The Executive Committee of the New York Study Committee, after consultation with the Bishops, shall nominate to the Bishops for appointment the members of the Metropolitan Area Planning Commission with representation as follows:

The two Bishops; the eight District Superintendents of the districts involved in the inner city area being considered (the Brooklyn North and South and the New York Districts of the New York East Conference; The New York District of the New York Conference; The Northern, Eastern and Southern Districts of the Newark Conference; and the Philadelphia District of the Delaware Conference); and

Ministers and laymen chosen because of their interest, ability and training in the city and city church work as follows: four from the conference boards of Missions, four from the conference urban work committees, and one from each conference representing the city or district.

5. STEERING COMMITTEE—DELAWARE STATE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

A number of the judicatories of Christian denominations serving in Delaware adopted a joint resolution at their respective sessions in the spring of 1958 looking to the establishment of a State Council of Churches in and for Delaware. Representatives were appointed by their respective denominational bodies, and a number of meetings have been held in the First Presbyterian Church of Dover. Consultants from the Maryland-Delaware Council of Churches, Delaware Council of United Church Women, Council of Churches of Wilmington and New Castle County and other interested individuals have been invited to help guide the formation of a Council. Those who have been meeting have come from several denominations and from various Delaware localities.

After reviewing the religious, social, and legislative matters in which Christian denominations have cooperated or need to cooperate in Delaware, it was unanimously agreed that a State Council of Churches is clearly, perhaps even urgently needed. The group thereupon constituted itself a Steering Committee to effectuate such an organization. The attached Constitution and By Laws represents our study of Delaware circumstances, of similar documents from numerous other state councils, and our unanimous recommendation to our respective denominations.

It is not proposed that a Delaware State Council of Churches will supercede any local or county councils now in existence or likely to be organized nor that there shall be any organic relationship with national or international councils of churches. It is contemplated that headquarters will be established in Dover, and that professional executive leadership will be secured.

Careful consideration has been given to financing a state council of churches. Recognizing that denominational budgets cannot be adjusted quickly, the following table of askings is submitted for a three year period:

Several factors determined these askings, including ability to give, the ecclesiastical structure of the respective denominations, and their comparative numerical strength in Delaware. It was agreed that no fixed formula is either feasible or desirable. Your representatives are deeply convinced, however, that no organization representing cooperative Protestantism ought to be brought into being abortively and without adequate, assured financial backing. The above yearly totals represent basic, minimum requirements. Unless they can be subscribed in good faith, the movements to establish a Delaware State Council of Churches very probably should be terminated for the time being.

The Steering Committee stands ready to call the first General Assembly into session under the terms of Article V of the proposed Constitution and By Laws. Presiding officers of denominational judicatories are invited to send certifications of favorable action to the Steering Committee's Secretary, 301 N. State Street, Dover.

THE CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS OF THE DELAWARE STATE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES, INC.

PREAMBLE: In the Name of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost. Amen. In order to discover together and to fulfill more adequately their common Christian purposes, the churches of Delaware do hereby constitute this Council as follows:

ARTICLE I. The name shall be the Delaware State Council of Churches, Inc. ARTICLE II. The membership shall consist of those several religious communions whose judicatories most nearly correspond to the State of Delaware in their geographic area which accept this Constitution on behalf of their constituents in the State of Delaware.

ARTICLE III. The governing body shall be an annual meeting called a General Assembly composed of the District Superintendents or Presiding Elders of Methodist districts in Delaware, the General Presbyter of the New Castle Presbytery of the United Presbyterian Church in the USA, the Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of Delaware, the Executive Secretary of the State Baptist Conventions in Delaware, the Dean of the Delaware District of the United Lutheran Church, and the corresponding executive of any other member communion, provided that the communions these officers represent are or become members of the Delaware State Council of Churches; and four (4) persons elected by the respective state judicatories of each member communion, of whom two (2) shall be clergy, and two (2) shall be laity; and for each

annual session following the first organizing session, a further number of persons, clergy and laity being equal in number, to be elected by the state judicatories of the member communions as proportionately determined an-

nually by an Executive Board to be constituted as in Article IV.

ARTICLE IV: 1. There shall be an Executive Board elected by the General Assembly to consist of a President of the Council, a Vice-President of the Council, a Secretary of the Council, and a Treasurer of the Council, who shall exercise the duties normal to their offices for terms of one year each; twenty-one (21) Members-at-Large, who shall hold office for overlapping terms of not more than three years; ex officio, with full voice and vote, the heads of all departments of the Council which may be organized from time to time with the approval of the General Assembly; and ex officio, with full voice and vote, the President or Executive of such local councils of churches as may from time to time exist in Delaware, as the respective governing bodies of such local councils may determine; provided that each member communion shall be represented in the membership of the Executive Board.

2. The Executive Board shall meet at least semi-annually; shall at its first meeting effectuate the incorporation of the Council under the laws of the State of Delaware; shall act on behalf of the Council between meetings of the General Assembly; shall present annually to the General Assembly for its approval a recommended program of activities and a financial budget; shall collect, receive, and disburse the funds of the Council; shall employ and supervise any staff for the Council; and shall give general direction to the affairs of the Council in administering policies and programs determined annually by the General Assembly.

ARTICLE V. The Delaware State Council of Churches, Inc., shall exist under this constitution upon the acceptance by the judicatories of any five (5) communions eligible for membership under the terms of Article II, as certified by

their respective presiding officers.

ARTICLE VI. 1. This Constitution and By Laws may be amended at any regular annual meeting of the General Assembly by a two-thirds (2/3rds) affirmative vote of those present and voting, provided that any proposed amendment; shall have been submitted in writing to all members of the Executive Board not less than thirty (30) days prior to the semi-annual meeting of the Board next preceding an annual meeting of the General Assembly.

2. Additional regulations for the operation and administration of the Council may be enacted from time to time in keeping with the terms of this Constitution and By Laws by a majority of the General Assembly upon recom-

mendation in each case of the Executive Board.

VII. Memoirs

LEON SYLVESTER MOORE



Leon Sylvester Moore, son of the late C. W. and Mary E. Moore, was born in Laurel, Delaware. After many years of effective service in the ministry of The Methodist Church, he departed this life on Saturday, October 4, 1958, at his home in Merchantville, New Jersey.

In addition to his elementary education, he matriculated at Princess Anne Academy, Morgan College, and Howard University. He graduated from Morgan College in 1910. Later, he received honorary degrees from Wilberforce University and Gammon Theological Seminary.

His many friends knew him as an outstanding leader, organizer, and lover of people. He was a good shepherd to many people who looked to him for pastoral care. His advice to young ministers may be expressed in these words, "Be a good pastor and you will succeed." His counsel to people of all ages and in various cir-

cumstances has been most helpful. His favorite expression was "God has His second best for those who give Him their second best. He has His first best for those who give Him their first best." Leon Sylvester Moore gave God his first best and now he enjoys through endless ages God's first best.

As an active member of the Delaware Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, Rev. RULES OF ORDER

DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Revised 1956

RULE I .- Decisions

The President shall decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Conference. The appeal shall be taken without debate. The appellant and the Chair may state the reason for their position. In case of a tie vote, the Chair is sustained.

RULE II.—The Appointment of Committees and Commissions

The Bishop shall nominate all committees and commissions, unless the Discipline, the Charter, or the Conference specifically orders otherwise.

RULE III.—Securing the Floor

The member shall respectfully address the Presiding Officer as "Mr. Chairman." The member shall not proceed to speak until he has been recognized by the Presiding Officer. He shall give his name before beginning to speak.

RULE IV.—Interruption of Speaker

No member who has the floor shall be interrupted, except for a breach of order or misrepresentation, arrival of time for special order, or urgent question of high privilege. The speaker may explain if he thinks he is misrepresented.

RULE V .- Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech

No member shall speak twice on the same question, if any member, who has not spoken, desires the floor; or more than twice on the same subject under the same motion; nor longer than FIVE minutes, unless the time be extended.

RULE VI.—Attendance Upon Sessions

No lay or ministerial member shall be absent from the Conference Sessions without its consent, unless ill; and no reserve lay delegate shall be seated until he has been certified by the District Superintendent to the Conference Secretary.

RULE VII.-Voting

No member shall be permitted to vote who is not within the legal limits at the time the vote is taken. A member must vote on all questions before the Conference, unless otherwise excused by the Conference.

RULE VIII.—Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions, except those noted below, shall be mimeographed and distributed a day in advance of consideration. The following reports and resolutions are not subject to this rule:

Resolution of Welcome; Resolution of Appreciation; Report from the Board of Ministerial Training and other reports that are to be considered in the Executive Session. These reports must be presented in triplicate.

RULE IX.—Tabling Motions

A motion may be laid on the table any time prior to the vote is taken. A motion to lay on the table takes with it all motions to which it adheres and which adheres to it.

RULE X .- Non-Debatable Questions

- To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn to the Conference finally.
- 2. To suspend the rule.
- To lay on the table, providing a representative of the Committee shall have the right to speak.
- 4. To take from the table.
- 5. To call for a previous question.
- 6. To reconsider a non-debatable question.
- 7. To limit or extend the time of debate.
- 8. To call for order of the day.

RULE XI.—Precedence of Secondary Motions

When one or more motions are pending, the order of a precedence in relation to each other shall be:

- To fix the time to adjourn (subject to amendment, or may be laid on the table).
- 2. To adjourn.
- 3. To take recess.
- 4. To order a previous question.
- 5. To lay on the table.
- 6. To limit or extend limits of debate.
- 7. To postpone to a given time.
- 8. To commit or refer.
- 9. To amend or substitute (one amendment being allowed to an amendment).
- 10. To postpone indefinitely.

RULE XII.-Motion to Adjourn

A motion to odjourn when unqualified shall be taken without debate and shall always be in order except:

- 1. When a member has the floor.
- When a question is actually put or vote is being taken and before it is finally decided.
- 3. When the previous question has been ordered and action thereunder is pending.
- When a motion to adjourn has been lost and no business or debate has intervened.
- 5. When a motion to fix the time for the Conference to adjourn is pending.

RULE XIII.—Reconsideration

A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order if offered by a member voting with the prevailing side. If the motion it is proposed to reconsider is non-debatable, the motion to consider is non-debatable.

RULE XIV .- The Previous Question

The previous question shall be taken without debate when ordered by two-thirds of those present and voting. If any secondary motion, or motions are pending, the mover shall indicate to what he intended the motion to apply. If he does not, the motion shall be regarded as applying only to the immediately depending question. The previous question shall not apply in cases where the character of a member is pending, or on matters of Conference relations.

RULE XV.-Written Motion

All motions shall be in writing when requested by the Presiding Officer or Secretary.

RULE XVI.—Unlawful Motions After Speech

It shall not be lawful for a member, after discussing a pending question and before he has relinquished the floor, to make a motion whose adoption would limit or stop the debate.

RULE XVII.—Division of Question

Before the vote is taken, any member shall have the right to call for a division of any question if its subject to such division as he indicates. If there is no such, the Chairman may put the question to a vote without waiting for a second.

RULE XVIII.—Suspension of Rules

These rules may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

RULE XIX.—Amendment of the Rules

Rules may be amended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, providing the amendment has been presented one day in advance of voting.

RULE XX.—Robert's Rules of Order

In any parliamentary situation not clearly covered by these rules, the Conference shall be governed by the current edition of the Robert's Rules of Order.

MISCELLANEOUS LEGISLATION

RULE XXI.—Admitted on Trial

A person may be admitted on trial who meets the Disciplinary requirements and who, on the opening day of the Conference, has not reached his fifty-third (53rd) birthday.

RULE XXII.—Retirement of Ministers

Ministerial members shall be retired according to the Discipline. In

cases where two or more ages have been given, the age first given shall be the retirement age.

RULE XXIII .- Fifty Years of Service

The Conference shall take special recognition of those ministers serving fifty (50) years.

RULE XXIV.—Appointment of Assistant and Associate Pastors

Assistant and Associate pastors shall be appointed by the Bishop and his Cabinet from the ranks of the ministers upon request of a local church. The appointment must be satisfactory to the regular pastor.

RULE XXV.-Fiscal Year

The Conference fiscal year shall end twenty (20) days prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. Pastors' reports shall be in ten (10) days prior to the opening day of the Conference.

RULE XXVI.—Conference Entertainment Fund

The amount for Conference entertainment shall be determined by the Conference upon the recommendation of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. This amount shall cover the cost of entertaining the ministers and their wives, the lay delegates, special Conference guests, members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, widows and two assistants on the Daily Bulletin staff.

RULE XXVII.—The Conference Program Committee

The Conference Program Committee shall be composed of one minister and one layman elected by each of the District Conferences, the District Superintendents, the host pastor, the Conference Lay Leader and the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

RULE XXVIII.—Ordination Service

The Ordination Service shall be planned, including the selection of the Ordination speaker, by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training, or a Committee selected by it. The program must be approved by the Resident Bishop.

RULE XXIX.-Board of Education

The Board of Education shall consist of two (2) ministers, two (2) laymen from each district, six (6) members at large and such other members as the Discipline may direct.

RULE XXX.-Pictures in the Journal

Pictures in the Conference Journal shall be limited to: Deceased ministers, newly appointed district superintendents, host pastor and the Presiding Bishop.

RULE XXXI.-Memorial Service

The Memorial Service shall be planned, including the selection of the Memorial Service speaker, by the Conference Board of Pensions, or a committee selected by it. The program and the speaker must be approved by the Resident Bishop.

BY-LAWS OF THE BALTIMORE AREA OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

ARTICLE I

NAME

This organization shall be called the Baltimore Area of The Methodist Church.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

Object of the Baltimore Area shall be to provide administrative oversight for the four Annual Conferences comprising the Area: Delaware, East Tennessee, North Carolina and Washington. This shall be a non-profit organization.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

The voting members shall be the Bishop of the Baltimore Area, Area Secretary, District Superintendents of the several Annual Conferences, and the following officers of each Annual Conference: the Conference lay leader, the Conference president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Conference executive Secretary of Christian Education, the Conference president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Conference Missionary Secretary, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism; one pastor from each District in each of the Conferences elected by the District; presidents of colleges and Wesley Foundations within the bounds of the Area.

Non-Voting members—any pastor or layman in attendance has the privilege of the floor.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

The officers of the Baltimore Area shall be: President, the presiding Bishop of the Area; two Vice Presidents, one of whom shall be a woman; a recording secretary and a treasurer. These officers other than the president shall be elected quadrennially and shall hold office until their successors are elected. All elective officers shall be chosen by ballot.

Duties of officers shall be those commonly associated with office. The recording secretary shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the meetings and circulate them in mimeographed form to the members. The treasurer shall receive all monies for the expense of the Area and pay all bills incident to meetings and make an itemized report to the presiding bishop after each meeting and deposit such balance as may be in hand with the Area office.

ARTICLE V COMMITTEES

Executive Committee: The District Superintendents of the several Conferences shall constitute the Executive Committee of the Baltimore Area and function for it ad interim.

Committees: Standing Committees of the Baltimore Area shall be: Education, Missions, Finance, Membership and Evangelism, Credentials, Courtesy and Program, and such other committees as may be found necessary. All others shall be appointed by the Resident Bishop, subject to approval by the Baltimore Area.

ARTICLE VI MEETING

The Baltimore Area shall meet at least twice during a quadrennium, such meetings to be known as the Baltimore Area Council, the first meeting being within the fiscal year following the General Conference of The Methodist Church, subsequent meetings to be determined by the Resident Bishop.

ARTICLE VII

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The budget for the support of the Baltimore Area shall be determined by the Bishop and submitted proportionately to the several Annual Conferences, subject to their approval.

ARTICLE VIII

THE AREA PAPER

There shall be published monthly an Area journal to be called the Baltimore Area Messenger, edited by the Area Secretary and such associates as he may select.

ARTICLE IX

LOCATION

The offices of the Baltimore Area shall be in the City of Baltimore, Md.

ARTICLE X

AMENDMENTS

These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Baltimore Area by two-thirds majority of those present and voting; provided, however, that such amendments be submitted in duplicate at least two days before being acted upon.

CONSTITUTION

BOARD OF MANAGERS-BALTIMORE AREA PASTORS' SCHOOL

ARTICLE I. Name and Purpose

Section 1. Name—The name of this board shall be the Board of Managers of the Baltimore Area Pastors' School, The Methodist Church.

Section 2. Purpose—The purpose shall be to provide counsel, make plans, elect a dean and other officers, staff members and teachers (nominated by the

dean), set up a budget, approve recommendations and reports, set the time and place of the Pastors' School and to transact any other business pertaining to the school.

ARTICLE II. Board Membership

The membership of the board shall consist of the resident bishop and three members from each of the Annual Conferences of the area. Two of the three conference representatives shall be nominated by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications and elected by the Annual Conference, the third representative shall be the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education. They shall be elected at the first session of the quadrennium and shall serve until the end of said quadrennium. They shall take office at the first meeting of the board, called by the resident bishop, after each of the Annual Conferences shall have met.

ARTICLE III. Officers and Duties

Section 1. Officers—The officers shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, assistant secretary and treasurer. Each Annual Conference shall be represented in, at least, one office. They shall be elected quadrennially from the membership of the board at the first annual meeting of the new quadrennium, by a majority of the members of the board, after being nominated by the nominating committee or from the floor.

Section 2. President—The president shall preside at meetings of the board, counter sign all checks drawn on the treasury, represent the board when necessary and perform other duties normally performed by a president.

Section 3. Vice-President—The vice-president shall preside and act in the absence of the president and assist the president when needed.

Section 4. Secretary—The secretary shall record the minutes, send out notices of all meetings and keep the president and members informed of any matters germane to the board of Pastors' School.

Section 5. Assistant Secretary—The assistant secretary shall perform the duties of the secretary in his absence and shall assist the secretary when necessary.

Section 6. Treasurer—The treasurer shall have charge of all monies of the board, deposit the same in an account known as "The Baltimore Pastors' School," and shall write and sign all checks. He shall disburse funds only upon written order signed by the Secretary with the exception of bills pertaining to the expense of the school session, in such cases, the dean shall sign the order and report the same to the secretary.

ARTICLE IV. Meetings

Section 1. Time—The board shall meet annually on the first Tuesday in October. The place and hour to be determined by the president in consultation with the resident bishop. This date may be altered by the executive committee provided it shall be held in the Fall of the year. Special meetings may be called by the president or by a majority of the executive committee.

Section 2. Quorum—Seven members shall constitute a quorum for transacting business not otherwise specified, provided, at least, one member from three conferences of the Baltimore Area is present.

ARTICLE V. Committees

Section 1. Committees—There shall be the following committees representative of each of the Annual Conferences and consisting of not less than four persons: Executive Committee, Nominating Committee and Recommendations Committee.

Meetings of committees shall be regulated by the board of managers, and

time and place of meetings shall be subject to the call of the chairman.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the elected officers and the resident bishop. The president and secretary of the board shall be the chairman and secretary of this committee. It shall act for the board between meetings in matters that are necessary to be acted upon before the next board meeting and report its action to the next board meeting. It shall constitute the finance committee and recommend a budget to the board after consultation with the dean. It shall have the financial records audited by a certified public accountant.

Section 3. The Nominating Committee shall nominate the officers of the Board of Managers, the business manager, the dean and other administrative officers provided that others may be nominated from the floor. It shall be composed of one person from each Annual Conference elected by the board

and shall elect its own chairman.

Section 4. The Recommendations Committee shall examine all reports; receive recommendations from members of the board, officers of the school, Department of Ministerial Education and other sources; counsel with the dean and others; and shall make any recommendations, as a result of the above procedure or otherwise, to the Board of Directors. The vice-president shall be chairman of this committee.

ARTICLE VI. Pastors' School

Section 1. Sessions—The time and place of the school sessions shall be set by the Board of Managers.

Section 2. Courses—Courses for the school shall be selected by the dean according to the procedure and rules of the Department of Ministerial Education.

Section 3.—The dean shall be elected at the first meeting of the new quadrennium and shall serve until the end of said quadrennium, or until his successor is elected. He shall be nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the incoming board of managers by a majority of its members. He shall be responsible for the administration of the school in keeping with the rules and recommendations of the Board of Managers and the Department of Ministerial Education. He shall submit a written report, by mail, of the school to the recommendations committee following the school session; and a written report in person at the next board meeting; at the same time he shall submit nominations for the faculty of the ensuing school session.

Section 4—The faculty shall be nominated by the dean after consultation with the resident bishop and the director of the Department of Ministerial

Education.

Section 5—The business manager shall be elected quadrennially at the first annual meeting of the Board of Managers by a majority of its members. He shall be responsible for the business proceedings of the school in cooperation with the dean.

ARTICLE VII. Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the board meetings in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the Constitution of the board.

ARTICLE VIII. Method of Amending

This Constitution may be amended in the following manner:

A proposed amendment shall be submitted in writing to the secretary, at least, sixty days before the annual meeting of the Board of Managers. The secretary shall send the same through mail, to all of the members of the board. The proposed amendment shall be submitted by the secretary to the board in session and shall require a three-fourths vote of the membership present and voting, for adoption.

Any part of this Constitution in conflict with the Discipline of The Methodist Church or the rules of the Department of Ministerial Education shall

be amended after the Board of Managers reviews the same.

Herewith is transmitted the Constitution of the Board of Managers—Baltimore Area Pastors' School, The Methodist Church, is adopted by the Board of Managers in session at Baltimore, Maryland, September 11, 1957.




